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YES, GOD STILL WORKS MIRACLES

If you think your life is too far in sin for God to change it, you are wrong. I can tell you this because I am living proof of it. Here is my testimony of how God changed my life, or better still, how He saved my life.

I was sitting at the kitchen table one evening without a care in the world, I thought, when the phone rang. It was Darlene Spredling calling to invite me to come to their church revival. I really hated to say no to her, so I told her I would come the next night. The next night came, but I didn't go. I put it off again. I finally ended up going on a Thursday night. I will never forget that night. Kate Vincent sang a special number called "Five Rows Back," which was just where I happened to be sitting with my brother, Jesse and his wife. The words of the song just fit me, and I was sure it must of all been planned that way. It was about all I could take. I was pretty sure I wouldn't go back. It really touched me, and I didn't want to surrender myself to God. (It still amazes me at all the different people God was using to win me over.)

I didn't go back the next night. Jesse wanted me to go back on Saturday night. I really wanted to go but I was also afraid. Finally, I decided to go and I even invited my mom to go. I told her what good services they were having. But when Saturday night came, my older brother, Clayton, was planning a party at our place. I figured it would be a lot more exciting, so I told Jesse that I didn't feel good and had decided to stay home and get to bed early.

Sure enough the party was a blast. I thought I was really having a ball. While part of the crowd was playing cards in one room, some of us were in the kitchen playing charades, smoking pot, and snorting cocaine. I had done about \$100.00 worth of coke that night, and I was feeling on top of the world. Then someone said something to me about having gone to church that week. I laughed it off and said, "Yea, I feel a little guilty lying to my brother, Jesse, but church just didn't fit into my lifestyle." Clayton overheard me and said, "Well, Bethany, you need to make up your mind then because you're just being a hypocrite trying to do both." I thought everyone there was thinking that too, so I began drinking real heavy to show them which side I was on and to drown my own conscience. I didn't want to think of church any more.

By the time everyone went home, I was beginning to really feel weird. My whole body ached from doing so many drugs. I couldn't sleep. In fact, I hurt so much I began to get really scared that my heart was going to quit beating and that I was going to die. I began to pray to God. I thought of that song again. I was really praying for help. I promised God if He would let me live, I would go to church that day. I called Jesse, and then there was no way to back out because he and his wife were there to get me when it was time to go to church.

Church was okay that morning. I really enjoyed the little children singing, and that really touched me; but other than that, I really didn't know what was going on most of the time. I was so spaced out and tired from being up most of the night, and I was still under the influence of all the drugs I had been taking. As soon as I got home from church, I lit a joint and it wasn't long before I hit the sack.

It didn't seem like I had been asleep very long until Jesse was on the phone to make sure I was still planning to go to the last night of the revival that night. It would have been so easy to forget my promise to God if my brother had just not been so persistent. Thank God for him.

I did go to the church that night, and I can't remember what the preacher talked about; but I do know he reached my conscience, and I was feeling mighty guilty. I know now that I was under conviction, but I didn't want to give in. I guess the devil was working overtime on me trying to keep me from listening to Jesus talking to my heart because when the preacher gave the altar call, I kept telling myself I was okay and I didn't want to make a fool of myself. I figured as soon as I got home I would just get high again, so I would be wasting my time if I gave in. I held out until church was over.

As we were walking out of church, a young lady I knew came up to me. She could see that I was in quite a state. She began to talk to me and try to help me. (I didn't know it then, but the whole church had been praying for me for some time.) Bonita Jones was the young lady's name. As Bonita talked to me, I began to cry and she invited me to go to the altar to pray. I accepted her invitation and several others came down and prayed with us.

I really didn't know what to expect or how I would know if I was really saved. I just didn't understand about the plan of salvation. After we had been praying for awhile, the preacher asked me if everything was okay. I almost told him yes because the devil was still working on me and I was thinking these people would probably like to get this over with so they could go home. But I knew I wasn't alright, so I began to cry more and told them I just didn't feel like I could get it all out. We prayed some more, and suddenly I felt something come over me that I had never known before. It was the sweet Holy Spirit. But at that time I didn't know it. Come to find out, I was SAVED!

The church gave me a new Bible, and I have read it a lot and am going to church and learning more about God all the time. Don't think it has all been downhill for me since then, because it hasn't. All the people in the church have been real good to me, and my brother and sister-in-law are always there encouraging me. There is someone else who has really helped me a lot too. It seems like every time I am at my lowest point,

Bonita arrives on the scene. I think God has given her a special talent, and she doesn't keep it hidden under a basket.

Even though I feel so inadequate at times to tell others about my Jesus and what He has done for me, one of the highlights of my Christian life so far has been the night about three months after I was saved. I gave my testimony one night at church, and there were seven people saved that night. I don't know if it was something I said, but it helped to encourage me and I hope I can continue to help lead others to Christ the way I was helped. A new Christian really needs a lot of encouragement from fellow Christian brothers and sisters, and I feel I have really been blessed in this way.

One other thing in my life that I have been able to do since I came to depend on the Lord is completely quit smoking. This was a habit I had had since I was twelve-years-old. So you can't tell me God doesn't do miracles any more; look at me!

HOMEcoming—FELLOWSHIP FREE WILL BAPTIST CHURCH

Hebrews 11:8-10

"By faith Abraham, when he was called to go out into a place which he should after receive for an inheritance, obeyed; and he went out, not knowing whither he went. By faith he sojourned in the land of promise, as in a strange country, dwelling in tabernacles with Isaac and Jacob, the heirs with him of the same promise: For he looked for a city which hath foundations, whose builder and maker is God."

In Hebrews 11:10, we read of Abraham's quest for the Eternal City that God had promised. A city which had foundations, whose builder and maker was God himself. Abraham spent his life as a traveler, a sojourner in a strange land, an alien. Many times he must have been tempted to settle down, to make himself content among the heathen. But by keeping his eyes on the goal that God had promised him, he kept moving on. Abraham and his family lived in tents (a structure with no foundations), making it simple to pack up and move out when God sent the word. He was not held back nor burdened down by material possessions. All his possessions were portable; he was laying up treasures in his homeland.

That small group of dedicated Christian men and women who laid the foundation for Fellowship Church were like Abraham. They, too, were looking for that City whose builder and maker was God. They, too, were foreigners (pilgrims) dwelling in a strange land. They first pitched their tents in the old Buckley Building on March, 16, 1946, and waited for God to tell them to move on. Not many days passed until the

"moving out" was ordered, just a couple of doors down the block, but they moved at God's command. They began building the church in the worst times, in the midst of a strike in the lead mines, which provided the livelihood for most of the men; but when God calls, He also supplies and supply He did, abundantly. On January 18, 1948, the first regular service was held in the basement church. Construction soon began for the Fellowship Church, and on Easter Sunday, April 17, a Sunrise Service was held at 6:00 a.m. in the new auditorium. Many changes have been made, more property and buildings have been added, but like Abraham, the people of Fellowship realize that this is just a temporary resting place; and one day, we will once more be called out and into our own country and be "at home" with the Lord.

Fellowship Church has been an oasis in the desert of our journey. It is a place to find rest and refreshment from the hot and arid desert of the world. An oasis in the desert is a "life saver" to the traveler, for there he can find shade from the blazing sun under the palm trees; refreshing springs of cool water to quench his thirst and cool his parched throat; green grass to cool his burning feet; and food for his hungry body. Fellowship Church has provided these same things for those in this area—refreshing shade for the souls of mankind; a place of safety from the attacks of Satan; refreshing Living Water from the Well of Salvation to quench their thirst forever; and the Bread of Life that will satisfy the craving of their hungry hearts. It has been a haven for these 39 years to the sinner and saint alike, offering protection and refreshment to all who come through the doors. But it

is only a temporary refuge. We are here only until we are called to finish our journey to the Eternal City that does have foundations, where we shall take up permanent residence.

Hand (Deceased); Damon Dodd (Colquitt, GA); Mark Lewis (Deceased); Rolla Smith (Nashville, TN); Elro Driggers (Timmons ville, SC); James Earl Raper (Greeneville, TN); Tom Malone (Florence, AL); Billy Walker (Houston, TX); Ken Doggett (Johnston City, IL); Grant Saverance (Deceased); John Rogers-supply pastor (Fredericktown, MO); Mike Creech-associate pastor (Georgia); Wayne Phillips, our present pastor; Lindell Richardson, our visitation pastor; and Curt Gwartney, music & youth pastor, who joined us in November, 1984.

We, like the song writer of old, can say—

"This world is not my home,
I am just a passing through.
My treasures are laid up,
Somewhere beyond the blue.
The angels beckon me,
From Heaven's Open Door
And I can't feel at Home
In this world any more."

Minute Meditation

"Where no oxen are, the crib is clean: but much increase is by the strength of the ox." Proverbs 14:4.

It seems that I have written several articles from the Book of Proverbs. Possibly because there are so many things to glean from this important book of the Bible. No doubt, this particular verse would seem odd to some and even ridiculous to others as a thought for meditation. I would like to share what I feel this verse has to say to our churches today.

Just as the crib was the feeding and sheltering place for the oxen, so is the local church the spiritual feeding and sheltering place for the Christian. If a farmer had an oxen, then there was no problem in keeping the crib clean, but neither did he have any means of working the fields.

Sometimes I hear, and I think to our shame, someone say, "those babies make so much noise!" Or, "those young people or bus kids are such a nuisance, I don't

know what we're going to do with them!" Perhaps you've heard it said, "those older folks have such funny ideas and don't want to change; we'd be better off without them!"

Yes, if we didn't have babies, bus kids, teens, young singles, young married, middleaged, and senior citizens, there would be no inconvenience and the church would be neat, quiet, and clean. But there wouldn't be anyone to do the work, and there would be no spiritual harvest for the Lord.

I'm not saying people are like animals to be cared for, nor am I by any means condoning people for being noisy, destructive, and unchristian in their conduct. What I hope to convey is that a church without people has no problems, but a church without people makes no progress.

In those days, some farmers probably never harvested anything because they didn't like the inconvenience of taking care of the oxen and cleaning the crib. Some ministers and churches aren't harvesting much either because they don't like the inconvenience of caring for the people, providing them with spiritual food and shelter, and sending them out into the fields to harvest.

Reverend Bob Francis, pastor of the Mission Church at Branson, Missouri, went to be with the Lord on Sunday, March 3, 1985. His condition was diagnosed as cancer in the pancreas and intestines. Those of us who have known Brother Bob for several years know that he had had a struggle with cancer on other occasions. He mentioned to me before he had surgery, "I don't want to ever give up. I want to give it all I've got." Those of us who were with Bob during his recent illness know that he did just that, "He gave it

all he had." He didn't give up. But at the time the Lord knew what was best. He called His servant, Bob Francis, home. It can be said with all sincerity, Brother Bob "kept the faith, he fought a good fight, and he finished his course."

The first time I met Bob, he was in his mid-teens and I was in my early twenties. He was one of the fine young people that attended the Third Free Will Baptist Church. He had a very pleasant personality, and I will always remember his easy smile. He naturally had many teen-age characteristics, but he also reflected a genuine love for the Lord, that he had learned from godly parents and a fine Free Will Baptist church. He was a leader of the youth group. When the Lord called Bob to be a preacher of the gospel, it could be said of him as it was of another: His feet were on the rock and his eyes were on Jesus.

He began his ministry by enrolling at Free Will Baptist Bible College. He served as a pastor for twenty-two years in the states of Missouri, Minnesota, and Arkansas. He was the first missionary employed by the National Home Missions Board to serve in the state of Minnesota.

Brother Francis was always actively involved in the state in which he was serving. He served for several years on the Arkansas State Home Missions Board and also served as moderator of the local association of which he was a member, the Saline Association. In Missouri he served on the Christian Board of Education and served as chairman for a period of time. While pastoring the South Side Free Will Baptist Church in St. Louis, Missouri, he taught five years at the Missouri Bible Institute. He served as clerk of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists.

Brother Bob always had a "missionary's heart," and it is noteworthy that he ended his service on this earth as pastor of a Mission church—the Friendship Free Will Baptist Church at Branson, Missouri.

He is survived by his wife, Jean Francis. Also, two children: Mrs. Becky Brown of Nashville, Tennessee, and Bobby Francis of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. And his father and stepmother, Mr. and Mrs. Alvie Francis of Fredericktown, Missouri.

What I say as a personal testimony could be said by many others who knew Bob. I loved him as a brother, cherished his friendship as a friend, and found delight in serving with him as a fellow-laborer. May his memory remind and motivate us to do a greater work for the Master, the Lord Jesus Christ.

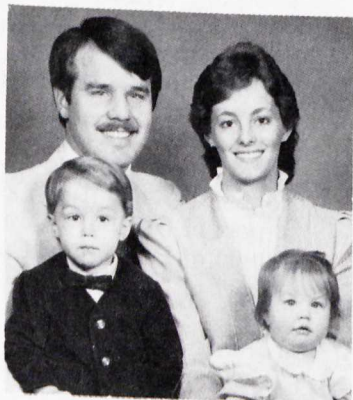

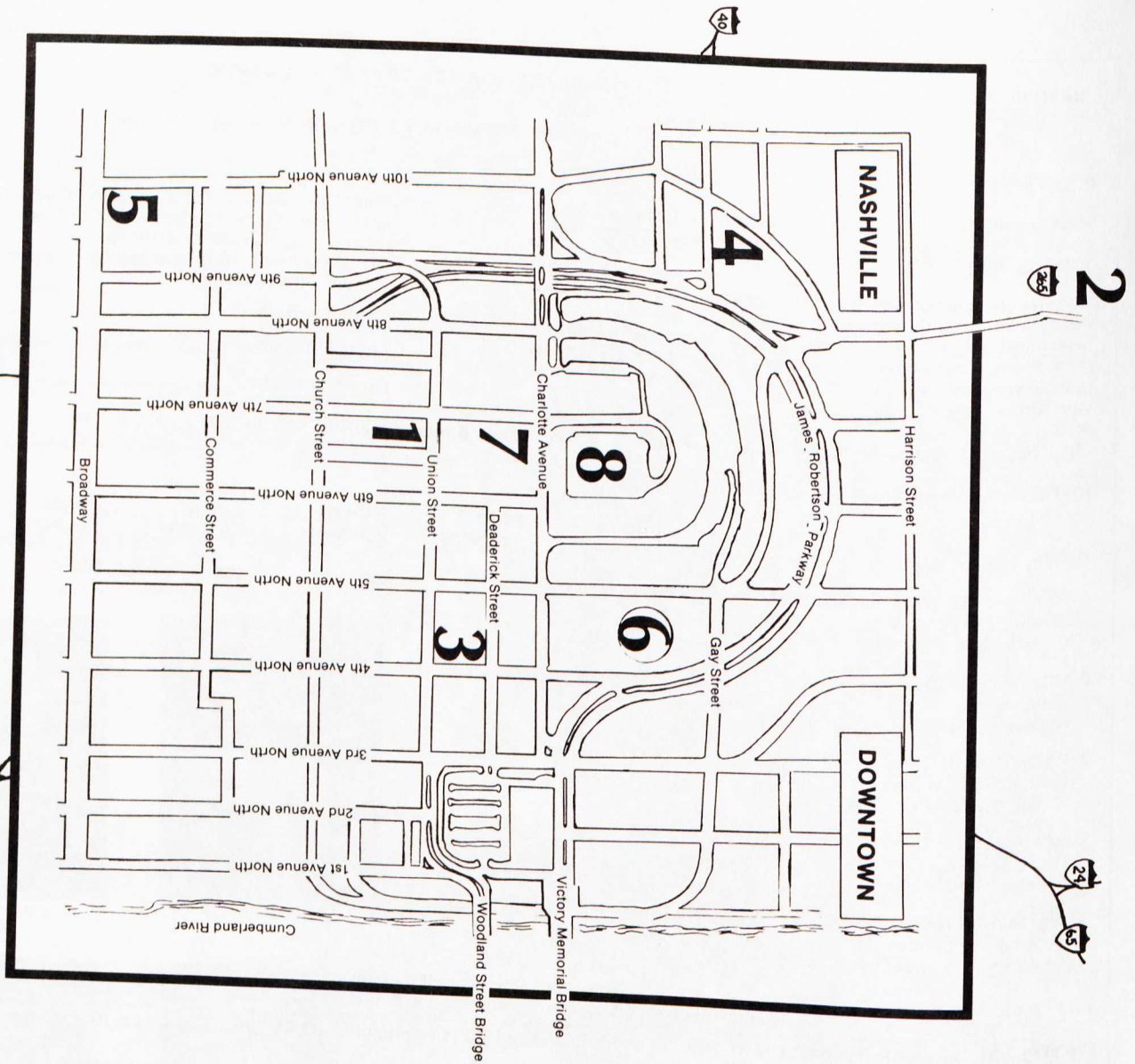
