Double in a Decade

"Where did 1990 go?," someone asked me. Well, I made an intelligent reply and said, "It went the same place as 1989 — it went in a hurry." And it did.

As we look back in retrospect at the year 1991, can we think of anything that we did, that we have not done in previous years, that made a definite impact for the cause of Christ? Are we planning to do anything differently this year, 1991, that will make a greater impact towards winning the lost to Christ?

Most folks that fail to serve the Lord as they know they should, don't plan to fail. The problem is they fail to plan! You have heard this said before, I suspect, but let me say it again — What we want to do for Christ, we should do quickly! I am not a date setter as to when Christ will come again. I would be foolish to state that He is coming in November, 1991, for as Jesus said, the angels in Heaven do not know the time. But in my soul I believe that His coming draweth nigh! And I have heard many others who love the Lord say, "I sense an expectancy of the coming of Christ that I have never felt before." We are living in the last decade of the 20th century. When the Cold War melted, the Berlin Wall crumbled and several European countries put off the yoke of control by Soviet Russia, the world was shocked. How could this happen so quickly! Who would have predicted that such momentous things would happen as rapidly as it did? Of course, this did not surprise God. He didn't say, "Well, I didn't know that was going to happen." As any serious Bible student knows these events happened according to the plan that a Sovereign God in His foreknowledge knew would happen, exactly and precisely, as they did. As Daniel, the prophetstatesman, said, "...Blessed be the name of God forever and ever: for wisdom and might are his: And He changeth the times and the seasons: He removeth kings, and setteth up kings..." (Dan. 2:20-21) Before the dust of the Berlin Wall had settled, suddenly, world attention was directed to the Middle East because of the surprise invasion of Kuwait by Iraq. Why? It was obvious that Iraq wanted control of the oil in the Middle East. The world system draws most of its energy from oil, and Iraq wanted control of it. This did not surprise God. Irregardless of one's eschatology, any serious Bible student knows that Bible prophecy unfolds in the Middle East, and Europe. Now, with what has happened, and the prospect of what will likely happen in the last decade of this 20th century, may I say this loud and clear, "What we plan to do for Jesus, we need to do it now."

May I suggest three things, by way of proper planning. (1) The What? (2) The Who? and (3) The How?

I The What?

Let's simply do what Jesus commanded (not suggested) we do following His resurrection and before His ascension. "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I

have commanded you: and lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." (Matt. 28:19-20) To compliment this the Bible states in Psalms 126:5, 6 "They that sow in tears shall reap in joy. He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him."

The ingredients that are involved in soul-winning and edifying the Christian will do more to fight some of the major battles the Christian faces than anything else. We are in a war against the world, the flesh and the devil! To win we must go on the offensive. There is the battle against drunkenness, drugs, pornography, alcohol, illicit sex, homosexuals and others. I am convinced that the only way we will win the battle in the fight against these evils of the devil is to lead that lost person to Jesus and help him or her claim the power of the Holy Spirit and grow in the Lord!

II Who?

Let me, first of all, say who is not going to do the going. Hollywood is not going to help. The movie industry will lose thousands of dollars on a film that is rotten to the core, rather than produce a film that has some family, Christian or moral value to it. Mike Medved, co-host of the weekly PBS TV program Sneak Previews, states, "The Last Tempation of Christ was by honest and objective standards, an artistic disaster. Yet many of my colleagues hailed it as a masterpiece. One of America's best known movie reviewers even stated it was the greatest film of 1988. The Academy of Motion Pictures, Arts and Sciences went so far as to nominate Mr. Scorsese for an Academy Award as best director of the year." Why was this ungodly, obscene, profane movie produced? Because there seems to be, to quote Mike Medved again, "For many of the most powerful people in the entertainment business, hostility to traditional religion that goes so deep and burns so intensely that they insist on expressing that hostility, even at the risk of commercial disaster.'

The TV media will not help. On most prime time TV shows today, an evangelical Christian, whether it be someone in the ministry or a lay person, is portrayed as an overzealous person who gets drunk, is half crazy and has no love for others, but rather abuses family and friends, alike. This is no secret that the TV News Media favors pornography (free expression they say), abortion, the homosexual movement and other immoral activities.

I could mention the National Endowment of Arts, the ACLU, the NCC and others who will not help in winning the lost to Christ. I shudder when I think of what will happen when the Judgement of God falls on these perpetrators of ungodliness, filth and perversion. But when I think of the countless thousands of people who have been led and are being led by these perverts of the truth, I can say, Lord, swing your sword of judgement just as you did at Sodom and Gomorrah.

— Sandy Morris, church reporter, writes, Christmas is the time of year we find ourselves anticipating, procrastinating, and reflecting on things to come, the year that is ahead, and what the year we are leaving has brought our way — especially the changes.

One of the changes brought to us at United Free Will Baptist Church, West Plains, Missouri, is rather "bittersweet." When God calls a blessed "saint" home, we often find for those of us left behind, mixed emotions. We are truly happy for the one called home, yet the loss and void their passing leaves takes a lot of adjustment

on our part.

Five years ago, my husband lost his father after a five week battle with cancer. The illness was so rapid that we found ourselves in a state of shock for the most part and afterwards. While reflecting on the situation with a dear pastor friend of ours, I mentioned how fortunate my husband had been in having such a great Dad and being so very close to him. I had tried to encourage him by pointing out all the things they had done together, all the time they had shared together, etc., and Brother Ray said to me, "One thing you will have to realize, those are the ones that have so very much to give up." I share that personal experience with you to say this, that is where we find ourselves with the death of Sister Lucille Beatty. There is so very much to give up. Where do we start? Lucille was so many things to so many people. She was truly one of the last of the "grand ladies." She was the product of a more genteel era. when hospitality and encouragement were a style of life.

There is no way to adequately sum up all the years of service she and Brother Harry gave to our denomination and do it justice. They worked all these many years locally and statewide as Pastor and State Coordinator. They were known both far and near in the State of Missouri and admired with great love and respect. They both, so loved God, and found a place in His service where they bloomed into beautiful roses. The legacy they leave is priceless.

When I think of Lucille, through tears yet, I think of seeing her on Sunday morning entering the sanctuary, all dressed up as if she were going somewhere special. She was. She was going to Church to worship God. She possessed an enthusiasm that was magnetic to the rest of us. There are so many things I remember with such a warm feeling — the raised hands during worship hour, singing in the choir, the "Amens" to Brother Glenn's sermons; the Word of God always thrilled her heart, the altar prayers for a loved one or friend, the hugs and "I love you" during our time of greeting, the special prayer requests during "prayer time" on Sunday, or prayers "in faith believing" for a grandson who was terminally ill (and seeing those prayers answered with healing), her endearing care of Brother Harry these past years as his health failed, the encouraging words during our dark hours — at a time when there was a lot of darkness in her own life. Maybe some of my fondest are during Auxiliary when, in despair over attendance or involvement, some of us would want to give up, but Lucille would tell us to remember those missionaries on the field and how much they needed us and we would go on to better times. Auxiliary was her "pet" love and I pray we shall always have a healthy, active one in our Church — she would want it that way.

When it came to God's work, Lucille was commitment, obedience, caring, and perserverence. She once told me, during one of her difficult times, "Harry has always lived by the philosophy that God takes care of His children, and I believe him. God will take care of us."

God did take care of Sister Lucille. It is sometimes hard for us to accept, but death is complete healing and God was merciful, for which we are grateful.

It would be impossible to give a summation to so many memories, but I think the one thing that sticks in my mind foremost is Lucille's enthusiasm and unexhaustible energies for God's work in whatever she was called to do. We so miss her. I know time makes death easier to bear, talking

about her will become some easier, but the loss and void will always be as real as it is today. The torch has been passed, and it may take several of us to carry hers. Thanks, Lucy — for all the good times, the wonderful memories, the example you lived before us, and the influence you left with us — we love you!

Let us not forget; however, we are to be servants to the living and take a few minutes to turn our attention to Brother Harry, who is presently residing in Oklahoma near their son Kenneth. I know he needs the encouragement and love of his friends now more than any other time in his life. If you have the opportunity, mail him a card of cheer. He, too, has given so much, so willingly, for so long.



Satanism...Is It In Your Community?

Revelation 3:14-22 gives a clear picture of the church in need of revival.

The condition of this church is described as wretched and miserable. This is a state of affairs where pity is to be shown toward those found in this condition. The church was poor or lacking true spiritual treasures. She was blind or lacking spiritual perception. She did not understand her condition. In fact, she said of herself that she was rich and had need of nothing. She was also naked or exposed to the shame and embarrassment that follows where such a great lacking exist.

What has produced this condition in the church? The cause is found in her lukewarmness. The church had not vocally denied God. But, she had no heart for the God she professed to love. She had form and ritual, but no loving obedience to the principles of divine truth. As long as religious church people fail to take seriously the absolutes of a personal God, lukewarmness will prevail. Accountability to a sovereign God is difficult for some churchgoers to attain because it may interrupt what Francis A. Schaeffer calls their "personal peace and affluence."

The corrective measure for this condition within the church is the obtaining of fire-tried gold or true spiritual riches. Another thing needed is the white (unstained) raiment or the robe of Christ's righteousness. An eye salve is needed for the healing of spiritual perception. These are all found in the person of Christ, Who stands on the outside of the lukewarm church, asking to be invited in.

A revival, where Christ is invited in by a persuasion that His commands and teachings are to be incorporated into every area of our lives, is the only thing that will keep this type of church from being spewed out, or from falling under the judgement of God.

Where are we and our churches?

Country Churches

Before you immediately and emphatically say, "NO!," listen to what Moody Adams, an evangelist who has done research on the subject, has to say: "It's just now really getting to us. Nearly every community has been touched by it now. The public is in a state of denial about Satanism, but that is not going to make it go away."

We as parents, teachers, church workers, etc., can take the philosophy of the ostrich and stick our heads in the sand, hoping that Satanism will go away. But we have left a most valuable possession exposed . . . our children.

WHO is attracted to Satanism? According to studies, adolescents, ages 11-17, from all walks of life. Many are from middle to upper middle class families. They are intelligent, creative, and curious children. Many have been loners and have low self-esteem.

The most frequent places WHERE children are recruited are rock concerts, game clubs, school, and private parties at some friend's house.

WHY do people get involved in Satanism? Some of the youth involvement is no doubt motivated by youthful rebellion. Rebellion is against parents, traditional religious values, school, and authority in general. On the surface, Satanism practices may appear as a means to acquire power and control over factors of importance in their lives. According to Adams, young people are attracted by three things: "power, pleasure, and pride."

HOW do we know if our child is being drawn into Satanism? Parents should know their children's friends and also should become acquainted with the parents of their children's friends. Notice the music that is listened to by your child. There has been an overwhelming amount of occult philosophy and symbolism in the entertainment arena. Heavy metal music, with lyrics of death, torture, drug usage, illicit sex, etc., are providing many children with more exposure to the occult than most parents realize.

What games do your children play? Fantasy role playing games like "Dungeons and Dragons" are dangerous. Monitor the movies and videos your child watches. Know what books and magazines your children are reading. What kinds of pictures and posters are they collecting?

WHAT can we do? We should educate ourselves and our families about Satanism and the occult. Attendance at community church sponsored seminars on the occult should be encouraged. Communication with your children is also crucial to overcoming this movement.

According to Adams, "It is going to be very difficult to turn the tide, until we get a return to solid values." This may be difficult, but it is not impossible. We simply must not take the "head in the sand" philosophy. Parents must communicate Christian values by example as well as by explanation, and build a healthy self-esteem in your child.

Greetings From Our Missionaries:

IERRY & CAROL PINKERTON, Cote d'Ivoire, Afrique - We plan to be in the United States around April 1. Following three years on the field a six month furlough has been requested. This will not be long to raise the needed money for our budget, but we are praying that folks will respond. Keep this in mind — gasoline is \$5.50 a gallon, a new tire is \$185.00 and three Missionary families (Daniels, Moores & Pinkertons) have 172 villages in the Bondouku immediate area to serve. We praise the Lord for a new attitude among the Africans. There is love, joy, forgiveness and unity.

KEN & JUDY BAILEY, Tokyo, Japan —We recently had a joint meeting with our church in the downtown area of Adachi. It is our only other church in the Tokyo area. We have unsaved neighbors and some unsaved who are attending some of the church services — please pray for them. We need about \$1500 a month additional support. The dollar has lost against the yen. Gasoline is \$4.50 a gallon, 4 apples cost \$4.64 and the price of a Bible went up from \$26 to \$34.

STEVE & JUDY LYTLE, Panama — Six people from the Panama City area churches went to Rio D Jesus to give free medical attention to the poverty stricken people in that area and above all to share the gospel of Christ. Seven doctors, three nurses and one lab technician saw approximately 1,250 patients. In the meantime other believers were going door to door doing soul-winning visitation. The gospel was shared with 400 people and every person who visited the temporary clinic received a tract and gospel witness. Stan and Brenda Bunch with their three children arrived back in Panama August 28 — we praise the Lord for that! Thanks for your prayers and support - please continue it.

From November 29 - December we celebrated the sixth anniversary of the church with an Evangelistic Service each evening. Our Christmas Program was held December 23rd. Pray for us as we continue to look for land on which to build. The dollar has dropped from 106 pesetas to 93 since returning in June. That is a 12% increase in our cost of living. Please remember our financial needs in your prayers.

JIM & OLENA McLAIN, Japan — Two young mothers are studying in a new converts class. We are looking forward to seeing them baptized in the near future. Two of our young ladies who have been studying in our Bible colleges in the U.S. are back in Japan. It is good to have them back in our fellowship and see how they have grown in the Lord. We ask for your continued support in prayers and finances to sustain our ministry in Japan.

The going; the witnessing for Jesus will be done by that born-again believer who has a love for the unsaved and who believes that the Bible is the inspired, authoritative, irrevocable Word of God. The committee Christian will go because Jesus said "Go," and because he or she knows that there is no joy compared to that which one experiences when an unsaved soul is led to Christ. The one thing that is near and dear to the heart of God, that brings rejoicing in Heaven, is one lost soul that repents and trusts Christ as Saviour.

There are so many examples in Scripture: Jesus and Nicodemus; Jesus and the Woman of Samaria; Peter at the home of Cornelius; Philip and the Ethopian Eunuch; Paul and Silas and the Philipian jailer. The fields are white unto harvest but the laborers are few.

And finally, The When?

A recent compilation of more than fifty years of public opinion polls by the Gallup Organization shows that 94% of the public believe in God, 90% pray and 88% believe that God loves them. More than 75% say their religious experience has been a positive experience. Co-author Jim Castelli, "The People's Religion: American Faith in the 90's," said the thing that has surprised him is the percentage that went to church last week is basically the same percentage that went to church in the 1930's. Perhaps the reason is reflected in the fact that only 65% of "believers" are affiliated with a church organization. There is no commitment!

George Gallup, Jr., says many Christians are practicing a religion that is comfortable and titillating but not challenging. Gallup states "that is the central weakness of Christianity in the United States today." Is this just the weakness of "the others" but not us? The statistics reveal that Free Will Baptists are plagued with the same weakness as others.

The National Association of Free Will Baptists has adopted the challenge "Double in this Decade." There are some local churches that have adopted this challenge.

Is the challenge too great — Double in this Decade? It is not too great if, I said if, every committed Christian will accept this challenge and work and pray to see this goal met. We cannot follow the pattern that has been evident for so long — 25% of the members of a local church do 95% of the work and shoulder 75% of the financial responsibility.

The Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists can double in the decade of the 90's if every born-again Free Will Baptist will say "I will." It has pleased God to use these earthen vessels to bear the Good News that Jesus died for our sins; He rose again for our justification and whosoever will may come to Him for salvation.

No one else will do this precious ministry. The devil, the world and the flesh will fight it, but bless God we can do it as we submit and commit ourselves to Him!

I pray that every pastor will lead the church he serves to accept this challenge; I pray that every person who worships at one of our Free Will Baptist Churches will follow the leadership of the pastor and give his/her best to the One Who loves us and gave His best for us! Let's Double in a Decade!

In my opinion there are certain areas in the church that can make or break the opportunities of growth. One of them is the music of the church.

In the surveys taken of the large fast growing churches, the five main reasons they grow and the people say they attend are: 1) they like the preacher; 2) they like the music; 3) they like the friendliness; 4) they like the location; and 5) they like the denomination.

There is no question that most people enjoy good gospel music. The charismatics, with all their doctrinal errors, have used music to attract people and draw them in to their church. We have failed to realize the potential in gospel music. Music can attract people; music can draw people into the church; music can touch the emotions; music can assist the preacher; music can help build the church.

In many of our churches music is second class. There is no organization, and little direction. Song books that are not even doctrinally sound are used instead of our own Free Will Baptist hymnals, or other recognized hymn books. The song service is often far too long, consisting of too many congregational songs, and too many special numbers that are too often ill prepared.

If the music program of the church is well organized, interesting, enjoyable, and inspirational, it will be a tremendous asset to the spiritual and numerical growth of the church.

The Beauty of Biology

A VERY SPECIAL ANIMAL

The duck-billed platypus of Australia is a most astounding combination of physical features. It is so completely different than most known animals that scientists in England, who first saw a dead specimen, believed that it had been sewn together by Chinese merchants to deceive the British! Their confusion is understandable.

The platypus has a duck-like beak. five webbed toes, swims like a fish, and lavs eggs. Like a bird, it makes a grass-lined nest and hatches its eggs by curling up on the nest and warming them. It must therefore be some kind of special bird. On the other hand, the platypus has four legs, a fur hide, a large flat beaverlike tail and claws like many mammals. It must, therefore. be some kind of a special mammal! However, when it is small it has teeth which in the adults are replaced by horny plates, unique among reptiles. Furthermore, it uses echo location like a dolphin or a bat; a hollow spur on the inside of its heel connects with a poison-gland, making it the only venomous furred creature. Its legs are short as a reptile's but it has large cheek pouches like a squirrel or a monkey. The platypus has recently (1985) been reported as being "plugged in": with its bill it can sense electrical fields, the first higher vetebrate found to have that ability.

Evolutionists have no means of classifying, or explaining the development of animals like the platypus. The "duckbill" of the platypus as well as the other structures, create a shattering blow to the credibility of the theory of evolution. These "weird" combinations of traits simply do not fit into the concept of a "tree of life" as explained by neodarwinism or even saltationism. For the Designer and the Creator of the world, however, the platypus is no problem at all! Each animal possesses characteristics through which God intended to display His wisdom to men.

But now ask the beasts, and let them teach you; and the birds of the heavens, and let them tell you. Or speak to the earth, and let it teach you; and let the fish of the sea declare to you. Who among all these does not know that the hand of the Lord has done this, in whose hand is the life of every living thing, and the breath of all mankind? (Job 12:7-10)

Bible College to Offer Student Aid Programs

Nashville, Tennessee — Students now attending Free Will Baptist Bible College, as well as those who enroll next semester, may qualify for federal financial aid, according to Tom Sass, Treasurer.

The college has already been approved to offer Pell Grants, the largest direct aid program administered by the Office of Student Financial Assistance. Students who demonstrate a definite financial need may qualify for up to \$2,300 per year. Even students enrolled for the current fall semester will be able to apply for Pell Grants.

The college is awaiting final approval for several other Title IV student financial aid packages. These include the College Work Study Program (CWS), the Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant Program (SEOG), the Stafford Loan Program, Supple-

mental Loans for Students (SLS), and the Parent Loans for Undergraduate Students Program (PLUS). FWBBC officials are hopeful that the Stafford Loan Program, the SLS Program and the PLUS Program will be available by the time students enroll for the spring semester. The CWS and SEOG programs will be introduced in the fall of 1991.

The Board of Trustees began several years ago to investigate the possibility of securing federal aid for FWBBC students. Many students now attending the Bible College come from homes where college expenses put their families in a financial strain. These financial aid programs will make federal funds available to these students and to their families.

The college has been cautious about accepting federal funds, even (continued on page 10)

in the form of student assistance. However, Chancellor Charles A. Thigpen says that the college's involvement in these programs will require no more that what the college has been doing for years by making GI Bill benefits available to veterans.


FWBBC President Tom Malone says, "We are offering these programs

to help our students and their families. This aid is to our students, not to the institution." He added, "We do not see this as opening the door for government control of the college. In 1965, the college pulled out of these assistance programs because of attempts to impose guidelines we were not ready to accept. If we detect such attempts in the future, we have the

right to do the same thing."
