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
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# Another Year To Live

"He spake also this parable; A certain man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came and sought fruit thereon, and found none. Then said he unto the dresser of his vineyard, Behold, these three years I come seeking fruit on this fig tree, and find none: cut it down; why cumbereth it the ground? And he answering said unto him, Lord, let it alone this year also, till I shall dig about it, and dung it: And if it bear fruit, well; and if not, then after that thou shalt cut it down."

The year 1978 has passed with all that it has held for us. Have we only cumbered the ground or have we produced fruit for God? While we can't change the past, 1979 brings a new year to live and serve God. A year that we may be fruitful and live forever, or another year to be unfruitful and die.

We know this parable in Luke 13 is written primarily to the Jews of Jesus' day. It illustrates the unfruitfulness of Israel and her doom if she did not repent, accept, and produce fruit for God. But we can also see a challenge to all mankind to repent, accept, and serve God while there is time, or die unprofitable and be lost.

As a pastor, I encourage my congregation to be a witness to the lost. Even as I do this I am reminded that faith cometh by hearing and hearing by the Word of God. Has not the ground been broken and the seed planted? Everyone in the United States has an opportunity to know the Jesus of the Bible. The Bible is the best seller, there is nationwide TV coverage of church services, and in some areas a church on every corner. Yet in 1978 we have not seen our country return to the Lord.

We may need to check closer to home; have our local churches in 1978 produced fruit-bearing Christians? We as Free Will Baptists are proud of our fundamental, conservative interpretation and application of the Scriptures. You can see this very plainly in our National Associational Meetings. With all of the fundamental preaching, why are our churches only half full on Sunday night and less on Wednesday night? Why do we see some Free Will Baptist parents so slack in teaching their children in the way they should go? Why do many of our young adults after marriage drop out of church or go to other denominations?

So likewise in our churches, as in the world, just knowing what to do doesn't assure the proper action. If 1979 is to hold for us as Christians a more productive year in winning the lost and seeing a crop of fruit-bearing Christians produced, we must look further.

What is the "spiritual fruit" we are looking for in a productive Christian's life? Someone will say, just have faith in Christ and live the best life that you can. This sounds good, but will it produce an adult Christian? The answer has to be "no"! Becoming an adult, well-rounded Christian is no more of an accident than becoming a well-rounded adult functioning in this world and being profitable to society is an accident. In our lives today, we have a pushbutton society. TV programs have their introduction, plot, and climax in thirty minutes to an hour. This is also reflected in the new converts to Christ. Many of the new converts want to be saved and become adult Christians without any pains of growth. So, when they find there is a lot of growing and serving between the altar and the grave, they become discouraged and are prone to give up. This may be our fault as pastors and teachers for preaching and teaching the pie in the sky and that Christ is the answer to all. Young Christians should be told to count the cost of discipleship, and that the Christian life is not a hundred yard dash, but it is an endurance race. Christ is the answer to peace and joy within. He is a present help in time of trials and heartaches, but the pressures of life will still come.

When we talk about fruit-bearing or becoming an adult Christian, we are talking about a time-consuming life of Bible study and application of the Word. This fruit can be divided into two groups. First, the "Fruit of the Spirit" found in Galatians 5:22, 23, which is the development of the inward man. An inward development is a growing process whereby we renew our minds daily to think on spiritual things. We should put them into practice until the good attributes of the Spirit become a part of us. This inward fruit-bearing brings forth a Christian who is lovable and loving. This type of spirit will manifest itself in people who can get along in one accord, and have true concern for the sick and the weaker brother. If the attitude of the believers is improved, there will be more progress made in the local church.

The outward fruit is bringing the lost to Christ or producing after one's own kind. This is best described in Matthew 28:19-20, the great commission, where believers are told to go into all nations teaching them God's plan of salvation through Jesus, and after they are converted, preparing them to follow after Him. This comes back to one's conversion becoming a life-changing experience which gives them the desire to go and tell others of what Jesus has done for them. Our debt to Jesus for our salvation should always be a driving force that keeps us taking the gospel to others.

What is the answer for a productive new year in the Christian's life? We can get some valuable advice for Christian growth in the fifth chapter of Hebrews. The last four verses of this chapter teach that Bible knowledge is to be sought and Bible knowledge is to be put into practice. This is God's plan if we are to have a fruit-bearing, adult Christian. The principles taught in Hebrews five are to be accomplished in a growing process. These verses tell us to be unskillful in the Word is to be babes in Christ. We can say again, we send our children to school to be educated in the ways of our society. Yet, we expect Christians to be knowledgeable of the Bible and to apply its teachings to their lives without dedicated study. Could some of the lack of accomplishment in 1978 be because of unequipped saints?

After the Christian becomes skillful in the Word, he must exercise its teachings in his life. Paul said, "Take heed unto thyself and unto the doctrine; continue in them." There is to be no room for a gap in the believer's testimony and life. "He that saith he abideth in him ought himself also so to walk, even as he walked." Do our lives line up with what we say we believe? There should be no difference between our opinion and our practice. Because if there is, our lives will add up to nothing on the spiritual scorecard.

To increase the number of Bibles in the homes of our church congregation is easy, but to see its truths put into practice is something else. One can be sure that we as Free Will Baptists have the right doctrine. So thank God we are more than half way toward a fruitful new year. Faithful preachers and teachers must teach and preach the practical works of James alongside the faith of Paul in Ephesians 2:8, 9, if we are to see the church grow in numbers and in fruit bearing Christians.

Christian brothers, we need to begin this new year by confessing our sins of commission and omission to God and accepting His gracious forgiveness. Make



The church conference has proven to be a cancer on the soul of many churches and pastors. The business meeting can be a devisive tool of the devil or it can be a real blessing to the church. Which it will be depends on several things, not least of which is the attitude of the pastor.

I have heard many different opinions as to why the business meeting is a problem. Some will say, "Don't have any at all." But this would do away with our "sacred" congregational government. Someone else says "only have one or two or four per year," while others tell us to have them every month.

May I take the liberty of sharing my ideas with you? First, it doesn't matter whether you have one or twelve regular business sessions per year. The number has nothing at all to do with the success or failure of the meeting.

Second, your attitude and the attitude of the congregation toward the business meeting is the important thing. If there is a sweet spirit in the church, it should carry over into the business meeting. However, if you view the meeting as a necessary evil, the church will do likewise, and this attitude starts everything off wrong.

Third, don't have business meetings on Sunday. I like to have them on Wednesday nights when the church members are usually present, but not so many visitors. Also, on Wednesdays we usually minister strictly to the church and this complements the church conferences. I don't like an extra night for conferences as few attend and church business should be ministered by the church body.

Fourth, preach an interesting and spiritual sermon, pray, and then have church conference. The sermon, singing, and praying should help get every one spiritually ready for business.

Fifth, have your business organized. Announce that all business should be presented to the deacon board or business committee for their monthly meeting. Have good, thorough reports, and give people ample time for discussion, but insist they stand, address the moderator, and be recognized before speaking.

Sixth, involve your board members in the presentation of business items and discussion.

Seventh, have frequent prayer before and during the business meeting and honor all reasonable suggestions.

If you follow these suggestions, your church conference should run smoothly and God should be exalted.

# HILLSDALE HIGHLIGHTS GREEN STAMPS FOR HILLSDALE



# TO ALL INTERESTED IN CTS COMPETITION:

Mark your calendar now! The State CTS competition will be held May 5, 1979 at the Trinity Free Will Baptist Church, 12143 Old St. Charles Road, Bridgeton, MO promptly at 9:30 a.m. All contestants must be preregistered by April 15, 1979 to be eligible to compete.

As you begin preparing for the state competitive activities, keep in mind that the Dress Code for the National CTS competition is still effective. The Missouri State Association at the June 1978 meeting directed the State Sunday School and CTS Board to enforce the guidelines used at the National competition in the state competition. On October 9, 1978 the General Board of Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists defined the term "PARTICI-PANT" as anyone involved in any manner in the competition, including judges, coaches, accompanists, and entrants. ANY AND ALL "PARTICI-PANTS" MUST COMPLY WITH THE DRESS CODE. ANY "PARTICIPANT" NOT COMPLYING WITH THE DRESS CODE WILL BE DISQUALI-FIED.

# I. DRESS CODE

- A. All clothing should meet Biblical standards of modesty (1 Timothy 2:8-10):
  - 1. All male participants in NYC competitive activities should dress in a manner that complements, protects and enhances their masculinity; and all female participants should dress in a manner that complements, protects and enhances their feminity.
  - 2. Dress should always be in good taste and should reflect high concern and appreciation for modesty. All clothing should be loose fitting; no tight pants on men or boys; no tight dresses, skirts, blouses, or sweaters on ladies or girls.
    - \*a. Boys are to wear suits or slacks. Tank tops and T-shirts are unacceptable.
    - \*b. Girls or ladies are to wear dresses which shall extend to the knee or longer. Dresses must not be low cut or revealing in style or material.

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- B. All participants should groom and attire themselves in such a fashion that would not be offensive or show tendences if conforming with the unholy fashions and patterns of the world (1 Corinthians 11:14, 15):
  - \*1. The boys shall groom their hair so as to follow natural hairlines without covering the ears or extending to the eyes or collar.
  - \*2. Hair styles for girls should not be in accord with male fashions.

(\*Adopted by the National Association of Free Will Baptists during the forty-first annual session, July 17-21, 1977, in Detroit, Michigan.)
