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hrist Preeminent In Our Look

Text: Titus 2:13 by Rev. Glen Rehkop

In this chapter of Titus, the great Apostle Paul teaches how a true minister of Christ should work in his pastoral duties. He advises to speak "sound doctrine." He challenges young and old, men and women, how to live in this present world. He teaches us to "adorn the doctrine of God our Saviour in all things."

The message of great hope is given. "For the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared to all men." "Teaching us that, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly, in this present world"; and in the next breath Paul speaks to our very soul: "Looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ.'

The Church is to "look" and "expect" the coming again of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. The anointed writer declares it to be a "happy hope." Of His coming again, he says that it's going

to be glorious.

In the early 1940's, President F. D. Roosevelt ordered General Douglas MacArthur to leave the Philippine Islands. MacArthur obeyed the order reluctantly. As he left he told the Filipinos: "I Shall Return." They looked forward to this promise with eager anticipation and expectation. In 1945 MacArthur waded ashore with these words: "I Have Returned."

These words sounded out the message that they had been freed from bondage, misery, heartache, and heartbreak that the enemy had inflicted upon them. The battle had been won. Victory was theirs. To say the least, it was a blessed, happy situation.

Jesus was speaking in the Passover chamber on one occasion, and He told His associates that one day He was going to come back for His own. This is what He has to say: "Let not your heart be troubled: ye believe in God, believe also in me. In my Father's house are many mansions: if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto myself; that where I am, there ye may be also." Hear what He is saying. "I'm going away, however, I will come again!"

In Acts 1:10, 11, just a little later, we see something amazing taking place. Jesus walked and communed with those who were near and dear to Him. He was giving them the message on the "Great Commission" in verse 8. In verse 9 Jesus begins to soar out into the air and the clouds hide Him from their view as He returns back to Heaven to sit at the right hand of the Father. As they looked long and strenuously into the heavens the angelic beings came and spoke to them saying: "... Ye men of Galilee, why stand ye gazing up into heaven? this same

Jesus, which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven." Jesus is coming again!

There are some things about the last days that we may not all be agreed upon. However, there is one thing that we are all agreed upon and are in harmony with—that is, the coming again of Jesus Christ our Lord to receive His children to Himself. As the text verse declares: "The glorious appearing or visible coming again of Christ in glory." This is one of the cardinal truths of the Scriptures. So very much is hinged upon this truth.

Deliverance from this old sinful world with all its miseries and testings. Deliverance from pain, sufferings, tears, sorrow, and man's enemy, death. To inhabit an eternal home not made with hands, eternal in the heavens. Hear how Paul emphasizes the truth in 1 Thessalonians 4:16-18. "For the Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God: and the dead in Christ shall rise first: Then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air: and so shall we ever be with the Lord. Wherefore comfort one another with these words.'

The Lord Jesus is coming again! Those who died in Christ, He is going to bring forth from the grave. We that are alive and remain will be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air. So shall we ever be with the Lord. Comfort one another with the message.

Scofield says: "To the Church the descent of the Lord in the air to raise the sleeping Saints and change the living Saints is set as a constant expecta-

tion and hope.'

Christ's coming again is certain. There is genuine Scriptural basis for us to build our hopes upon. This is not just an afterthought of someone. The greatest attested fact of all the Scripture is the Second Coming of the Lord Jesus Christ. It has been declared by the Patriarchs, the Prophets, and Preachers from the Old Testament through the New Testament. The Gospels are diamond-studded with references to His coming again.

Jesus taught us about His coming. "If I go away I will come again and receive you unto myself that where I am there ye may be also." Jesus cannot lie. We can depend upon His promise. Before He went away He promised that He would not leave us

comfortless. He promised His Holy Spirit. True to His promise, we have the Spirit's Divine presence to guide, instruct, reprove, and direct our paths.

The angels said He would return in Acts 1:10, 11. The Apostle Paul paints the picture so beautifully and explicitly that one's spirit is almost captured by it all. Paul says: "The Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God." The second coming of Jesus Christ is not a question among saved people. We believe it. We believe that His coming is imminent. Philippians 4:5 states: "Let your moderation [gentle, forbearing spirit] be known unto all men. The Lord is at hand." James 5:8 declares: "Be ye also patient; stablish your hearts: for the coming of the Lord draweth nigh."

There are definite signs given in Scripture that point to His coming. One is the parable of the fig tree in Matthew 24:32. If this is the rebuilding of the Jewish nation, then it is a definite sign that Jesus' coming is at hand. The attitudes that 2 Timothy 3:1-7 describes will prevail preceding His coming are undoubtedly with us now.

The text speaks of looking for that blessed hope and glorious appearing of the great God and our Savior Jesus Christ. Jesus taught us to watch and pray. The looking, watching, waiting, praying that is connected with His return involves more than just a staring off into space or loafing around waiting for

an event. It implies:

Preparedness. When the Lord returns He will come for a prepared people. "Be ye also ready for in such an hour you think not the Son of Man cometh." Preparedness involves praying. "Watch and Pray." Never was there a need for seeking the face of our Lord in earnest praying as it is right now. "If My people which are called by My name will humble themselves and pray." Being prepared involves separation. Remember 2 Timothy 3 says that in the last days men would be "lovers of pleasures more than lovers of God." Instead of praying "even so come Lord Jesus" the prayer might well be, "wait a little longer please Jesus." I've got another camping trip to go to this weekend. I've got to enjoy my land or possessions. I have to see about the oxen. My wife has other plans for me. Second Chronicles 7:14 speaks to us saying, "turn from your wicked ways." Again, the Bible says: "Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world." God's people must be separated from the filth, vice, and un-Christlike attitudes in the world.

Paul writes in Colossians 3:2-4. "Set your affection on things above, not on things on the earth. For ve are dead, and your life is hid with Christ in God. When Christ, who is our life, shall appear, then shall ye also appear with him in glory." Looking for Christ calls for obedience. First Timothy 6:14, "That thou keep this commandment without spot, unrebukeable, until the appearing of our Lord Jesus Christ." Note God's command. "Fight the good fight of faith, lay hold on eternal life, where unto thou art also called, and hast professed a good profession before many witnesses."

We look for Christ's return by carrying out the

Great Commission. Acts 1:8. Evangelizing. Soul winning. Paul says in 1 Thessalonians 2:19, 20, "For what is our hope, or joy, or crown of rejoicing? Are not even ve in the presence of our Lord Jesus Christ at his coming? For ye are our glory and joy." Could David be looking this far when he wrote: "He that goeth forth with weeping bearing precious seed shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him"?

In looking for Jesus' coming again we must be about the Father's business of winning souls. Looking for Jesus' coming involes worship and church attendance. "Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together as the manner of some is: but exhorting one another: and so much the more as ve see the day approaching." He who looks for Jesus' coming again will be a faithful Christian in service,

tithing, and soul winning.

The writer of Hebrews looked for His appearing (Hebrews 9:28). Peter looked for His appearing (1 Peter 5:4; 2 Peter 3:10). John looked for His appearing (1 John 2:28). Paul looked with great expectation (2 Timothy 4:7, 8). I read a story of a man who was to be executed for his testimony for Christ. As the executioner raised the ax to behead him, the Christian began to quote: "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith: Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me on that day: . . . " The executioner interrupted. "That does not mean you, sir! That was for the Apostle Paul." The Christian immediately replied: "You forgot what the rest of the verse said, sir. It says, 'Not to me only but to all them that love his appearing." May our prayer be: "Even so, come quickly, Lord Jesus."

Did you ever notice the words to the beautiful, old hymn of the church "Sweet Hour of Prayer"?

Sweet hour of prayer, Sweet hour of prayer The joys I feel the bliss I share Of those whose anxious spirits burn With strong desires of Thy return.

Looking for that blessed (happy) hope, that glorious appearing

Look up, Christian. God has promised a better

day.

Points for Pastors

This month we will continue discussing our subject of pastoral and church organization. We have already considered the choir music program, the Sunday school, and the staff in earlier months. Last month we discussed: 1. the Pastor's time; 2. the order of service; 3. the organization of visitation. The pastor needs to organize his own visitation schedule. If he studies in the morning, then he wil! need to visit in the afternoons. Since hospitals usually have regular, enforced visiting hours, he will need to plan his visiting around his hospital calls. He should also plan to visit when he can take a layman with him. I usually go visiting two nights per week when I can take different laymen with me. This allows me to not only make the necessary visits, but to train my laymen also; 4. the organization of records: An organized system for filing your sermon outlines in such a way that you can locate a needed sermon subject (never throw outlines away). You should keep all your church bulletins. I keep them in notebooks in yearly groups. You should keep all financial records, Sunday school records, and all membership and baptismal records.

We could go on and on but I think you can see that organization is important to the busy and successful pastor. A pastor should never have to write or prepare anything twice. He won't if he organizes his records and his program.





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

BIBLE COLLEGE ENROLLS 528

NASHVILLE, TENN.—Free Will Baptist Bible College reports that 528 students from 29 states and six foreign countries have registered for Fall Semester classes. The 343 returnees were joined by 185 new students who chose the Bible College for their training.
