And when these things begin to come to pass, then look up and lift up your heads, for your redemption draweth nigh. St. Luke 21:28.

There are many diverse theories about the Lord's return, and I'm not going to give you another one. This verse, however, does have an important message for us no matter how we believe about the end times. Like most shepherds who feed their sheep with a three pronged fork, there are three things I wish to share.

The first part of this verse lets us know there will be things that will give us an indication that Christ's coming is near; unrest in nature as well as in nations. Second Timothy 3 tells us that His coming is near, even at the door.

The second part is the area that shames most of us. That is the expectation in which we should await the return of Christ. Just as a bride awaits the marriage with the groom, we should await the Lord's return. How sad to say, most of the time, Christians are not looking up with heads held high. Instead they are going around with their chins down singing, "Wait a little longer please Jesus." We are looking to government, financial stability and everything else, when we should look to Jesus, "the Author and Finisher of our faith." Hold your head up, Christian! Not with pious pride, but with patience and persistence.

The closing part of the verse tells of the jubilation that Christ's coming will bring for the redeemed. Free at last from all the ills of time. No sorrow, no pain, no tears, no night, no curse, no death, and no separation.

It has been said there are two ways for people to look at Christ's coming. They will either dread it or delight in it. The thing that makes the difference is whether you've done what he asked you to do while he was gone.

Can't you see some indications that His coming is near? Is your expectation high for His return? Will there be jubilation for you when He comes? It's up to you.


35TH ANNIVERSARY HOMECOMING CELEBRATION AT THAYER

BRIEF HISTORY OF FIRST CHURCH, DESOTO







On Sunday, April 2, 1989, the First Free Will Baptist Church, DeSoto, Missouri, observed its Twenty-Third Anniversary and an annual Homecoming Service. Reverend Clarence Burton, State Executive Secretary, was the guest speaker and the evangelist for the preceding week of evangelistic services.

The church began as a Mission Church in March 1966. Two Free Will Baptist families, the Theoford Riders and the Henry Stephens, were instrumental in starting the work. Reverend Charles Moyers was the missionary pastor.

In June 1967 the Missouri State Home Mission Board organized the mission into a church. A month later, Brother Charles Miller came from the Parkview Church in Deloge, Missouri to preach for the newly organized church, and has been there since that time preaching and building.



Sister Eunice Miller Home With The Lord





Freedom by Rev. Mike Hutsel



The 4th of July is a very important time for those of us who live in the United States of America. We should be reminded of the very important date in 1776 when our second Continental Congress adopted and signed a formal statement called "The Declaration of Independence."

Two hundred thirteen years have since passed and the United States continues to enjoy freedom.

But we need to remember that this 'freedom' was not free. It came at a high cost - the cost of sacrifice, toil, sweat and, yes, even blood. We can be thankful for those who were willing to pay the price for freedom.

Bishop Fulton Sheen once said, "America will not be slain by the Soviets. But America can commit suicide." Great nations rarely fall to the battering of the enemies. They decay from within. They lose their moral courage and their purpose for existence.

But there is a greater freedom than that of our independence as a nation. It is freedom from sin and death. This freedom came at the highest cost - the blood, the death of God's only begotten Son, the Lord Jesus Christ.

Think of freedom from sin in this respect: When Jesus died on the Cross, was buried and rose again, He signed for every person, a 'Declaration of Independence'. He declared that all who trust Him as Saviour are free from the law of sin and death. Romans 8:2, "For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus hath made me free from the law of sin and death."

Multitudes have never experienced this freedom. They are in slavery to sin and its consequences. This freedom is available to all, but the condition is to believe, to trust. Let us thank God, today, that we live in a free nation and that, in Christ, we have freedom from sin and eternal separation from God.

Recently, at a laymen's conference, I attended a seminar entitled, "Prayer in the Will of God," which was led by Brother Rick Dablemont. As long as things are going well for us there is little need worrying about other people or problems. Most of us need to get our "I's" back on God and His concerns. Prayer will bring blessing upon a church and power upon the pastor. It will settle arguments and misunderstandings, plus change people's lives.

Remember the words of the old song ... "How long since you prayed, how long since you stayed, on your knees 'til the light shone through?" One of my fondest memories of childhood was of waking up early in the morning and hearing my grandmother crying out in prayer for my family, our church, and lost friends. Let's give our children today such memories. Let's get the POWER back in our prayers!
