A Chance

This article was written by Dale and Elaine Skiles. It is very touching and heartwarming. It reflects a strong faith in God, strong family relationship, and the power of God that can do all things.

Leviticus 17:11a, "For the life of the flesh is in the blood." How forcefully this statement came home to us when we learned from a blood specialist at St. John's Hospital that our 14 year old daughter Carla had a rare blood disease, Aplastic Anemia.

It was in December 1978 when Carla first became sick. She was a Freshman at West Plains Junior High School and Junior High cheerleader at the time. Looking back it is almost scary to remember how routinely everything was handled. We took her to a local doctor in West Plains, Dr. Kang, who recommended we take her to see a blood specialist in Springfield. We still were not alarmed thinking it to be something minor that could be corrected with medication.

After extensive blood tests the blood specialist, Dr. Leo Neu, recommended Carla to enter St. John's Hospital in Springfield for further tests. She entered the hospital in January of 1979. Although we didn't know it at the time, this would be the first of many hospital stays for her that year.

The first inkling that we had that Carla's sickness was of a serious nature was when Dr. Neu told us that he suspected she had Aplastic Anemia and recommended we see a bone marrow specialist in St. Louis. This we did in late January. We made an appointment with Dr. Geoffrey Herzig who had 10 years in bone marrow research and was an instructor on this subject at Washington University.

In our interview with Dr. Herzig we learned that a bone marrow transplant might be necessary sometime in the future. He explained the procedure, and took samples of blood from each member of our family to determine if there was a family member that would be compatible to give bone marrow for the transplant. It was determined at this time that Crystal our older daughter was compatible and would be the donor if a transplant became necessary.

Then began a year of blood transfusions, anxious waiting, moments of frustration and disappointment, and much praying to God. It was during this year I really noticed the great faith and courage of my family. My wife who had much greater calmness and courage and faith during this crisis than I did; and of course the faith and courage of Carla as she faced this ordeal was almost unbelievable.

In January, 1980, it was determined by both Dr. Neu and Dr. Herzig that a bone marrow transplant was indicated. We again visited at Barnes Hospital with Dr. Herzig who explained in great detail the transplant procedure. He then told us that Carla had

a 40-50% chance of surviving with the transplant and without the transplant maybe a 5% chance. We agreed, along with Carla, to go ahead with the transplant. I remember one thing in particular Dr. Herzig said to Carla. He said, "Carla, your attitude during your stay in the hospital will largely determine how well you get along." Carla always maintained a good, positive, attitude.

Dr. Herzig called us about 2 weeks later on Wednesday to inform us that a room was available at Barnes and that Carla would be admitted the following Monday. He then suggested that we contact the Social Worker at Barnes about the financial arrangements. While talking with the social worker, we learned we needed \$50,000 to admit Carla to the hospital. It was at this point that we began to see the miraculous hand of God. Of course the people of our church and the city of West Plains and pastors and people all over the state of Missouri on hearing of our predicament immediately began drives to raise the needed funds. But the fund raising had hardly begun until God worked it out. Dr. Herzig called and said the money was available and to bring Carla immediately to the hospital. I remember vividly the prayer I breathed as we drove out of our driveway to take Carla to the hospital, a prayer God answered. "Lord, bring us all back home in health and peace."

Carla was admitted to Barnes Hospital on January 14, 1980, and preparations for the bone marrow transplant were begun immediately. First there was the process of administering drugs into her bloodstream to kill out all of her old bone marrow. This lasted four days and then on the sixth day, Jan. 22, new bone marrow was transplanted.

The bone marrow transplant was really not as involved as most people think. Crystal who was the donor was taken to the operating room, put under anesthetic and then the doctor drilled 5 holes in her hip bones and drew out about 2 pints of bone marrow. The bone marrow was taken immediately to Carla's room and given to her intravenously. The whole process covered about an hour's time.


Then began the long wait to see if Carla's body would accept or reject the foreign bone marrow. After about 4 weeks it was determined by blood tests and bone marrow tests that the transplant was successful and that the bone marrow was indeed producing the necessary blood cells. Carla was released from the hospital on March 12, 1980, after a period of 58 days hospital confinement.

We are thankful for dedicated doctors like Dr.

Kang, Dr. Neu, Dr. Herzig, and others, and to the staff at Barnes Hospital, especially the Barnard Section. We're thankful for friends all over the country who prayed for us, encouraged us, visited with us, shared with us, and helped us financially. The burden was much easier to bear knowing there were those who shared it with us. We're thankful for Crystal's willingness to give of herself so her sister might live. We're thankful for Laura our youngest daughter who was separated from her family for weeks, yet conducted herself like a mature young lady. We're thankful for Carla who, without complaining, went through days and weeks of anxiety and fear with her faith firmly anchored in God. But, most of all, we are thankful to God that Carla is home with us. doing well, and all her blood counts are normal. It is truly marvelous and miraculous what God has done in her life. Unto His name be honor and glory and praise and thanks giving both now and forever. Amen.

Report On The Missouri State Association-1980

"Free Will Baptists Gather Here" was the heading used by the Lebanon Daily Record. That stated it very well. Free Will Baptists all across Missouri, and visitors from Tennessee, Arkansas, Oklahoma, and Illinois came to Lebanon for the Sixty-Seventh Session of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists.

The Youth Service on Monday evening was probably one of the best attended in several years. The program was well planned and enjoyed by everyone. It was highlighted by the testimony of Art Still, defensive end for the Kansas City Chiefs, Gary Beets, director of FCA, and special music and song by winners of the State Competitive Activities. Reverend Kent Tallent, who presided at the service, stated that he thought that it was one of the better Youth Services.

The Woman's Auxiliary had a very fine State Convention. The reporter of the Woman's Page, Shirley Bowden, will give a report on this.

The special singing provided by Missouri Free Will Baptists blessed each service. Each group or person did a great job. As they appeared on the program; the Farmington Sextette, Sue Cook, the Brawley Family and the Jones Evangelistic Team. Reverend Howard Gwartney directed the congregational singing. His wife Patsy and Jean Bowman served as musicians. They also did a great job and they were so faithful that it enabled the services to function very smoothly.

The ministers that gave the devotionals, Reverend John Turner, Reverend R. E. Helsley, and Reverend Nick Hollis, challenged the hearts of everyone and prepared the minds for effective sessions.

The Youth Camp Board gave a fine report and requested that special offerings continue for the Expansion Program, especially churches that have not made contributions for this project.

This was requested inasmuch as the NYC will be held in California this year and will be quite expensive to travel. This will be a one-time request.

The Christian Board of Education gave a special emphasis to the Pastor-Layman's Seminar, which will be held at Youth Camp, September 22-24. Dr. Stephen Olford will be the guest preacher using as his subject; Revival.

The Retirement Village Board stated that a 20 acre plot, of the 60 acres, has been developed for individual lot purchase and building individual homes. Nineteen lots have been platted and are available for purchase. The lots are 90 feet by 140 feet. (See article in this issue regarding this.)

Every report given was a fine report and was well received. It was also interesting and helpful to hear from representatives from the National Offices.

A note of interest to all *Gem* subscribers: The association voted to publish the *Gem* bi-monthly. This was done in order that the subscription cost would remain the same. To help overcome the monthly publication the bi-monthly will include 4 additional pages. The cost for publishing and printing has almost doubled from the previous years.

The Lord gave us another wonderful Missouri State Association. There was a sweet spirit of unity as each board gave special emphasis to its ministry, while recognizing that each board, each church, and each pastor is involved in a total State and National Work.

Thank God for Missouri Free Will Baptists and for our involvement in a strong state and total worldwide ministry for the Lord Jesus Christ.

Essentials of Evangelism



In the last issue we began an examination of the role of the Holy Spirit in the ministry of evangelism. In that first article of this series, we discussed the Spirit's function as He empowers men to speak for Christ. Now we need to consider the effectiveness of evangelism as it is assured by the Spirit's work.

It is evident that the first century church enjoyed the fruit of successful evangelism. Many were saved. At one time three thousand were added to the church (Acts 2:41). Another occasion witnessed five thousand believing (Acts 4:4). In Acts 6:7 the Scriptures record a great company of priests were also obedient. The city of Samaria gave heed to the preaching of Philip (Acts 8:5, 6). And many other incidents could be cited where men were brought to Christ.

This successful evangelism was assured by the power of the Spirit (Acts 1:8). By Paul's own testimony his effective ministry was the result of the Spirit's power: "My speech and my preaching was not with enticing words of man's wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power" (1 Cor. 2:4). It is the Spirit of God who strengthens the witness of the evangelist (Acts 5:30-32).

There can be effective evangelism in our day if we allow the Spirit His rightful place in this important ministry.



Pastors' Salaries

Does your pastor's salary adequately express what you want to say is your view of the importance of a spiritual leader in the community? General Baptist churches are rapidly changing attitudes toward pastors' salaries. Many are attempting to match their pastor's income with professional men in the community who watch the pastor in experience, age, ability, training, and whose position is near equal in responsibility.

A \$22,000 to \$26,000 total yearly package is the expression of a number of General Baptist churches today with over 250 in attendance. This is counting housing and utilities as worth \$300 to \$400 per month. Insurance, pension, car allowance, etc., are counted as income. Some churches 200 to 250 among us express their view of spiritual leader's importance with total package of \$18,000 to \$21,000. A large number averaging between 125 and 200 in attendance express themselves at \$15,000 to \$16,000 per year. Fewer and fewer General Baptist churches are asking pastors to serve full time for less than \$15,000 per year total package.

What is a fair salary? How does a church know what to pay? What are other churches doing? What would God have us to do? Certainly God would want churches to take good care of His anointed servants. Those He has called and set aside should be cared for and loved. Churches testify to the world what they think of God and His message by the way they treat His messengers. Men who permit a church to show disrespect for God's message by failing to adequately pay His messenger surely do God's cause harm.

A fair salary must take into consideration a number of things: The size of the church, its ability, its needs, and the membership's average income are a few. The minister's needs, ability, training, experience, and what is expected of him are others. The area in which the church is located, the travel expected of pastor, his dress and how they want him to live, must also be considered. A parsonage or housing allowance, insurance, social security, and retirement are benefits included in some salary schedules. The housing allowance should be adequate to buy the average member's house. In most areas this would be \$300 to \$400 per month.

Most companies that require travel will supply a vehicle and expenses, or pay mileage. The article below is taken from the U.S. News and World Report, December 3, 1979 issue, page 94.

DRIVING COSTS: "The average cost of owning and operating a new car is now 38 cents per mile, a record high, according to an annual survey by the Hertz Corporation which specializes in auto rental and leasing. It now costs more than 30 cents per mile to operate a subcompact car. The 38 cent figure was based upon the cost of owning and operating an average equipped, intermediate-sized two-door sedan driven 10,000 miles a year and owned three years, which is the usual case, says Hertz." It is most doubtful we will be able to operate a car for less than 25 cents per mile in 1980. When you count the price of a car, its depreciation, insurance, upkeep, etc., a large salary becomes small.

The kind of car a church wishes the pastor to drive, the kind of clothes they expect the minister and his family to wear, the recreation and social life expected are all considerations.

Cost of living increases should be reviewed. The church that pays the same in 80, that it did in 79, will cut the pastor's salary at least 10%. To increase the salary the same as the cost of living increases each year is not a raise. To give the pastor a raise would be to go beyond or above the cost of living increase.

How long has it been since you reviewed your pastor's salary? Is it fair and comparable to what others with his responsibility, experience, training, ability, age, and needs are receiving in other occupations? Does his salary adequately express what you want to say is your view of the importance of a spiritual leader in your community?
