the fellowship of the church.



Record Enrollment At FWBBC

A record 584 students enrolled at the Free Will Baptist Bible College for the fall semester, as the college began its 40th year, according to Dr. Charles Hampton, registrar. Compared to last year's enrollment of 513 the enrollment is up by 14 percent. New students numbered 224. The new record does not include five students who have enrolled for a class currently being offered for credit toward the Graduate School, which does not officially open until August 1982. All five are Free Will Baptist ministers in the Nashville area and all are FWBBC graduates. The student body is comprised of people from thirty-four states and six foreign countries. Four Canadian students have enrolled. Three of these are from the newly admitted Canadian Association of Free Will Baptists, which joined the National Association of Free Will Baptists in Louisville last July.

Missouri has 30 students enrolled at Free Will Baptist Bible College. Three of these students are serving as officers in students organizations. Ginny Reeves, a junior from Flat River, is recording secretary for the Foreign Missions Fellowship; Harmony Mowry, a sophomore from Cabool, is serving as chaplain of the Student Body; Ruth Ann Cartee, a junior from Leadington, is the secretary/treasurer for the college's Woman's Auxiliary chapter.

Increase in Enrollment At Hillsdale

Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College announced that there was a ten percent increase in enrollment for the fall semester over the fall of 1980. The number of students enrolled is 165.

Dixon Receives Annual Warden's Certificate

Reverend Othel T. Dixon, pastor of the Lexington Free Will Baptist Church, who serves as chaplain at the Joseph Harp Correctional Center, was honored by the Oklahoma State Department on September 1, 1981. He was chosen to receive the Annual Warden's Certificate.

While serving on the staff of the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Brother Dixon was asked to organize a chaplaincy program at the Correctional Center. During the process, he felt that the Lord was leading him into a full-time chaplaincy program. During the following three years he ministered to one hundred fifty-six state employees and four hundred medium security inmates.

Pastor Dixon was honored by the church he serves for having been awarded the Certificate for Outstanding Service. The church, in speaking of the award, noted that Brother Dixon had used Free Will Baptist Sunday school literature and preached Spirit-filled evangelistic messages, while building the chaplaincy program. The wardens serving the institution complimented the church literature from the Free Will Baptist denomination. It was noted also by the church that while working with the institution Brother Dixon assumed the pastorate of the Lexington Church, and the church received and baptized forty-six members and received record tithes and offerings.

Evans Named to Foundation Position

Reverend Bill Evans has been named Director of Planned Giving for the Free Will Baptist Foundation that serves under the Board of Retirement and Insurance.

Brother Evans brings to the position eleven years experience as trustee and nine as chairman with the Board of Retirement and Insurance. He served pastorates in New Hampshire and Missouri for 19 years.

His primary goal in the initial stage of this ministry is preparatory training through a series of study programs and seminars in estate planning. Assisted by Brother Hersey, Director of the Board of Retirement and Insurance, he plans to implement a program of "will" clinics for local churches.

At present he is serving as pastor of the Bellview Free Will Baptist Church in Colquitt, Georgia. The church is permitting Brother Evans to work parttime with the Foundation. This will continue until the duties of the Foundation require his full attention.

Essentials of Evangelism

Matthew 28, Mark 16, Luke 24, and Acts 1 make every Christian a commissary of the "Great Commission." His presence and power are without intermission. Therefore, He expects our going for Him to be without interruption.

I am challenging every Christian to assume his Christ-given commission of evangelization of every

soul for whom He died.

I would like to introduce myself and give a brief account of my life. My name is Phyllis Miller. I was raised in a Christian home. My father, Reverend Ode Hackworth, was a minister in the Cave Springs Association and was highly respected in the community.

I married at a young age. My husband is a wonderful guy, and we have four precious children. I attend church regularly and I am active in auxiliary work.

Although I am a Christian, there was an area in my life in which I felt defeated. I could not have victory over it. I was a lonely person. I didn't want to be that way, but I didn't know what to do to overcome it. It continued to eat away at me like a cancer does to the body until it put me flat on my back. After several trips to the doctor's office and numerous tests, the diagnosis was bad nerves. I decided that if I did not conquer this thing, that it was going to conquer me.

I made myself an altar at the side of my bed and began to agonize before the Lord. I asked Him to take my life and mold and shape it into a fit vessel for His service. I believe that whatever He did would be the right thing because He doesn't make mistakes. I didn't give it a thought that He might possibly use those who were the most precious to me in His efforts to reshape my life. The things that followed were almost a chain reaction. 1973-I completely blew a friendship with a woman that I worked with; September 1973—my father had open heart surgery; March 1975—my father died; May 1976—my mother died quite unexpectedly; 1977-my daughter Joe Beth became sick; 1978—her disease was diagnosed as an incurable muscle disease, and one month later she was admitted to the hospital. She was in ICU for thirteen days and surgery with no hope to live. Last year, December 1980, because of my determination I was able to sit down and write this prayer of reflec-

"Dear God, as I talk with you today I want you to know that I love you very much. Help me to show that love by being totally loyal to you. As 1980 draws to a close and I begin to reflect back for a moment even before this year comes to a close, I have so much to be thankful for. Thank you for renewed friendships that grew dim for a while. Oh, how anxious I was at times because things were not falling into place as fast as I thought they should. Only a God of love can know the number of days or years of rigorous spiritual training each of His children needs. Some of us seem to need more difficult training than others. Sometimes there are penalties along the way, but this is a part of the process of training and learning. I couldn't grasp that

at the time, but I remember the words of the Apostle Paul, 'I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me.' Lord, I realized that my training was to be continued. It was soon that another step unfolded. It is so difficult to give up a loved one. But I remembered Psalm 116:15 'Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of His saints.' Thank you, Lord, for the strength and the assurance that I felt as you welcomed the homecoming of two of your saints. Lord, because I love you please make it precious to me. Lord, I think that I am ready to bear much fruit for you, but still I seem to want to question, Why me? Isn't my training over? I am getting so weary. It seems that I can hear you say, 'O you of little faith.' Lord, I didn't know that part of the rigorous training included a severe test of my faith and that it would span over a two year period. Our home has been invaded by incurable disease, Lord. I thought that always happened to other families, not mine. It has touched the body of one that has been so full of vim, vigor, and vitality. Lord, she has had two of the childhood diseases; surely she is immune to a disease the medical field knows so little about. Once again I hear you say, 'My grace is sufficient for thee.' The words that keep coming to me time after time is, 'Be still and know that I am God.' Lord, as I began to be still and meditate on your words, I began to realize that our purpose here on earth is to bring honor and glory to Your name. The impact of those words didn't really hit hard until that night in the hospital waiting room when it seemed all hope had gone. I realized that there was no time for selfishness on my part and that I must quit asking, 'Why, Lord?' My desire is that everything I do and everything I say will bring honor to your name. I want to surrender all to Thee, even my children! Lord, the years I have been in training are helping, for I can hear You say, 'All things work together for good to them that love God 'Lord, as I bring my thoughts to the end of this year, I know that we are nearing the day we celebrate as Your birthday. I feel almost like a child. I am so excited! Surely it is because I have a personal relationship with You and because I have felt Your love so strongly during these years of training that Christmas has a new meaning to me. Help me, dear Lord, this special season to radiate some of Your love to those around me. But above everything else, help me to bring honor and glory to Your name. Thank You, Lord, that two people have been healed, my daughter and myself."

OUR SON IS A WRESTLER

January 17, 1981

Our son wrestled his last competitive match last evening in Kansas City, MO. His season ended prematurely due to a leg injury. He is a senior and will not be wrestling in college; so, wrestling is over for him. I suppose that is why mom and dad shed some tears this morning when we brought him home from the hospital. Wrestling has been our life for four years. It is heart-rending to see it abruptly come to an end. Our minds go back a little over four years ago when, as a J.V. wrestler, he won his first competitive match at 105 lbs. He lost his second match that day

but no one is perfect. Not even our son!

What did he look like four years ago? He had the appearance of a normal fourteen year old. His body had not grown into maturity. He had some fat not yet turned into muscle. He had weaknesses and flaws in his character which had not been given the opportunity to develop. From 1978 to the present, our son has devoted himself to this great sport. Last evening, I wish you could have seen our son walk out on the mat for his last match. Is that our son? Something has happened to him. Through some miracle our son is a man now. Confidence and determination are written on his face. Wide shoulders and rippling biceps have replaced that boyish look. The character traits of our son now make us ashamed of our own. Did wrestling do that for our son? You better believe it did! The years of running, weight-lifting, and drilling have developed his body. The "one-on-one" competition on the mat has developed his character by teaching him how to win and how to lose. Notice the title of this small article—it is in the present tense; "Our son is a wrestler"! We won't see him on a wrestling mat again. We won't see his hand raised in victory. Neither will we see him hang his head in defeat. Life, however, is full of wrestling matches. There are days of victory and days of defeat. There are days of joys and days of sorrow. To succeed in this life both materially and spiritually, one must learn to bounce back. Our son has learned that lesson on a wrestling mat. He never gave up. As a sophomore, he wrestled and lost fifty percent of his matches. We have seen him sit with

tears in his eyes after a defeat. We have seen him come home from practice ready to quit. But he shook off the despair again and again and believed in tomorrow and himself. This is the most valuable lesson anyone can learn, and it will remain with him all his life.

His training and devotion paid off, although he will not finish his last season. Our son won thirteen of his eighteen matches, and the boys who defeated him those five times all went six minutes and knew they had done something. He was also able to fulfill one of his main goals as a wrestler for which we are very thankful. He wanted to make it to the finals in a large tournament. A few weeks ago he upset the number one seed at Columbia, Missouri, and advanced to the finals in the Rock Bridge Tournament of champions. What a thrill to see our son in the spotlight. He was defeated in the final match by two points, but no one is perfect. Not even our son!

We should all, as parents, express our appreciation to Coach Dudick and Coach Albrect for what they have done for our sons. No sport demands as much

from the coaching staff as wrestling.

Today as our physician drove to the hospital to examine our son, he commented to his wife, "You know, it takes a real man to be a wrestler." On the wall of the wrestling room at Central High School, Coach Dudick has appropriately painted the words "Wrestling is a sport for men."

My wife and I are very grateful for our son's Godgiven ability to participate in this great sport. We are very, very proud as parents when we say, "Our son is a

wrestler."

Dilcia

She was a tiny dark-skinned woman, with a touch of red in her complexion. Her hair was almost black and very straight and shining. To me, she appeared younger than her 31 years. Maybe it was her small stature that fooled me. Her name was Dilcia.

Upon our arrival in Panama, we were bombarded with many necessary tasks such as unpacking, buying furniture, endless government paper work, plus the work in the church. Michael was $2\frac{1}{2}$ years old, and I was five months pregnant with Phillip. I needed some help! Dilcia, I was told, desperately needed some work. So it was decided that she would help me in the house two days a week.

As I came to know this quiet, sincere person, I discovered many things about her. She had three children she was trying to support entirely on her own. Her common-law husband had deserted her and their children when she was expecting her third child. Making a salary of \$3.50 a day, I wondered how she could possibly buy the food they needed, much less anything else. I learned she lived with an elderly aunt, uncle, and possibly seven other relatives in a small house not far from our church. I learned that she was very shy and had a big inferiority complex because of lack of education and poverty. But I also learned that she was honest (a trait rare among women who work as maids in Panama). Most important, I learned she was unsaved-believing there was a God, but not knowing how to reach Him.

Dilcia became a matter of prayer in our home. We grew to love her and her children. As we prayed and lived before her lives that demonstrated Christ and His love (for Dilcia an example was much more understandable than words at that point), we saw an interest sparking in her. She began to question us concerning our faith. Soon, after lunch one day, she asked timidly, "Could you tell me how to be saved—to repent of my sins?" Needless to say, I gladly shared with her the plan of salvation as Steve prayed for us in another room.

God loves us all. There are countless Dilcias in this world searching for the hope we can offer them through Jesus Christ. Let us all be faithful to the task we are given (1 Corinthians 4:2).
