

Therefore leaving the principles of the doctrine of Christ, let us go unto perfection; not laying again the foundation of repentance from dead works and of faith toward God. (Heb. 6:1).

The fifth chapter of Hebrews closes with a sad picture of immature believers, while the sixth chapter opens with an exhortation to spiritual progress. In this meditation I would like to encourage each child of God not only to go on, but to go on unto perfection.

Hebrews 6:1 was drawn to my attention while reading the book The Essentials of Prayer by E.M. Bounds. Mr. Bounds made the following statement, "In religion we must not only go on, we must know where we are going."

Paul said, "I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." He started

toward a definite goal and purpose, and was a man set on fire by the Holy Spirit, who could humbly say, "I've never been disobedient to that Heavenly vision." Paul was not the same individual that answered the call to preach to the Gentiles when he sat in prison waiting to die. He had gone on unto perfection, and was ready to be ushered into the presence of a Holy God.

Peter said, "Wherefore beloved, seeing that ye look for such things, be diligent that ye may be found of him in peace, without spot and blameless." I think he was trying to convey the same truth John states in First John 3:3 where he said, "and every man that hath this hope in him purifieth himself even as he is pure."

As I close this meditation, I trust the desire of each believer would be that we not only want to go on, but that we take a look at where we are going. Do you know where you're going? Do you know more scripture now than you did when you were saved? Are you less pure? Should you be teaching and yet must be taught? Are you still on milk instead of strong meat?

I challenge you to go on unto perfection and be found of Him in peace, without spot and blameless.

From Pastor To Missionary

There are many questions that are typically asked of the new missionary appointee, but I suppose when an experienced pastor is appointed as a missionary to the Ivory Coast there are even more. It is not a matter of routine when such a thing happens, and asking a few questions is quite in order. Let me try to anticipate a few questions that might be asked and answer them the best I can.

First, the most logical question would be, "Why are you leaving the pastorate for the mission field?" I can hear the speculative comments now: "There must be some trouble in his church" or "He must be a disgruntled pastor with a bad experience", etc. Nothing could be farther from the truth, however. The past four and a half years of ministry at Calvary Free Will Baptist Church have been some of the best years of my life. I have enjoyed a good ministry in Georgetown. The Lord has given many deep and personal relationships that will last into eternity. The new pastor, Brother Eddie Baird, will have the privilege of working with some of the finest Christians I know. The ministry at Calvary is not a bad experience pushing me, but a good experience preparing me for the mission field! To answer God's call for missionary service while in the midst of a good ministry was a difficult decision to make. Yet, I knew that not to submit to His perfect will could very easily result in that which has been a blessing becoming a curse. I did not want this for the beloved friends at Calvary, or for myself!

Second, "Why Ivory Coast?" In simplest terms the answer to this question is the same as the first: it's God's will. I am not sure of all the reasons why the Lord chose me for the Ivory Coast rather than Japan or Brazil, or any of the other fields. I know more missionaries in Ivory Coast than any other field, and that may have something to do with it. I knew more about that field than any other, and that may have contributed as well. The idea that really gripped my heart, however, was knowing that in the Ivory Coast there is a field ripe unto harvest and the need for laborers great. From 1980 to 1985 the number of believers who worship together in the Ivorian churches has grown about 180%. The fruit is ripe unto harvest. If laborers are not sent immediately, the fruit may fall to the ground and spoil. We do not know how long the harvest season will last; God forbid that I, and maybe you, should delay in answering, "Here am I, send me."

Third, What will your ministry be in the lvory Coast?" The exact location and specific ministry will not be identified until after I am on the field. But one thing is certain, and that is that I am a preacher. God has given me a burden for proclaiming Christ to those who have yet to hear. Whatever my ultimate ministry will be, I am confident it will involve evangelism and church planting.

Fourth, "How much will it take to send you to Ivory Coast and support you and your ministry there?" Although exact figures are not available at this time, it is estimated that I will need about \$3,000 in monthly support and about \$35,000 in cash before Linda and I

depart for France to do language study. Indeed this is a lot of money, but the God who has called us will provide for us!

Fifth, "When will you depart?" This is another question that is hard to answer at this time. I have been advised not to speculate too much about a departure date until there has been enough time pass to evaluate how well the support is coming in. I am asking the Lord for a miracle, and am trusting Him for a quick and early departure date. I will be able to be more specific after a few months of deputation.

Sixth, "What can I do?" I am glad you asked that question!! The first thing you can do is pray. Pray for our health, travel on deputation, support, language acquisition, and that God would use us as we speak in our churches to touch hearts with His burden for lost souls. You can also schedule us for a service in your church, Woman's Auxiliary, Master's Men, Sunday School, or other organization. Finally, you can give. If 144 individuals, churches, or any combination thereof, would support us with only \$6.00 per week, we would be able to depart almost immediately. What an answer to prayer this would be!! Regardless of whether or not you can give, please support us in prayer; this is what will ultimately send us to the field.

The Lord Jesus said, "The harvest truly is plenteous, but the laborers are few; pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth laborers into his harvest." There has been a tremendous response to the gospel by the Ivorians the past half decade. The harvest truly is plenteous. Laborers are needed. God has called us to go. Will you pray that the Lord of harvest might send?

Editor's Note: May I encourage the churches in Missouri to help this missionary family with prayers and support.

Delay — Defeat?

All seemed normal. Jerry left at 7 a.m., on the cycle for Appimadoum, thirty-five miles away for services. At 8 a.m. Carol rode her bike into Tanda for the Sunday School, followed with a French and English preaching service. It was 12:15 p.m. when she returned home. The Honda cycle was there, but the car was gone. A note explained that Jerry needed to make a return trip to Appimadoum since one of the young Christian girls was having problems. Her pagan parents were attempting to force her to submit to initation rites and make sacrifices. Naomi left the village in the wee hours of the morning.

At 2 p.m. Jerry returned home unable to find Naomi. She captivated our thoughts. We were leaving for evening services in Tanda when three exhausted young men arrived. Naomi was still in the village and help was needed. Jerry, the three young men, Paul, a licensed evangelist, and Kouame Paul, an older and much respected Christian from Goumere, went to help.

I agreed that first they should obtain permission from the stepfather before taking her away. The village chief and stepfather refused. Appimadoum, a village without electricity, was dark. Loud talking groups formed. Many joined the excited people. Some threats to cut pastor's car tires and burn the church were voiced. It was a most defeated group of Christians as they walked back to the car, unable to help. Just as the group reached the darkened car, one of the local Christians whispered into pastor's ear, "We have Naomi in your car." Oh, no . . . but some of the villagers with flashlights had spotted her inside. Then came the accusation: "You were not given permission to take her, so you are stealing her!" Pastor's loud voice was heard, "I did not give anyone permission to get in my car... Not Naomi and not you!" The man backed away. . . and pastor had to tell Naomi that permission to take her had been refused. She would have to get out of the car. She would have to stay in the village. The Christians could do nothing more. She was assured of many prayers believing that God would answer. The sad group returned home. It was 1 a.m.

Monday brought no news. Tuesday Jerry and Paul went to Bondoukou. It was there they learned that the small, yet beautiful, split-bamboo church building at Appimadoum had been burned. Four young men were in prison. Naomi had been released from her parent's authority. A policeman just kept repeating the unbelievable, "They burned God's House. They burned God's House." Pastor Jerry assured the Appimadoum Christians that building was only a building. It could be rebuilt. They were the Church,

and they were urged to remain faithful.

Another day, another trip to Bondoukou. The four young men had been released from prison (lack of evidence). Naomi had again been placed under her parent's authority. They had clearly been instructed not to force her to carry through with the rites or sacrifices. And, the entire village was blamed for burning the church. The government official gave them three days to build another one—in time for the next Sunday Service.

What had appeared earlier to be defeat was now recognized only as a delay . . . GOD DID ANSWER . . . and sorrow was turned into gladness.

Thoughts And Suggestions Concerning A Radio Ministry

The Lord had blessed our church with eight years of sustained growth. Not a spectacular growth, but a gradual, consistent growth. Then, in mid 1986, I began to realize that we had drifted into a state of complacency. We began to lose some families, and a cloud began to settle over our congregation. I realized that we must attempt to recapture the aggressive spirit that helped spark earlier growth. Momentum can be a tremendous force, but once you lose it, it becomes very difficult to recapture. One of the ministries which I felt led to initiate was a radio ministry.

DAILY OR WEEKLY? At first, I thought we would have one program on both Saturday and Sunday with each airing on a different station. As our people began to respond, I began to envision a daily ministry which was always preferred but thought unattainable. The daily ministry would have put us in the home or automobile every day, and if you missed us today you could always get us tomorrow. I made the decision in early September to go with the daily radio ministry.

STATION SELECTION. St. Louis has several gospel stations. A couple are solid stations but are also terribly expensive. I would have preferred such a station for it would have given our ministry instant credibility. However, it was not in the Lord's will for us to do so. Other stations are filled with "crackpot" programming. To be on one of these stations would have identified us with a group of cults and/or denominations that I felt would mislead people as to where we stood doctrinally. When all factors were weighed, I contracted with KSTL for one year of programs. Even though the contract was for one year, management wrote in a special two week notice clause to enable us to launch the ministry with no great financial risk.

PROGRAM FORMAT. Our broadcast is not a nationwide program such as Back to the Bible, Haven of Rest, Chapel of the Air, etc. It is a local broadcast familiarizing people with the ministry of the Calvary Fellowship Free Will Baptist Church. Therefore, we use music provided by our own musicians. This can be a problem. Fortunately, the Lord has blessed us with some talented people. Finis Barr, a member of our church, had gone to Nashville and recorded an album which supplied me with ten great songs. P.D. Murdick, also a member, had just started a recording studio and Ron & Deb Scott, Doyle Fulbright, Finis Barr, and Marilyn Jones spent some time with P.D. preparing a tape which provided another nine outstanding songs. Nick Nixon, as a labor of love, tapes all our services, and we use some of this live music on the broadcast. Besides the music, I will mention birthdays, special prayer needs, special announcements from both our church and our sister FWB churches. I climax the program with a five minute challenge, thought devotion.

RECEPTION. Our people have been most encouraging. Still, it is a small segment of our church that is carrying on the bulk of the financial load. However, as a whole, the people are sensitive to let me know they appreciate the program each morning. I get calls from various people outside of our congregation encouraging me in the ministry. Some have called to say they listen to us at breakfast every morning. One man called to say he tapes it every morning and plays it back several times during the day. However, to my knowledge, we have received no new people as a result of this ministry.


PROBLEMS? I do not have the equipment to produce the quality tapes for the broadcast. Therefore, on Monday morning I go down to the Station, which is approximately 20 miles. I record two broadcasts from 7:00 a.m. to 7:45 a.m. I then move into another studio and do my Monday's broadcast live. I then return to the other studio to tape the other programs. Station personnel have been very gracious to me. When we get a new sound system (How is that for faith?) we will include some equipment for preparing these programs.

Finances are always a problem. As we faced 1987, we did not feel that we could budget any funds for radio. You will recall that I previously mentioned the loss of some families which meant that for the first time in my ministry at Calvary we would not be able to increase the budget. I can tap the advertising budget for a few dollars, but I must raise 90% of the money outside the church budget. This isn't good, but it is the way it must be for right now. As growth makes additional funds available, it is my desire to channel a portion of those funds into this ministry.


PURPOSE. The primary purpose of this radio ministry is to make folks aware of our church's total ministry.

Out Of Season: Things To Remember When You Have To Preach All The Time

James Agee was a noted author in the 1950's. One critic defined him as a writer of formidable talent who, unfortunately, had nothing to say. That would seem to be the most important thing about communicating with someone—you have to have something to say.

I am bothered by the death of small talk. When we preach we always want to have something important to say, but what about when we are just talking to people? I think a guy with something important to say will always have something to say. His words aren't wasted if they make sense. Most of us preachers don't know any other type of small talk with one another besides, "How's your church doing?" Why can't we talk about anything other than that? I'm afraid that carries over into our sermons and our newsletters. If we aren't talking about the church, we are at a loss for anything to say.

Don't you hate to be ignored? Think about it—don't you hate to go the the State Association or the National Association? Everytime you stop to talk to anyone, they are always looking over your shoulder, because they want to be talking to someone else. I used to think that they had something urgent to say to them, but when I eavesdropped on the conversations, they always began, "How's your church doing?"

I think that, a lot of times, I ignore the people I'm preaching to. I'm always aiming my sermons at the folks who ought to be there. And maybe that is why I draw mixed reactions from the congregation. Who is that sermon for, anyway?

Sermons have to do with building faith, which I am going to define as "believing that which someone else has told you is a fact." It doesn't mean that it **cannot** be proven. It means that you have confidence in the one who said it, so you don't bother proving it. In order to do that, we have to have something to say, and we have

to be sure we are conscious of who we are saying it to. Relevance will take care of itself.

Growing up in a pastor's home, I suppose I've heard thousands of sermons. I am an avid reader. The ones that grabbed me had some specific qualities, and, bathed in the Holy Spirit and pastoral concern; I think they will grab a congregation too.

1. Be Prepared to Hand Over Your Heart. There are two types of good communicators: tellers and talkers. Carl Henry, in his series, God, Revelation and Authority, is a teller. John Naisbitt, author of Megatrends, and Josh McDowell, author of Evidence That Demands a Verdict, strike me as tellers. They give documented, concise, well-grounded information. These guys, far from being superfluous, are the foundational writers upon which systems and decisions are built. They offer proof you can count on in doctrine and philosophy.

But foundations do not sell houses—they are just a necessary part of a house. Once a potential buyer makes sure the foundation is solid, he goes on to what sells the house—the location, the arrangement, and the beauty. Foundations are what beauty is built upon. Tellers don't seem to make good pastors to me.

On the other hand, there are the talkers. After I've read a Nero Wolfe mystery by Rex Stout, I feel like I could have a pretty good conversation with the author. He has given me a peek inside his personality. I feel the same way after listening to a tape by Chuck Swindoll or James Dobson. McDowell and Henry would intimidate

me with a barrage of knowledge. Swindoll, Stout, and Dobson are talkers. They have given me facts about themselves as a matter of course, without ventilating or spilling their guts. They are saying, "These facts about life and God are true, and I have personal experience with them, so listen to me and save yourself some trouble."

Faith is built, not just by being presented with facts, but by thinking that you understand the heart of the one presenting.

2. **Be Prepared to Preach After You Preach.** Good sermons and books leave you wanting to come back for more because they answered your yearnings.

When I was in college, the creative writing class was given the assignment of describing a student at the school who was not in the class, and describe him so that the class could guess who he was. The only description correctly identified by the entire class was the one of me. My roommate told me the description: "He has a multitude of acquaintances, but few close friends." That has always bugged me. I often recall it after a sermon is preached that results in a lot of people wanting to talk to me. My tendancy is to shy away from people after I've finished a sermon. One day I finally realized that these people were responding to the invitation, and I was turning them down.

After the sermon is preached, it has to turn into an inner message. It does that sometimes when people are talking to us after the service is over—to find out how much we meant of what we preached. I realize that we wear ourselves out physically in a sermon; I also understand from the example of Christ that ministering out of exhaustion is a part of the message. What are the seven sayings from the cross other than ministering out of exhaustion? How you respond to the sheep who respond a little later than you would have liked is a pretty good measurement of your status as either undershepherd or hired hand (John 10:12, 13).

In recent years, a great deal of emphasis has gone into convincing us that preachers need to show themselves as real men with real feelings and needs. I am all for that. However, we usually go off the deep end in good things; the extreme we have gone to is to believe that we stop being the preacher unless we are in the pulpit. I am always a preacher because that is God's call. I am a man, because that is God's method.

3. Be Prepared to Repeat and Repeat. Joe Ellis says you should always repeat your information at least three times; most people didn't notice the first time you said it; they didn't listen the second time you said it; and they misunderstood the third time you said it.

In **God**, **Revelation**, and **Authority**, Carl Henry took six huge volumes saying one thing: Most men will do anything to avoid facing the fact that the Bible means exactly what it says about them.

After the election in 1981, political analysts tried to figure out how Reagan won. One writer said it was because of the consistency of his message: he told you what he was going to say, he said it, and then he told you what he had said. And while we're on that subject, have you noticed when President Reagan has had political difficulty? It has not been because of unpopular programs—lots of the things he has gotten

through have been unpopular. His trouble has come when he has been persuaded that the things he wants to do are too urgent to explain fully.

God told Isaiah in chapters 40 and 41 that He had repeated Himself for centuries, and still people didn't listen. It is no sin to be ignored; it is a sin to speak His Word in such a way that it isn't noticed, to be boring. To be noticed, God's Word comes through men who speak it consistently, frequently, and urgently.

4. **Be Prepared to Live and Learn.** Rich Hall says that every five years we look back at ourselves and shudder. "Man! Am I glad I'm not in high school anymore! I was so stupid!" When we graduate from college, get married, we say, "Boy! Am I glad I'm not in college anymore! I didn't know anything!" Hall goes on to say, "I guess when I'm 80, I'll probably say, 'Brother! Am I glad I'm not 75 anymore! I was such a dope!"

I really an glad my first sermon is over with, and so are the people who heard it, if they remember it at all. You couldn't pay me to go through four years of Bible college again. The encouraging thing about being a New Testament preacher is faith that the quality of my sermons has nowhere to go but up. They are going to have to get better, if I know Christ better. My writing will have to get better if I get close to God, because I will know my subject better.

Why should we try to get better at preaching, teaching, and writing? Because we don't know when God is going to be through with us. I want to die like I've lived, so I had better live well. I had better learn well. As the 80-year-old cowboy said, "If I had known I was going to live **this** long, I'd have taken better care of myself."

When a minister leaves a church he hurts and his family hurts. This is like a death. He and his family need a lot of understanding.

But there are some other people involved here. They hurt too. They are also experiencing trauma. I'm talking about the church and congregation who is losing a much loved pastor. I want this article to help them.

First, the membership must accept the fact that God has called him away. He will send his man to the church to lead them. Don't get bitter. Don't get angry. Go ahead and cry-be hurt, but don't start blaming people. If the pastor said God was finished with him there, then accept it.

There are several reasons why God would move a man from a successful ministry. He is growing stale and needs a new challenge. The work has outgrown him, or he has outgrown the church. There may be a particular ministry in another place that he is uniquely experienced to do. These are only a few of the possible reasons God would move your pastor. But if these are available, then there are probably more. So accept it. As much as it may hurt, and as easy as it is to place blame-don't. Just accept it.

Second, feel his hurt and make the change as easy for him and family as possible. Go ahead—express your love. Cry over the pastoral family. Feel guilty about all the times you could have helped him and didn't. Now do something to make up for it. Get the guilt out and get rid of it. Now do all in your power to help him leave with a good taste in his mouth about the church and its people. Encourage him and pray for him and tell him how much he has meant to you. Tell him you'll miss him. Tell him you'll be praying for him. Assure him you'll go and help reach the dreams he had for the church.

Third, support the pulpit committee. Some people may desire this position, but most won't. It can be a lonely job-trying to select a pastor for the church to consider. Sometimes church members love the former pastor, feel guilty about how they treated him, resent the pulpit committee and its power, and vent their fury on this underserving committee of dedicated people.

Instead, support the committee. Encourage them. Pray for them. Allow them to make mistakes. Love them. Expect the best. Trust God. Never stop loving your church. God has his man for the church.

Fourth, don't make impossible demands. You won't find a man just like the one leaving. If God had wanted that He would have left the old preacher there. He probably intends to redirect the ministry of the church. Pray that God will send the right man. Trust God to answer your prayer. Then accept the man sent.

One thing in closing—don't try to pretend you have all knowledge and know more than the pulpit committee. Remember, in this situation the church must come first. You'll regret it if you do things that harm the church. Many once large and thriving churches are slowly dying because of unwise and unchristianlike conduct by members during the search for a new pastor.

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This report ends the year 1986! The Lord has been so good! We praise Him from Whom all blessings flow. How wonderful it is for pastors and churches to work together in reaching a goal. May the Lord continue to bless these ministries as we endeavor to be good stewards for Him.
