

Hannon Church Celebrates Seventieth Anniversary

The Hannon Free Will Baptist Church of Liberal, Missouri, held its homecoming on September 4, 1977, to celebrate her seventieth year. Three charter members are still with the church. They are Mrs. Pearl Lewis, age 91; Mrs. Edna Thornton, age 86 (these ladies are sisters); and Mrs. Gertie Crabtree. The sisters were presented potted plants by the pastor, Rev. Gary Elder. Mrs. Crabtree is a resident of a nursing home in Nevada, Missouri, and was unable to attend the homecoming service.

Three former pastors were present. Rev. Cecil Campbell, a former pastor, delivered the sermon at the morning worship. Rev. Winford Davis spoke in the afternoon, and Rev. Donavan Maxwell delivered the sermon at the evening worship.

A basket dinner was enjoyed by everyone in the new annex. Special music was given by the Nutting Trio of Joplin and Bob and Barbara Hopkins of Hannon.

A brief history of the church was given by Mrs. Alice Hoover in the afternoon. It is as follows: Before the Hannon Church was organized, there

were three Free Will Baptist churches in the area. These churches had come out of the "mother church," the Verdella Church.

The Hannon community held Sunday school in the townhall over the local grocery store. Rev. T. C. Ferguson began holding services on Thursday evening, following services at the Verdella Church. He held a three-week revival in August of 1907, and the Lord blessed with a great number of converts. The people wanted to organize a church. Brother Ferguson invited the late Rev. W. H. McKown to assist him. On Saturday evening, September 7, 1907, the church was organized with 19 charter members. A board of deacons was elected and ordained. They were L. C. Wade, E. S. Lewis, and John Reihart. Sister Frankie Wade was elected to serve as the church clerk. The church elected Rev. W. H. McKown to serve as the pastor and he served for ten consecutive years. Several other ministers have served as pastors of the church: Rev. W. H. York, Rev. Marion Cliff, Rev. Allred, Rev. Selph Jones, Rev. Zinn, Rev. Greenway, Rev. Turner, Rev. Harold Hoover, Sister Martin, Rev. Conrad Williford, Rev. Ussery, Rev. Charley Hatfield, Rev. Jim McCully, Rev. Harry Sterling, Rev. Nutting, Rev. Grover Terry (first full-time pastor), Rev. Glenn Murray, Rev. Mays, Rev. Russell Johnson, and the present pastor, Rev. Gary Elder.

The Lord has blessed the church by calling out several full-time workers. At present a young licensed minister, Lynn Smith, and a young lady, Brenda Selvey, are students at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College.



September is one of those beautiful months! It gives us a touch of the fall with a reminder of the summer. In Missouri we can enjoy the four seasons. In thinking of the beauty of the seasons, only the wisdom of God could have prearranged the beauty and harmony of colors that give us pleasure and delight as we look upon His handiwork.

When I think of His wisdom to plan and His power to create, I am reminded of a verse of Scripture I have read several times. Pastor, if the church you are leading is not supporting this unified plan, I am praying that you will be able to lead it to support this plan that undergirds our state work and shares in a worldwide ministry.

It was my privilege to visit these meetings and churches in September. On Friday, September 2, I met with Rev. Rufus Coffey, Dr. Malcolm Fry, and the pastors in the Kansas City area. We made some initial plans for the National Association which will meet in Kansas City next year. The following evening, I was with the Central Western Association which met with the Oskaloosa Church. We enjoyed two meals—a delicious dinner by the host church and a spiritual meal by Rev. Connie Carriker. Brother Charlie Hoover does a fine job as moderator. The next day I was glad to be with Rev. and Mrs. Bob Dickey and the Oskaloosa Church. This church has been a faithful supporter of cooperative giving. That afternoon I enjoyed a fine service at the Hannon Church. The people were celebrating their seventieth anniversary. (An article concerning this appears in this issue of the Gem.) Rev. Gary Elder is the pastor of this progressive church. That evening I was able to see the new

auditorium of the Marshfield Church. It is very adequate and beautiful. The fellowship with Rev. and Mrs. Dale Broyles and the church was nice. I appreciate the faithful support this church has given our state work.

It was on Friday, September 9, that I met with the Bootheel District Association. Rev. and Mrs. Wayne Williams and the Sikeston Church were host to the meeting. This association is growing and giving fine support to the state work. How wonderful to share in the Lord's work.

I began revival services with the Belton Church on Sunday, September 11, and continued through the following Wednesday evening. Rev. Bill Christensen is the pastor of this fine church. These folks made me feel at home away from home, and they are giving full support to our state ministries. It was a pleasure being in the homes of the pastor and his family and of the friendly folks of the church.

The following Sunday we especially enjoyed being with the new mission work at Fair Grove. The Lord is blessing Rev. James Crawford and his family as they lead in this new work. It is growing and they have already adopted the cooperative plan.

The last Sunday in September we were with Rev. and Mrs. J. W. King and the Wilderness Church. This was great fellowship and a delicious dinner. That evening we enjoyed being with Rev. Gary Mitchener and the Cotton Creek Church. Vivian has relatives in this church, and it is a joy to preach to and fellowship with them.

I went to Mt. Harmony to close out the month. The Northeast Association was combining a Yearly Meeting and Bible Conference with Evangelist Stanley Jones and the Jones Family Singers as guests. It was a great service. I always look forward to the fellowship of Rev. Glynn Campbell, moderator, other ministers, and the fine folks in that area.

We ask again that you continue to remember this ministry in prayer. We are so grateful for the Lord's blessings. We know that you share in this as you give your financial and prayer support. If I may be of any help to you, do not hesitate to ask.

Dr. and Mrs. Miley write: "Yesterday was a full day. Following the morning service, we went down to the river where four followed the Lord in baptism. Several pagans watched (and heard) from the bank, sober and thoughtful. I pray that the Holy Spirit will somehow use this experience to break through their hard shell of paganism and turn them to himself. After lunch, two carloads went to a bush

village (real bush with grass five feet tall in the road) where a Christian wanted to destroy his fetishes Clint and Lynette and their boys left September 2 for France. Then, the Lord willing, they should be here by next Christmas May God richly bless each of you. Truly we thank God for every remembrance of you. We value your prayers more than we can tell you."

The Bobby Poole family writes: "Never before have we gotten back into the work so quickly and so smoothly. Almost everything fell into place with the minimum of difficulties. When we arrived, there was a busload of church people waiting for us. We went through customs without paying, loaded our baggage on the bus, and made the four-hour trip to Ribeirao Preto. FIRST SERVICES IN FLAGSTAFF

The Sunset Free Will Baptist Church in Flagstaff, Arizona, conducted its first service on October 2, 1977. There were 30 people from Flagstaff that attended one of the two Sunday services. There were 15 people visiting from Phoenix and Prescott, Arizona and Columbia, Missouri. The prayer meeting attendance was 16.

The mission church is sponsored by the National Home Mission and the Arizona Mission Boards. The Flagstaff Church is the eighth Free Will Baptist Church in Arizona. 

We are saving our small coins each month to be given to the Student Loan Fund in the spring. Our Action Group is planning a Silent Auction with the money going to some of our special action projects.



The pastor must visit his people, his prospects, his sick, and his unsaved, and he must visit much.

A casual study of the Bible shows that Jesus visited His flock. Pastoral calls to Mary and Martha, innumerable visits to the sick and dying, as well as to the bereaved, were a common task of our Lord. We know He visited the unsaved. Peter, John, and Paul were visiting pastors.

Zechariah 11:16 talks of a "shepherd in the land, which shall not visit those that be cut off" and Jeremiah 23:2 refers to a shepherd who scatters the

flock and "have not visited them."

The "visitation" in both Old and New Testaments at its core is "oversight that shows concern for." The idea of visiting is closely related to the matter of shepherding. The pastor is a shepherd over the flock. It is his business to watch over the flock, and he can do this best by visiting them. So it is safe to say that God expects the pastor to visit his people.

There is a general visitation ministry which involves all kinds of visitation. There is a specific congregational ministry when the pastor goes out with specific goals in mind. Then there is personal individual ministry. Here the pastor goes out to help a particular individual.

Before beginning a visitation ministry, the pastor would do well to study a good book on etiquette. This might save him some embarrassing experiences.

MAKE HOME CALLS: Set a goal of at least 40 calls per week. The pastor comes as the representative of Jesus Christ. Lead the conversation around to a discussion of Jesus Christ. Don't make the calls either too lengthy or too short. Scripture reading and prayer are always appropriate. Keep these rules in mind: Don't visit during mealtime; or if they have company; or if you will interrupt a planned outing. Keep in mind that you are there to help them grow in their spiritual life and show them the love of God.

VISITING THE SICK: (Matthew 25:31-36 and James 5) A ministry of mercy—visiting the sick, the bereaved, the imprisoned, and the needy—led by the pastor, carried on by the deacons, and enlisting all the congregation is a necessary part of any church's ministry. When visiting the sick:

1. Plan the visit—Why is the patient in the hospital? Is it wise to visit now?

2. Go on request, or on a short pastoral call.

- 3. Recognize that the needs for visiting are to glorify God and encourage the sick.
- 4. Be sure to display a happy spirit.
- 5. Obey hospital rules.
- 6. Quote Scripture and pray.
- 7. Never lie to patients.
- 8. Always witness about Christ.
