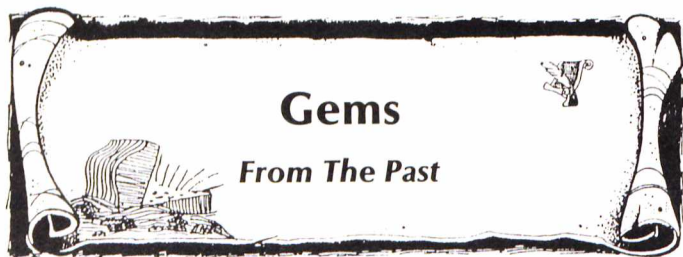

"How Much Owest Thou Unto My Lord?" Luke 16:57

I am alarmed at the increasing number of people who, when asked to do something in the service of the Master, state flatly they either are not interested or, would rather you would ask some one else, "They can do it better than I." Friends, modesty is a virtue but when it is used as a cover for neglect and carelessness it ceases to be a virtue and becomes a stumbling block to the progress of the Cause of Christ.

Salvation is by faith, but the rewards of the coming King will be according to our works. With this thought in mind then what reward do you expect to get? It will be in exact proportion to what you have given.

Do you remember the story of the little boy who observed his father, the preacher, put fifty cents in the collection plate. While on the way home the boy asked his father how much he had received and the father said, "Fifty cents." To which the boy replied, "Well Dad, if you had put more in, you would have gotten more out."

Friends, there are certain things we owe to our God. I think the first thing we owe to our God is love. "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish but have everlasting life." John 3:16. If God so loved us to give unto us Jesus, surely we owe Him our love. Doubly so if we have been redeemed by the precious blood of this same Son.

In the parable of the householder demanding fruit from his vineyard as recorded in the 21st chapter of Matt. He admonishes us to reverence His Son. In chapter 22:37 He says, "...Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind." I am persuaded to believe he meant all when He said all. He goes on then in vs. 38 and 39 to say, "This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like unto it, Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself." The extent of our love for our neighbor will be governed by our obedience to v. 37.

We owe our time to God. "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow me," Luke 9:23. Our sinful self always is with the chief priest and the elders in rejecting Christ. But self must be denied if we are to follow Him. In the eyes of the world, the Cross of Christ will always be a shameful thing, but God forbid that we should glory, save in the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ. This cross of discipleship is not thrust upon us but we are to take it up daily. Too, it is absolutely necessary to a life of fellowship with him. II Tim. 2:11, 12.

We owe our service to God. Again, I refer you to Luke

9:23. Further, in verse 24, He says, "For whosoever will save his life shall lose it: but whosoever will lose his life for my sake, the same shall save it." This losing our life by saving it and saving our life by losing it, is a mystery to all the strangers of God's Grace. The life that is spent in the service of Christ is a saved life; the life that is spent for self is a lost life. We may have a saved soul by trusting the cross of Christ, but our lives be lost by not acknowledging Him also as our Lord, our Master.

We owe our money to God. "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store, as God hath prospered him, that there be no gatherings when I come." I Cor. 16:2. In this verse Paul is teaching that God's plan of finance for the church is a regular, worshipful, personal, proportionate plan for every one. It is also preventive, for he says, "that there be no gatherings when I come." How easy it is to become covetous for more money when we have some laid by; how easy it is to become highminded when the bank balance is high. I believe that this is partly what is wrong with our people today. They are making too much money for their own good. The title of this article asks, "How much owest thou unto my Lord?" I am happy to give you God's answer, one tenth of all that God has prospered you with. Money, fruit, crops, whatever it is, one tenth belongs to God. You owe Him that. More than this, the free-will offering. Mal. 3:10, "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me how herewith saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it."

The world is asking, "What is the matter with the churches today?" The answer is to be found in the title question of this article. Too many have been disobedient and as a result, the storehouse has been neglected, left to shift for itself and the souls of men are now begging for bread.

Friends, God's power is not diminished, but too many will not let God work through them to reach a lost world.

In closing I want to bring one more thing to your attention. We owe ourselves to God. In the parable of the ten pounds as told in Luke 19:16-24, He is teaching us that there are three classes of servants represented here. They all had the same gift; the same possibilities were in the reach of each. The first servant had great faith and gained ten pounds. The second had little faith and gained five pounds. The third had no faith and gained only the reproach of his Master. The application is most plain. Every believer in the Lord Jesus Christ has the gift of the Holy Ghost and in the strength and power of this Divine gift can do something for his Lord. God does not ask us to work for Him in our own strength. If you are trying to do this, work in your own weak way, as I've heard so many say, that is what is wrong. Go in the power of God and the results will surprise you.

Answer for yourself, "How much owest thou unto my Lord?" I've tried to bring some facts to your attention. I trust God to use this to His glory, but I want to close this little article by quoting Romans 12:1, "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service."

In Tribute To Rev. Joe Braddy

Funeral services were conducted January 23, 1993, for the Rev. Joe Braddy, Pastor of the First Free Will Baptist Church of Fredericktown and Assistant Moderator of the Missouri State Association. The 52-year-old pastor died in an automobile accident January 20, 1993. According to the highway patrol, the driver of a pickup truck failed to stop at a stop sign and struck Pastor Braddy's car on the driver's side.

During his 30 year ministry, Brother Braddy pastored churches in Oklahoma, Arkansas, Iowa, and Missouri. In Missouri he pastored the First Free Will Baptist Church of Fredericktown and the First Free Will Baptist Church of Lebanon. He was serving as pastor of the Fredericktown church for the second time. Brother Joe was actively

involved in the work of the Missouri State Association. He twice served as Clerk, and he served on the General Board and the Executive Committee. At the time of his death he was the Assistant Moderator. He will be remembered for his work in designing and helping to establish the Missouri Retirement Program for pastors.

Approximately one thousand people attended the visitation on Friday evening to pay their respects. On Saturday the church was filled and overflowing as the Rev. Clarence Burton and the Rev. Nathan Ruble shared Scripture and memories of their association with Joe. A large crowd gathered in the rain late Saturday evening for the committal service in Green Forest, Arkansas.

Reverend Braddy was born in Green Forest, Arkansas, on December 8, 1940. He was a graduate of Oklahoma State University and served six years in the U.S. armed forces. He is survived by his wife Patsy; two sons, Christopher and Kurtis; one daughter, Mrs. Pamela Hedgpeth; two granddaughters, Chesalea Braddy and Jennifer Hedgpeth; one great-grandson, Kyle Hedgpeth; and three sisters.

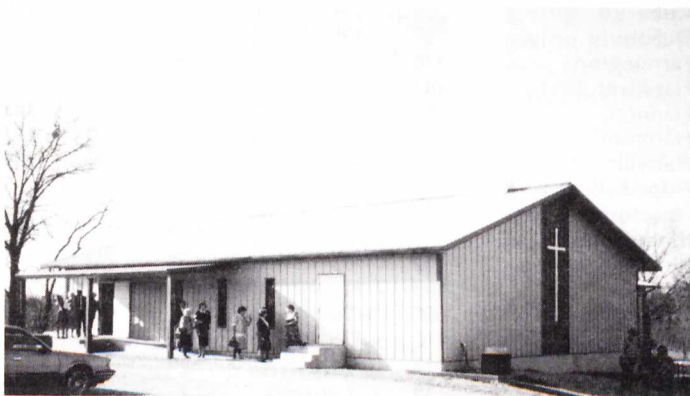
The Reverend Joe Braddy will be missed by his family, his church, and his denomination. He was a loving and compassionate man of God.

1992 brought a great deal of growth to the Children's Home. With the opening of the Sibling Home in October, we are now caring for 51 children which is up from 18 children in 1990. As well as having five residential cottages, we operate the only Emergency Shelter in all of Greene County which is one of only 20 Emergency Shelters in Tennessee.

Along with children from over 20 counties in Tennessee, last year the Home also helped meet the needs of youth from Michigan, Oklahoma, and Ohio. In 1992 the Emergency Shelter served over 141 children from 4 different states. We were able to place 27 of these children in the family environment of our cottages at the Home.

The Home is able to minister to these children only because of the donations received from the Mother's Day Offering. In spite of our growth, we had to turn away over 40 children this past fall simply because we did not have room and in 1993 we have already had to turn away children from our Emergency Shelter. This year, \$50,000 is needed to support the Emergency Shelter. HERE'S HOW YOU CAN HELP:

The attendance goal for that exciting day is 270,000 in the churches of the National Association of Free Will Baptists. That day is also the final Sunday of the Sunday School Department's Spring Enlargement Campaign. Bible College's Spring Enrollment Exceeds Fall's

NASHVILLE, TENNESSEE — an exceptional surge in spring student enrollment drove the total to 322 at Free Will Baptist Bible College.

In January, the college enrolled 300 regular students, exactly equaling the first semester enrollment. Then 22 more students enrolled for a special night course. Most of these were area pastors and music directors. They brought the spring semester total to 322.

Last year the college picked up nine students for second semester. This year the number added was 24, up by 167%!

Significant growth was seen in the numbers of students from Tennessee (41%), Virginia (50%), California (67%), Texas (67%), Florida (67%), and Kentucky (80%). Dr. Hampton says, "We thank the Lord for a net increase of 41 students over last spring and for the significant state growths."

The total number of students enrolled for the year is 343, not counting the 22 night course students — an increase of 12% over the 307 who enrolled in 1991-91.

Hillsdale Continues To Struggle With The Bureaucracy

Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College continues in its struggle with governmental and bureaucratic policies. The new policy by the HEA has placed the Title IV funds in jeopardy. It is essential that Hillsdale College satisfy the Oklahoma Board of Regents and through this the Accrediting Committee in order for this funding to be continued. Presently, Hillsdale is in this process.

The favorable response to President Shepherd's appeal for funds was \$215,000.00, as of December 31, 1992. It is anticipated that the total 'Have A Heart' fund will reach upwards of \$350,000.00. The Lord has truly blessed and surely our hearts rejoice for that which He has done through His people, the alumni, and friends of Hillsdale.

Because of pressure that has been placed on Hillsdale it has had a negative affect on recruitment and obviously the enrollment. But the second semester reflects a very encouraging enrollment picture.

An update for the second semester comes from the Vice President Of Academic Affairs, Tim Eaton. "At present the enrollment stands at 120, with 51 students in the dorm....". This is a very favorable enrollment considering the circumstances under which Hillsdale has been laboring.

Surely we can claim this fact and promise "Now unto Him that is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us." (Eph. 3:20)

Please continue to remember Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College in your prayers. For God is able to direct minds and change hearts, even in governmental affairs, that these critical needs can be met.

In 1992, a national magazine did a survey on the topic of school prayer. To those who believed that only ultra-conservative "Bible-thumpers" think students deserve the right to pray openly in a classroom, the results may be surprising.

By making ourselves heard and taking back the schools, we can give God His rightful place and see Him heal our schools, thus, future generations.

Marriage vs. Divorce

Part I

"What therefore God hath joined together let not man put asunder."

Matthew 19:6

In 1986, about 2.4 million people in the United States were married and 1.16 million people became divorced (Craig, 1992). In other words, almost half as many people divorced each other as married in 1986. Divorce appears to be an accepted practice of this generation, and almost every family has been touched by it. The real tragedy is that too many of these hurting marriages involve Christians. This raises the question...Why???

This is a complex question and of course there are no simple answers, but one explanation might be that too many couples today enter marriage as a "maybe" proposition — maybe it'll work, maybe it won't. The vows are not entered into with the seriousness God intended.

Another explanation could be that too often our young people rely on unrealistic myths of marriage. Many dream of meeting someone of the opposite sex, falling in love, marrying and living happily ever after. But, this kind of relationship rarely just happens. Few couples enter marriage with exactly the same set of expectations. There are always differences. Much of what eventually becomes of the relationship — whether it is satisfying or frustrating, rewarding or confining — is determined by the couple's ability to resolve or reduce these differences. Some simply refuse to work out these differences. Couples have to place their commitment to marriage as a relationship in a priority position.

Another cause for divorce is the subtle drifting away from each other. According to some counselors, this has become the most common cause of marital failure among Christian couples. This cause will be discussed in Part 2.

Greetings from everyone at the Hannibal Free Will Baptist Church! It is a New Year and we are looking forward with anticipation to the good things the Lord has in store for us.

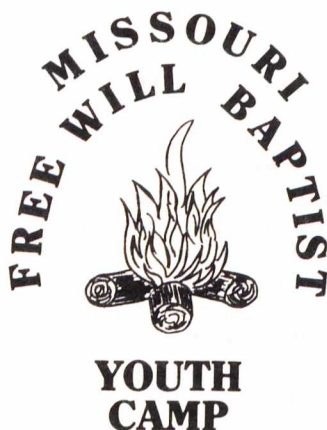
