Report on the Missouri State Association 1978-79

The weather was almost perfect—the accomodations very adequate and the fellowship was sweet. It was evident the Lord was blessing from the first song until the final amen.

The Youth Service, under the direction of the Sunday School and CTS Board, was wonderful. The service was directed by Reverend Kent Tallent, chairman of the board, with Evangelist Jonathan Thigpen bringing the message. The Lord blessed the message with decisions made for Christ. This was followed with a Youth Banquet, which was directed by Reverend Roger Harwell with a ventriloquist and his buddy- Coach and Ronny. This was fun time with a good meal and a gospel message.

The Woman's Auxiliary met on Tuesday. Mrs. Helen McAllister, president, directed the services. I always enjoy the worship service, especially. Dr. and Mrs. LaVerne Miley were the guest speakers for the Morning Worship and the Auxiliary Banquet. They always bless the hearts of the ones with whom they share their message.

The Missouri State Association, itself, began on Tuesday evening. Someone said, "The Lord was surely with us, for His presence was felt in the congregation and special singing and the wonderful preaching of the Word. The theme this year was "Christ Pre-eminent." The clerk, Reverend Bill Van Winkle, declared the Sixty-Sixth Session in session as he read Colossians 1:18 and asked that we keep this thought in mind throughout the State Association. Reverend Frank Giunta delivered the keynote message and emphasized "Christ Pre-eminent in our life." Reverend Nathan Ruble continued developing the theme with the Wednesday morning message by showing that Christ should be "Pre-eminent in our love." Dr. Roger Reeds-kept the fire in the pulpit when he preached on Wednesday evening on the subject that Christ must be "Pre-eminent in our labor." Reverend Glen Rehkop summed it up and put the icing on the cake with his message that declared the necessity of Christ being "Pre-eminent in our look." The devotional messages given by Reverend Howard Bowers, Reverend Richard Robinson, and Reverend Dana Booth prepared the way for smooth and effective business sessions.

The moderator, Reverend Bill Evans, handled the business sessions, beginning with the General Board Meeting until the adjournment of the association, with professional skill and leadership. The sad note of the association was knowing that Brother Evans was moving out of state. He accepted the pastorate of the Free Will Baptist Church in Colquitt, Georgia. We will surely miss Bill, Brenda, and the boys, Jeff, Lee, and Benji. They have provided leadership, motivation, and inspiration to our state work. We pray the Lord's choice and special blessings as they continue to serve Him. We are confident the newly elected moderator, Reverend Dale Skiles, will continue to give leadership to our state ministries. In the business session the body voted to recommend to the National Association that it meet bi-annually. (This will be submitted to the General Board of the National Association.) The body also adopted a recommendation from the executive secretary, Reverend Rufus Coffey, that cooperative giving to the departments of the National Association be allocated according to the percentage adopted by the body of the National Association. This will be on a trial basis for one year beginning January 1, 1980. The continuation of this will likely depend upon the leadership the executive office gives cooperative giving in our denomination. The Retirement Village was reemphasized by Reverend Andy Lay, director of development, and Don Ruble, secretary of the board. The need is for commitments from prospective buyers. Hopefully this will occur in a short time. Much of the other business was important to our state work but was routine in

nature.

A "Moderator's Plaque" was presented to Reverend Bill Evans in appreciation for his faithful service as moderator for the past three years. He was also given a standing vote of thanks.

The Missouri State Association adopted a budget of \$170,000 for cooperative giving. We trust the Lord for His blessings of this. As the Lord leads and blesses we know that this goal will be met. Therefore, we are trusting that pastors will lead and the laity will encourage in order that we can do together that which the Lord has led us to do. Everyone is aware that the cause of Christ is extended in every phase of His work throughout our denomination, through cooperative giving. Let's meet this goal.

I will close this report with the statement I hear every year and it sounds good, 'The Lord surely loves us because He is so good to us." Let us praise God from whom all blessings flow!



QUESTION:

I know it is wrong to smoke, but how can I prove this to a few of my church members who smoke?

ANSWER:

Sometimes the human being is very difficult to understand. Practically everyone tells us that smoking is detrimental to our health, yet in spite of all of this, we go right on cutting our lives short. As far back as 1960 the American Heart Association published this statement:

"Up to the present, a number of medical studies have been made, nearly all demonstrating a statistical association between heavy cigarette smoking and mortality (death) or morbidity (illness) for coronary heart disease. In these studies, death rates from coronary heart disease in middle-aged men were found to be from 50-150% higher among heavy cigarette than among those who do not smokers smoke."

It is further estimated that four out of five cases of lung cancer in men from age 25 to 75 are due to smoking. The incidence of lung cancer among heavy smokers (more than two packs a day) has been judged to be from 13 to 50 times that in nonsmokers.

One study, including 200,000 policyholders of U.S. Government life insurance, showed the mortality rate to be double for those who used two or more packs a day compared to those who were non-smokers. This same study revealed that those who smoked regularly more than one pack per day had a 15.8 times greater chance of dying with lung cancer than did the non-smoker. On and on the statistics go. Study after study has shown the same thing. I personally believe the evidence is irrefutable that smoking is harmful to our bodies.

Therefore, the question is no more: Is it wrong to smoke? Now the question is: Do we have the right to knowingly destroy our physical bodies? I say knowingly because there are few people who have not heard these statistics that I have just quoted.

The Apostle Paul says in 1 Corinthians 3:16, 17: "Know ye not that ye are the temple of 8

shall God destroy "

The word translated "defile" in the first clause of verse 17 is the same as that rendered "destroy" in the second clause. It has the general meaning: to bring into a worse state; to mar or to injure. Verse 17 may, therefore, be rendered, "If any man injure (or mar) the temple of God, him will God injure." This remains true whether we interpret this passage as referring to the church as the body of Christ, or the individual as a member of that body. After all, does not Paul emphatically state that our bodies are the temple of the Holy Spirit of God (1 Corinthians 6:19, 20)?

Therefore, it seems rather straightforward that smoking is harmful to the body and, if harmful to the person physically, God condemns it. If we do smoke and our bodies are harmed, the indication is that He will bring disciplinary judgment upon us.

Smoking, of course, is not the only thing that may harm our bodies. Alcoholic beverages, overeating, drug abuse, etc., will take their toll.

Some time ago a white male, forty-two years old, came to our clinic with a severe kidney dysfunction. He was a business man under a great deal of pressure. His normal routine after work included one martini and two non-prescription headache tablets. This regimen had almost wiped out his kidneys. The alcohol, plus a compound (no longer used in over the counter headache tablets) found in the tablets, acted together to damage the kidneys. I might say it took ten years for this to happen, but it did happen.

The Apostle Paul in Romans 12:1, 2 declared: "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God.'

I am convinced that, if we took this plea seriously, we would never knowingly, or willingly, do anything, or consume anything, that would harm our bodies. For, you see, the sacrifice that God always demanded was one without physical blemish (Leviticus 1:3; 3:1).



This month let's look at the preacher's library. I've heard college professors say, "If it's a choice between a sandwich and a book, buy the book." I don't know whether I would go that far, but it is certain that a minister's library is as important to him as a carpenter's tools or a painter's brushes.

The young minister will need a good concordance, preferably one such as "Strong's Concordance." He will need a good study Bible, a good Bible dictionary, Matthew Henry's Commentaries, a reli-

able Bible Atlas, and a few good books on such subjects as Jay Adams' pastoral counseling, Spurgeon's commentary on the Psalms, the Daily Study Bible Series, etc. He will also need a service manual for funerals, weddings, baptism, dedication, and graveside services.

As a minister is able, he should add more books to his library. Different translations of the Bible, more extreme commentaries (Pulpit, Lenski), books on more specific subjects, and "How To" books are valuable assets to a busy pastor. After a pastor has been in the ministry for 20 years, he should have a library of 2,000 or more books.

A minister's library is a tax deduction and will serve as a valuable asset to his ministerial work. The pastor's library should be locked, and those using or borrowing books should be controlled. If you aren't careful, your expensive books will gradually disappear. Pastor, build your library.

Thus far the enthusiasm has been good. About 25 new children have attended during the campaign. Our furlough begins the last of July. Pray that we will be able to adjust smoothly as this is our first.


