## Essentials of Evangelism

Much is being said today about the work of the Holy Ghost or Holy Spirit. Men continue to draw conclusions concerning the Spirit's ministry based on their own personal experiences. Personal experiences are good only as they agree with Scripture. Therefore, let us look at the role of the Holy Spirit in evangelism as we find it revealed in the Word of God.

The New Testament Church enjoyed the blessings of revival and evangelism because they depended on

the Spirit of God.

The Spirit of God gave power to speak. The servants of God who were involved in first century evangelism sought power to speak through prayer. They were not content to speak empty dry sermons. They prayed for boldness to speak the Word (Acts 4:29). And their prayer was answered. They were filled with the Holy Ghost and "spake the word of God with boldness" (Acts 4:31). The Spirit not only empowered them as they spoke but taught them what to speak (John 16:13; John 14:26). Speaking under the unction of the Spirit silenced the arguments and excuses of the opposition (Acts 4:8, 13, 14). These early evangelists relied on the Spirit to direct their evangelistic endeavors as to where they should preach (Acts 8:29-40; Acts 10:19, 20).

Next month we shall continue our examination of the role of the Spirit in the ministry of evangelism.

### Points for Pastors

Revival praying is almost a lost ministry of the local church. You cannot, and will not, have revival without revival praying.

Please allow me the privilege of reviewing with you the revival praying leading up to our very successful

revival in October of 1979.

Archie Parrish was appointed Prayer Director of our church. He established a continual prayer list for unsaved, backslidden, and various departments of the church. Each Wednesday night he was in charge of a part of the mid-week service. During this time he took prayer requests and then had an altar of prayer. This continued each week and continues even to this day.

The next thing he did was to set up cottage prayer meetings prior to the revival date. There were

several of them in different homes. He also set days of fasting and prayer (one day each week). These became very important days.

We have an "Early Bird" prayer meeting each Sunday at 8:45 a.m. Brother Parrish speaks on prayer in each of them. Our prayer list in this prayer meeting now numbers over 700. Over 200 of them have been saved since they were added to the list.

The deacons meet with the pastor between Sunday school and church each Sunday and pray for revival, the sick, the lost, as well as the day's service.

We also had prayer meeting prior to each night's service during the revival, and the first day of revival is always a day of fasting and prayer.

What were the results? 110 decisions, attendance averaged over 350 per night, and God brought real

revival to the church.
