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FAITH IS A MIRACLE

Our Lord is still in the miracle business! If you wonder about this, just ask anyone in the congregation of Faith Free Will Baptist Church in Oak Grove, Missouri. Perhaps the very name "Faith" has a lot to do with this miracle.

Just one year ago, in June 1983, two families met with just 5 people around the dining room table at Granville Short's home near Oak Grove for Bible study. No one was quite sure what the future would hold, but everyone unanimously agreed that now without a Free Will Baptist church in the area to worship in, something must be done. Even if we just met for Bible Study, it was decided that would be a start. But the Lord has promised us if we take the first step in faith, He will lead us the rest of the way. And the Lord certainly has guided us this past year on an incredible journey of faith filled with tremendous blessings.

From that very first meeting, the Lord began to build for His church. Almost immediately it was evident the Lord had plans to organize a new congregation from this small group which had always been Free Will Baptists. With the preciseness that only the Lord can arrange, the pieces began to fit together.

God long ago had called John Percival to the ministry, but until this time, John had always said no to that call. Immediately it became evident the Lord was providing a perfect opportunity for him to answer yes to the call to preach. Having been in the denomination all his life, John was certainly aware of the enormous responsibility of this calling and by early fall it was evident this group needed to become a church that was organized and affiliated with the local association. So in the early afternoon of Sunday, December 4, 1983, amid an ice storm, Faith Free Will Baptist Church was officially organized and affiliated with the Greater Kansas City Association of Free Will Baptists, and John Percival was licensed to preach as its first pastor—just six short months after that first Bible study, with 14 charter members!

Scarcely had the ink dried on the corporation certificate when the Lord, knowing we had outgrown the living room, led us to a building for sale—and not just any old ordinary building for sale, either. This is a very special building. It is 6,000 square feet of church in the very heart of Oak Grove—a landmark, in fact, in this community—filled with every possible convenience we need to have to function as a church.

But the best part was that He didn't just show it to us—He arranged every single detail to the very minutest part—including financing—so we could buy this beautiful building. Nor did He stop there, though, because He knew we'd need a way to pay for it once we were in it, so He even provided for that need. Fantastic!

Now barely a year since that first Bible study, Faith Free Will Baptist Church is organized with our very own pastor, John Percival, a Christian day care center has opened with a full-time staff, and other outreach ministries are starting as the need arises in the community.

It is impossible to express the jubilation of this congregation at this time. Even more impossible is trying to imagine what the Lord has planned for us in the years ahead—but of this we are certain—the Lord is still in the miracle business—we know for sure because we've just been part of one! Praise the Lord!

Points for Pastors

In the last issue I briefly discussed hiring a new staff member. More and more of our churches are realizing the necessity of hiring second and third men. If our churches are going to continue to grow it wil require specialized help. A man can successfully pastor 150 people; the attendance should increase approximately 100 people from each new staff member.

Should we wish to increase church attendance beyond 150 if it requires additional help? The answer is obvious. Yes! And, the answer is yes for several reasons.

1. It is *economically* practical to have a larger church. We are talking about more people, but, other than one more salary, all the basic costs remain virtually the same. 100 additional people will, if discipled, provide much more financial increase than just one man's salary.

- 2. It is *evangelistically* practical. Buildings, programs, and personnel are all present and available. Unsaved people can be evangelized and brought into a fully equipped church.
- 3. It is *effective*. Two or more men on the staff should be able to work together and reach much more than just two times what one man can reach. They specialize in various department and become experts. For example, music, bus, youth, senior citizens, young marrieds. All these staff members must become experts at soul winning and visitation.
- 4. It is *equitably* practical. There are many people in every area and community that need to be reached. For a church to become satisfied at 150 in Sunday school is to oppose the commands of our Lord to go out and compel them to come in that my house may be filled.

"Incline my heart unto thy testimonies, and not to covetousness" (Psalm 119:36).



Bible College Enrolls 417 For Fall Semester

NASHVILLE, TENNESSEE—Free Will Baptist Bible College has enrolled 417 students from 26 states and seven foreign countries for the fall semester of the 1984-85 school year, according to Dr. Charles E. Hampton, registrar. Four graduate school enrollees bring the semester total to 421. Tennessee leads all states, with 70 students enrolled, followed closely by North Carolina with 65. Other states with 20 or more are Alabama (26), Georgia (22), Illinois (28), Indiana (30) and Michigan (24).

By classes, the student body breaks down to 86 seniors, 80 juniors, 113 sophomores, 124 freshmen and 14 special students. Ministerial students number 95, and 63 others are preparing for missionary service.

The early school year services were especially blessed. Scores of decisions indicate that the 1984-85 school year will be special at FWBBC.

President Thigpen noted, "Even though the college enrolled about nine percent less than a year ago, there was an excellent spirit of enthusiasm and expectancy among the students. With more than 400 eager, alert students, we have a great group to train and educate."

Hillsdale Completes Fall Enrollment

August 30, marked the close of enrollment for the fall semester at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. As of this date, 156 students had enrolled for college credit courses.

This fall's student body includes 70 freshmen, 38 sophomores, 19 juniors, 18 seniors, and 11 special students. These students come from 14 states and 7 foreign countries; 88 students are men and 68 are women. On-campus students total 72; off-campus students total 84.

According to Dr. Thomas Marberry, Vice President of Academic Affairs, this is not a record enrollment, but it certainly is a healthy enrollment in a time when many college enrollments are actually declining. "We believe that we are looking forward to a good year. We desire the prayers and support of Free Will Baptist people," Marberry said.

Depth Devotional Makes Second Debut

Depth, a daily devotional guide, published by the CTS Department from 1962 through 1973, will make its second appearance beginning with the Spring Quarter, 1985.

According to Dr. Roger C. Reeds, General Director of Randall House Publications, *Depth* will take on an entirely new format. Instead of being based on a Sunday School daily Bible reading, it will follow a practical, doctrinal, inspirational, and denominational emphasis. Each of these areas will be treated every quarter.

It will be uniquely Free Will Baptist in every sense of the word. Denominational prayer requests for both home and foreign missionaries, Bible colleges, and other department will be listed on a daily basis.

The compact 4" x 7" pocket or purse size will make it attractive and portable yet permit the size of print to be large enough for middle-age and older adults. It will be listed on the Spring Quarter, 1985 Randall House order blank. Churches are encouraged to order enough copies for each family in the church.

Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College in Moore, Oklahoma, broke ground Friday, September 7, for a new Library/Classroom Building. The masonry and steel structure will have a total of 10,500 square feet. Library space will be 4,500 square feet with the remaining 6,000 square feet to be used for classroom space and faculty offices. The contract was awarded to R.F.D. Construction Co. of Sulphur, Oklahoma.

A fund-raising drive preceded ground breaking with more than one-half of the \$640,000 price tag raised. During the nine months of construction, fund raising will continue with the goal of the building being debt free by the time of completion.

An Open Letter To Free Will Baptists

VICTORIOUS FAITH, our national radio and television ministry is really shaping up. The radio broadcast, Lord willing, will be available to be aired January 1, 1985. The telecast is scheduled for viewing during the 50th Anniversary of the National Association in Nashville, Tennessee, July 1985.

The programs are thoroughly Free Will Baptist our theme "Faith is the Victory" was written by John H. Yates, a Free Will Baptist of D. L. Moody and Ira Sankey's day. Rev. Tom Malone, pastor of First Free Will Baptist Church, Florence, Alabama, is our speaker for radio, and Dr. Melvin Worthington, Executive Secretary of the National Association of Free Will Baptists, has agreed to speak for the pilot television program.

To continue and complete our work, we must

know two things from you, our Free Will Baptist people.

1. Do you want to sponsor VICTORIOUS FAITH on your radio in your area? Early receipt of this information is essential to preparing program tapes. Local churches, associations, individuals, or reputable businesses will want to consider sponsoring the program in your area. Arrangements will need to be negotiated with local stations and requests for program tapes made by November 15. We have prepared a full calendar quarter tapes (13 programs) to be shipped to you or your station for broadcast January 1, 1985.

2. Will you help us financially?

A "bare bones budget" of \$23,700 is essential for our work. (This figure does not reflect \$30,000 included in our budget for puchasing air time since we are asking you to purchase our time on a station in your area.) Although the National Association approved our budget and provided approximately \$2,000 through 1% of cooperative receipts, we must raise most of our budget through appeals to our churches.

To complete our work we must have the help of many churches and individuals in cash gifts by December 31. We could accept "firm commitments" to be paid by February 1, 1985. Whichever way you choose to help, we must hear from you by December 31, 1984. This is the deadline we have set to assess whether our people are behind us in this endeavor. If by December 31 we have the \$23,700 in hand or "firm commitments" we will proceed to enter the necessary contracts for production of the pilot television programs. If we do not have the money or "firm commitments," we will have to seek further direction from our National Association.

During the 1984 National Association we made a plea for people to stand, committing themselves or their churches, to a \$100 gift. The response was overwhelming with some coming by our booth and giving the gift immediately. We need those others who stood to follow through and send their gift now. In addition, we need many others to step forward and be a part of this historic and exciting venture of faith by Free Will Baptists.

It is so very important that you not lay this matter aside, forget and later regret it. Will you go immediately to your phone and call "toll free" 1-800-251-5762 to our treasurer Rev. Larry Hampton and tell him you are sending a cash gift or give him a "firm commitment" to be paid by February 1, 1985? We just must have that \$23,700 in hand or in "firm commitments" by December 31, 1984, else we cannot proceed. Remember we must know by November 15, 1984 if you want to sponsor the program in your area and whether you will help us with a gift by December 31 or a "firm commitment" to be paid by February 1, 1985.

Those churches and individuals who respond with a gift of \$100 or more by February 1, 1985 will have their names inscribed on a *Media Memorial Plaque* to be displayed during the 50th Anniversary of our National Association and eventually hung in our

office to memorialize the help given this ministry at its inception.

RANDALL HOUSE SETS NEW REQUIREMENTS FOR 1985 WRITERS' CONTEST

The eighth successive Writers' Contest is being sponsored by Randall House Publications, according to Dr. Roger C. Reeds, General Director.

The purpose of the Writers' Contest is to: (1) discover new talent, (2) afford expression to existing talent, (3) and give recognition and encouragement to superior talent.

The deadline for entries is March 15, 1985. Fees for each entry have been reduced to \$3.00. Entries and fees should be directed to: Reverend Harrold D. Harrison, Writers' Contest Director, P.O. Box 17306, Nashville, Tennessee 37217. Checks should be made payable to Randall House Publications.

RULES OF ENTRY

- 1. Any member of a church in the National Association of Free Will Baptists may enter.
- 2. Each entry must be religious in nature and the original, unpublished work of the contestant.
- 3. Entries must be typewritten; otherwise, they will not be considered. Each typewritten page should have 25 double-spaced lines of type. Each line should be approximately 70 spaces in length. The writer's name, address, and category of entry (Short Story, Poetry, etc.), as well as the approximate *total* number of words in the entry, are to be placed in the upper right-hand corner of the first page. Please adhere to the requirements listed under "CATEGORIES" as to the length of each entry in the seven categories.
- 4. Entries must be postmarked no later than March 15, 1985. Those postmarked after March 15, 1985 will not be considered.
- 5. A contestant may submit *one* entry each in no more than *two* categories (the \$3 entry fee is required for each entry); however, entrant is eligible for first place in only one category. (Please do not send more than one entry in any one category and no more than two entries total.) All entries become the property of Randall House Publications.
- 6. Winners will be announced in press releases to editors of Free will Baptist state papers, where applicable, and in *Contact Magazine*.
- 7. Winning entries may be published; space, time, and priorities permitting.

CATEGORIES

- 1. *Exegesis/Sermon*. Each exegesis should develop a brief passage of Scripture, not to exceed 15 verses in length. Each entry should be at least 10 pages in length but not more than 14 pages. Sermon text and subject are left to the discretion of the writer. Outlining is suggested, but not mandatory.
- 2. *Short Story*. A short story should not exceed 25 pages in length.
- 3. *Poetry*. Poetry entries should consist of rhymed or unrhymed verses of not more than 100 lines which develop a central theme or image.
- 4. *Tract.* Gospel tracts or tracts on special spiritual subjects are acceptable. These should be short enough to be published in the usual tract format; not more than six pages.
- 5. *Plays/Skits*. Not to exceed 14 pages in length, plays or skits should contain plot, theme, dialogue, characterization, setting, suggested set design, and stage directions.
- 6. Book. A book entry may be of any nature as long as it serves a religious purpose. Suggestions include devotional guides, novels, commentaries, guides to practical Christian living, etc. Length should not be less than 50,000 or more than 90,000 words. Only book entries accepted for publications will receive awards.
- 7. Art/Visuals. In this category, any one of the following would be acceptable: a photo, painting, drawing, or poster, adhering to the main principles of element and design. Each entry must be a minimum of 8" x 10".

CRITERIA

Entries will be judged on the basis of contestant's creativity, composition techniques, originality, expertise of the literary or art form selected, impact, and theme content.

AWARDS

In each of the categories except books the awards are:

First place—\$50.

Second place-\$25.

Books accepted for publication

First place—\$250 plus Randall House royalty contract Second place—\$250

WHAT WILL HAPPEN TO MY PASTOR IF ...?

Have you ever stopped to think, What will happen to my pastor and his family if he becomes seriously ill and requires extended hospitalization; suffers an accident and becomes disabled; suddenly dies; or (thinking more optimistically) reaches an age where retirement is possible?

Forget the "what if" because it is a fact that ministers are occasionally hospitalized. Some become disabled, others die, and many even live to retire. Actually, unless Jesus comes soon, every pastor will face at least one or more of these possibilities.

In light of that, it seems wise that a church be interested in planning for its pastor's future.

As Christians we all recognize our absolute dependence upon God. No pre-planning can eliminate the need for His continuous direction and provision. Yet, the Scriptures are clear that God gave us a thinking-planning ability; and He expects us to use it in preparing for our spiritual and physical future. (Look at these passages—Proverbs 6:6-11; 22:3; 24:3-6; Luke 14:28, 29.)

How do we get started? The most obvious place is with the pastor's salary. For instance, what basis does your church use to establish his salary? Is it, Can he "get by" on x number of dollars, or will this amount allow him to support his family relatively worry free?

Many people compare the pastor's salary dollar for dollar, with their take-home pay. But can it be compared? Often it cannot. Why? Because in most cases there are a number of benefits that public work offers that are not included in a pastor's salary, such as:

1) Hospitalization coverage. Almost every employer protects himself and his employees by providing some type of medical coverage. In some cases it even extends to provide coverage for the entire family or offers coverage at a lower group rate for an additional charge. Do you offer hospitalization coverage to your pastor? If so, great. But if not, why not consider it.

2) Disability insurance. This is an added feature to many paychecks. It may take the form of workman's compensation or unemployment or be provided in another type of insurance package. Yet, the only protection offered most ministers in this regard is the good will of their people. This is not in any way to demean God's people, for many pastors have been blessed with folks who would and have given sacrificially to help the pastor and family in case of this type of need. Yet, few churches have enough extra income to put another pastor on the field and continue to give the disabled pastor any long-term help. The easiest way to provide for this possibility is to secure a reasonable amount of disability insurance for the pastor and review it each pastoral change.

3) What about retirement? If the pastor is blessed with long life, he most definitely will come to face with retirement. There will be a time when he no longer will be asked to pastor. He may fill the pulpit as a guest preacher, but he will not receive a regular income as a preacher.

Many churches provide parsonages for the pastor which makes it convenient for him when he comes to pastor the church, but when he leaves he has no equity in a house. The parsonage is provided as a part of the salary, and the pastor is grateful for this provision; but when he must provide his own house, he has no house. And, inasmuch as the parsonage has been included as a part of his salary, there has not been any extra income to use for a house payment. The church can do two things: Give a parsonage allowance, or give a modest amount to the pastor when his services are terminated in order that he may begin to build a "house fund" for the future when he is forced to retire.

The Missouri State Association offers a Retirement Program through the National Board of Retirement and Insurance. The people of Missouri have gone on record that they do care for their pastors. In 1978 the Missouri State Assocation adopted a plan whereby a pastor and/or full-time Christian worker can give \$90.00 every six-months, the church where the pastor and/or full-time Christian worker serves gives \$90.00 every six-months, and the Missouri State Retirement Program gives \$180.00 every six-months. Inasmuch as this program is supplied through an allocation of cooperative giving, the church is required to support with the regular amount of ten percent of its regular tithes and offerings. What a tremendous help this will prove to be to the pastor and full-time Christian workers. (The pastor may have employment other than the church he serves, and still be eligible.) If your pastor is eligible but as yet is not a participant in this program, why not let him know that you are favorable to him becoming a participant.

Essentials of Evangelism

One essential aspect of successful evangelism we perhaps need to be reminded of is honesty. Dear Reader, I believe I heard you say "Amen". But you may also wonder why such an elementary Christian virtue needs to be mentioned in connection with evangelism. You may already be aware that an honest love for God is essential to win souls. Also, an honest love for the lost is necessary; sinners can tell a phony act. And too, you no doubt know an honest approach to the reality of eternity is important before we can ever see souls saved.

But, there is another area of honesty we must come to grips with if we would win souls for Jesus. Would you agree that keeping your word is important in this over-all scheme of honesty? Perhaps it goes without saying that if we are known not to make good our promises and commitments, the unsaved will not believe us when we approach them about their salvation. If that assumption is true, then sinners are being turned off from Christ by a lot of dishonest Christians.

Do you remember when you joined your local Free Will Baptist church? You agreed to a covenant that

said in part, "... To this end we agree to labor for the promotion of ... evangelistic efforts for the salvation of the world." I don't question that we are glad when souls are saved. But there may be some dishonesty when it comes to this matter of "labor." That sounds like personal involvement to me. Can we say we are keeping our word to labor for souls when we fail to faithfully attend revival services in our local church? Or, when we fail to pray regularly for the salvation of souls? Or, when we fail to personally win souls? Or, when we fail to encourage and train new converts? Or, when we fail to encourage ministries in the local church that would reach out to the lost? Have we really kept our promise? Are we really being honest?

Will God use us effectively in the greatest work on earth-winning lost people to Christ-if we have not been honest in keeping the promise we made to our church family in the sight of God?

"... To this end we agree to labor for the promotion of . . . evangelistic efforts for the salvation of the world" (Free Will Baptist Church Covenant, paragraph 7).

In just a few weeks we will be cleaning up the wrappings from the presents from under the Christmas tree. I personally get a kick out of the guessing and wondering before time to open the presents. We can guess, we can be all but sure . . . but until we hold that present in our hands, with all the wrappings removed, we cannot fully appreciate the gift. Then we can try it, put it to use, forget the descriptions, and see it for ourselves. This same thing has been true of God's great Christmas Present. It has been surrounded by wrappings and disguised. Men have guessed, described, looked forward; yet, until all wrappings were removed and He was ours to have and hold in our hearts, we couldn't realize what the Present really was.

I see God's great Christmas Present wrapped in Old Testament prophecy. "Therefore the Lord himself shall give you a sign; Behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel. Butter and honey shall he eat, that he may know to refuse the evil, and choose the good. For before the child shall know to refuse the evil, and choose the good, the land that thou abhorrest shall be forsaken of both her kings" (Isaiah 7:14-16). He was a Present wrapped in a wrapper of prophecy and mystery. How the prophet must have turned this Present over and over in his mind, he must have guessed and wondered as he looked at the wrapping and guessed at what might be inside.

This Present was tied securely in the ribbon of promise. Israel was steeped in their backsliding. The Assyrian armies were moving in with a threat of captivity. The Present was wrapped so securely in these prophecies that it was hard for them to realize what was inside and what it would mean to their storm-tossed nation. This same Gift lies wrapped in thousands of homes today. The storms of life are beating down. Evil is surrounding them, threatening to take them captive. The wrappings are still in place, the ribbons unmolested, keeping God's great Present from being used.

I see God's great Christmas Present wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger of a borrowed stable: "And they came with haste, and found Mary, and Joseph, and the babe lying in a manger. And when they had seen it, they made known abroad the saying which was told them concerning this child. And all they that heard it wondered at those things which were told them by the shepherds. But Mary kept all these things, and pondered them in her heart. And the shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all the things that they had heard and seen, as it was told unto them" (Luke 2:16-20). Notice the wrappings of swaddling clothes. The garment of peasants covered that Present from the eyes of those who looked for a king. No purple robe; just swaddling clothes. No golden crown on His head, no ivory throne overlaid with gold; just a borrowed manger. No beautiful palace; just a stable. No legion of soldiers standing at attention; just humble shepherds looking over the manger. No bowing servants to bring Him His bidding; just the animals lowing and bleating in the stillness of the winter night. Wrapped securely in humble surroundings until even those who came and looked on didn't realize the importance of this great Christmas Present.

To thousands today He still lies in His swaddling clothes in His borrowed manger, a Present unwrapped. He is picked up once a year and fondled and studied and laid carefully away again until next Christmas season with the wrappings still in place.

I see God's great Christmas Present wrapped in the blindness of religious form and ritual and rejection. The Bible states, "And rose up, and thrust him out of the city, and led him unto the brow of the hill whereon their city was built, that they might cast him down headlong. But he passing through the midst of them went his way" (Luke 4:29, 30). They refused to remove the wrappings of religious form and ritual and unwrap God's Christmas Present. Miracle after miracle, good works after good works, and they didn't see. They even had to buy false testimony to convict Him, yet they refused to believe their eyes and to unwrap the Gift from God.

I see God's great Christmas Present today wrapped in unbelief and unconcern. "For we know that the whole creation groaneth and travaileth in pain together until now. And not only they, but ourselves also, which have the firstfruits of the Spirit, even we ourselves groan within ourselves, waiting for the adoption to wit, the redemption of our body. For we are saved by hope: but hope that is seen is not hope: for what a man seeth, why doth he yet hope for? But if we hope for that we see not, then do we with patience wait for it" (Romans 8:22-25). It is faith that unties the ribbon on God's great Christmas Present. It is hope that takes off the wrapper. It is our spirit that receives the Present and makes it work for us. For there is no difference between the Jew and the Greek: for the same Lord over all is rich unto all that call upon him. For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved" (Romans 10:9-13).

The Present lies there before you. You can guess; you can wonder; you can look at the description others have given; you can speculate as to how it will affect your life; but until you unwrap it and put it to use in your own life, God's great Christmas Present can never be real to you.
