

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MIRACLE SUNDAY AT FARMINGTON 906 In Sunday School

On Sunday, October 28, 1979, the First Free Will Baptist Church in Farmington, Missouri, had 906 in Sunday school. This broke all records. Reverend James McAllister and the Sunday school and church staff had set a goal of 800 for that Sunday. The goal was exceeded by 106.

The church was in revival services with Reverend Bob Shockey as evangelist that week. A great number of professions of faith and rededications were made during the week, with over 50 decisions being made at the Sunday services.

Editor's note: I asked one of the staff workers how the goal was reached and exceeded. He replied, "Through hard work, prayer, and cooperation." Congratulations to the pastor, Reverend James McAllister, his wife Helen, and the fine Sunday school and church staff. According to my knowledge this is the largest attendance for a Free Will Baptist Sunday school in Missouri.



The Story that Never Grows Old

Luke 2:1-20

There is no story that has so stirred the heart of humanity as the story of the birth of Jesus Christ. Every year as we celebrate in a special way the birthday of our Lord, born of the virgin, Mary, it brings renewed excitement and joy. I suppose the story has been told more than any other story, and yet it is still full of charm. Men tell it in all lands, and they joy over it as if it were an event of yesterday. It is new at every Christmas, and it presents a beautiful opportunity to share the good news of the birth, the life, the death, the resurrection, the ascension, and the coming again of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Let us note some things about this beautiful, miraculous event. *The place*. The first Christmas service was not held in a church building, nor in a temple or synagogue, but rather out of doors in a building or shed used to shelter cattle.

The woman. Her name was Mary. She had been selected as the woman to give birth to the Christ-Child. The unusual thing concerning the pregnancy of Mary was that she had not conceived of Joseph but of the Holy Spirit of God. This was explained to Mary by the angel Gabriel as to how this would take place. "And, behold, thou shalt conceive in thy womb, and bring forth a son, and shalt call his name JESUS" (Luke 1:31). Then Mary asked the question in verse 34, "How shall this be, seeing I know not a man?" The angel gives the answer in the following verse. "And the angel answered and said unto her, The Holy Ghost shall come upon thee, and the power of the Highest shall overshadow thee: therefore also that holy thing which shall be born of thee shall be called the Son of God" (Luke 1:35). I believe this, and every person that has made profession of faith in Christ believes this. by Clarence Burton

One may read in the two previous verses that Joseph and Mary were engaged and Mary was pregnant.

What beautiful words from the angel that announced, "For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord."

Is He your Savior? If He isn't, it is simply because you have not recognized Him and trusted Him as such. He said, "For the Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost."

If you have never received Him as your Savior, will you do it today? The Golden Text of the Bible states, "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life."

What a wonderful, beautiful Christmas this Christmas will be if you know the Christ of Christmas.

HONOR ONE ANOTHER

There can be no doubt that there are few commands greater than our responsibility to love one another. If God just commanded us to love one another only one time, it would be sufficient to obligate us to obey. However, we can find the command to love one another 16 different times throughout the Bible. Therefore, it is very obvious that God wants to make it perfectly clear to each Christian that we are to love one another.

However, our love becomes just vain and empty words if we do not show it or express it. For example, I can tell my wife that I love her; but I prove it by my actions of support, affection, and care. Without my actions, my words would be hypocritical. God does not only want our words of "I love you" but, more importantly, our actions to prove that claim. We should not only prove our love to God, but also our professed love for one another. Just as God is very clear in His command to love one another, God is also just as clear to us in His Word as to how that love is to be expressed to others in the body of Christ.

For example, our love should be expressed by "submitting yourselves one to another in the fear of God" (Ephesians 5:21) or by "pray[ing] one for another" (James 5:16). The Bible says "by love serve one another" (Galatians 5:13); also that we should try to be "likeminded one toward another" (Romans 15:5). A difficult but important way to express our love is to "admonish one another" (Romans 15:14). Other ways that the Bible gives for us to express our love is to be "kindly affectioned one to another" (Romans 12:10); "receive [or accept] ye one another" (Romans 15:7): "bear ye one another's burdens" (Galatians 6:2); "be ye kind one to another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another" (Ephesians 4:32); and also to "edify one another" (1 Thessalonians 5:11). These are just a few of the many ways that we can and should be expressing the love that we are commanded to have for one another.

One very important and challenging way that we should express our love is found in Romans 12:10b, where we are told, "in honour, preferring one another." Let us consider carefully our obligation to love one another by honoring one another. When we think of honoring someone, we usually think of someone who is famous or has done something great to deserve the honor of others. However, we need to realize just how important and special that each of us are as children of God; and as we do, we can see that we are worthy of the honor of one another.

We should honor one another because each of us has the outstanding privilege of being loved by the highest ruler with authority over any other power in the universe. The Bible refers to us as "the apple of his [God's] eye" (Zechariah 2:8). We are very important people and deserve the honor of one another, in that, each Christian represents a soul for which Jesus

Christ died. The fact that God has seen fit to place His precious Holy Spirit to actually dwell in the body of each believer, should make us want to honor one another. The Christian has access to the greatest power known to mankind through prayer. God has made us joint-heirs with His Son, Jesus, who at this very moment, is preparing us a very special place in Heaven. Imagine, a wonderful home, especially made for us! Although in the eyes of the world, God's children may not be honored as famous or very important. When we see ourselves the way that God sees us and realize all the many wonderful blessings that He has for us, there is no wonder why God tells us to express our love by honoring one another.

To honor one another means to serve others for their good, without expecting anything in return. A good illustration of this is your church piano player. Here is an individual that plays beautifully each week to make the congregational singing sound good. Although we seldom notice the piano player, our singing would be terrible without him. So then, here is a person that serves others to make them sound good without really getting any recognition for his service. This is how our love should be as we honor one another. May we seek to serve others by putting them over us, without any concern for our own recognition. Let us remember the words of our Lord who once said, "But when thou doest alms for good deeds], let not thy left hand know what thy right hand doeth: That thine alms may be in secret: and thy Father which seeth in secret himself shall reward thee openly" (Matthew 6:3, 4).

To honor one another means to protect and defend our Christian honor. May we always be anxious to defend the honor of our brothers and sisters against the ugly gossip and rumors that are often spread by the unsaved outside of the church or the hypocrites that are within the church. When we listen to gossip, we make ourselves an accomplice in the attempt to discredit one another. To love one another means to defend the Christian honor of our fellow servants of Jesus Christ.

To honor one another means to uplift others with our words, or compliments. When a famous person is about to be introduced, he is often given many compliments to honor him. Think of the power of a compliment. It doesn't cost a dime to say one, but to the one who receives one, it is priceless. May we be anxious to honor one another by saying nice things to our brothers and sisters. Tell that Sunday school teacher, "You're doing a great job," or tell that singer, "That was a beautiful song." Tell that dear Christian, "I admire your faithfulness," or tell that pastor or deacon, "We're proud of you." Rather than keeping all the nice things you want to say to others bottled up inside of you . . . honor one another by telling others good things to encourage them.

When you compliment someone, you make him feel

good; but you don't get anything in return, other than the joy and satisfaction that you have made someone very happy. This, of course, will make you very happy. Soon, someone else in the body of Christ will uplift you with a compliment so that you will not only feel good because you have honored someone, but someone else has honored you. If everyone in the church will participate in this Bible command to uplift one another by honoring one another, we cannot help but have a good, healthy, and unified church to do great things for the glory of God!

Jesus taught this divine principle of honoring one another in Matthew 23:11 when He said, "He that is greatest among you shall be your servant." Also, we see it in 1 Peter 5:5: "Yea, all of you be subject one to another, and be clothed with humility." The Apostle Paul also teaches us in Philippians 2:3, "in lowliness of mind let each esteem others better than themselves." We cannot truly obey the Scripture, "in honor, preferring one another," unless we are willing to humble ourselves below everyone else. So rather than wasting precious time fighting over who is the greatest or most important person in the church, we should try to see who can be the most humble.

Our Lord would not tell us to do something if He was not willing to do it Himself. In John 13:12-15, we see Jesus practicing what He had preached. Here we find God's Son, on His knees, washing the feet of His disciples. What an example of humility and honoring others above yourself! Jesus said, "For I have given you an example, that ye should do as I have done to you" (John 13:15). May we not only obey the command of God, but also follow the example of Jesus to honor one another in every area of the Christian life.

May each of us strive to honor one another, for when we honor one another, we honor God. If we will obey this command and cooperate in the body of Christ, we will experience the endless cycle of honoring and being honored by one another through service, defending, uplifting, and encouraging one another. That, my friend, is what love is all about!

Should a pastor be concerned about denominational programs? Years ago a well-known Free Will Baptist preacher told me he considered denominational support the last priority. I don't agree. I owe a great deal to Free Will Baptists. I was raised in a Free Will Baptist home; saved in a Free Will Baptist church; my Bible teaching came from the Free Will Baptist denomination; God called me to preach while attending a Free Will Baptist church; and He has given me a place to preach for more than twenty years in a Free Will Baptist church. I am debtor to my denomination.

Thus, I believe I should support the cooperative program of denominational support. I have organized four churches, and all supported the co-op plan. I have pastored two other churches in the state, and both support the co-op plan. It works and I believe in it.

I also am dedicated to extra support beyond the

co-op plan. We use the faith promise plan of support, give each fifth Sunday offering to denominational ministries, and put various ministries into the church budget. Thus, our offerings have grown along with our numerical growth, and our denominational giving averages over 25% of our total offerings.

By designating the fifth Sunday offerings, we are assured of having at least four special programs each year. During a given year we will have a representation from the Foreign Missions Department, the National Home Missions Department, the Free Will Baptist Bible College, and Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. These departments are happy to send a representative because they know they will get a good offering.

God has blessed our church in many spiritual and physical ways, and I am convinced that much of this is due to the fact that God can trust our stewardship.

He is God's anointed, and he has been placed there to lead and serve you as you become involved in living a dedicated, committed life for the Lord. God has placed your pastor in the most responsible job anyone could possibly hold. See that you respect this position. You may say—we give him a salary and parsonage. Yes, the parsonage is a part of his salary. Where will he live when he reaches the age of retirement? But even more than his salary, you need to watch over him and his family. See that he has time with them. They need him, too. Then, don't use your church financial report as scratch paper. Read it. Be aware of what's going on. Insist on your pastor's needs being met. The secret of success is being involved. God will bless.

Essentials of Evangelism

It has been said that in our day, we have substituted "planning" for "praying." This may be true when it comes to evangelism. If we would examine our activity, we might find more time being given to the "method" instead of the "message." Or perhaps, more time promoting the "purse" instead of the "Person," Jesus Christ. While the purpose of this article is not to underestimate preparation and planning for evangelism, it is hoped that proper importance be placed, once again, on the need for praving.

Habakkuk's prayer in Habakkuk 3:2 gives us one of the best guides to follow as we pray for revival.

"O LORD. I have heard thy speech, and was afraid: O LORD, revive thy work in the midst of the years, in the midst of the years make known; in wrath remember mercy" (Habakkuk 3:2).

His prayer for revival was the result of hearing God's Word. While promotion and rallies are good, they are limited. In fact, they are only good as their program is centered around the Word of God. Nothing can challenge and stir the hearts of men like the Word. Men are caused to pray for revival as the warnings and wonders of the Word are sounded loud and clear. Men see their responsibility before God as they behold the Christ revealed in the Word of God. It is as we compare the existing needs of our world with the Bible that men begin to pray, "... I have heard thy speech, and was afraid: O Lord revive thy

Habakkuk prayed for three things. He prayed first of all, "... O Lord, revive thy work" Revive whose work? The Lord's work. The work of evangelizing the world through the church is the work of God. I have the weakness of sometimes praying that God would bless my work of evangelism. But, it is not mine; it's His. Referring to God's work of redemption, the psalmist declared, "This is the LORD'S doing; it is marvelous in our eyes" (Psalm 118:23). When we pray for revival, let us pray for the advancement of His kingdom and not ours.

Second, Habakkuk prayed for God to "... make known; . . ." We need to pray for a revival that would provide a fresh revealing of Christ to ourselves and to

the world.

Third, he prayed "...in wrath remember mercy." Our prayer for revival should be saturated with our petitions for the mercy of God. In light of the sin of man, His wrath is sure and just. We need an evangelistic stir that will cause men to beg the mercy of God.

Let us always include praying in our plans for evangelism. Remember, God does not answer plans for revival but rather, prayers for revival.

Overland Church Celebrates Twenty-fourth Year and Honors Pastor

Miriam Wilhite, church reporter, writes, "On October 8, 1955, the St. Francois County Quarterly Meeting Executive Board Members, Reverend Rolla Smith, Reverend Bill Turnbough, and Deacon Frank David met with the Wellston Mission to organize it into a church and to ordain its Pastor, Reverend Harry Asher, to the gospel ministry. In 1959 the church purchased the property at 9440 W. Milton and changed her name to Overland Free Will Baptist Church. In 1967 a new building 45' by 90' was erected with an \$80,000.00 bond issue. In just twelve months the church will be debt free, having paid off in 20 years \$130,000.00. Current value of the property is approximately \$400,000.00. Hundreds have been saved through the ministry of the church. Several ministers have been called from the church, and some of them are pastoring great churches today."

On October 28, 1979, the Overland Church celebrated its anniversary by presenting Brother Asher with a plaque commemorating his service at the church. He and Sister Asher were presented a boutonniere and corsage of white gardenias. The plaque was presented by our Sunday school superintendent, Brother Bob Loyd, and the corsages was presented by Sister Beulah Logan, one of our charter members. The Revelators blessed our hearts with their singing. Brother Asher's messages were truly anointed by the Spirit of God. There were rededications at the altar, and one young couple joined the church. The Vernon Long Family, natives of Missouri, are now serving as home missionaries to Jackson, Tennessee. The Longs are from the Bethel Free Will Baptist Church in Festus, Missouri, where Brother Long served as a deacon and was active in the St. Louis District Quarterly Meeting. After surrendering his life to the full-time ministry, Brother Long attended his first year of college in St. Louis and then the Longs moved to Nashville, Tennesee. After completing his final three years of college at the Free Will Baptist Bible College, they moved to Portsmouth, Virginia, where Brother Long served as associate pastor to Rev. Jack Stallings at the Collinswood Free Will Baptist Church. The metropolitan area of the city of Jackson has a population of over 73,000, and the church is located in the fastest growing residential area of Jackson. They have a church and a parsonage on $3\frac{1}{2}$ acres on Highway 45, just a mile and a quarter North of Interstate 40.

The National Home Missions Department is working with the Tennessee Mission Board in a joint project at Jackson. The Longs have a burden for the work in Jackson, as well as other areas in the western part of Tennessee where there are very few Free Will Baptists churches. 

Dear Women in Missouri,

We read in the GEM that the Missouri State Woman's Auxiliary had adopted a \$1,500 project. "Mary McLain, Back to School." Thank you so much

for the generous project.

As you no doubt have already read in HEART-BEAT, the Lord provided more than we had thought possible. When we were at the Foreign Missions' office, just before going to Mr. Critcher's office to decide on the best correspondence course to order, we were handed a letter from Christian Academy in Japan. The letter informed us that someone wanted to help a needy student, and they were giving a two-year scholarship—room, board, tuition, travel money home on school vacation included. The school offered this to Mary for her two years left in high school. So instead of correspondence, she is enjoying school with friends and all the activities that go along with school. BUT, we can still use the money. We have been amazed at how fast things have moved since we returned in July. We have rented a house to use for classes and meetings in an area where we had had some classes before furlough. The Bishops had kept these classes going the two years we were away. We are working with Ben Abe, a young man from the church here who is dedicated to the work of the Lord. He has studied at Hillsdale, graduated from college here in Japan, and has done one year of graduate work at Columbia Bible College. We have been having Sunday afternoon services for a month now. Last Sunday, a Sunday afternoon Sunday school was initiated with the help of the Airin Chapel young people, and we had 53 children attend. We also have adult English classes on Wednesday mornings and Thursday nights with these beginning contacts we have started. Of course, it takes money to get set up, pay utilities, etc. Our offerings are not big yet. Next spring a building will be built for our use very near the place we have rented now.

Our biggest need is *PRAYER*. We can teach, we can invite, but only the Lord can touch hearts and convict them of sin. Pray with us. The opportunity before us is exciting, and we want to see the Lord

work in a great way.

Thank you again. The women of Missouri have been very faithful over the years we have been in Japan, and we know we can continue to count on them.
