

MORTGAGE BURNING SERVICE AT DE SOTO



A special event was held at the First Free Will Baptist Church in De Soto, Missouri, on Sunday, April 18, 1982. The church held a Mortgage Burning Service.

The Service began at 1:30 in the afternoon. The pastor Reverend Charley Miller welcomed the congregation and visitors and asked Reverend Jim Parker, pastor of the Richwoods Free Will Baptist Church to open the service with prayer. Following this the congregation enjoyed several songs by special

singing groups.

The program proceeded with the pastor giving a brief summary of the history of the church. The church began as a mission in a small building in De So to and later moved to a larger storefront building on Main Street. During this point in the history of the church Reverend Miller was called to serve as pastor. Brother Miller had not been licensed as a minister at this time. Prior to that time he had served as a deacon in the Parkview Free Will Baptist Church in Desloge, Missouri. As the Lord blessed with an increase in attendance the church recognized that there was a definite need for a larger building and a permanent land site. One and one-half acre was bought on Vineland Road. A basement was built with much of the necessary money being given as was needed. Early in 1971 the church voted to build the sanctuary and additional educational space. It was necessary to borrow \$45,000.00. This was secured on a note for twenty years. To the praise and honor of God reflecting what His people can do because they love Him, the note was paid off in eight years.

The pastor recognized Reverend Clarence Burton, promotional secretary, Missouri State Association. Brother Burton recalled that he was the evangelist for the first revival. He stated that the wonderful accomplishments that had been made by the church was because the church honored God and God had blessed the leadership and body of the church. He noted that two things are essential for growth, "proper leadership and a united effort by the body of believers."

The leadership of the church was called to the front: the pastor, the trustees, the deacons, Sunday School Superintendent, CTS Director, Children's Church Director, the Joy-Makers director (woman's group) and Director Christian Service Brigade. A selected passage of scripture was read by Brother Burton and a special prayer of thanksgiving was offered by the pastor, as the leadership and the congregation prayed together.



The time had come; Brother Paul Ruble held the mortgage while Brother John Mouser set it on fire. Praise God from Whom all blessings flow! A church rejoiced in the blessings of the Lord for what He had done through them. Wonderful revival services were enjoyed Sunday Morning and Sunday evening.

Equipped for Service 2 Timothy 1:6-14

As the Apostle Paul wrote this letter to Timothy, he could probably see the day of his execution rapidly approaching. Yet, Paul took the time to write to his "Son in the Gospel" to cause Timothy to remember the gift or calling God had given him. Timothy would need this for the days of persecution that lay ahead. We need to realize as did Timothy that God does not call us without equipping us to do the work. Paul gives us this divine equipment which is power (verse 7), a purpose (verse 9), and assurance (verse 12).

As believers God has given each of us gifts to use in His service (1 Corinthians 12:11). So much of the time, however, we fail to use our gifts fully because of fear. God has given us His power to overcome that fear and cause us to make an impact on men's lives. The dictionary says that power is "a great or telling force." With God's power we can make a difference in our place of service. Along with His power God has given us love to combat fear. When our love for God and our fellowman is what it ought to be, we will see the importance of our work and overcome fear. A sound mind is also important in that as Christian witnesses we need to keep our bodies under subjection and also display godly wisdom. Knowing when to speak and how to act is as important as knowing when not to speak and when not to act. Allowing God's power to work in our lives comes about as we mature as Christians. In other words it takes time. Because of God's power, love, and wisdom there is no need to be ashamed of our work, but these things should keep us going. As Christians there will always be a certain amount of "hardship" or ill treatment in our walk, but we are to shoulder our responsibilities and go forward in the power of God.

Not only have we been given a gift but also a purpose to use our gift by the one who saved us and called us into service. When we think back to what God has brought us from, it should help us realize the needs of the lost around us. God has given us a plan whereby we might be free from the guilt, dominion, and stain of sin. In fact He has given us a holy calling or called us to a life of separation from the world of sin. Thank the Lord our salvation is not dependent on our abilities or accomplishments because they are so few compared to His great work. But we have been saved from destruction because of His love and by His grace. Our salvation is not due to a new revelation or a change of mind but the sacrifice of the cross has been God's plan since before the foundation of the world. Since we know that all should come to repentance and

since we personally have experienced the victory over spiritual death and a union with God, we should be thrilled to be able to pass on the good news of the gospel. No matter what we do for the Lord our ultimate goal should be the salvation of souls. In 2 Kings 7 we read the story of the four leprous men who came upon the vacated Syrian camp after God had frightened the enemy away. They were starving but found all they needed and much more. They then thought of the starving city of Samaria, went and told the king about what they had found, and the whole city was saved. We as God's servants are like those four men; we were doomed to starve spiritually until we found the Savior and experienced His love and deliverance. The question is, What will we do about the starving world around us? It is God's plan that all may know of the vastness of His love and grace. This is our purpose.

Paul suffered much persecution. He was imprisoned, beaten, stoned, threatened, hated, expelled, and tried. Yet he never looked back with regret or shame. He had great boldness in his ministry because he was assured of God's power, love, and wisdom. Paul says in verse 12, "For I know whom I have believed." This was always his greatest desire, to know completely, by the life he lived, the One who gave His life for him. To have Christ known in our lives is to strive to love the way Christ loved, to care the way Christ cared, to give the way Christ gave. Paul had tried and tested the Lord's way and found Him equal to every occasion. Even though he faced execution Paul stood firm in his trust of the one he had committed his life to. In spite of his bleak future, Paul never doubted God's way or His care. When we come up against trying times, may we ever place our faith in the One we are committed to.

In verse 14 Paul says, "That good thing which was committed unto thee keep by the Holy Ghost which dwelleth in us." We have been entrusted with the precious gospel of Christ. We as Christians have been given a most important task. Let's use our God given equipment to do our best for the One who gave us His best.


