

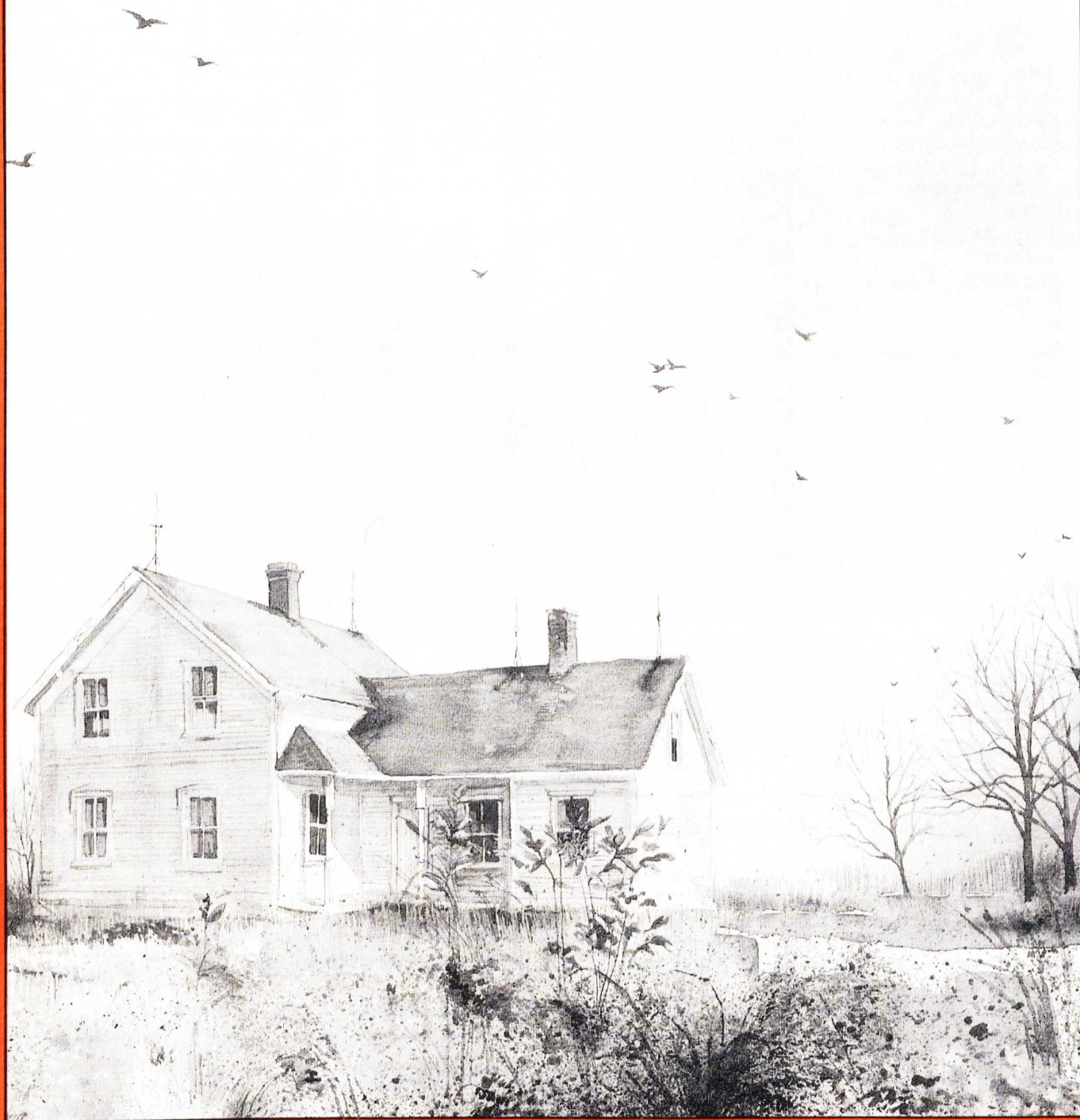

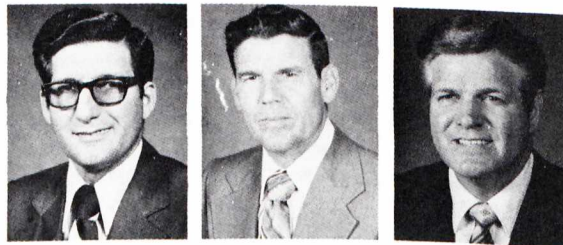

## Brief Report on National Association

*The largest voting delegation in 46 years* hammered out a seven-paragraph resolution on the final day of the Free Will Baptist National Convention, re-committing the denomination to total abstinence and pledging the movement anew to its fundamentalist Church Covenant. The vote condemning the use of alcoholic beverage in any form came on Thursday morning of the five day convention. Although some continued to call for a stronger, more pointed resolution, the overwhelming majority of delegates felt that commitment to total abstinence was both biblically defensible and in line with the denomination's historic teetotalism position, an anti-liquor stance that has remained unchanged since the movement organized in 1935.

*Note:* The National Association voted to combine the 1982 Minutes with the 1983 Church Directory. The combined publication will be marked by Randall House Publications. Randall House will provide one free copy of the publication to each of the churches listed in the Church Directory. *The purpose of this:* To help curb the cost of the National Convention.

*Contact* will raise its subscription rate to \$8.50 for individual subscriptions and \$8.00 for the Bundle and \$7.50 for the Family Plan. A five-man study commission was appointed by the moderator to investigate the possibility of the denomination sponsoring a national radio/television outreach.

*The next session* will meet in Columbus, Ohio, July 17-21, 1983.

## Revival at Rolla

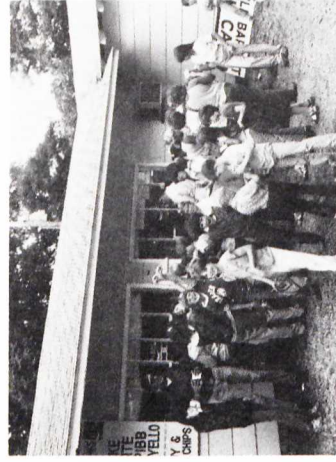

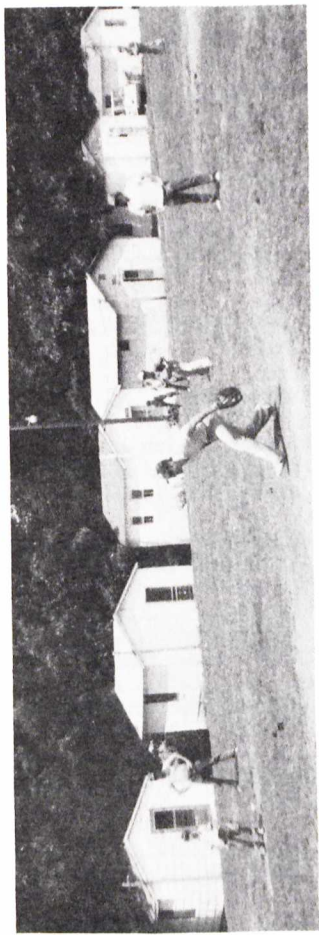
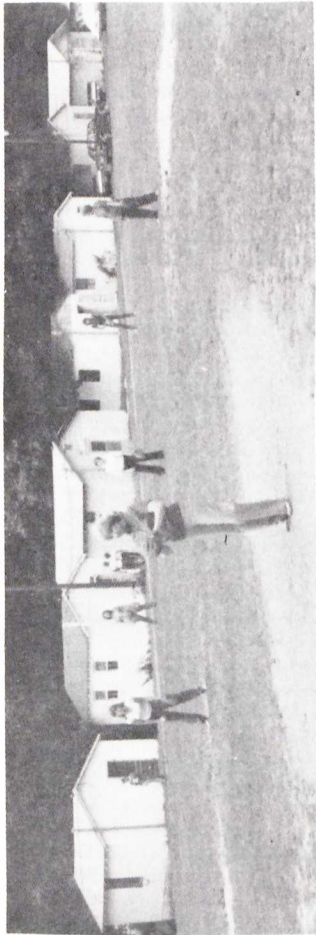

## STATE ADOPTED PROJECTS

The State Auxiliary Convention adopted the following projects at their meeting in June for the 1982-83 year. They are:

(1) Foreign Missions Project will be for Jeff and Susan Turnbough in the amount of \$2,000. This money will be used for their language school in Spain. The project will be known as "LANGUAGE FOR TURNBOUGHS."

(2) National Home Missions Project will be also in the amount of \$2,000 and will be for Bill and Glenda Fulcher and their work among the Spanish American people. They have begun a work in Houston, Texas. The project will be known as "FULCHERS TO SPANISH AMERICANS."

(3) Youth Camp Project in the amount of \$2,000. This money will be used in the renovation of the swimming pool at the youth camp when the board deems necessary. The project will be known as "RENOVATION OF YOUTH CAMP SWIMMING POOL." A Constitution and By-Laws change was also made. This would amend the By-Laws of Article 5 on Fees and Reports to read as follows: "One dollar and seventy-five cents of the two dollars (\$2.00) per active member shall be paid annually to the WNAC for membership fee. It shall be the duty of each body directly affiliated with the state auxiliary convention to send a report to every annual session for the auxiliary year beginning May 1 and ending April 15. All reports are to be sent to the state secretary and to the state treasurer by May 1. (\$2.00 sent to the district, \$1.75 sent to the state by the district or locals not in a district.) In the future our membership fees will comply with the WNAC on any changes."
