

# Love For One Another The Mark Of A Christian

Jesus Christ told his disciples that they would be known for their outstanding distinctive love for each other. When Jesus knew that his arrest, trial and crucifixion were imminent, he shared some special instructions with his disciples, including, "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; as I have loved you, that you also love one another. By this all will know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another." (John 13:34-35 NKJV)

Charles Ryrie, Th.D., Ph.D., writes in the "Ryrie Study Bible": "Their mutual love would be the strongest possible argument for the Christian faith."

A person who is controlled by the Holy Spirit is enabled to live as Jesus commanded. In Ephesians 5:18, the Apostle Paul commands Christians to be "filled with the spirit." The Holy Spirit leads to self-control, joyful worship of God, and the mutual submission of Christians to one another in such relationships as local church membership, marriage, and parent and child.

In the forward of Francis Schaeffer's book "The Mark of a Christian," the editor of InterVarsity Press wrote: "Christians have not always presented a pretty picture to the world. Too often they have failed to show the beauty of love, the beauty of Christ, the holiness of God." Regarding Christian love, Schaeffer wrote: "We must include everyone who stands in the historic Biblical faith, whether or not he is a member of our own party or our own group."

How can you be spirit filled and demonstrate the quality of love of which Jesus spoke? A good place to start is to carefully read and meditate on the book of Ephesians found in the Bible or New Testament. The Apostle Paul discusses forgiveness of sin and being adopted as a child of God. Also, he wrote about making changes in one's life, becoming more like Jesus Christ in the way one thinks and lives.

Jesus Christ also affirmed that his followers should love "your neighbor as your self." (Luke 10:27 NKJV). Jesus responded with the story of a man who was mugged while walking along the trail from Jerusalem to Jericho. Two

religious leaders passed by the injured man without offering assistance. Along came a Samaritan man, culturally despised by the mainstream of society, who tenderly and lovingly cared for the wounded man's needs. The editors of the "Wesley Study Bible" wrote: "My neighbor is anyone in need whom I can help."

In his high priestly prayer, Jesus Christ gave another extremely strong charge for Christians to maintain a pure bond of love. "And the glory which You gave Me I have given them, that they may be one just as We are one: I in them, and You in Me; that they may be made perfect in one, and that the world may know that You have sent Me, and have loved them as You have loved Me." (John 17:22-23 NKJV). Love and unity of purpose is to be a convincing witness to the world that Jesus came from God.

In his book, "What's So Great About the Bible," James C. Hefley wrote: "This description of the early Christians was written in the ancient 'Epistle to Diognetus': 'They marry as do all; they beget children; but they do not commit abortion. They have a common table but not a common bed. They are in the flesh, but they do not live after the flesh. They pass their days on earth, but they are citizens of heaven. They obey the prescribed laws, and surpass the laws by their lives. They love all men, and are persecuted by all.' " I believe there are such Christians in our time. You can be one.

In order for love to demonstrate God at work in your life there must be practical applications, such as saying "Please forgive me," or "I forgive you." "Above all things, have intense and unfailing love for one another, for love covers a multitude of sins -- forgives and disregards the offenses of others." (I Peter 4:8 Amplified Bible)."

## A Tribute To Frances L. Bowman



For the past 25 years on Wednesday evenings at 7:30 p.m., one could enter Olivet Free Will Baptist Church in Marshall, Missouri, and be greeted with a hug from Sis. Frances Bowman. It was not uncommon for her to discern a troubled spirit or a burden that needed to be shared. Her office was always available to those who needed a word of encouragement from their pastor's companion, even on Wednesday nights. It was her practice, however, to be ready to step into a back

pew in time to hear the Word as her husband, Bro. Cliff Bowman,

ministered to his congregation.

Wednesday evening, April 21, 1993, was no different from any other Wednesday night. The day had been a joyous one. Sis. Bowman had participated in some of her favorite things: shopping for a new outfit for her dear sister-in-law who was soon to depart on a mission tour of the Philippines, witnessing to those she met along the way (this woman couldn't even stop at a rummage sale without sharing her testimony for the Lord with somebody!), preparing dinner for her family and friends, and now -- the highlight of her day -- going to church for the mid-week service. Oh, yes, it had been a wonderful day!

Bro. Bowman was just ready to announce the text of the evening's Bible study when he saw the office door open and its occupants enter the auditorium. As he read, his companion took her seat for the final time in this world. There could have been no more fitting place for the Angel of the Lord to tap this dear servant on the shoulder and say, "Come, it's time to go home!" She was in the place she loved the most, with the people she had loved as

family -- certainly, she had no regrets.

Frances LaVaughn Bowman was born in Allen, Nebraska, on December 24, 1921. She married Cliff Bowman on September 4, 1952. Their lives were blessed with two children, Dennis and Kathy. Sis. Bowman was ecstatic when Dennis and his wife, Jeannie, presented her with her first two grandsons, David and Stephen. Then, when Kathy and her husband, Gerald Daniel, produced another grandson, Chad, and her beautiful granddaughter, Melissa, her joy was beyond compare. She often remarked that if she had known how much fun grandchildren were, she would have had them first!

Frances was converted at an early age, but it was following the rededication of her life in September of 1956 that she felt a great burden for lost souls. Immediately, she and her recently converted husband became involved in the work of the Lord. They were instrumental in the organization of several Free Will Baptist churches in Missouri, including churches at Waynesville, Marshfield, Conway, and Marshall. Her fearless witness for the Lord was responsible for many conversions and changed lives.

The Youth Camp was a special love of Sis. Bowman. She served as a General Cabin Sponsor for a number of years in the 1960's and 1970's. Several fund-raising projects for the Youth Camp were successful due to her persistence and dedication to the cause. These projects include: the establishing of the Parrott Memorial First Aid Station; giving Youth Camp a "new face" through the remodeling of the tabernacle and the dining hall in the late '60's; the building of the laundry room which bears her

name; and several kitchen projects.

Sis. Bowman's heart beat for missions. She was involved in many projects for Missouri State FWB Home Missions. It was in her home that the Perpetual Loan Fund began. (This loan fund exists for the purpose of providing funds for establishing first-unit buildings for new missions works.) The initial contributions to this fund were made in the Fall of 1972 by Cliff & Frances Bowman and Harry & Lucille Beatty. The Woman's Auxiliary has had several projects through the years to support the loan fund. Now there is a statewide effort by the Woman's Auxiliary to make a

substantial contribution to the Perpetual Loan Fund in honor of Sis. Frances Bowman.

Sis. Bowman's love for children was obvious to all who knew her. She and Bro. Bowman raised several children in their home. All of the children at Kiddie Kare Kampus (a ministry of the Olivet FWB Church and of which Sis. Bowman was the director) called her "Grandma Bowman" whether they were at school, at church, or at the local grocery store. She figured people around town probably thought she had a large and varied family. For that matter, she did! Those she loved, she considered to be her family -- a family made by God. The special love of her last four years of life on this earth was Lucas Daniel Scott (better known amongst the preachers as the "Duke of Marshall"). There was no blood relationship, but Duke and his Dobie truly had a love connection.

Bro. Dennis Bowman had promised his mother at a very young age that he would preach at her funeral. This was her desire. Bro. Dale Skiles, who through many midnight hours had entertained his friend with guitar and song, now would fulfill his commitment to sing for her this one last time. Olivet FWB Church was filled to capacity with family and friends who came to pay a final tribute to Sis. Frances. How she would have loved to have seen all her dear ones gathered together to hear her beloved son

proclaim God's message!

Because of her many fund-raising efforts for our state works, Sis. Bowman was teased by one of her preacher friends. "When you die," he said, "your tombstone will read -- 'And the Beggar Died'." She laughed and laughed every time she told that story. But if she were here to tell it again, she would doubtless say one more time, "Please give to the Perpetual Loan Fund. Remember, you can never outgive God!"

The following is a copy of an article about Sis. Bowman which was printed in the "TV FOCUS" for the Marshall area. Waynelle Scott (who put together the information for "A Tribute to Frances L. Bowman") writes the "Timely Tidbits from Ellen" each week. Sis. Scott is a member of the Olivet FWB Church and is actively involved in the ministries of the church. She has taught in the Olivet Christian Academy and in the pre-school program, Kiddie Kare Kampus (of which Sis. Bowman was director), for the past eleven years.

### Timely Tidbits from Ellen

You may have seen us around town together. She loved to patronize the dress shops and children's shops on the square. The dress shops were visited in hopes of finding a bargain on a good quality dress or suit for herself or for one of her special friends. The children's shops were always included on any trip to the square because the "Duke of Marshall" had to be the best-dressed child in Missouri. Invariably, we would go by the pharmacy and see about picking up one of her collectible figurines.

Some days we missed the downtown area completely and went shopping on the other side of town; or, sometimes we got a newspaper and hit all the yard sales we could find (I say "we could find" because neither of us had any sense of direction -- we were like the blind leading the blind!). Wherever we went, one thing was for sure: her checkbook went with us. It was a huge checkbook, which made it hard to carry and shop at the same time. She would almost always ask permission to leave it at the counter until she was ready to pay for her selections.

A little over a week ago, my friend left this world behind. Never again will I be privileged to escort her to her favorite places. All of her "Dukie" stories will be entertaining heaven's forces in the days to come. She would have loved to have heard the exchange between the Duke and his "Poppie" two mornings following her death. They got into the car, and Dukie saw his "Dobie's" checkbook.

'Poppie!" he exclaimed, "Dobie forgot her checkbook."

"That's all right, Duke, where Dobie's gone she won't need her checkbook," Poppie replied.

"Poppie," his brown eyes were flashing, "Dobie always says, 'You don't take anything until you pay for it!'

Poppie was ready with the answer, "But, Dukie, Jesus has already paid for the way."

Nothing could be more perfect. She's found the greatest "bargain" ever made!














## Bible College Adds Youth Ministries Teacher
