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A Hurt Slightly Healed

In Jeremiah 6:14 we read, "They have healed also the hurt of the daughter of my people slightly, saying, Peace, peace; where there is no peace."

Jeremiah saw in his day a truth so pronounced that he said the priests and prophets were dealing falsely with it and had only silently healed or helped the people. Judah had strayed away from God. Jeremiah knew of their sins and warned them out of a heart of love and concern. He was the type of preacher that was needed for his time, and the kind of preacher that we need today. We need preachers that will speak out against sin. We need to recognize that there are many false religions and teachings that will not heal the hurt of the people.

We should also recognize that there are many false teachers and cults that are teaching a social religion or a religion of works. This will not heal the sins of the people. The only thing that will do that is repentance, a born again experience, and the blood of Jesus Christ. A religion that preaches salvation without commitment or salvation without Christian conviction will not heal. I believe that Free Will Baptists have the gospel; we believe that it will heal and that it will bring about a commitment and a new birth experience. We need to realize that the new birth is more than just a new beginning; it is a definite commitment to Christ. As we teach and preach this, we can show our people that God can heal and that He will heal as we commit ourselves to Him.

In our day, it seems fashionable to think that one must build great buildings, universities, or cathedrals of glass in order to prove that we love the Lord. I believe that our love for the Lord is proven by devotion to Him in preaching His Word and offering a "balm"; a "Balm of Gilead" Jesus Christ that will heal the hurt of the people. Jesus Christ must be given first place in our programming, planning, teaching, and preaching.

I pray that we will have more dedicated people in the ranks of Free Will Baptists. I trust that our consecration will be so deep that we will not be just Sunday morning Christians, but our devotion will bring us to church on Sunday night and to the prayer service on Wednesday night. My prayer is that I might point people to the One that can heal completely and not leave them slightly healed.



Essentials of Evangelism

The church finances are important. Most of us don't consider money very spiritual, but it certainly isn't very spiritual not to have it. Money is important. Many preachers have been crucified because they did not know how to handle finances. In fact, during the past twenty years I have found so few preachers who knew much about church budgets and finances. This to the shame of our colleges.

A budget is a necessity. The church needs to know where it is going and how it will get there. A budget is a road map in financial matters. The budget should take salaries, building payments and up-keep, utilities, literature, insurance, and outside giving into consideration. As the church grows you will add other items such as staff salaries, bus ministry, children's church, and maybe even a Christian school. You must consider every detail a possible expenditure your church will experience during the coming year, then put that into the budget. Next, you can know how much your income must be for the coming year. If the income figures to be less than the expenditures you will have to deduct some expenditures.

Stick with your budget. Don't deviate from it. The church should adopt the budget when presented by the church board and pastor, and it should be followed.

The pastor must not serve as church treasurer. To do so is to flirt with suicide. He must not ever handle church monies. In our church the ushers receive the offerings, the deacons count and deposit the money (they are bonded), a deposit slip copy is given to the church office and the chairman of the finance committee and to the church treasurer. The church secretary writes all checks to pay church bills but only the treasurer can sign the checks. As you can see, this gives the church and each person handling money several safe-guards. The reputation of the pastor is very important and must be guarded. There are always those among us who would like nothing better than to accuse us of mismanaging money, or even stealing it. If you aren't careful to protect yourself by making sure you don't touch church money, they will get you. Have a budget, and see that it is followed.

No one becomes a medical doctor without sufficient preparation. We as God's people are engaged in the greatest work on the face of the earth. That being, evangelizing the world for Christ. And we need to be prepared.

Once the date for revival has been set and the particular spiritual need is determined—training, revival, or inspiration—then we can begin the preparation of our people.

Each member of the church family needs to be made aware of the existing spiritual need and led to carry a burden for the revival effort. This burden is intensified by prayer. Organized prayer bands, made up of Sunday school classes, auxiliary groups, etc., should begin meeting well in advance of the revival date and continue throughout the meeting. These groups should have a list of needs they desire met in this particular meeting and go over the list each time they meet for prayer. Without these prayer bands there will be no church-wide burden. Without a burden there will be no expectancy. Without expectancy our people will enter the revival meeting void of purpose and the meeting will be another "calendar revival" without accomplishment.

Preparation for the service itself is also very important. Have a capable person in charge of the music. Keep the congregational singing alive and meaningful. Do not use singing for a "fill-in." Make it an important part of the revival effort. The choir and special music should be well prepared. Each time those involved in the choir or special music meet for rehearsal, include a time of prayer. Pray that God will use the music to condition hearts to receive the preaching of His Word.

Train faithful workers beforehand to be used in the altar service. Some basic instructions in which verses of Scripture to use with a seeking heart could mean the difference between victory and defeat for the one who comes forward. These workers should know to pray and work with people in the altar without the preacher having to remind them.

A prepared people will have their hearts and minds in the revival effort, and God will bless with results that honor Him.

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What Is Your Question?

Question: I am a Christian and I have peace in my heart with God, but I get depressed so easily and quite often. Can you give me a possible reason for this and what I can do to cope with or overcome it?

Answer: First of all we must differentiate between true, clinical or reactive depression and a temporary blue or down period, sometimes called simple depression. Simple depression can be brought about by many different factors. A person may put off things or procrastinate in required activities and feel guilty because of it. The guilt will bring depression. Someone has said that preachers and women are the most prone to this kind of depression. In fact those who are relatively free to plan their own schedules are subject to this depression. Of course the way to solve this is to confess the procrastination and complete the required tasks. Reactive depression is a condition marked by feelings of worthlessness, dejection, and worry. This person believes that all he does results in failure. He feels inadequate and unworthy of respect and love.

The most consistent finding in all kinds of depression is a strong sense of guilt. This guilt may either be real as a result of unconfessed, unforgiven sin, or it may be imaginary. The only way that real guilt may be dealt with is to confess and repent of the sin, or sins, that brought it. God has promised to clear our record, or forgive us, when we confess our sins to Him (1 John 1:9; Proverbs 28:13). He then will restore us to peace and the depression will pass.

Imaginary guilt is another matter. In my experience, far more Christian people suffer depression from this type of guilt than the first mentioned. There are many facets to this, but allow me to mention only one by way of example. Imaginary guilt usually springs from a lack of love and acceptance. As an unwanted child, a person may feel no deep sense of belonging. Sometimes he is told he is unwanted and sometimes he merely senses it. As a result, he becomes conscience smitten for being there; he feels he is causing all the problems. If he were out of the picture, the family would be fine. He feels guilty for being there and grows up feeling guilty for even being a person. This imagined guilt persists throughout life. Understanding imaginary guilt is the first step in turning it over to the Lord; experiencing God's acceptance is the antidote to rejection and its twin, depression.

I am convinced that the Scriptures hold the key to all such problems as we have been discussing. The Apostle Paul reminded the Philippians (4:4-8) that "the peace of God that passeth all understanding" can be a present possession of every Christian. A careful study of this passage will reveal that a positive attitude with much prayer, self discipline, and the control of our thought life will issue in the PEACE OF GOD.

JONES TO VACATE HILLSDALE POST

MOORE, OK—Rev. Bill M. Jones, president of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Moore, resigned January 22 after eight years as chief administrator of the Oklahoma institution.

Jones announced his decision to Hillsdale's trustees during their yearly organizational session meeting on campus. He said his plans are indefinite. The resignation becomes effective August 1.

"This seems to be a good time for me to leave," reflected the outgoing president. "The future is bright for Hillsdale. We have a stable faculty and a solid academic foundation. I'm quite optimistic.

"I've accomplished what I came here to do," he continued. "But I believe freshness in the president's office is now needed to guide the school into new areas."

A trustee spokesman said the board has initiated plans to secure Jones' successor.

The 42-year-old Texas native was named to the Hillsdale post in 1971. He previously served as a member of the college faculty in 1969-1970.

During Mr. Jones' tenure Hillsdale erected five major campus buildings including a multi-purpose gymnasium, four-plex dormitory, 16 apartment dormitory, a duplex, and the president's home. Gift income to the college tripled under Jones' leadership rising from \$93,000 annually to \$270,000.

Prior to his 1971 Hillsdale appointment. Rev. Jones was director of communications for the Foreign Missions Department (1970-71). He first came to national prominence as a missionary to the Ivory Coast (1959-69).

Bill Jones is a graduate of Free Will Baptist Bible College and Oklahoma City University. He attended the Dallas Theological Seminary.

Especially for the Youth Growing Pains

Here are some things you should never do on the spur of the moment:

- (1) Move
- (2) Get Married
- (3) Buy a car

(4) Choose to attend a college located more than ten miles from home.

(5) Volunteer to be in charge of crafts in Vacation Bible School.

The reason it is unwise to do these things on the spur of the moment is that these things should not be regarded in the realm of "ideas." They should be considered DECISIONS, and should be examined carefully before they are decided upon. Four of these items can change your life. (Volunteering to be in charge of crafts at Vacation Bible School is a form of insanity, and I'm not qualified to deal with that.)

However, I have made the other four decisions at one time or another in the past four years. I'm sorry to say that buying a car was an idea I had on the spur of the moment, and I'm still paying for that bright idea. I'm afraid I also decided to move one day and moved two days later. That was probably a bad idea, too.

The two decisions I'm proudest of are the two concerning (1) where to attend college and (2) who and when to marry. The reason I'm happy about these is that they were reached through *prayer*. Prayer is the acid test for any decision. If you pray about something and get up from your knees with assurance, then you've touched God. Sometimes it's assurance that you're right, and sometimes that you were wrong. Sometimes God will have fortified you, and sometimes He will have weakened you. At any rate, your will must be submissive to God's.

Remember how Jesus prayed in Gethsemane? "Father, if thou be willing, remove this cup from me: nevertheless not my will, but thine, be done" (Luke 22:42). Do you think Jesus WANTED to suffer the agonies of the cross? Don't be silly! He was as much human as you and I, and most of us are scared to death of pain. Christ was simply so burdened with God's plan, that He was able to love more than He hurt.

Christ had a decision to make. He had to move from Heaven to earth. His decision wasn't on the spur of the moment; it had been planned since the beginning. As Moses said in Exodus 2:22, he became a "stranger in a strange land." Doing God's will has always been the burden of one man or one woman—standing alone. Is this a decision you're willing to make?


