20th ANNIVERSARY AND HOMECOMING AT SOUTH FREMONT — Sunday, June 30, 1991, was a special day for the South Fremont Free Will Baptist Church in Springfield, Missouri. The church observed its 20th Anniversary and Homecoming. Rev. Dale Skiles, pastor of the church, gave a warm welcome to the 185 members and friends gathered for the special occasion. There were 45 charter members present. He recognized several former members of the church, who came from several states: New Mexico, Oklahoma, Tennessee, and Texas. Rev. Bill Adkisson, a former pastor, was introduced. He brought greetings and thanks for the privilege of serving the church. Special guests were recognized from the Springfield Police and Sheriff Departments. Rev. Clarence Burton, State Executive Secretary, delivered a challenging message.

A brief history of the church is as follows: It was organized on June 27, 1971, under the leadership of the first pastor, Rev. Bill Adkisson. The first unit of the present building was erected and dedicated in 1972. Brother Adkisson resigned the pastorate in the fall of 1972 and Rev. Wayne Wagner was elected the pastor in January 1973. During Brother Wagner's pastorate the present sanctuary was built and dedicated in 1974. Brother Wagner resigned in January 1981.

On May, 1981, Rev. Dale Skiles was elected as pastor. During his pastorate the auditorium has been enlarged to accommodate a choir loft and a new wing added, which provides additional Sunday School space. Also, a lot adjacent to the Parking Lot has been purchased for

possible building expansion or added recreational area. The pastor stated at the Morning Worship, "It has been and it is a real joy to serve this fine group of Christian people."

The church provided a delicious noon meal with very accommodating facilities. It was served on the grounds with a "relaxed picnic atmosphere." Homemade ice cream was served in the afternoon. Everyone did an excellent job in planning and caring for the special day. Someone said, and expressed the feeling of everyone, "This has been a wonderful day!"

Information Concerning Missouri State Retirement Program

NOTE FROM EXECUTIVE SECRETARY: Following the State Convention, I mailed information to the ones I thought wanted it. It was more complete than this that I am giving in the GEM. But space, in the GEM, will not permit giving all the information. As I have stated at the end of this article, do not hesitate to call, write, or come by. I will be more than glad to help.

In order for a pastor, associate pastor, or full-time youth minister to participate in the Retirement Program, the church he is serving must support the Missouri State Cooperative Program with the full 10% of its regular tithes and offerings. As is shown in the cooperative disbursement each month, this ministry is funded through cooperative giving. (The associate pastor and/or full-time youth minister must receive his salary from the church as a full-time employee.)

A Retirement Pension Enrollment Form supplied by the State Office shows the two plans for participation in the program. Plan 1 is defined as Full Employer Participation with the church contributing at least 5% of the base salary.

Plan 2 is defined as the Individual Plan with the employer contributing at least 3% of the base salary. The term life insurance for \$25,000 is \$13.00 monthly for Plan 1, but optional for Plan 2. A \$10.00 Enrollment Fee is paid to the Board of Retirement & Insurance in Nashville, Tennessee. This may be paid through the State Office, but it goes to the Board of Retirement & Insurance.

Tax Deferred Contribution Information: Only 20% of base salary is allowed for total tax deferred contributions. The 20% includes both Salary Reduction Agreement (SRA) (this SRA form may be obtained from the State Office or the Board of Retirement & Insurance) and employer (church) contributions. Base salary is taxable income which excludes benefits such as housing allowance. Ministers may include compensation for honorariums, revival offerings, etc. Older ministers may, under certain circumstances, exceed the 20% by completing a form.

A new SRA may be filed once in any 12 month period. It is not retroactive. Increases may not be credited prior to the date of signature.

It is a member's responsibility to maintain and keep accurate records for tax liability and reports to IRS. It is recommended that you keep all SRA forms, semi-annual statements, and correspondence, and that you seek competent counsel in all tax matters.

All tax deferred contributions are subject to income taxes the year of withdrawal or distribution. Early withdrawals may be subject to an added 10% penalty. At retirement, distributions for ordained members may be designated housing allowance and tax free (determined by current IRS regularions). Distributions from tax deferred funds to unordained spouses are subject to taxes.

Twice each year, shortly following January 1 and July 1, the Board of Retirement & Insurance, who holds and handles the Missouri State Retirement Fund, will transer the amount stated by the Missouri State Association to the account of the participant. Presently the amount is \$240.00. Before this transfer is made the treasurer of the local church is asked to sign a form, sent from the State Office, stating that the church has supported the Missouri State Cooperative Program with the full 10% of its regular tithes and offerings.

There are several options at retirement. Space will not permit including all of this information. This information may be obtained from the State Office. Please do not hesitate to call, write, or come by for any help that is needed.


Her pastor, Rev. Ken Dodson, said she always had a smile and a word of encouragement for him, even when her body was filled with pain.

If you were selected as Miss Teen Missouri, what message would you have for other young people? This was the judge's determining question in the Miss Teen Missouri Pageant finals. However, before the five finalists could answer that question, they had to have successfully competed in the six catagories of judging, which included: Scholastic Record, Service and Achievement to School and Community, Personal Development of Talents, Hobbies and Skills, Written General Awareness Test, Personality Projection in formal wear, and Judges Interview.





The week of June 16-28 saw an estimated 450 teens and sponsors come and go at our Free Will Baptist State Youth Camp, near Niangua, Missouri. As Camp Evangelist for the two weeks, I was able to observe the dedicated work of sponsors, teachers, superintendent, and camp board. An evangelistic atmosphere was set by the classes, prayer meetings, music, and camp devotions. And, God blessed! The two weeks yielded 105 inquirers, 23 of these were first time decisions for salvation. Four were commitments to missions. One was in answer to the call to preach.

While I am rejoicing over the victories won, at the same time I am asking "How did it happen?" At first I thought it is just the response of

youth. But, I must be honest. Many of these young people came from our churches, where they did not respond, as they did at Youth Camp. No, it's more than just their age. Perhaps it is the atmosphere created by limiting worldly influence - no TV, radio, magazines, etc. And, increasing the campers exposure to the Word of God; class sessions, cabin devotions, and preaching every night.

If the atmosphere does have a direct bearing on the positive response witnessed at camp, I have an exciting thought in mind! What if we could bring together a couple hundred adults in a setting with limited worldly influence, and maximum exposure to the Word of God? That's worth pray-

ing about!













