

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# PASTORS' CONFERENCE SET

Pastor Andy Lay, chairman of the Christian Board of Education, writes:

An unusual Pastors' Conference is being planned by the State Board of Christian Education for September 19-21, 1977, at the State Youth Camp near Niangua.

It will be unusual in several respects. First, it will be unusual in its subject matter: Christian Counseling. I do not recall ever hearing of a Free Will Baptist seminar on counseling before. Yet, it is one of the greatest areas of ministry for pastors and their wives. It is often an area of frustration, and that is precisely why the Board of Christian Education selected the subject. We believe the seminar will help significantly.

Secondly, the coming Pastors' Conference will be unusual in program personnel. Dr. John Broger will be the principal speaker. Again, if he has ever spoken at a Free Will Baptist meeting, I am not aware of it. Three of the members of the Board of Christian Education met him at last year's National Association of Evangelicals meeting in Washington, D. C. He works in the Pentagon, but as a Christian layman has a tremendous witness for Christ. He is well qualified to speak on the selected subject, having practiced and taught Nouthetic Counseling as taught by Dr. Jay Adams, a popular Christian writer.

We believe the Pastors' Conference will also be unusual in its format. It will be geared to learning and applying practical knowledge and skills. Pastors and their wives will not just take some sermon outlines home with them, but some valuable new and challenging ideas that will no doubt revolutionize the ministries of some of our pastors.

The cost of the seminar (including room, board, lectures, insurance, and some literature) will be \$20 for each pastor or \$30 for a pastor and his wife. Churches should plan to send their pastors, if at all possible.

Plan now to attend.



It is extremely easy for the preacher to develop a habit of constantly demeaning and complaining about the denomination and other preachers in his area. He may do this because he is failing in his pastoral or evangelistic ministry and needs to blame someone, or because others are getting more lucrative offers of churches and positions while he has been ignored, or because he feels that some denominational leaders are antagonistic toward him; or he may believe he is the only one with *all* the answers.

The preacher should either remain loyal to his denominational vows or terminate his relationship with it if he in good conscience cannot keep his covenant. In many circles today, the favorite past-time is to blame all the social and religious problems on the denominational programs.

The denomination has a right to expect cooperation without a compromise of our personal convictions. Free Will Baptists should demand high standards and principles with regard to morals, virtues, purity, respect and confidence, prayer, and Christian living from its preachers. The denomination should demand a high degree of efficiency in the minister's preaching of the Word, his pastoral work, and his manner of conducting services in the church program. The pastor has a duty to learn all about his denomination and cooperate with its program so long as this does not infringe on his personal convictions. Just consider all that Free Will Baptists have done for you.

Professional jealousy among preachers provokes envy, strife, gossip, and many times war between the "brethren." We preachers want our church people to love one another. This is a must if we are to have successful churches. How can we expect them to do so if they see hate, greed, envy, strife, and disharmony among the clergy? Let's pray that God will give us love for one another. No one preacher can convert all the world. No one evangelist can do the whole job. We need each other. We need to defend each other. God help us to enjoy the sweet fellowship of the brethren.

# NAE CONVENTION MEETS

The National Association of Evangelicals met February 22-24 at the Arlington Park Hilton Hotel in Chicago, Illinois. The NAE is composed of more than thirty-two thousand local churches from sixtyfive denominations. Through its various ministries it touches many areas of concern: missions, religious schools, world relief, broadcasting, Christian chaplaincy, evangelism, child welfare, higher education stewardship, and others.

The convention adopted two outstanding recommendations—a paper on "God's Word—Our Infallible Guide" and one entitled "A Call To Repentance." A part of the paper on "A Call To Repentance" is being used in this article. (Space will not permit the entire article.) As this is being read it should stir our hearts and motivate us to a great dedication to the cause of Christ.

## A CALL TO REPENTANCE

Many in America are asking, "Is God trying to say something to us?" It may be that, if we would give Him our attention, we would hear His clear voice calling us away from evil and to righteousness. And perhaps the shift of weather patterns that has brought droughts to the west, dust bowl conditions to the plains, and paralyzing cold to two-thirds of the nation is part of God's effort to get our attention.

It is time to listen. American morality has declined at an appalling rate in recent years. Standards have been swept away by a flood of personal freedom without responsibility. Actions are not based on what is right but on what one can get by with. Dishonesty is prevalent in business, labor, and government.

Pornography poisons the minds and perverts the actions of millions, including many of pre-high school age. Television programming presents a warped picture of American life with the portrayal of immorality, indecency, drinking, and violence. Alcoholism has become a national shame. Youth often learn to drink before they are twelve; many in high school are alcoholics. Alcohol is involved in over half of the deaths of young people in automobile accidents.

All too often those who are concerned about moral problems are like the blind leading the blind. They try to solve these problems by humanistic methods and they fail. It is time for America to repent and return to righteousness based upon the Word of God. Realizing this, and knowing that renewal must begin with those who know God, we: (1) Pledge ourselves to prayer for personal renewal. We will confess our sins, ask God's forgiveness, and commit ourselves completely to Him.

(2) Call upon the churches of America to gather their people together for prayer for renewal, through the confession of sin and commitment to moral righteousness.

(3) Ask President Carter to issue a call to prayer

throughout our nation, based on God's promise, "If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land" (2 Chronicles 7:14).

# BILLY GRAHAM SAYS PRESS DISTORTED HIS STAND ON USE OF ALCOHOL

MINNEAPOLIS, MINN.—Evangelist Billy Graham states that the report of an interview he did with a southern newspaper concerning his stand on the use of alcohol contained only a partial transcript of his views, and subsequent press reports across the country conveyed some deductions that were not intended. "It was accurate as far as it went," he stated.

According to Forrest Boyd, director of communications for Billy Graham Evangelistic Association, at no time did Mr. Graham state that he thought it was all right for then President-elect Jimmy Carter to drink an occasional highball. He did not even mention highballs.

In a message prepared for a future Hour of Decision broadcast and circulated to the news media, Mr. Graham takes a strong stand against the use of alcohol and expresses pleasure that Mr. Carter has said that no hard drinks will be served at the White House during his administration.

"I am duty bound to stand with the Bible on the question of drunkenness. Any sin that can keep a man out of the kingdom of God must be earnestly denounced by the preacher of the Gospel," Mr. Graham stated.

"The Bible puts drunkenness in the same category with other vicious sins. Listen, 'Nor thieves, nor covetous, nor drunkards, nor revilers, nor extortioners shall inherit the kingdom of God' (1 Corinthians 6:10).

"The evil strikes at the very heart of American idealism. It gives our enemies choice material for propaganda, is a waster of time, money and energy, and is eating at the very foundation of our home life.

"One of the greatest social problems in America is alcoholism. One hundred million people in the United States over 15 years of age drink and eleven million of these are alcoholics. Statistics show that 450,000 alcoholics are added to the total each year; 52 percent of the new alcoholics are women.

"According to the Department of H.E.W., for every alcoholic, 4 other persons are affected by their behavior.

"In one year we are spending in the United States \$35 billion for alcohol, \$500 million for advertising, and losing \$25 billion in lost work time, health and welfare services, and property damage.

"But we must admit, in all honesty, that teetotalism as we know it today was found only in certain individuals in the Scriptures, especially those who had taken the Nazarite vow, like John the Baptist. The alcoholic beverages of the middle east in that period were very much weaker than modern drink. Biblical scholars such as Alfred Edersheim tell us that the wine of biblical times was mixed with water.

"The Bible does teach, as Paul admonished Timothy, that alcohol can be used for medicinal purposes. Many modern medicines have alcohol in them.


"While the argument for total abstinence is hard to prove from the Bible—yet another scriptural admonition comes into force. The Apostle Paul devoted most of the 14th chapter of Romans to this subject. He went so far as to say that 'It is good neither to eat flesh, nor to drink wine, nor anything whereby thy brother stumbleth' (Romans 14:21). But He also made it clear that we have a free conscience before the Lord and are not to judge the one who feels it is wrong to eat and drink . . . . Nor are we to judge the one who does . . . so long as he does it unto the Lord . . . does not hurt the testimony of Christ—and does not cause a brother to stumble.

"However, it is my judgment that because of the devastating problem that alcohol has become in America, it is better for Christians to be teetotalers except for medicinal purposes.

"The Bible is not silent about any force which threatens the souls of men. It lashes out against any and all of Satan's tricks and devices, and it is very clear in its denunciation of drunkenness."

The Reverend George Lee, in a guest editorial in the February issue of *Contact* Magazine, also stressed that the Bible denounces drunkenness and warns against consumption of alcoholic beverages. The editorial took exception to Mr. Graham's position on alcohol as first interpreted by press reports, particularly as related to social drinking. Mr. Lee asserts that alcohol should not be tolerated in any degree by the Christian.

Editor's note: Inasmuch as there has been some controversy regarding a press report concerning Evangelist Billy Graham's position on the use of alcohol, it seemed proper to carry this article which appeared in the March issue of *Contact*.
