Linda Joe Dean, Floyd Dean and Kevan Francis were honored by being placed on the Dean's List.


Graduation At Free Will Baptist Bible College

Points for Pastors for 1978 has dealt with the various phases of the program of Farmington FWB Church. In January, we talked about the various areas of prayer ministry; in February, we covered the follow-up program; in March, the music ministry; in April, the bus ministry; in May, the children's churches. This month we will look at a very adventurous program, the Christian Day School.

We have been told that Farmington Christian Academy is the first Free Will Baptist day school in the history of Missouri Free Will Baptists. We have 70 students enrolled, six hired faculty members, and three volunteer faculty members.

It is a real joy to see those children, kindergarten through ninth grade this year, come in each morning, have devotions together, recite long passages of Scripture and sing God's praises. What a thrill it is to see them all out on the playground dressed and acting like good Christian young people. Parents know their children will be taught Christian principles and standards as well as the three "R's".

How do you start a Christian school? (I have had the honor of being chosen by Accelerated Christian Education to represent their program for Missouri Free Will Baptists, so you can contact me for a special informative service in your church.) First, decide whether there is a real need for a Christian school in your town or area. If there is, let's make the first school a Free Will Baptist School. Second, contact the representative of ACE or another Christian school program and have them come before your congregation and present the school ministry. Third, after finding out whether your people want this ministry and what it will cost (Someone said, "Christian education doesn't cost, it pays"; but believe me, though it pays in changed lives of children, it does cost.), start following the plainly laid steps of ACE or any other good school program. Shortly thereafter you will have a good sound educational program for your boys and girls and, as a result, will reach several parents previously unreachable. It will work. Already our school has obtained much good publicity for our church, some new people have started coming to church, others have joined the church, and we are recognized as the church on the move in our city. Try it!


