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What Is Wrong With Today's Rock Music? (The Devil)

Make a joyful noise unto the Lord! We hear this statement very often in our churches, usually from people who say they can't sing or don't know music. But what is this thing called "music"? The dictionary defines it as the art of organizing sounds that create a certain mood to the listener. The sounds that we like most are also the moods we want to be in most often, whether it be a twangy bango, a soothing flute, a driving drum beat, or a blazing electric guitar. Music does affect the kind of mood we can be in.

In this article we will be taking a very close look at Rock and Country Music—the messages of the song, the life styles and thoughts of the people making the music, and why they are making their music. Are they doing it for money and fame, or is there some other motive?

The first statement I want to make is that not all rock and country music is bad. There are groups who play good, clean music that is enjoyable to listen to. There are also groups whose music is vulgar, sick, and demonic-the kind of music that makes you feel like hitting someone, going out and getting drunk, or that which confuses us. One thing you can be sure of is that Satan loves confusion. When we get confused and are not in control of our thoughts, emotions, or actions, we are at our weakest point. Satan loves this. It's at this point when he will throw all he's got at us to try and make us fail or start doubting the Lord. Does the music you listen to confuse you? Do the lyrics that you know or have memorized reflect how you feel about certain subjects, whether it be drinking, rebellion, sex, drugs, or God? When one of your favorite songs comes on the radio and you start singing along, do the contents of the song embarrass the Lord? I hope not.

Let's take a look at some of the messages of a few rock songs. The #1 album of 1980 (according to Rolling Stone magazine) was "The Wall" by Pink Floyd. The lyrics say, "We don't need no education. We don't need no thoughts control. No dark sarcasm in the classroom. Hey, teachers, leave us kids alone!" Although this song is almost four years old, it is still a favorite among the youth. Why? Because of the message. "Hey, teachers, leave us kids alone!" To me it's kind of disturbing to know that this is what is going on in the minds of the youth of this world. Rebellion-we do what we want when we want. Maybe you didn't realize it, but Jesus was a teacher. He taught all about life, friendships, love, happiness, and how to serve the Lord. He is still a teacher in many ways, and a very good one. Do we listen to Him, or do we rebel against Him?

A big hit for the group Loverboy was a song called "Turn Me Loose." The words say, "I'm here to please, I've even on my knees making love to whoever I please. I gotta do it my way or no way at all." Well, how obvious can you get? In Leviticus 20:10-13 the Bible says any sex that is not between a husband and his wife is sin. You will be put to death; "their blood shall be upon them."

There is a song on the Styx album "Kilroy Was Here" called "Heavy Metal Poisoning." The words say, "Get the lead out, go for broke. Pop your pills and drink and smoke. Shoot those chemicals in your vein. Anything to ease the pain." No hidden message here.

The Beatles' song "Hey Jude" says, "Remember to let her under your skin, then you'll begin to make it better." To understand this song you need to know that "Jude" is a street name for heroin. Titus 2:11-12 tells us to "live soberly, righteously, and godly in this present world."

One of the biggest songs of 1982 was by Joan Jett, a song called "I Love Rock-N-Roll." The song has a hard driving beat, loud guitar, with Joan Jett singing "I love rock-n-roll" over and over. This past summer when I spoke at Youth Camp, there was a young man who was asleep while I was speaking. I tried not to let it bother me. As I played this song, "I Love Rock-N-Roll," he woke up singing along with the tape. Almost all of the other teens knew this song and quite a few were singing along. This really puzzled me. "Do you love Jesus?" I asked. Silence came over the hall. The looks on their faces was one of "do I have to say it out loud?" Why not? When you're with your friends and you hear this song, you probably sing aloud or out loud; but you're afraid to say "I love Jesus" out loud. Do you love Him? Do you really know Him?

There may be a few moms and dads ready to go into their kid's room with a hammer. Before you do, stop and think about that country music you are listening to. Songs like "Take Me to Bed and I'll Be Good," "Whiskey River," "I Love That Woman Like the Devil Loves Sin," "It's a Cheatin' Situation," and others. Conway Twitty said (*People* magazine, 9/3/79), "As a country artist, I'm not proud of a lot of things in my field. There's no doubt in my mind that we are contributing to the moral decline in America." Willie Nelson said (*TV Guide*, 10/8-14/83), "I haven't smoked regular cigarettes for seven years. Marijuana? Just a joint ot two a day to help me relax."

I've read where Barbara Mandrell says she is a Christian. When she had her show on TV, she always performed at least one gospel song. She sang "Amazing Grace" one time with tears flowing down her face. It really touched me. But then a few minutes later she sang "Married But Not To Each Other," a song which she also wrote. I thought "something's not right here." What is she doing? She is compromising! As I read the Bible, I find no situation in which Jesus compromised. He took stands on what He believed in and what He knew was right and wrong. We need to take firm stands in today's world.

There are a few country and rock singers who claim to be Christians, and I believe they are. But if you will look at the others, their lives, and examine their songs, you will find out that they are about as Christian as the devil. It hurts God and our spiritual lives when we desire to hear this kind of music or if we enjoy this type of entertainment.

There are methods being used on people which try to get something into their subconscious minds without their even knowing it. These methods are called subliminal suggestions. For example, right now you are reading this article; your conscious mind is focusing on the words on this page, but you can also hear the other sounds around you—someone talking, a car drive by, or an airplane fly overhead. Your subconscious is listening to everything that goes on around you. Have you ever been driving or riding in a car and your mind wanders off for a while, and all of a sudden you realize you have driven several miles and you don't remember anything? You made a few turns or a few lane changes, but you don't remember how. Your subconscious took over for that period of time. Have you ever heard a song two or three times and, even though you didn't listen to the words, you know the chorus? After a few more times you may know the entire song. Your subconscious picked up on the beat and the words.

Some of today's artists are using this subliminal technique on you to get a message into your mind. The Beatles sang "My Sweet Lord." In the first and second choruses, you hear "My sweet lord. Hallelujah. Hallelujah.' but in the third chorus you hear "My sweet Lord, Hare Krishna. Hare Krishna." It's very plain.

Another technique that is being used in rock music is called backward masking. This is a word or phrase which may or may not make sense forward; but when you play it backward, there is a hidden message, usually about Satan. Speaking backward is a type of worship done in churches of the occult. The #1 song of the decade 1970-1980 was by Led Zepplin, a song called "Stairway to Heaven." In this song, when played backward, you hear the words "My prince Satan," "I'll give you 666," and " 'Cause I live with Satan." In the song "Snowblind" by Styx, you can hear "Oh, Satan, move in our voices." The song "Hotel California" by the Eagles says, "Yes, Satan, he organized his own religion." And there are many, many more.

People often ask me, "Why get hung up on this backward stuff?" I'm not "hung up" on it; it's just something that came about that proves Satan is using some rock bands for his glory. You don't have to play songs backward to find satanic messages. In the song "Goodbye Stranger" by Supertramp it says, "With the devil as my savior, I don't pay no heed."

AC/DC sings "Hell Ain't No Bad Place To Be." Their song "Rock-N-Roll Singer" contains the words "I got the devil in my blood telling me what to do, and I'm all ears." These songs are being played all over the world; their concerts are sold out everywhere they go. Teenagers love them. Their biggest song is called "Highway to Hell." The words to this song are saddening: "My friends are gonna be there, too. I'm on the highway to hell. No stop signs or speed limits. Nobody's gonna slow me down. Like a wheel, gonna spin it. Nobody's gonna mess me around. Hey, Satan, pay my dues. Hey, I'm in a rockin' band. Hey, mama, look at me. I'm on the way to the promise land. I'm on the highway to hell."

When Satan tempts us, what kind of guard can we have against him if this is what we are listening to? There is a highway to hell. I know, because three years ago I was on my highway to hell—going to all the concerts, doing everything all the other guys did. But all that is changed now. Three years ago I knelt down at an alter and asked the Lord to be my personal Savior. I told Him that it was no joke. At that very moment the Lord reached down and killed me; then He raised me up a new creature, just like He said in II Corinthians 5:17-18, a born again Christian. Making that decision was the best thing that ever happened to me. Being a Christian is a lot of fun. The Lord will put a new song in your heart.

A question to the Christians: Have you really separated from the things of the world, namely, the type of music you listen to? Are you compromising? It is my prayer, through writing this article, that both parents and young people will be made aware of the dangers of certain types of music and how Satan is using this very popular and "addicting" means to destroy our Christian testimony.

Points for Pastors

How do you plan, organize, and promote a big day? Our church has experienced several big days which we call "Miracle Sundays." Time after time we have set big goals and reached them. Sometimes pastors set goals and don't seem to get anywhere. Why? How can a church reach its goals?


First, be sure it is the church's goal. Don't allow the church congregation to put the "monkey" on the pastor's back. The goal isn't the pastor's goal or the Sunday school superintendent's goal; it is the goal of the entire church. To assure this, we present our goal to the General Board, who pass it and then recommend it to the church while in conference. They vote to make this goal the church goal. That changes the whole complexion of the big day.

Second, plan well in advance, preferably a whole year. By planning a year in advance the church can be well organized, and can do a good and adequate job of promoting the big day. *Third*, be organized. Plan in advance; approach the goal from as many different angles as possible. For example we have bus goals; we have class goals; we have department goals. We have contests between the adults; we have a teen rally, a children's church rally, and a special program to induce visiting and inviting. We usually have guest speakers, give prizes, and do anything else we can imagine to provoke our people to be present and bring friends.

Fourth, promote. Nothing takes the place of promotion. One can use radio, newspaper ads, bulletins, banners, round tuit pins, signs, newsletters, posters downtown, and especially posters in the church. Pastor, remember it's more important to get your church excited and working than it is to get the outsider interested.

A church can reach its goal. Once in a while a church may miss the mark, but not often if these ideas are used. Goal setting is good for the church.

Dear Friends:

Greetings from New Jersey. The Lord is continuing to bless our work. We are having souls saved and an increase in attendance. We are averaging in the forties now and feel that the church will continue to grow.

Our urgent need is our missionary account. In April we were within just a few dollars of being "cut off" from the National Home Missions Board because of being too far in the red. We have never been in the red until last November. But because of the \$43,000.00 deficit of the General Missions Account many began to switch their support believing we would be alright. But we went \$400.00 a month into the red very quickly.

Our second great need is for Building Funds. We are just breaking even with the finances and construction on present responsibilities. We raised over \$5,000.00 to build the recreation room to the parsonage for a place to meet away from the rented school. (We can only get the school building on Sundays). The city has placed a \$17,800.00 cash surety bond against our Building Plans. We have spent the equivalent of \$14,000.00 plus to comply with the City Planning Board requirements and they still demand \$7,600.00 cash surety bond guarantee. The National Home Missions Board cannot help because of some difficulties.

Thirdly, building loan money is not available at this point. I have approached the National Home Missions Board twice and I have not been able to get any help. The local banks will not loan it. So, if we cannot get the money from the bank nor the National Home Mission Board we are at a loss as to what to do.

We have not asked our missionary supporters to help raise Building Fund money because we know that the giving is to send the missionary to reach the lost. Also, the National Home Missions Board has asked the missionary not to make this kind of appeal. But because of the unusual difficulties I am appealing to the Woman's Auxiliary, Youth groups, Master's Men or etc. to help us.

The last point to be made is, bonding in New Jersey is similar to Missouri. One Bonding Company charges \$6,528 as a fee for \$80,000.00 and another could not bond because it is not registered in the state.

It is against the law in Vineland, New Jersey to meet in your home for church services. However, we are meeting in the recreation room of the parsonage. We do not advertise it because we would be subject to a fine or jail if the authorities should be aware that our Mid-Week Prayer Service is being held in the home.

So you can see that we need your help. We are claiming victory because we believe the Lord will give it.



Report on Missouri State Association

"I love the Bible more now than I ever loved it before" was said and echoed by many that attended the 71st Session of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists. Surely there was a greater appreciation, love and respect for the Bible as a result of four messages and two devotionals that developed and lended themselves to the theme "Back To The Bible".

The preachers, Dr. Thigpen, Brother Braddy, Brother DaVault and Brother Murray preached with an anointing from Heaven. The devotionals by Brother Greg McAllister and Brother Steve Hale prepared hearts for the business sessions. The ones that presided, Brothers Gene Crewse, Tim Eaton and Dale Underwood set the spiritual tone for their respective service. The congregational singing and the special music by Brother Ted Wilbanks, The Durbin Family, Patsy Kesaluv, The Postlewaites, and Rhonda Hodges complimented the spirit of each service. The fellowship, as always, was sweet and uplifting.

The service on Tuesday evening, with an emphasis on Sunday School and Church growth, under the direction of the State Sunday School and C.T.S. Board, coincided with the ten-year program that was initiated last year. Brother Connie Cariker delivered a challenging message with a strong emphasis on "Keeping Our Purpose". This year marks the beginning of the 10 Year Program inasmuch as each state board has made it's response to the Planning Committee. We anticipate these goals being met by 1994: 1,000 professions of faith in Jesus each year; Sunday School growth increasing an average of 1,000 each year; an average of 2 new churches started each year; an appropriate increase in giving with a goal of five hundred thousand for cooperative and at least that much for designated by 1994. Included in this program is also satellite bookstores, Sunday Schools and etc.

This goal may seem unreachable, and 1994 seems so far into the future, but look back ten years and note how quickly it has passed and increases that have been accomplished. With a firm trust in God, a firm determination and a firm interdependence and love for each other we can do it! If we are to move forward these goals should and must be kept in view. May God help us that there will not be one ounce of pessimism in our thinking. May we go forward and press on with this one underlying thought that souls must be saved in Jerusalem (local church), in Judea (throughout Missouri), Sameria (throughout the U.S.) and the uttermost part of the earth.

The Lord has given us quality leadership in our state work with our moderator Brother Millard Sasser, assistant moderator, Brother Nathan Ruble and the general board. As these challenge and lead us may we not be guilty of hindering or holding back, but may we be in step with the Holy Spirit and claim continuous victory month, by month and say with the apostle Paul, "I can do *all things* through Christ which strengtheneth me".

It was estimated that approximately six-hundred attended the Missouri State Association and related activities. Registration was down this year because of the meeting being held a week earlier and some of the public schools were still in session. In fact graduation exercises were being held in several areas.
