The pastor of the church had resigned earlier and had preached his last sermon the night of the fire. Pray for the church as they rebuild and as they call a new pastor.

The Victory Free Will Baptist Church in Kansas City was set fire by an arsonist on Wednesday night September 9, or early Thursday morning, September 10. Gasoline was poured under the doors and ignited. Pastor Mark Braisher found the fire still smouldering and the church filled with smoke when he arrived Thursday morning. Brother Mark says that God intervened, because the fire had gone out. Otherwise the building would have been destroyed.





Gems From The Past

EDITOR'S NOTE: GEMS From The Past is a new addition to the GEM. It will feature unedited articles and news bits from the oldest GEMS in the State archives. We hope you enjoy it.

September, 1942, Free Will Baptist Gem Missionary Department Rev. Winford Davis, Chair.-Treas. National Board Monett, Missouri

Jaruco, Cuba — July 27, 1942

Dear Bro. Davis:

I feel I must write you at once and tell you all the abounding good news. We organized the first Free Will Baptist Church in Cuba Saturday, July 25, 1942. A great company of people walked three miles singing as they went, and while they sang on the bank I baptized 26 people. The first to be baptized was our son, Tommy, and what shouting and singing we had. All of our workers except Cela, Pedro's wife, were there with us.

Two of our young local preachers had gotten up at 4:00 o'clock in the morning and rode to the American Encampment where I am serving as chaplain, and we returned, a two and one-half hour horseback ride. (I will finish about the chaplancy later.)

Returning, we met at our usual meeting place in Sabalo, and I read the Discipline of the Free Will Baptist Church following the procedure for the organization. We chose one deacon, appointed the regular officers, and received into membership in the first Free Will Baptist Church in the Island of Cuba 45 charter members. I still have in that place 20 more to baptize. That night we returned to San Juan (St. John) and preached there. Sunday morning at 9:30 another large company went to the river where I buried in the waters of baptism 20 believers. Returning to the chapel we organized with a membership of 36 there, dedicating two deacons who are very active and forceful preachers of the Word. I shall have each of them to write of their conversion.

The movement is a real revival. I have never heard such joyful singing or firm declarations as these to follow the Lord. I wished for the presence of our deputation party of last winter in these two meeting.

Now I want to tell you something of the way God led me to the camp. I first met a fine sailor boy coming from Sabalo on the train. I told him who I was and he gripped my hand with joy and said, "I have been praying to meet someone like you. We need you at the Camp." I left the affair with him to see the commander. Not hearing from him I went on to the camp and was received by the Post Doctor, the officers and the chief like a long lost brother and installed as Chaplain with a war buggy at my command to meet and take me to the station. One could not be treated better, and rather than interfere with my work it gives me added prestige with the Cubans.

Fred, the Christian sailor, was with us all day at the baptizing Sunday and received a real blessing. The church at Sabalo is a two and one-half hour ride on horseback from the camp. I am starting a Sunday School next Sunday morning. I have already encountered about six Christians or members of churches. I felt it was my duty as an American to place myself at their disposal, and am sure it will meet with the approval of our people.

I must write you something of the needs of our work:

First, there are, as we stated, three chapels to build. One at Sabalo, one at San Juan, and one at Saint Andrews. Our plan is to build simple building of the native building material they have on hand. Practically all of which will be donated, together with the labor. Of course, we will have to buy the nails and planks for seats.

Our two deacons at San Juan, who are railroad men, have a vacation and have offered to take their vacation and dedicate it to the building of the chapel. We may have to spend \$50.00 on this chapel. I told them to go ahead the first of August.

The chapel at San Juan will possibly cost us more, perhaps in the neighborhood of \$100.00. The same deacons and members will build that one.

The chapel at Saint Andrews will be at a cost of about

\$50.00, and they are ready to build.

Port Hope has opened for us. We can rent a house for \$7.00 per month; with lights and water about \$10.00 per month. Pedro and Rufino will handle this. The cost of sufficient furniture and benches will be about \$30.00 I shall visit there about the first of August to arrange that.

Blass Serrano, another worker, who will be with us the first of the month. Luis Diaz must have his tonsils removed. He is suffering but still preaching in seven places each week, and there are seven more to enter. Blass will take his place for about a half month, and I will be assisting all of them. Our next GREAT need is the Bible School. There are at least 15 students who want to start this year. The best plan is for us to find a small farm which will be our center of operation. I have in mind now four small farms:

- 1. A one horse farm called one caballeria in acres. I can't tell you how much it is. The cost of this is \$1,000.00.
- 2. This has more than one caballeria, 600 palm trees which are valuable, and has also other fruit. The man is asking \$4,000.00.
- 3. One caballeria with two teams of oxen, a cow, a horse, and two houses. The cost of this is \$2,000.00.
- 4. A much smaller piece of land; but a much better center for our work, especially for conventions, three houses livable, and all the water we want piped in, and close to electricity. The others have neither of these advantages. This is located close to our work. The price is \$900.00.

I do not know what terms we might make but \$1,000.00 in cash would speak big if I had it on hand. If it is possible to get that amount we would save a lot if Mrs. Willey could bring it over as she returns to Cuba from the National Association.

We are fully determined by the grace and aid of God to start the school; starting with at least ten or fifteen students.

We now have besides Pedro Oliva, Santiago Delgado, Luis Diaz, Blass Serrano, and Cela as regular full-time workers, also four lay workers who can fill positions of importance.

Praise the Lord for the way God is working. Luis Diaz is walking in the Heavenlies.

I am rejoicing in the result of the conference. Thank you for the good and welcomed check. Praise Him.

Mrs. Willey writes that some money came in designated for horses and saddles. We understand Bro. Griffin is buying a horse and saddle, and that Bro. and Sister Sasser are buying a horse. Praise the Lord for it all. (Note added

by Winford Davis — Mr. Will Price is also buying a horse.)

I am thinking if I can I might make a deal on one of these properties. I am convinced this is the center for us to concentrate upon. We shall go into it with prayer, thought and much council.

I am returning this Thursday to camp, and to visit the new point at Port Hope.

Looking Out My Parsonage Window

Overcrowded lives — stressed parents, hurried children...Does this sound familiar? Too many families are on a fast-paced treadmill and can't seem to find a stopping place.

Consequently, many of our children lack what they need most — parents' time and attention. According to Cheri Fuller, "the average child, even in a two parent home, gets about eight minutes of one-to-one time per week from either parent, and the great majority of that time is spent sending negative messages." How does your one-on-one time compare with this national average???

As a parent, even if we are on a fast track, we can help our children keep academics in the proper perspective. Here are a few tips:

- 1. Don't just assume homework is finished. Ask to see it. Check over it.
- 2. Set a time for homework, possibly the same time each day.
- 3. Be available to help your child with homework. Listen to him/her read as you are cooking supper, folding laundry, etc. (I'm amazed at how many parents send their first grader to the bedroom to practice reading!
- Use travel time productively. I sometimes quiz my daughter on the way to school.
- 5. Attend parent/teacher conferences. Stay informed about your child's progress. If you have a question, call the teacher. We appreciate interested parents.
- Encourage recreational reading.
 Our daughter reads every night just before bedtime.
- 7. At test time spend a few minutes and study with your child. You'd be amazed how few children know how to study for a test.
- 8. Be interested. Don't be a part of the light minute one-to-one statistic. Spend quality time with your child. It will make a difference in their education.

Abusive Use Of Tax Dollars

The following article was prepared from material published by Donald E. Wildmon of the American Family Association which promotes positive values to undergird our society. Dr. Wildmon's organization targets one particular project for involvement each month. September focused on the abusive use of federal tax dollars to produce and air TV programs which promote the homosexual lifestyle as well as programs which advance the liberal, left-wing political agenda and censor traditional, pro-family views:

Two federally funded television networks are blatantly guilty of promoting and condoning homosexuality, political left-wing programming and censorship of traditional conservative values. They are The Corporation for Public Broadcasting (CPB) and The Public Broadcasting Service (PBS). The Independent Television Service (ITVS), which was created to provide free films to PBS, has adopted the same philosophy.

Examples of pro-homosexual propaganda produced and aired by PBS include "Protrait of a Marriage," a presentation about two lesbians. For the first time ever PBS showed scenes of explicit, nude lesbian lovemaking. "In the Life," by PBS, is an hour long gay variety show. "The Lost Language of Cranes" is a story of Owen Benjamin and his son Phillip as they "come out" to proclaim their homosexuality. Throughout the film the men are clearly to be admired and lauded for their homosexual lifestyle. "Behind Censorship" is an NEA-funded series which includes programs on homosuxual "oppression."

"Anthem" is an eight-minute "erotic piece" produced by Marlon Riggs who is Homosexual and HIV-positive. It is scheduled for New York PBS station WNET. Riggs has also produced a film, "Tongues United," which was so offensive that over 200 PBS stations refused to air it because of the vulgar content and explicit street language for sexual terms. Riggs sums up his philosophy behind these films as prompted by CPB and PBS, "Our collective struggle . . . is to fundamentally redefine the dominant political and media discourse."

The Independent Television Service recently gave \$70,000 toward the making of "Out Here." This forthcoming film by Ellen Spiro is a tour of gay and lesbian lifestyles in the South.

Many programs also promote the liberal, left-wing political agenda. PBS Federal Frontline is guilty of presenting only the left side of political issues. For example, "After the Warning" was presented as a scientific program about the Greenhouse effect. The program stated that half of Florida would eventually be submerged in water and 20 million people would die of starvation and floods. PBS refused to carry "The Greenhouse Conspiracy" which presented the other side of the issue. It is a matter of record that the number of programs on the PBS series "Point of View" dealing with the struggle for freedom in the Soviet bloc during the years 1989-1991 was 0. The number of interviews with anti-communist dissidents on "Bill Moyers World of Ideas" during 1989-1990 was also 0.

One of the worst examples of anti-family fare sponsored with the tax dollars was "What Kids Want to Know About Sex and Growing Up." Produced by the Children's Television Workshop and broadcast on PBS stations in


May, the show is an attack on traditional family values in the guise of a pseudoscientific presentation. Among other things, homosexuality is presented as being equal to heterosexuality.

At a time when your federal government is \$4 trillion in debt, Congress appropriated \$24 million to set up the Independent Television Service (ITVS) to provide free television programs to PBS. This piece of government bureaucracy was a direct result of lobbying by those who eventually ended up on the ITVS board of directors. In its first two years ITVS spent \$1,840,000 on administrative expenses alone!

Congress recently voted to increase funding for CPB to \$1.1 billion. George Will said, "Public Television is a paradigm of America's welfare state gone awry. It is another middle class — actually, upper class — entitlement. If you doubt the entitlement mentality of the public television lobby, hear its indignant rhetoric equating any questioning of their subsidy with censorship. The public television lobby consists disproportionately of people with the financial and educational means to provide their own entertainment, but who have the political competence to bend public power to their private advantage."

This congressional appropriation will help PBS stations pay their people well. Lester Crystal, director of PBS station WNET, earns \$304,000, while stagehand R. Bowman earns \$103,290. In comparison, President Bush earns \$200,000 and Congressmen earn \$125,000.

It is time to end all tax support for CPB, PBS and ITVS. Taxpayers should not be forced to pay for their prohomosexual, left-wing political agenda.


"Where's this picture?" the young friend asked, pointing to the blank space.






