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CHRIST FOR THE PAST,



PRESENT, AND FUTURE HEBREWS 9:16-28

Few passages in the Bible give us an insight into all the blessings we have in Christ. This passage, when looked at closely, sheds more light on the benefits we have in Christ than almost any other. I would like to draw your attention to parts of three verses and enlarge upon them. They deal with our past, present, and future as related to Christ Jesus.

I. The Past: Note the last part of verse 26, "...he appeared to put away sin by the sacrifice of himself." God has a law, "The soul that sinneth shall surely die." Based on Romans 3:23, "For all have sinned and come short of the glory of God," we see the penalty of sin is upon us all, no escape, all must pay. Now according to the passage before us (verse 22), there was the necessity of a blood sacrifice for sin, but the blood of calves and goats was not sufficient for the forgiveness of sin; something better was required. Romans 3:24, 25 tells of Christ being a "propitiation" for our sins. This has to do with the sacrifice and blood offering upon the mercy seat under the law whereby God "passed over sins." Note that sin was always just passed over, but there were sins, nonetheless. Man needed a better sacrifice, so God in love gave of Himself in the person of Christ. Love is always the giving of oneself. Romans 5:8 is the proof: "But God commendeth his love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us." Now back to verse 26. Not only did Christ die for us, but He appeared in the presence of God to present Himself as our sin offering. The results of this are:

When we accept Christ as our Savior and confess Him, we are freed from the guilt and penalty of sin. We have placed our guilt and penalty upon Christ. I note some new converts still are not able to discern between guilt and remorse for sin. We should always feel sorry for our sins, but we need not feel guilty because Christ accepted this when He died for us. Praise God I am now free from the guilt and penalty of sin.

II. The Present: The now, where we live today. One would likely say, "Fine, the past is taken care of, but what about today?" Praise God, He leaves nothing to fear. Verse 24, "... now to appear in the presence of God for us." Note, not for Himself or someone else, but for us. You see, God is a personal God. Because you and I live in a world of sin, we need someone to speak to God for us, someone to plead our case. Well, that has been taken care of by Christ (Hebrews 2:16-18). Christ took on our nature, suffered and died; now He is able to deliver them that are tempted—you and me. We note

further in Hebrews 4:14-16 that Christ knows what we are going through. He feels our sins now and offers us mercy and help. We now, in this present world, have one to deliver us from the habit and dominion of sin. Praise God, isn't it great to know that now through Christ you don't have to be a slave to sin and you don't have to let sin rule over you? We are now free, because of our new nature, from the habit of sin. This means we no longer practice sin. "Thanks be unto Christ that giveth us the victory."

III. The Future: About now someone is saying, "Great, but what about the future?" The past is taken care of. Today is taken care of, but I worry about tomorrow. Well, I tell you, God has left nothing to chance. He has taken care of everything. Look at verse 28, "... He shall appear the second time without sin unto salvation." When we start talking about the return of the Lord, many things and questions are asked. I know a lot of things are going to happen when Christ appears but the most important, I believe, is the gathering together of His children. The Bible teaches us that God is going to pour out His wrath without mercy upon this ungodly world. Praise God, this passage tells us His appearing is "salvation" for us. Salvation means to be saved from. We will be saved from God's wrath. We are to be saved from the presence of sin. What a glorious hope this is. We will be in a place where sin will never tempt us again. We will have a new body (1 John 3:2). We will get a body like Jesus, one which knows no sin. Second Peter 3:13 tells us of dwelling in a new Heaven and new earth, one where sin never enters. Titus 2:11-14 teaches us Christ is going to take unto Himself a "peculiar people." Peculiar means "belonging exclusively to one person, shut up as a jewel." This is what is ours at the appearing of Christ.

In this troubled world we live in, we can take faith and hope in Christ. He has appeared to deliver us from the guilt and penalty of sin, past. He is appearing now to deliver us from the habit and dominion of sin, present. He is coming to deliver us from the very presence of sin, future. God has made all the provisions for us; all we have to do is claim them and live in the light of them. No wonder the song writer says: "Praise God from whom all blessings flow, Praise Him all creatures here below...."

Report From Eastern Gate





Points for Pastors

We now have a full-time staff consisting of Pastor, Associate Pastor, Youth Pastor, Christian Educational Director, Secretary, and Minister of Maintenance. Our school has twelve staff members. That means there are eighteen paid people working in our church and school program. That's quite a group, considering five years ago we only had one, the pastor.

Many of you are already hiring second and third men as well as secretaries. Some of you are preparing to begin Christian schools. When you do, you will face a whole new range of problems you never faced before. Such problems as jealousy, salary disputes and gripes, work delegation, just to

name a few.

In this article let me tell you of some things we have done to make our program work more effectively.

- 1. Prepare a job description for all the church staff. Briefly, the associate pastor is in charge of follow-up, bus ministry, and visitation. The youth pastor is in charge of all youth, teen ministries as well as our six children's churches. He also assists our bus ministry. The Christian educational director is principal of our school and assists in Sunday school administration. The minister of maintenance is in charge of all custodial work and also helps on bus visitation as well as youth ministries.
- 2. Keep salaries confidential.
- 3. Have staff meetings.
- 4. Recognize all workers from the pulpit and in newsletters and bulletins.
- 5. Keep a happy atmosphere. The staff should be able to laugh and play jokes, but yet respect one another.
- 6. Treat them with respect. My wife and I have a Christmas dinner yearly for all our staff and their families. They enjoy it, we enjoy it, and morale is helped.

Your staff will be extremely important in your church. They should not be hired to do what laymen won't do, but what laymen can't do. Bus captains should be laymen, Sunday school teachers should be laymen, choir members and musicians as well as music director should be laymen. However, if they aren't available, use your staff. I thank God for our staff. They mean everything to me and our church.

Essentials Evangelism

One aspect of preparation for the church-wide revival that has been ignorantly and sometimes purposely overlooked is that of finances. There is nothing spiritual or pious about allowing the financial needs of a meeting to go inadequately met.

The financial needs of a church-wide revival should be considered in the early stages of revival preparation. This can be accomplished by the church as a whole, but preferably by a committee set up for that purpose. If a committee is used, be sure it consists of individuals who have a realistic approach to monetary obligations.

The finance committee should consider all financial obligations that are concerned with a meeting. Such as promotion, advertising, and special workers. The committee should receive and deposit all offerings, pay all bills, and give a detailed report to

the church following the revival.

If special workers are invited to be a part of the revival effort (such as evangelist, singers, children's workers, etc.), their financial needs should be discussed frankly with them by the finance committee. Most full-time evangelists and special workers will appreciate a church's honest concern and will be glad to share the needs of their ministry and family. An evangelist who is regarded by a church worthy to be called for a meeting is worthy of proper honorarium for his services.

Finances for a revival campaign can be raised in several ways. The method you decide to use will depend on your own situation. You might want to include an adequate amount in your church budget. Many churches receive an offering during the revival and if necessary add to it from the church treasury. Some churches lay aside special offerings in advance of the meeting for the revival needs. Whatever methods your church uses, be sure your people are made aware of the need and feel a part of meeting that need. It is neither wise nor ethical to expect visitors to carry this financial responsibility.

Proper preparation will help alleviate the apprehensive feeling that arises from trying to raise enough funds at the last minute to cover the expense of the church-wide revival. This will enable the church and evangelist to turn their attention to more immediate spiritual needs, paving the way for a more successful revival.

NATIONAL CONVENTION MEETS IN NORTH CAROLINA

NASHVILLE, TN—All roads slant east as the National Association of Free Will Baptists moves across the Old North State July 15-19 toward its 43rd annual convention in Charlotte, North Carolina's Civic Center.

North Carolina is unique in Free Will Baptist history because 252 years ago (1727) denominational roots were planted in Chowan County by Paul Palmer. It will be a homecoming atmosphere for the expected 4,000 delegates and visitors from 40 states who drive or fly into the area of their spiritual ancestry.

This is the fourth time in 34 years North Carolina has hosted the national convention, the last occasion 14 years ago (1965) in Raleigh. North Carolina also welcomed the 1959 convention to Asheville and the 1945 session to Middlesex. The task of hosting the 43rd annual meeting is shared by 26,200 members in 177 churches of the nine associations comprising the North Carolina Association of Free Will Baptists.

Meeting simultaneously with the National Association is the National Youth Conference. Attendance for the Sunday night keynote service at NYC '79 is expected to reach 4,000. Officials anticipate 3,000 youth registrants in Charlotte.

The Woman's National Auxiliary Convention con-

ducts their one-day annual conclave Tuesday, July 17.

Five speakers launch 1979's convention theme, "The Spirit-Controlled Life." Sunday morning's speaker is Heritage Temple Pastor Paul Thompson of Columbus, Ohio. Other conference speakers include North Carolina Pastor Gordon Sebastian of Peace Church, Wilson; Free Will Baptist Bible College President Charles Thigpen; 17-year medical missionary to Africa LaVerne Miley; and former California State Moderator Edward F. (Butch) Johns, pastor of First Church, Chula Vista, California.

BUSINESS AGENDA

Moderator Bobby Jackson will gavel to order some of the most important business sessions the denomination has faced in a decade this July.

Not since 1967 has the national convention inaugurated a new Executive Secretary. One of the major responsibilities awaiting delegate consideration is selection of a successor for outgoing Executive Secretary Rufus Coffey. Coffey resigned in March and is returning to the pastorate in August.

In other business, delegates must vote on three items postponed from the 1978 General Board report relative to *Treatise* additions and doctrinal clarification.

One item concerns a five-paragraph explanation

of the Free Will Baptist position regarding glossalalia

(speaking in tongues).

Two other statements more precisely defining inspiration and Scriptural infallibility and inerrancy

will demand close delegate scrutiny.

Nine national board positions are to be filled in Charlotte. Master's Men, Home Missions, and Retirement and Insurance Departments are scheduled to receive three new members each.

The Theological Liberalism and Historical Commissions will replace one member each. New General Board members from 16 states will be elected.

FAMILY ORIENTATION

Approximately 3,000 young people and their sponsors are expected to gather in the Civic Center Sunday night, July 15, to worship together during the keynote service of the 1979 National Youth Conference.

Pastor Eugene Hales of West Duplin Free Will Baptist Church, Warsaw, North Carolina, will bring the keynote address and develop the theme, "Approved...unto God...and of men," taken from 2 Timothy 2:15 and Romans 14:18.

A unique variety of special music is planned for the keynote service, including a mixed choir and a children's choir from North Carolina as well as the Watchmen Quartet (young pastors from Oklahoma).

Four action-packed days of Bible competition, Music and Arts presentations, messages from God's Word and the finest in fun and fellowship await the large group expected to attend NYC '79.

Bible teacher and speaker, Mrs. Kay Arthur, will address the fellowship dinner of Woman's National Auxiliary Convention Monday evening, July 16. The annual banquet is scheduled in the Civic Center and

is open to both men and women.

Mrs. Arthur's weekly radio program on WMBW—the Moody Station—in Chattanooga, Tennessee, and her tape ministry reach 38 states and seven foreign countries. She and her husband Jack Arthur operate *Reach Out*, a Bible conference ministry located in Chattanooga.

"Knowing and Growing" (Ephesians 4:15b) is the theme for the business and worship session on July 17 in the Civic Center. Awards for the creative

writing contest will be given at that time.

Major addresses are slated by missionaries Jerry Barron, Mexico; Jimmy and Janie Aldridge, Ivory Coast, West Africa; and Lorene Miley, former missionary to the Ivory Coast.

Numerous workshops and seminars designed to aid Christian workers in local churches are slated

Monday and Tuesday of the convention.

The National Association of Free Will Baptists is comprised of nearly 2,500 congregations who have voluntarily chosen to unite in an endeavor to extend local church witness throughout the world. The objectives of the National Association are implemented through eight departments which serve the needs of local churches from offices in Nashville, Tennessee.


