Three dedicated, committed, consecrated Free Will Baptist preachers, Reverend Don Lombard, Reverend Russell Spurgeon, and Reverend Lawrence Thompson, were called home to be with the Lord. (I listed them in alphabetical order because to those of us who know them, each one is number one.) They were killed in a plane crash September 17, 1980, in an attempt to land at the Spirit of St. Louis Airport in St. Louis County. They were returning from a seminar in Kansas City, Missouri.

These brother-preachers were personal friends of mine. I met Russell and Lawrence a short time after they announced their call to the ministry, and I met Don shortly after he assumed the pastorate at the O'Fallon Church. They were dedicated, committed, and consecrated to the task of preaching the gospel, ministering to the church, and endeavoring to win the unsaved to Jesus.

They were alike in many ways. They enjoyed preaching the gospel, studying the Word, and ministering as shepherd to the local church. They were alike in that each one had a sense of humor and tasteful wit. Lawrence had an unlimited supply of jokes; Don could make any story funny; and Russell

was always able in a quick "witty" way to get the final

punch line.

There is no way by which one could properly evaluate the worth of these preachers to the Missouri State Association and the National Association. (To be sure there is no way to evaluate their worth to the churches they were serving and to their dear families.) The vacancy seems impossible to fill. Don and Lawrence were serving on the Missouri State Home Missions Board, and Russell was serving on the Christian Board of Education and on the Retirement Village Board of Directors. They labored in the spirit of love and unity for the advancement of the cause of Christ and the benefit of our state and national ministries. But we do not accept this tragedy as defeat.

Could we not say that in the sovereign will of God there are no "accidents" for the person that is fulfilling God's plan for his life? Some finish the prescribed course at a different time than others. But each one that is endeavoring to do God's will can say with the Apostle Paul, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith; Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, shall give me at that day: and not to me only, but unto all them that love his appearing."

May the sweet aroma of love, joy, and faithfulness, which characterized the lives of these preachers, fill our churches, our Missouri State Association, and our National Association as we continue to serve the One who loved us and gave Himself for us, the Lord Jesus

Christ.

Russell B. Spurgeon was born September 23, 1932, near Mtn. Grove, Missouri. He was converted and made profession of faith in the Lord Jesus Christ at the age of 19. He surrendered and announced his call to preach the gospel at the age of twenty-one.

Reverend Spurgeon attended the Free Will Baptist Bible College in Nashville, Tennessee. He was graduated with the Bachelor of Arts degree from Missouri

Baptist College, St. Louis, Missouri, in 1975.

He served these pastorates: Myrtle Free Will Baptist Church, Myrtle, MO; Victory Mission Church, Kansas City, MO; Third Free Will Baptist Church, St. Louis, MO; and the church he was serving at the time of his death, Trinity Church, Bridgeton, MO.

Reverend Spurgeon served on various District and State Boards. He also served a total of thirteen years on the National Church Training Service Board. The positions to which he was elected on the state and national level reflected that he had a deep commitment to teaching and training the Christian that he or she might be a more effective servant of the Lord.

He is survived by his wife Elaine of the home in Bridgeton, Missouri; one son Mark at home; two daughters, Jean Ann Matthews of Bridgeton, MO, and Janet Carol Dumm of St. Ann; and two grandchildren Michael Matthews and Lukas Dumm; his father and step-mother, Mr. and Mrs. Flint Spurgeon of Mtn. Grove, MO; and one brother Elbert Spurgeon of Mtn. Grove, MO.

Donald W. Lombard was born January 14, 1944, at Monett, Missouri. He was converted and made profession of faith in the Lord Jesus Christ at an early age. He surrendered and announced his call to preach the

Reverend Lombard attended Southwest Missouri State University in Springfield, Missouri. He later attended the Free Will Baptist Bible College in Nashville, Tennessee, and was graduated with a Bachelor of Arts Degree in 1968.

His pastorates include Bright Light Free Will Baptist Church in Bryan, Texas, and the First Church, O'Fallon, Missouri. He was serving the

church at O'Fallon, Missouri, at the time of his death. Reverend Lombard served in various offices in District and State work. At the time of his death, he was serving on the Missouri State Home Missions

He was actively involved in community activities. He was serving as Chaplain in Charge of the Chaplaincy Program of the O'Fallon Police Department and had served with the chaplaincy program for several years. He received special recognition as policeman of the month for meritorious service in 1979. He was recently named regional chaplain of the National Chaplaincy Program.

He is survived by his wife Carolyn of the home in O'Fallon, Missouri; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Laman Lombard, Monett, Mo; one sister, Marilyn Hull, Monett, Mo; five brothers-Gerald, Danny, Russell and Larry of Monett, and Tom of Portland, Oregon; a grandmother, Mrs. Hazel McClure of Monett.

Lawrence Delmon Thompson was born May 16, 1925, at Salem, Missouri. He was converted and made profession of faith in the Lord Jesus Christ at the age of 25, while a member of the First Free Will Rantist CL. Baptist Church, Berkeley, Missouri. He surrendered and announced his call to preach the gospel in 1951. He later led in organizing a mission church at Salem,

During his twenty-eight and one-half years in the pastorate he served the following churches: Bear Point Free Will Baptist Church, Sesser, Illinois; Riverview Free Will Baptist Church, Bessel, Illians, Viet Free Will Baptist Church, Bettendorf, Wansas Iowa; Victory Free Will Baptist Church, Kansas City, Missouri; and he was serving the Oak Hill Free Will Bantist City of the time of Will Baptist Church, Union, Missouri, at the time of

Reverend Thompson served on various District and State Boards. He will be remembered especially for the many revivals in which he served as the evangelist, his dedication to the ministry of Missouri State Home Missions, and his wit and humor.



Beginning a Children's Church

Last time we talked about why we need a Children's Church. We also had a few pointers about how to conduct a program. This time we have some things to

say about actually doing it.

1. Where will we have it? An assembly room is best. Don't get into a huge room, though. If you have sliding partitions, make the room big enough to enclose about 10 kids comfortably. Being in a huge room with few people discourages people. Being crowded encourages BIGGER crowds. Filling up a room makes the kids proud of their church. If at all possible, don't use an adult classroom. They talk too long, and the kids stand around in the hall making noise until the teacher gets through. Get your own chalkboard and your own easel, so you can prepare before class; and the teacher that uses the room won't erase what you've written. Get as far away from the sanctuary as possible. Kids like songs that you get to shout in, and being too close to the sanctuary will bring you complaints from the adults in a hurry. Try to avoid having chairs that the boys can lean back in. Benches are good, but this isn't a necessity.

2. What will we use? Buy poster board and magic markers, and make as many of your own things as possible. If you can't do lettering, hire a High School kid to do it for you. (While he's (or she's) working, you might even lead him to the Lord.) Be careful of

copyrights on songs. David C. Cook Publishing Company has complete programs for 13 weeks, as does Randall House Publications. Standard Publishing Company of Cincinnati has many excellent flannel-graph series. Baker Book House of Grand Rapids has an incredible number of Object Lesson booklets on many themes: sports, household, objects, animals, etc. All of these are available at our Bookstore in Lebanon. Child Evangelism Fellowship has many visual songs available and also a series of songbooks entitled, "Salvation Songs for Children." Moody Monthly is a good source of material for Children's Church. They always have lots of human interest stories and a monthly column for kids, "Gil Beer's Muffin Family."

I would like to interject this advice: After you get these kinds of materials, guard them with your life. You can't afford to loan them to anybody because you usually won't get them back in good shape. This is

GOD'S property. Guard as such.

3. What do we absolutely need? (1) Some sort of instrument: piano, organ, guitar, accordion, etc. Somebody in your church has a musical talent he isn't showing. Use a cassette player if you have to. Some companies offer entire medleys on cassette. (2) Some sort of pulpit. Get the kids used to the idea of FORMAL SPEAKING. We can give our kids respect for the preacher now that will still be there when the kids have kids. (3) Visual songs-simple, loud, fast, with easy-to-read words, that even the kids who CAN'T read can memorize. (4) Chalkboard or flannelgraph. Don't spend a lot of money. You can find old chalkboards in second-hand shops, and you can make a flannelgraph board with a small piece of paneling and a yard of cheap flannel from a department store. (5) Patience. Not all the kids are going to appreciate your effort, and not all of the parents will. Some of them "don't believe in that sort of stuff." Find out what God's will is, and do THAT.

Points for Pastors

A pastor who has a vision of building a great church needs to sit down and count the cost. The cost may be more than he wants to pay. Long hours, lots of pressures, hard work, time away from family, and times of great loneliness.

If the pastor is just moving to a new field, or has been in a field for a period of time, and now senses an unrest and desire to really do a great work for God, he

should do the following things:

First, read some good books on church growth and methods. I suggest "Sharpening The Focus Of The Church" by Getz; "Why Churches Die" by Hollis Green; "Your Church Has Real Possibilities" by Schuller; "Success Motivation and The Scripture" by Cook; "Planting and Growing a New Testament Church" by Thomas. These and other books by Hyles, Rice, and Towns will help. Now jot down lists of things you learn from each of these books. When finished you should have a list of at least 25 steps you need to take to build a great church.

Second, attend some pastor's schools. Take good

notes. These will not only help with methods but will also motivate you to want to build a great church.

Third, talk to successful pastors and visit some large churches. Find out what they are doing. Look over their plant and their program. Measure your desire by theirs.

Fourth, walk through your church plant and get a clear picture of every detail of your church facilities.

Now, you should know what kind of church you want to build; methods to use; what to do; what your plant capabilities are; and what you will need in building, facilities, and tools to get it done. Now, either from past experience in this place, or through patient waiting and watching, determine how you can accomplish these things in your place of service. Please be smart enough to determine what can and cannot be used. Don't tear up your church by trying to make it into another Thomas Road or First Baptist of Hammond.

Move cautiously, intelligently, in a sane and sensible fashion toward building the kind of church God

wants in your town. It can be done.

You may need to wait awhile and train as well as teach your people. Don't get impatient. Rome wasn't built in a day, and the condition of your church wasn't made in a day.



What Christmas stands most vivid in your memory? Would it be the time that as a child you excitedly tore off the wrapping paper and mentally checked your list of Christmas wants? Perhaps the best of Christmas was the year you received that long awaited present, the one you had wished for, longed for, and perhaps even coveted for many months.

I remember that Christmas well, but still, that was not the Christmas that stands out most in my memory.

Christmas is not Christmas because the wish comes true. Christmas is not just families together, even though this is important. Christmas is Christmas when we learn God's heart concerning this season. "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life" (John 3:16). This season of celebration is ours because God chose to give, and give, and keep on giving. To know what Christmas has at its center, we must manifest this same spirit of giving.

The most memorable and blessed Christmases of all will be those when in Christ-like measure we learn to give, and keep on giving. We often feel cheated during this holiday season when we don't receive that wished for item; could this hollowness be caused from the fact that our emphasis is on the wrong side of giving and receiving?

The Christmases I remember best are not those filled with gifts, but those in which I gave of myself. I'll never forget the joy of helping distribute baskets of food; the joy of seeing the thankfulness of tears from a mother's face as she told me that without the baskets, her family would not have had a Christmas. The sparkle of the eye and thrill of expression on the faces of little ones as a stranger handed them a repaired toy, will never be erased from my heart or memory.

The Christmas our family remembers most was the year a young lad, a friend to our sons, spent Christmas week with us. Shortly before Christmas, the only mother he had ever known, his grandmother, passed away. Christmas and alone, how tragic! God turned disaster into blessing! Our children responded by asking if he could spend Christmas with us. Then in chain like response, the Ladies Auxiliary and our congregation began to give for him. Our families were called and they too responded with warm hearts to give to one less fortunate. We all learned a valuable lesson: Christmas is not found in gifts, it's found in giving!

Do you want to make Christmas 1980 special for your church and family? Find someone to extend the love of Christ to. Find someone who hurts and ease the pain. We don't need money and gifts to have a blessed season; what we do need is simply Christ in us and through us. One of the beautiful carols we sing says, "Joy to the world, the Lord is come,"—How will the world know that Jesus is come unless He works through us?


