

Points for Pastors

Last month I wrote about the great number of fundamental preachers and laymen who are falling into sin and shaming the Lord. It is happening, and we know it is happening, but we don't seem to be doing anything about it. We neither try to prevent, nor do we have a program of restoration for those who fail. But we must, and we must start NOW.

First, we need a program of prevention. Several years ago there was a great deal of controversy in our denomination concerning the question of whether sin has any part in your relation to Christ. At that time it was a doctrinal game. We solved the theological question (if not the actual teaching) with an appendix in our Treatise that says we do not believe one is right with God if he is practicing sin. But it may be that we don't agree with that appendix. If we do agree with it, we need to start preaching that doctrine. We need to establish standards that honor our Lord and the church. I am not talking about the superficial preferences we try to make convictions, but sins that are identified in God's word as sin.

Second, we need a program of restoration. Ministers who fall need to have those who care enough to attempt to restore them. Our Free Will Baptist doctrine requires attempts to restore the fallen Christian. We should call on our denominational leaders to lead the way into a system of restoration. Why not demand it of our leaders. Let's do it now.

Free Will Baptist National Convention

The National Association of Free Will Baptists meets in Charleston, West Virginia, July 21-25, 1991. Executive Secretary states that he expects an attendance of 6,000. The Mariott Hotel will serve as headquarters for the National Association Convention and the Woman's Auxiliary Convention. The National Youth Conference will be headquartered in the Holiday Inn Charleston House.

The major addresses of the National Convention will be delivered by Pastor James Raper, Pastor Keith Woody,

and Pastor Billy Hanna.

Tuesday evening has been designated as Jubilee Celebration of Praise for Free Will Baptist Bible College's 50 years of service to the denomination. The 90 minute celebration will include a dramatic presentation, music by the college choir, a video production testimonies, and a sermon by Academic Dean, Dr. Robert Picirilli.

Meeting simultaneously with the National Convention are the 24th National Youth Conference with an expected 2,000 registrants and the 56th annual Woman's Auxiliary Convention with more than 1,000 expected. Missionary Steve Lytle will be the keynote speaker for the WNAC's missionary service. Dr. Mary Ruth Wisehart will speak at the Tuesday WNAC Fellowship Dinner. The four-day Youth Conference will rally around the conference theme, "Come, Celebrate Jesus."

Moderator Ralph Hampton will gavel the voting body through the 55th annual session, expected to approve a budget of 11 million dollars and electing more than 34 board and commission members.

Our society must be filled with this kind of people because in our society there is not - An issue, (1) Which does not have pro and con viewpoints printed on bumper stickers so one can show the world where he/she stands on the particular issue. (2) An "American Hero" who can't be easily recognized on a Tshirt, button, or keychain. (3) A product which doesn't rally more support by advertising on a town's largest billboard for every passerby to see.

People honor other people by identifying with them or with the product that is being promoted. Now, for someone to speak highly of a product, identify with it, and by choice use another product is inconsistent. Example: A person speaks highly about a Coke product but drinks a Pepsi Cola, or states how wonderful a Ford is, but drives a Chevy - this is the

height of inconsistency.

Silly? It does seem trivial...yet people do this to Christ everyday. How many times have you, as a Christian, been disgusted with a driver who has a bumper sticker "I have Jesus," but drives inconsiderate and unlawful? How do you feel when you see someone wearing a T-shirt with a Christian slogan, and spewing out words that are filthy and vulgar? If we, as Christians, are offended, can you imagine how it is interpreted by someone who is not a Christian.

Let's remember, we live a testimony for or against Christ. Whether we wear it or not - what kind of "Ad" are you? What slogan does your life best reflect?

"NEW AGE AND THE MEDIA"

Recently, my daughter Lynn was watching cartoons before school one morning. She had also been helping me research the NewAge movement, and this cartoon caught her attention. The main character indicated that the bad guy "was simply living out his karma." Another character was called "Dr. Lucifer." What was this cartoon? Believe it or not, it was the all-American "G.I. Joe."

Some Saturday morning take the time to watch the cartoons with your child. You will discover many are immersed in New Age thinking (self-realization, the occult, witchcraft, the power of oneself, everyone and everything is God, reincarnation, ESP, etc.).

Movies are definitely no better. Take for instance, "Ghost," with afterdeath fantasies, or "Star Trek V," in which the villains are a bunch of crazed believers, who follow a mysterious demonic force that they and the film's credits identify as "God."

Even Christian programming should carefully scrutinized. The cartoon series, "Kingdom Chums," is New Age thinking to the hilt, according to Texe Marrs, in his book entitled, "Ravaged by the New Age." Mr. Marrs states that New Age concepts, such as "the power within" and "believing in yourself," are throughout the series. He cautions parents about any material published by WORD, INC., and urges them to examine everything with extreme care. Even with Christian programming, make sure the material reflects your beliefs. Just because they are published under a Christian label does not make them Christian.

The argument that TV does not severly impact the minds of viewers can be readily debated. According to a recent government survey, children start imitating what they see on TV as early as 14 months of age. We have recently curtailed "Ninja Turtles" at our elementary school due to injuries resulting from playing out the charac-

ters. The children were simply imitating what they had seen on the screen.

Another student, age eight, made some horrible statements as to what he would like to do to me and my husband, Jay. I could not believe these words were coming from a child's mouth. In conference with the parents, we found he was quoting verbatim from a recent movie he had watched. He had become angry with me and imitated what he had recently seen on TV. The parent commented: "I didn't think he was listening..." I'm only thankful he only verbalized what he had seen rather than act it out.

What is the danger of this bombardment? I'm sure most of you have heard the tale of the frog and the pan of water. When placed in boiling water, the frog immediately sprang out of the pan. But when placed in warm water, with the fire turned on low, the change was less noticeable and the frog was cooked before he recognized what was taking place. This illustrates what is happening with America's children. They are slowly, but surely, being immersed in New Age philosophy. The heat is on, and if parents do not become aware and speak out, these children will be "cooked" before reaching adulthood, being polluted by the lies of the New Age.

WHAT CAN PARENTS DO?

- Educate yourself on New Age terms and concepts. (You don't need to become an expert, just familiarize yourself with the basics.)
- Monitor your child's TV viewing. Don't assume that because it is a cartoon or a kid's show that it is O.K.
- 3. Talk to your child about fantasy and reality.
- 4. Teach your older children about what to look for.
- 5. Most importantly, use God's yardstick to decide what's suitable for viewing. If we would be ashamed to have Jesus sitting beside us while viewing something, it most likely is not fit for watching. Instead, feed your mind with "whatsoever things are TRUE, whatsoever things are HONEST, whatsoever things are PURE, whatsoever things are LOVELY, whatsoever things are a GOOD REPORT; if there be any VIRTUE, and if there be any PRAISE, think of these things" (Phil. 4:8).

SUMMARY

In the past few months I have

attempted to discuss the far-reaching effects of the New Age movement and its comprehensive attack on many of the highest values of both the Christian Church and Western Culture. The examples that have been cited are not isolated cases. On the contrary, New Age philosophy can be seen from greeting cards to Sunday School curriculum. According to the late Dr. Francis Schaeffer, "those who embrace the humanist world view virtually control the general or popular consensus in our society, much of the media, much of what is taught in our public schools, and much of the arbitrary law being produced by various departments of government.'

It is increasingly apparent that the goal to change our children's values from traditional values of home, family, and church is becoming a reality. It is evident that the moral conscience of American society has been steadily declining. A major contributor to this decline has been the subtle, steady propagation of New Age ideas.

The battle to gain control of people's minds is raging and the stakes are high. There are millions of children that are being innocently taken in by this deception. As Christians, we need to do the following:

EDUCATE ourselves with Biblical truths. **EXPOSE** Satan's lies and deceptions. **EQUIP** both ourselves and our children with the proper armor.

EVALUATE all curriculum, toys, TV programs, movies, etc.

ENCOURAGE other parents and fellow believers to stand fast.

EVANGELIZE the world with the Gospel truth.


