

Report on Missouri State Association

The Lord blessed with another great State Association this year. It was well attended with an estimate of over 700 people who were in attendance. The congregational and special singing was beautiful, the preaching was great and the fellowship was sweet. With a combination like that, it surely can be said, "The Spirit of the Lord was in this place."

The preachers developed and preached their messages with power and persuasiveness - Rev. Jeffery Gaskins, "The War We Must Fight"; Rev. Wesley Rider, "The Will We Must Follow"; Rev. Sterl Paramore, "The Witness We Must Furnish"; and Rev. Charley Miller, "The Work We Must Finish." The moderator's message by Rev. Cody Freeman and the Devotional Messages by Rev. Gary Sheets and Rev. Boyce Williams laid a good foundation for the smooth morning and afternoon business sessions.

Rev. Jerry Pilgrim and Rev. David Bates with the musicians, Marian Pilgrim, David & Stephanie Brawley, Teresa Dixon, and Rev. Gene Howell did a wonderful job with the congregational singing, and their special touch of special singing. A special thanks goes to the Keith Family, The Calvarymen, the Lewis Family & Glen, Debbie Beck and the Young Ministers Quartet. They did a great job and added much to the effectiveness of the services.

The Woman's Auxiliary Convention on Tuesday had a special treat with Missionaries Steve and Judy Lytle giving the Morning Devotion and the Morning Message. It is always a thrill to see and hear our missionaries. This meeting seems to always go well. The women have so much talent and they always emphasize the purpose of the organization - missions. What a blessing the Woman's Auxiliary has been and is to our Free Will Baptist denomination.

The reports given by the Standing Boards of the State Association reflect that the Lord is blessing each ministry, and there are goals to reach and visions to fulfill as we labor together for the cause of Christ.

In my report I stated that Missouri Free Will Baptists gave approximately \$700,000.00 for ministries outside the local church in 1991. Cooperative Giving has gone up each year and I believe that it is stronger now than ever before. It is my opinion that it will continue to increase. The State Association adopted a plan for assuming our share for the cost of the National Office Building in Antioch, Tennessee. (This is a suburb of Nashville.) This year, and only this year, 5% of cooperative disbursements will go towards our allocation (approximately \$37,000). The balance will be allocated to the local churches, through the District Associations. This, hopefully, will be raised by 1994. The 5% cooperative allocation will go back to the Conference Center Fund in 1993. (This was a promise and I am sure that it will be honored.)

In this report I must express my personal appreciation for the honor shown to Vivian and me on Wednesday evening for our seventeen years of service to the Missouri State Association. It was overwhelming! The Love Offering given by churches/associations and individuals to us, plus the offering given to Vivian from the State Woman's Auxiliary, was more than wonderful. (The total amount will be given at a later date. There were some who said they failed to get their love offering in on time.) This Love Offering, plus the Roses from the Greater Kansas City Association, given as something extra, was marvelous. Also, the prolonged Standing Applause by those who filled the Community Center, was unforgetable. There is no way of adequately expressing our full gratitude for what the Executive Committee initiated and the beautiful and wonderful response given by our people. I can only say, "We thank God for you, and for every remembrance of you."



Points for Pastors

How do you preserve your catch? One, be as sure as possible they are really caught. Two, have an active follow-up discipleship program. And three, use powerful pastoral preaching.

What kind of preaching helps preserve the catch? First, it must be interesting. Second, it must be biblical. Third, it must be pertinent. Fourth, it must be understandable.

There are six purposes for pastoral preaching. One, to build doctrinal knowledge. The force and power of the pulpit must be to reinforce the new converts understanding of doctrine that has been taught in follow-up

and in the classroom. Two, sermons that build personal purity in thought, action, and knowledge are necessary. Three, sermons that increase Bible confidence are essential. As the pastor preaches, the power of his preaching will teach and increase the knowledge of his parishioners. Four, sermons that build church loyalty are the obligation of the pastor. Five, sermons that build spiritual assurance must be high on the pastor's priority list. Six, sermons that build denominational commitment are a must for the pastor.

The pulpit is a powerful tool for building up the new convert. They will listen more, believe more, and follow more the teaching and preaching of the pastor. He can use the pulpit for all these things. If he is faithful in his preaching, and establishes a follow-up program as well as a thriving Sunday School, he can be assured of providing a means of preserving his catch.

Murfreesboro Road Property Sold

ANTIOCH, TN — The Free Will Baptist National Offices property at 1134 Murfreesboro Road in Nashville was sold May 21, 1992, to a local business, AC Service and Installation, Inc., according to Executive Secretary Melvin Worthington. The \$725,000 purchase price will be paid in 60 monthly installments of \$8,400 beginning August 15, 1992. On August 15, 1997, the unpaid balance of \$403.160 will be due. Interest rate over the term of the contract will be 6.3 percent.

The National Offices relocated from Nashville to Antioch in August 1991 after more than 25 years at the 4.5 acre Murfreesboro Road location.

Free Will Baptist History

In November 1775, Benjamin Randall enlisted in the militia as an assistant commissary, and then afterwards he enlisted as a sergeant under Captain Calf. He stated that he never felt closer to God than while he was a soldier.

Also, around this same time, as he studied the Scriptures very diligently, he came to the conclusion that 'believer's baptism' was the only proper form. This excluded in his mind the practice of sprinkling infants for baptism. After coming to this conclusion, Randall knew that he would be at odds with the majority of people, especially the clergy.

He speaks of this doctrinal transformation in these words, "Although it was like taking away a right hand, to give it up yet I dared not to hold it while I found not a 'Thus saith the Lord' for it." He was convinced that sprinkling was only a tradition and was not authorized by Christ or His apostles.

Today, we may not grasp the emotion felt by Randall in changing his doctrinal view. We may be too far removed, by the decades, to know of the uncertainty and excitement of the years surrounding the American Revolution and the Great Awakenings. We may not even have an understanding of the spiritual and religious environment that surrounded him to appreciate this development. Yet we know this - that Benjamin Randall had a great desire to be led by God. He also had an enthusiastic appetite for the Word of God and a strong will to live out the consequences of both.







NASHVILLE, TN — Dr. Vernon Whaley will return to Free Will Baptist Bible College this fall to head the Music Department, according to Dr. Robert Picirilli, Academic Dean. He will be joined by Jerry Carraway, a 1984 FWBBC graduate.

Dr. Whaley is bringing with him a six-year proposal for expanding FWBBC's Music Department. It includes offering new programs and enlarging the faculty. His goal is to assure that the college will play a leadership role in the denomination's musical training. He has also mapped an aggressive strategy for recruiting talented Free Will Baptist young people for a music ministry.
