One thing is sure to happen. People are going to get angry with one another. You will have occasion to pray over disruptions in your congregation. It doesn't matter how long you pastor, or how large your church, this will be a recurring problem.

Several years ago, when I was a young minister, two members had a falling out. I interceded and as a result not only were they angry with each other, how they were angry with me. Obviously I did

something wrong.

In disruption and internal strife, the following rules are applicable: Be sure you are right. Don't just think you are right, know you are right. Next, pray a long time, as long as you can, before making any decision or taking any action. Then move slowly, deliberately, kindly, and always in a Christ-like way. Always do what you honestly believe in, but for the cause of Christ.

Be willing to apologize if you are wrong. It won't hurt you. Learn how to say and mean, "I'm sorry, I was wrong." If you practice that, and if you teach and preach this kind of attitude toward wrong doing, most of your people will follow your leadership.

If you have a person or persons who are involved in controversy and won't settle the issue, be patient. Turn this over to God. Go on about your work. Don't allow them to side-track you. At times I have discovered that the devil has side-tracked me from

my soul-winning, church building task, and I was occupied with the foolish task of putting out the fire. I was on the defense. Once I stopped defending and started attacking the devil instead of people, I

went forward victorious again.

Evangelism

Successful advertising is more than giving public hotice. It is, as the dictionary says, "proclaiming the qualities of, generally in order to sell." Many different approaches can be used in advertising, but the goal is always the same: making known an offer such a fashion that a positive response will be generated. When it comes to revival and evangelism, the same principles of advertising apply.

The following questions need to be asked and answered if our advertising for special revival and

evangelistic services is to be successful.

1. What do we have to offer?

2. What qualities does our offer have that makes It desirable?

3. Who are we making the offer to? 4. How has our offer been received?

In this article, we will discuss the first two questions. We will look to the Word of God for our answers. Luke 8:38-40 gives one of many instances When proper advertising was successful. "Christ" is the answer to the first question (verse 39). We often promote our facilities, programs, and personalities and then wonder why so many fail to accept Christ. Whatever method of advertising is used, the main offer should be easily seen and understood, which is Christ and all that is available in Him.

Verse 39 also gives the answer to our second "And he . . . published . . . how great things Jesus had done unto him." Many religions and organizations have made boast of what they have to offer. We, as Christians, need to have a personal knowledge and experience of what Christ has done for us and can do for others. We have more than an empty boast, we have changed lives. So, when we advertise for a revival meeting, let us not cheapen the reality of the power of Christ with impersonal, poorly prepared, and unattractive promotion.

What is Your Question?

QUESTION:

I am a college student majoring in one of the natural sciences. This past year I had a course in organic evolution. This course went against everything I have ever been taught in Sunday school and church. The professor made fun of the creation as well as Christianity in general. He made evolution sound very plausible. Now I don't know what to believe. Can you help me?

ANSWER:

Shades of the past!! This sounds very much like my own experience thirty years ago. Yes, I think I can help.

In the first place the THEORY of evolution, as it is taught today, is diametrically opposed to several well-established scientific laws, the foremost being the Second Law of Thermodynamics. This law states that in any energy transfer or change, although the total amount of energy remains unchanged, the amount of useful and available energy is always decreased. Since all activities of nature (including biological activities) involve such energy transfers, there must be an ever-decreasing supply of usuable energy for maintaining such processes in the universe as a whole. This means that there is a tendency for the complex to deteriorate into the more simple. However, the theory of evolution teaches just the opposite: that there is a tendency for the simple to be built into the complex.

There are many more scientific reasons for rejecting the theory of evolution. There is the absence in the fossil records of the intermediary forms of life bridging the major divisions of the Phila.

Wheat and Fitzpatrick's textbook in Biology, page 420, boldly declares:

"... When all fossils are placed in the correct timetable as revealed by the rocks in which they were trapped, a succession of organisms developing from simple to more complex is disclosed..."

This statement, and others like it, would lead the student to believe that there is a clear, concise record recorded in the rocks. This is just not the case. In fact, such statements ought to be utterly repugnant to the scientific mind and truly this is the case in many instances.

Professor A. C. Seward of Cambridge University says:

"A student who takes an impartial retrospect soon discovers that the fossil record raises more questions than it answers."

Herbert Spencer in *Illustrations Of Universal Progress*, page 376, states:

"The facts of paleontology can never suffice either to prove or disprove the developmental hypothesis."

Professor L. T. More of Cincinnati University states in his book, *The Dogma of Evolution*, page 160, that:

"... the more one studies paleontology, the more certain one becomes that evolution is based on *faith* alone."

Douglas Dewar, distinguished naturalist of England, wrote in his book, Difficulties of the Evolution Theory:

"Paleontology cannot be regarded other than a hostile witness. It is not possible to draw up a pedigree showing the descent of any species, living or extinct, from an ancestor belonging to a different order. The earliest known fossils of each class and order are not half-made or half-developed forms, but exhibit, fully developed, all the essential characteristics of their class or order. It is not possible to arrange a genealogical series of fossils proving that any series has in the past undergone sufficient change to transform it into a member of another family. All the changes proved by fossils that have taken place in animals are within the limits of the family."

If evolution were true, life throughout the ages would have been drifting over, in a continual stream, from one form to another, taking millions of years to bridge family after family. As untold millions of years passed new strata were being formed while fish became four-legged amphibians, which drifted over into reptiles whose scales became feathers and front feet became wings. Other reptiles and amphibians later developed into mammals, apes, and man. Yet as these changing creatures lived and died for hundreds of millions of years while new strata were being deposited, no fossil has been found that clearly shows one of the millions of necessary transitional forms. Isn't it strange that the only fossils that are found are those of the parent family with all of the essential characteristics of their class or order?

Charles Darwin (Origin of the Species, Vol. 2, page 49, 6th ed.) attempted to answer this objection by saving:

"Geology assuredly does not reveal any such finely graded organic chain; and this perhaps is the most obvious and serious objection which can be urged against the theory. The explanation lies, however, in the extreme imperfection of the geological record."

But yet, the evolutionist has taken that same record, admitted to be "imperfect" by them, and has formulated a strict "science" called "evolution."

The truth of the matter is that the record of the rocks proclaims that life appeared suddenly and in complex form, that new families came abruptly upon the scene, without apparent predecessors. The fossil record testifies that life does not cross the family boundaries, though varying widely within these boundaries. Paleontology proves that the first bats were true bats, the first whales were true whales, etc.

In every area of science used as proof of evolution, arguments such as I have given here may be presented against the theory of evolution.

One final note, and this is ultimately the most

important of all. The Lord Jesus Christ believed in the creation as stated in Genesis 1 and 2. In Matthew 19:4, 5 Jesus, discussing the important subject of marriage, declared:

"... Have ye not read, that he which made them at the beginning made them male and females, And said, For this cause shall a man leave father and mother, and shall cleave to his wife: and they twain shall be one flesh?"

Jesus, in quoting from Genesis 1:27 and 2:23, 24, thus confirms the Genesis account of creation. If one believes in a literal interpretation of the Scripture, the Genesis account does not allow for evolution.

Wonderful Report From Waynesville

The church reporter from the First Free Will Baptist Church in Waynesville writes, "We write this report that each church may rejoice with us as we rejoice in the blessings the Lord has given to us. The Apostle Paul wrote, 'Rejoice with them that do rejoice....'"

The pastor, Brother Butler, states, "My family and I wish to thank the wonderful people of the Waynesville Church for their love, kindness, and helpfulness. I also wish to thank the preachers that drove quite a distance to be at the service: Clarence Burton, Dan Talbot, Mike Hutsell, Grover Terry, and Marion Allsman. It is very pleasing to see so many people ordained and lay people gather together for a special ordaining service. I would like to offer my services to any and every church by way of holding evangelistic services or any help that I might give. If my wife and I may help, please let us know. Remember us and the ministry of this church in your prayers."

Report On The National Association—1979

NASHVILLE, TN—The National Association of Free Will Baptists elected its first executive secretary in 12 years as business concluded at the 43rd annual convention in Charlotte, North Carolina's Civic Center, July 19. Melvin Worthington, 42-year-old pastor of First Free Will Baptist Church, Albany, Georgia, was named successor to outgoing executive secretary Rufus Coffey.

Convention officials reported 4,500 delegates and visitors from 40 states and nine foreign countries attended the July 15-19 gathering. National Youth Conference personnel registered 1,300, while Woman's Auxiliary Convention recorded 937 registrants.

Veteran convention watchers analyzed the 1979 session as a reaffirmation of staunch conservatism for the 252-year-old denomination. Lengthly resolutions sounded clear notes opposing moral and social decadence. Delegates drew lines defining the denomination's commitment to biblical inerrancy and rejection of the modern charismatic movement.

In other Charlotte action, convention delegates:

PAID TRIBUTE to Rufus Coffey for 12 years' service as executive secretary of the National Association. During the Wednesday missionary service, Moderator Bobby Jackson presented a commemorative plaque to Rev. Coffey and a bouquet of roses to Mrs. Maude Coffey, accompanied by thunderous applause from 3,400 worshippers.

REELECTED North Carolina Evangelist Bobby Jackson to his third consecutive term as moderator. Other officers elected included assistant moderator Eugene Waddell (Tennessee), Clerk Waldo Young (Oklahoma) and Assistant Clerk A. J. Looper (Alabama).

APPROVED a 1980 budget surpassing \$6.6 million for seven national departments.

RE-ALLOCATED Cooperative Plan disbursements effective fiscal 1980. The major change specifies that national departments will receive allotted monthly percentages from Co-op receipts, instead of Executive Office expenses being totally underwritten before other departments share in Co-op monies.

RESOLVED opposition to the Equal Rights Amendment, abortion on demand, and religious cults.

VOTED Treatise adjustments clarifying the Free Will Baptist position against the tongues movement

and strengthening *Treatise* affirmation of biblical inerrancy and infallibility.

TABLED the General Board recommendation to appoint a biennial study committee to investigate the feasibility of the national convention meeting every two years.

REJECTED suggested changes in the executive secretary's term of office and method of election. Suggestions, amendments, and substitute motions were debated at length before delegates tired of the matter and tabled it all.

GAVE a record \$11,600 missionary offering on Wednesday night of the convention.

ACCEPTED an invitation from Ohio's State Association to conduct the 1983 national convention in Columbus.

REPORT ON NATIONAL YOUTH CONFERENCE 1979

NASHVILLE, TN—Approximately 3,000 Free Will Baptist youth and adults converged at Charlotte, North Carolina's Civic Center to attend the 1979 National Youth Conference keynote service Sunday night, July 15, 1979.

The service contained quite a variety of special music ranging from the Cramerton Christian School Choir, consisting of junior-age boys and girls, to a mixture of pre-teen through college-age singers in the Swannanoa Free Will Baptist Church Youth Choir, to the mature rendition of two songs by the Watchmen Quartet, consisting of four young ministers from Oklahoma.

According to Mrs. Nancy Cole, NYC Registration Coordinator, statistics are as follows: 586 Participants in Bible Competition and Music and Arts from 19 states; total registration attendance 1,260 from 24 states and 2 foreign countries.




