In the society in which we live today, the need is greater than ever before for Christian homes and parents. There is also a need for Christians to be involved in the community, education, and the government. If you seek God's will for your life, I am sure that He will show you what He would have you to do for Him. I have felt impressed to share with you what I feel God has done in my life.

I am the mother of four children, one son and three daughters. My prayer has always been that the Lord would guide and help me to rear my children in such a way that they would grow up to love and serve the Lord. Without God's help this is an insurmountable task.

When my youngest daughter was in school, I went back to college and graduated the same year that my son graduated from high school. I had a B.S. in education and there were seventy-five applicants for every job. The week before school started in 1971, I was offered a job in our local high school. My son was enrolled in Missouri Southern State College. Before the first semester was completed, he came home one day and said, "I am in the wrong school." He went to visit Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College and enrolled there for the next semester. The Lord was dealing with his life; and, very soon after going to Hillsdale, he acknowledged his call to the ministry. God had provided a way that we could

afford to send our son to Hillsdale. We know that our colleges are not federally funded and are expensive, but God does provide a way. Timothy is now in Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas, and is pastoring a small Free Will Baptist church. God saw fit to use him in His service.

Since I have been teaching teenagers, God has opened up many ways in which I could witness to them. One of the classes that I teach is "Marriage and Family." What an opportunity that I have to teach values, morals, and the sanctity of marriage. In another class, I can present God's creation of the universe and man. Any day I may be asked for advice on drugs, premarital sex, and alcohol. We know that the ideal situation would be Christian schools. Since this is not possible for all, God wants Christian teachers. We cannot withdraw from this world and reach people for Christ.

Each year about 300 teenagers pass through my classes. I pray that I have never neglected my own children. I feel that by being able to give to others that I have more to give to them. God may not ask you to go out into public work, perhaps your job is in the home, but whatever you do, do it in the name of the Lord. I feel God has led me into this path.

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NATIONAL ASSOCIATION TO COMMEMORATE DENOMINATION'S SPIRITUAL ROOTS

NASHVILLE, TENN.—For 250 years Free Will Baptists have been a spiritual force in America. This milestone in religious history will be commemorated during the denomination's 41st annual convention in Detroit, Michigan, July 17-21. The Michigan State Association of Free Will Baptists will host this 1977 conclave in Cobo Hall.

The special proclamation heralding the heritage and spiritual contributions of Free Will Baptists for the past 250 years will be part of the keynote service Monday night, July 18. The denomination's spiritual roots in America date back to 1727 when in Chowan County, North Carolina, Paul Palmer launched a new movement that came to be identified as the Free Will Baptist movement.

The National Association of Free Will Baptists remains the largest body of Arminian Baptists to date. The constituency consists of 227,434 members in 2,419 churches in 39 states and Mexico. Denominational offices are maintained in Nashville, Tennessee.

SPEAKERS NAMED

The 1977 convention theme, "Trimphant in Christ," will be developed in five messages beginning with the preconvention Sunday morning service, continuing during the association's evening sessions and concluding Thursday morning. The speakers are Pastor Dennis Wiggs, First Free Will Baptist Church, Beaufort, North Carolina; Rev. Joseph Ange, director of religious activities, Free Will Baptist Bible College, Nashville, Tennessee; Pastor Frank Davenport, Faith Free Will Baptist Church, Goldsboro, North Carolina; Pastor Fred Warner, First Free Will Baptist Church, Russellville, Arkansas; and Pastor Trymon Messor, First Free Will Baptist Church, Salina, Kansas.

PRECONVENTION ACTIVITIES

Sunday, July 17, will provide an array of preconvention activities beginning with the Sunday school hour at 10:00 a.m. and morning worship at 11:00

a.m. These sessions will be in the Detroit-Cadillac Hotel. At 2:00 p.m. that afternoon registration begins for the National Association, the National Youth Conference, and the Woman's National Auxiliary Convention. The latter two organizations have their annual meetings in conjunction with the National Association.

At 4:00 p.m. on Sunday, the first of three rehearsal periods for the mass adult choir, which will be singing in two of the main worship sessions, will be held. Other practice sessions are at 4:00 p.m. Monday and Tuesday. Mr. Blaine Hughes, convention music coordinator, states the choir will be composed of pastors, choir directors and members, former Bible college choir members (FWBBC, Hillsdale, and CCC), and members of Free Will Baptist Music Ministries.

SEMINAR SESSIONS

A major thrust of the seminar sessions this year is Sunday school growth. This emphasis is quite appropriate since Sunday School Director Roger Reeds has challenged the denomination to increase Sunday school attendance from the current 200,000 to one million by 2000 A.D. This 25-year challenge was issued during the national meeting last year.

Each seminar dealing with Sunday school growth will stress practical suggestions for implementing growth through mobilizing and motivating workers and developing a program of action.

Other topics to be discussed in seminar sessions include developing a church choir, reaching youth, getting the church in the news, personal Bible study, family relationships, roles of the pastor and his wife, conflicts in the home, church budget, current theological issues, missions education, and preparing for and promoting revival.

A complete list of seminars and times of presentation along with a complete program of the national meeting will be carried in the June issue of *Contact* magazine. Housing reservations are included in both the April and May issues of the denominational magazine.

The Reverend Billy Bevan, pastor of Tupelo Free Will Baptist Church, Tupelo, Mississippi, will be the guest speaker for the keynote service for the 1977 National Youth Conference Sunday night, July 17. Mr. Bevan, who will speak on the theme, "Jesus Christ... Lord of All," has been a strong supporter of the CTS program in each of his pastorates. Tupelo's CTS was recently inducted as a member in the Century Club, sponsored by the Church Training Service Department. Membership in this organization is limited to a CTS which has achieved an average attendance of 100 or more for a literature quarter. The Free Will Baptist Bible College alumnus will continue to develop the theme in inspirational sessions throughout NYC '77.

All activities of the National Youth Conference are in the Detroit-Cadillac Hotel except the Sunday night keynote service which will be in Cobo Hall. Competitive activities officially begin at 9:30 a.m. on Monday, with the Music and Arts Festival commencing at 9:30 a.m. the following day.


All those attending NYC must register and receive the official conference badge, which will serve as an admittance pass to all the NYC activities except the evening service. Preregistration for young people ages 6-24, adults 25 and up, and sponsors is only \$3.50 per person. After July 1 a late fee is added which brings the registration fee to \$4. Any adult who wishes to view only the competitive activities and the Music and Arts Festival may do so by purchasing a spectator pass for only \$1. "Preach the word" (2 Timothy 4:2), so said the Apostle Paul. Our Lord said the same thing, and so said the ordaining council as they laid hands on me. "Preach the word." Everybody claims they preach the Word. The Calvinist, preaching unconditional eternal security; the modern charismatic, preaching an "unknown tongue" as the sign of the indwelling Holy Spirit; even the Mormon, preaching his doctrine of "the galaxy of Gods, and preexistent spirits" claims to preach the Word. It must get awfully confusing to the person sitting in the pew, and especially to the unconverted.

The WORD is the Scriptures. The Scriptures (the Bible), God's Word, written by holy men of God, inspired by God, is eternal, infallible, and powerful. St. Paul said the Scripture is profitable for doctrine. The very doctrine of God is found in the Bible.

God's doctrine on sin, atonement, justification, salvation, the Holy Spirit, the second coming, and a host of other important subjects are all found in the Bible. The problem in preaching today is not found in the Word. The problem is found in our interpreting the Word.

The Word is to be preached. The reason is, "That the man of God may be perfect, throughly furnished unto all good works" 2 Timothy 3:17. The only way people can be in right relationship with God is

by the power of the Word of God.

Paul said the man of God can be throughly furnished by hearing the Word of God preached. The Word is profitable for teaching, convicting, setting right, and discipling. Warren Wiersbe said, "It enables the *child* of God to become a *Man* of God, matured in the things of the Lord." The word "perfect" means fully matured, and the phrase, "throughly furnished," means fully equipped. This Word of God, studied, preached, and lived will take this child of verse 15 and make a mature man of him. It will take the new convert, recently saved from servitude to sin, and make a mature saint of God of him.

Notice, Paul said, "Preach the word," not preach from the Word, or about the Word. Dr. William Evans said, "Preaching is the proclamation of the good news of salvation through man to men. It's two constituent elements are a man and a message." The discussion of politics, authors, current events, social problems, and any other subject other than the Bible is not preaching. "Preach the Word."

Educational Building Dedicated at Aulsbury Chapel

On Sunday, May 1, 1977, the Aulsbury Chapel Free Will Baptist Church held a dedication service for a beautiful educational building. The new building complements the present building with six spacious rooms on the upper level, a large area on the lower level accommodating more classrooms, and a fellowship hall. The rooms are fully carpeted with beautiful paneling on the walls.

The afternoon was begun with congregational singing followed by Rev. Earl Ames, pastor, giving a brief history of the church. This account is taken from minutes of May, 1889. "On the fourth Sabbath in May, 1889, the Rev. John Wood and Rev. W. B. Aulsbury commenced a protracted meeting which resulted in the conversion of a goodly number of precious souls. After careful examination and consultation, it was deemed necessary to organize a church. Then on the ninth of June the group assembled at the Sunk Spring schoolhouse and organized into a church. The following officers were elected: Brother W. T. Newby, church clerk; Brothers T. J. Buckner and Thomas Pinkston, deacons; and Valentine Rosener, treasurer. Then it was adopted that the name would be Aulsbury Chapel."

On March 28, 1890, the church decided to build a

church building. The lowest bid was \$93.50 which was given by T. H. Shelly and N. K. Cunningham. On October 6, 1890, a foundation was laid on ground donated by William C. Newby. It was $50 \times 34 \times 14$.

On July 11, 1955, the church voted to build an addition, including a basement, to be used as

Sunday school rooms.

Currently, the building accommodates 10 Sunday school rooms, a nursery, an office, a library, a large basement, and an auditorium that will seat approxi-

mately one hundred and fifty.

Rev. Clarence Burton, Missouri state promotional secretary, delivered the dedicatory message. Brother David Pinkston led in a testimony service, and special music was given by Cheryl Johnson and Marilyn House. Rev. Burton stated, "It is evident the people have a desire to work. This zeal and the sweet spirit of unity reflects proper leadership of a good pastor."

A Labor of Love at Olivet

Daisy Harper, church reporter, writes: Nine years ago the Lord sent a preacher and his wife to Marshall, Missouri. This mission point had only five people. It probably looked like an impossible task for anyone to build a church. But, through a dedicated preacher and his family, a burden for the work, and a strong trust in the Lord, the impossible became the possible. The first Sunday there were about twenty-five people. Most of these were friends of the five people. This was a start. The work began to grow. The Lord sent a lady; then a few more Sundays and a few more families. The Lord was blessing in a great way. The Bible states in Proverbs 13:11, "Wealth gotten by vanity shall be dimin-

ished: but he that gathereth by labour shall increase." The Lord was blessing the labor of the preacher and his family.

In one year the church had assumed all the financial obligations from the Missouri State Home Missions Board. It began contributing ten percent to the cooperative program and giving designated amounts to Home Missions and the Youth Camp. The attendance climbed to an average of seventy in Sunday school, above one hundred in the morning worship, and seventy-five at the midweek prayer meeting service. The church received ninety-seven new members.

With the increase in attendance, the church needed more space. So, the pastor's family moved out of the church building into a parsonage, located not far from the church. The church kept on growing, and in 1974 another expansion program was begun and completed.

The Lord was not only using this dedicated preacher and his family in Marshall, they were being used to help through the Home Missions Board and other ways to raise money for the Lord's work.

The pastor now has a serious illness, cancer. But this is not slowing down his labor for the Lord. He and his wife still go eighteen to twenty hours a day, visiting the sick and trying to lead the lost to Christ. It seems that, when he is feeling the weakest, he has determination to do more.

Yes, we thank God daily for the Bowmans. We are thankful the Lord sent them to serve as pastor and family for the church family at Olivet. There is a verse of Scripture that must be of special interest to Brother Bowman. "And when the chief Shepherd shall appear, ye shall receive a crown of glory that fadeth not away" (1 Peter 5:4).

God's people ought to be distinguished from a pagan society by the character and quality of their life-styles in order to maintain their testimonies; and

Whereas,

Christian liberty dictates a spirit of humility whereby we conform in brotherly love to standards that do not offend fellow believers; and

Whereas,

The need exists to adopt some mutually agreed standards to avoid unnecessary contentions and judgmental attitudes; therefore,

Be it resolved:

1. That we express our concern and disapproval of contemporary trends toward a unisex lifestyle in dress and personal appearance, and that we reject shabby dress attire, immodest garments, and hippy life-styles as reflecting inappropriate ideals for a Christian.

2. That we affirm that biblical principles of modesty, propriety, and femininity for Christian women. Likewise, Christian men should exhibit modesty, propriety, and masculinity in

their personal dress and grooming.

3. That we recognize the home and the local church as the primary place to teach biblical principles pertaining to dress and Christian standards. Therefore, we urge parents, pastors, Sunday school teachers, Church Training Service workers and Christian workers to instruct believers in the proper mode of dress and personal grooming.

4. That we require all participants in the National Youth Conference competitive activities to apply the following uniform regulations to

prevent conflict of attitudes:

A. The boys shall groom their hair so as to follow natural hairlines without covering the ears or extending to the eyes or collar. Sideburns shall not extend below the ears. Suits or slacks are to be worn. Tank tops or tee shirts are unacceptable.

B. The girls shall wear dresses which shall extend to the knee or longer. Dresses must not be low cut or revealing in style or materials. Hair styles for girls should not be in accord with male fashions. Slacks or

pantsuits are unacceptable.

5. That we admonish believers to guard against judgmental or critical attitudes that are unchristian because the Scriptures exhort us to demonstrate a spirit of love and deference with those with whom we may disagree, Romans 14:1; 1 Corinthians 11:16.

6. That we commend all of the young people and delegates in attendance at the National Association who have consistently exemplified the ideals and traditions that we can all appreciate.


