

Tonight was Thursday night visitation at our church. Thirty men and women attended. We met at 7:00 p.m. for coffee and cookies, paired up, received our instructions from our director, prayed, and then went out to visit in our community.

My partner was an anesthesiologist and after the first visit he was called to the hospital for surgery. I continued on alone, made three more calls and returned to church at 9 p.m. for the report time. (This is one of the most important times of visitation.)

Report time was a happy time. We sat around tables drinking coffee and rejoicing. Two men reported a young man saved; two other men reported they had 9 people promise to come to church the last Sunday of the month. I was glad that I could report four promises to attend on our big day and a really good visit with an unsaved man I had been trying to find.

Our spirits were lifted and we went home rejoicing. We know there will be two more to be baptized this Sunday and several promised to attend services.

Last week our visitation director asked the 20 persons attending visitation to each bring a partner this week. Ten people responded and brought a partner. Thirty people out on a visitation represented fifteen teams and they visited more than thirty homes. Multiply that times 52 and you have 1560 homes in a year. God honors that kind of dedication.

Do you have a visitation? Do your people respond and attend? If you're a teacher, deacon, or leader in the church and you don't attend, how will you ever be able to face God? Visitation is God's will and God's plan. Don't fight it, do it.

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1985: Year of Milestones in Panama

The Spanish-speaking congregation of the Betania Free Will Baptist Church in Panama City, Panama greeted the dawn of 1985 with enthusiasm and excitement for what God would do for us during the year. At a special watch-night service and prayer/fellowship vigil, we committed ourselves to the Lord and to each other to make 1985 count for Christ.

God has truly blessed our church. Vacation Bible School in February saw around 15 children and young people pray to receive Christ. A special evangelistic outreach in July resulted in over 10 decisions. A young couple who were dating received Christ less than six weeks ago; I had the privilege of joining them in marriage on August 30 in a lovely wedding at our church. In the first eight month of 1985, we saw around 40 professions of faith, and baptized 18.

Two other super special events have made this year unforgettable. First, on May 18, we celebrated our 9th anniversary of the beginning of the work under Bill Fulcher in 1976, and the same night officially organized the church with 67 charter members. Our building is barely able to seat 80 people, but that night over 250 friends, well-wishers, and members of other churches joined with us in praising God from whom all blessings flow.

On June 15 our small but aspiring congregation, after literally hours, days, and months of hard work, planning, organizing, and praying, sponsored a banquet and concert in a large banquet room at a local restaurant. Three hundred and seven attended the event, and were treated to a delicious meal and fine Christian music by several local Christian singers. In addition, through the sale of tickets to the dinner and concert, our church raised \$1,500.00 for our building fund. In less than two years, through sacrificial giving and special activities and projects, the church has raised \$8,500. We hope to have \$12,500 by the end of 1985.

We ask all Missouri Free Will Baptists to join us in praising God who has truly done great things in Panama (and our church is just **one** testimony among many that could be given), and to **pray** with us for continued growth, numerical and spiritual, and that we will be able to raise the necessary funds to purchase property and build for the glory of God.

Ways To Say "I CARE" To Your Missionary

When asked, "What can I do to help you?", every missionary that I know gives the same answer, "Please pray!" This may mean sending a letter so you'll know just how to pray: what problems are being faced, items of praise and thanksgiving, etc. The best kind of letters include more than a verse and signatures. Tell us about yourself, your family and your church. Can we help you through prayers? Let us know. We ask you to pray for us ... we would like to pray for you, too.

Do you want to do more than pray? Do you wish to give over and above the amount that is being sent to the missionaries' account? Would you like to send a package? Here are some suggestions: Magazine subscriptions are an easy way to send a long-term gift with one check. You'll need to know if the man is a fisherman, car mechanic, or if the lady enjoys cooking, crafts, or decorating. Religious magazines are most welcome, even books you have already read. How about a salad dressing mix, or a package of garden or flower seeds. Something extra nice would be a tape of special music or your pastor's sermons.

Please remember the missionaries' families. Send a friendship card and get acquainted with the missionaries' parents. Ask what would please MK's living with their parents or at boarding school on the field. Don't forget the MK's who are in the States away from their parents in college, armed forces . . . Wouldn't a bit of extra spending money be a nice surprise? Or a box of chocolate chip cookies right from your oven? MK's who are married are still a part of the team . . . and Grandkids . . . wow! The list is unending. This mommie likes to think that people remember my far-away family in prayers as well as the people here on the field among whom we labor. When you help and care for my family, you are helping and caring for me!

If packages are sent, make sure they are two pounds or under in weight and have a green customs sticker from the Post Office. Packages weighing more have white stickers and missionaries will have to pay to receive them. Perhaps you should first contact your missionary and ask if they have specific requests (make sure the missionary knows if you are talking about \$5.00 or \$50.00!)





Partial Report of the Resolutions Committee


(The Missouri State Association requested that this report be included in the Gem.)

"The Summons From Heaven" Revelation 22:17 by Ron Edgil

"And the Spirit and the Bride say Come. And let hime that heareth say Come. And let him that is athrist come. And whosoever will, let him take the water of life freely." If there is any book in all the world that captures one central theme, then that book is the Bible. From Genesis 3:9 wherein God called out, "Adam, where art thou?"until the last closing summons to man in Revelation 22:17, the Lord has been dealing with sinful mankind to restore that lost fellowship. Man's communion with God was broken because of sinful rebellion and disobedience. That reason should serve as grounds for consideration in viewing how God deals with us today. First, we find the reference to those who are guilty. The prophet Isaiah made the plea for man to come to God and "reason with the Lord." We may say that "religion has the basis for making use of common-sense." Even though man has sinned and come short of the glory of God, there is yet room for the Heavenly Father to demonstrate love and compassion. Christ died "for ungodly sinners" while we were yet still in our sins. The Apostle Paul stated that "He who knew no sin became sin for us" and we must conclude that the Innocent became the burden-bearer for the guilty that a ransom could be paid and the guilty be set free. The case of the adulterous woman as found in John 8:1-11 reveals three things about our guilt as well as God's desire to forgive us. One, there shall always be someone ready to accuse you and lay the burden of guilt at your feet. Two, every man in the world must honestly face his own guilt problem before God. Then ask forgiveness and allow God to remove that burden and penalty. Three, God did not send Jesus Christ into the world to condemn, but rather to save from condemnation. Therefore, carefully consider the summons from Heaven to "Come and reason" with God about your standing before Him.

The second summons from the Lord is found in Matthew 11:28-30 and offers to the weary a means of rest. To those who are laboring under stress about spiritual things; to the heavy ladened who are not refreshed by the lifestyle they experience nor the master whom they serve. Sin offers drudgery and depression after it is finished; it brings forth death. Christ offers a yoke that is lighter to bear, and equitable to share, for He bears the greater portion of all the Christian's life. So here we find a summons from Heaven to "Come and rest" from guilt and affliction from sin. Without a place called Calvary, and a Person called Jesus, we could never know peace. There had to be a source and a Saviour to make the transfer of guilt possible. That need was made complete by Jesus Christ.

The third summons we find is addressed to the thirsty. John 7:37 "If any man thirst, let him come unto me and drink." We all understand what thirst is and how that a man could die if not satisfied in the need of water. The physical body cries out in need of nourishment and the replensishing of the lost supply of liquid. Even so, the soul and heart of man lost the source of satisfaction and contentment when by transgression and sin he fell from favor with God. That lack of contentment is shown today by many situations such as broken homes and multiple marriages, alcohol addiction and use, the sexual permissiveness of unrestrained and immoral behavior among men. The appetite for drugs and any other means or method that may provide a temporary lift and quenching of the desire that cries from within the heart of man is again proof that the thirst exists and is very real. This is the age of counseling and therapy sessions and these methods surely have a purpose and a place but, many of the problems we face are there because we refuse to allow Jesus to satisfy the longing of our soul. We face the same burdens, bear the same consequences, and experience recurrent defeat, unless Jesus is given the opportunity to fulfill our needs. And after such awhile many will come to the place

they should have come much sooner, as God summons man to Himself. There is a story of a little boy who was thirsty after bedtime. He let it be known several times until his father became very irritated. The man threathened to spank the child if he did not hush. The boy could stand it no longer so he said, "Dad, when you get up to spank me, would you please bring me a drink of water?" Oh dear friend, why do we make the Lord go to such extremes to gain our love and devotion? Why not allow Jesus Christ now to satisfy the thirst and longing of your heart?

The fourth and final consideration is the summons to those who are distant and as Peter who followed afar off. Jesus invited him to "come and dine." Here we consider those who are saved and have known what Christian service is all about. Then somehow they may fall back and remain distant to the Lord. Distant discipleship certainly may be one of the greatest hindrances to the local church today. Lack of faithfulness to attendance to Christian duties, and the failure to practice stewardship that pleases the Lord may also be an indication of your distance from the will of God. The first thing the Prodigal Son did upon his return home was ask the father's forgiveness and consideration to allow him to be once again part of the family. Is it possible that you might have seen yourself mirrored and represented by one of these illustrations of Scripture? Has the Lord graciously summoned you to consider His love and your relationship to Him? Do that which is right and pleasing in the sight of the Lord Jesus Christ. Whatever you must do you should do right now, or else your greatest regret in eternity will be that you failed to answer the summons.


