How to Appreciate Your Pastor

Pastor Appreciation - it's a difficult subject. Should the church officially show appreciation to its pastor? After all, many people go to work every day without feeling any appreciation.

REWARDS

First, consider rewards. Sure, some employers do not go out of their way to show appreciation, but others reward employees that do a good job, usually with pay increases, benefit increases or bonuses of one kind or another. If we consider the pastor like any other employee, then perhaps consideration should be given for rewards when they are appropriate.

CALLING VS. OCCUPATION

Second, look at the pastor himself. Is the ministry just an occupation for him or is it a calling? If it is a calling (and most hold this opinion), the pastorate is more than a job; it is his life -- consuming a major part of his time, attention and heart.

Seldom does a pastor walk out of the office and really leave his job. If this is the case, within reason, shouldn't the reward be from the heart? Shouldn't appreciation be shown in more ways than just cut-and-dried procedure?

DISTANCE

Third, a pastor often lives miles from what used to be considered home. While this does happen in other occupations, if our theology is correct concerning a "call," then a pastor limits his personal choices and follows God. Being hours from his extended family, a pastor, especially one with a family of his own, really appreciates the extra love and care given to his family. The adopted aunts, uncles, moms, dads and grandparents can be a gift from God. Consider the distance that God has called your pastor.

WAYS TO APPRECIATE

Now, let's turn our thoughts to what pastors see as a show of appreciation.

Remember pastors are people, too. They have hobbies (or should); they have other interests (or should). One can show them appreciation the same way you would anyone else.

I asked over 100 randomly-selected pastors from across the denomination what made them feel appreciated. Here are their top responses:

- 1. For the church to show stronger commitment to service.
- 2. To have the church honor my weekly schedule and time.
- 3. The third highest response was a tie between Give increased vacation time and Give a love offering.
- 4. Other answers included give a gift and give a raise in salary.

CONSIDER A SABBATICAL

There were other areas mentioned in the survey that a church can do for their pastor to not only keep him happy but also benefit the church by having a more qualified pastor. One idea is to provide the pastor with a sabbatical. A sabbatical is something rare among Free Will Baptists, but not rare throughout the history of the church.

For years, and still in some parts of the country and in some denominations, a pastor was expected to fill the pulpit from September through May. A radical idea? Perhaps, but imagine the impact such a schedule would have on a pastor's preaching if he spent most of his time through the summer preparing sermons for the coming year. The power of such preparation may produce results unfathomed in your church.

So, you can't give up your pastor every summer? Try giving him up once every five to seven years for two to three months. Encourage him to spend that time in renewal and personal revival. Giving him this time with enough salary to provide for him and his family could do several things for him and your church.

It will probably lengthen his tenure at your church. It will allow him the refreshment and renewal to carry on with greater zeal and diligence. It would allow and encourage greater depth in his preaching, teaching and pastoral care.

"Why give the pastor a sabbatical; I don't get one on my job!" Good question, and the answer goes back to his being on call 24 hours a day, and the emotional and spiritual stress it places on him. A sabbatical will also help members of the church grow spiritually by expanding their personal ministries while the pastor is away.

CONTINUING EDUCATION

One final idea that will assist the church is continuing education. George Barna of the Barna Research Group was quoted in a January issue of the *National & International Religion Report:* "Many pastors are among the 'most occupationally frustrated people in America,' partly because 'the old strategies for ministry growth, and the usual assumptions about people's motivations, are no longer valid.' "

Your pastor needs to continually grow with the changes in the ministry. Allow him to do that while he serves you as pastor by instructing him to take the time and energies needed to attend quality classes, seminars and conferences that will instruct him how to better minister. In order to do this the church must assure him that it will assist by paying for educational events and by teaming with him in ministry to give him the necessary time to be part of these equipping events.

A learning pastor will be more creative, possess more depth, and will be more competent to handle the situations that your church will face in the years to come.

MAKE A CHOICE

So, it's about time for that traditional Pastor Appreciation Day in September. What will you and your church do? Whatever you do, make an intentional choice and remember that what you invest in you pastor will probably allow you to reap dividends in the success of your church. Your pastor will be happier, you will be happier, and God will receive the glory!

Convention Highlights

The Eightieth Session of the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists was hosted by the Greater Kansas City Association of Free Will Baptists June 7 - 10. Meetings were held at the Victory Free Will Baptist Church and the Winnetonka High School.

Great singing and preaching characterized the Convention. Four ministers -- Rev. Cody Freeman, Dr. Stephen Olford, Rev. Vernon Maggart, and Rev. Richard Robinson -- developed the theme of "Great Expectations." Each one did an outstanding job of expounding the Word of God.

During the Monday evening service, the Rev. Cody Freeman was presented a plaque in recognition of his service as Moderator of the State Association. Tuesday afternoon the Christian Education Board sponsored a seminar on Expository Preaching. Dr. Stephen Olford, president of Encounter Ministries, was the speaker. Wednesday evening the C. E. Board gave the Roll Call Sunday report and presented plaques to those churches which had the largest percentage of increase in attendance.

The State Officers -- Moderator Gary Fry, Clerk Rick Dablemont, and Assistant Clerk Bob Warner -- did a good job of leading the delegates and visitors through the business sessions. The reports of the State and National were received and budgets were approved. A 1994 Cooperative budget of \$342,000.00 was adopted.

The following resolutions were approved by the body:

- 1. Be it resolved, that we, the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists, go on record as fully supporting our covenant, Foreign Missions Department, and the Director and Staff. We also affirm our confidence in all of the Foreign Missionaries who presently serve and especially those from the state of Missouri. Be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be submitted to our National Foreign Missions Department.
- 2. Whereas we, as Free Will Baptists, believe it is the duty and role of men to provide for and protect our families, friends and nations when called upon to do so; and whereas women have always been viewed as the life givers (Not Takers), the weaker vessel, and preserver of what is good and right at home; be it resolved that we go on record as being opposed to women participating in military combat, the drafting of women for combat or military duty and the registration of women for combat or military duty. Be it resolved that a copy of this resolution be sent to President Bill Clinton and the Governor of Missouri.
- 3. Be it resolved that we go on record as being opposed to the lifting of the ban on homosexuals serving in the military. Be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be sent to President Bill Clinton and the Governor, Senators, and Representatives of the State of Missouri.
- 4. Be it resolved that we give the Greater Kansas City Quarterly Meeting, and especially Pastor Mark Brashier and the Victory Free Will Baptist Church, a hearty thank you for their Christian hospitality in hosting our Missouri State Association.

Rev. Gary Fry was reelected to lead the State as Moderator and the Rev. Ken Dodson was elected Assistant Moderator. Rev. Rick Dablemont was reelected to serve as Clerk as was his assistant, the Rev. Bob Warner.

The Woman's Auxiliary met on Tuesday and enjoyed Ron and Linda Moore's speaking. The same slate of officers was elected to serve for the coming year with Rose Mertz as president. The Auxiliary adopted the following mission projects:

- 1. Ron and Linda Moore...Ivory Coast, Africa...\$3,000.00
- 2. Terry and Ramona VanWinkle....Kansas....\$3,000.00
- 3. Missouri Visions....All State Missionaries....\$3,000.00

Our thanks is extended to all who had a part in making the State Convention a success. Thank you singers, presiders, speakers, ushers, and registration ladies. Our special thanks is extended to David and Stephanie Brawley, David Bates, and Jerry Pilgrim for working with the music; to Mark Brashier and Gene Howell for the many details they arranged; and to Victory Church for its gracious hospitality.

The 1994 Convention will be hosted by the Cave Springs Association in West Plains, Missouri, June 6-9.

He then recognized those who had helped in the building of the

parsonage. He gave special recognition to the material supplier, building committee, Deacons, Trustees, and the lead carpenter.

Following the special music the pastor introduced the Rev. Nathan Ruble, younger brother of the pastor, to preach the dedication message. He commended the church on its vision, faith and sacrifice, recalling that the church had built a new church facility valued at \$250,000.00 just a few years earlier and had paid for it in five years. With the same vision, faith and willingness to sacrifice, the church has undertaken another five year project.

Following the message a prayer of dedication was led by the pastor's older brother, Rev. Edward Ruble.

Pastor Ruble and his wife, Marcella, held an open house at the parsonage following the benediction. Everyone agreed that the house was beautifully done inside and out.

It is fair to say my heart was not purposely challenging the God whom I serve, but looking at circumstances my weak natural self did not understand. Call it lack of faith, weak Christianity or what you will; it happens to all of us at one time or another. Mostly because we are human, that's all. We have a tendency to believe once we have accepted Jesus Christ as Lord, our life will suddenly be grand and glorious. "When that doesn't happen, we freak. We found out eight days later that he had a very serious heart condition and was immediately flown to St. Louis to have surgery the very next day. We were told that Alex will have to have at least two more surgeries.

The sickness, the sorrow, and the pain in my daughter's eyes sometimes is just overwhelming. Again I find myself saying,


Contrary to the world's picture of Christianity, it is not for the weak and shallow. God requires discipline and strength -- obtained through learning to live with authority.






























All Boards Meeting -Preacher/Layman's Retreat September 20 & 21, 1993 YOUTH CAMP, NIANGUA

Ten years ago, the Bailey family landed in Tokyo, Japan, ready to embark on a mission: to represent Christ thru the Free Will Baptist Mission group. Since that time, we have endeavered to follow that goal, with your faithful prayers and support along the way.

Our first two years were spent in language school, then two years of working with the Adachi F.W.B. Church and the Iriso F.W.B. Church.

After a year of furlough in the U.S. during 1987-88, we returned to Tokyo, in September of 1988, to plant a church. However, God had different plans in mind for us.

Fred and Evelyn Hersey were serving at the Iriso F.W.B. Church, located in a suburb of Tokyo. When it was discovered that Evelyn had cancer, the Herseys returned to the U.S. in 1988, and we were asked to assume the responsibilities of the church. Since that time, we've had many blessings in the church. In the last two years alone, there have been four conversions, and this past year, four baptisms.

Last year, the church lost some long-time members. We basically began over again as a "new" church. Six of the original members still attend, but there are nine new people who have become members. There are unsaved people in every service -- an opportunity to witness for Christ! However, if we are asked to leave the field at the present time, there is no one to assume the leadership of the church -- no one to preach to these people who "drop into" the Sunday morning service.

Our account is currently over \$15,000 in the deficit. Our missions board has allowed us to stay on the field because there is **no one to take our place**. However, this must soon change and we will be asked to return to the States, unless we have YOUR help! You have always helped us in the past when we had a **special need**, and we are once again asking you to please give, so that we might continue our goal of winning the Japanese to Christ. Will you take a moment and pray about this need and do what you can to keep the Gospel before the Japanese people? If you can help in any way, please contact our mission office at 615-731-6812. Which Generation Are We As Free Will Baptists?

There have been only a couple of sermons in my life that have made a tremendous impact. One such sermon was preached during a chapel service by the late Paul Ketteman in 1976. The message was, "It Takes Three Generations for a Denomination to go from Fundamental to Liberal."

The first generation is strongly adherent to God's Word. Only radical idealism based upon God's Word brings the need for a new denomination; otherwise people would have stayed with what they had. Strong obedience and self-sacrifice brings about soul-winning missionary efforts to reach the lost at any cost. This commitment, in turn, brings about new churches without much money or support. A deep hatred for complacency and status quo drives the individual to further the gospel. Holiness and Godly living are a must. Thus Separatist ideas are what starts the first generation and drives the group.

The second generation adheres to the beliefs of the first generation but eliminates the radical ideas of separation and attempts to get along well with others. Getting along with others at any cost is the motivating factor of generation two. While keeping the beliefs of the first generation is still a must, strict adherence

becomes less and less important. The second generation believes right but acts wrong. Immodest dress, watching vulgar and obscene television programs, listening to and enjoying horrible music and attending questionable entertainment are tolerated. The toleration of lower standards becomes a must in daily living in order to get along.

The third generation lowers their beliefs to meet their lack of Godly living. Finally, once again, daily living and theology meet, but the theology is lowered to ungodliness. Beliefs, such as that the Bible contains the Word of God, instead of the absolute that "the Bible is the Word of God," are embraced.

A people always go liberal in their living before their theology reaches that level. Where are we as Free Will Baptists? Are we on fire for God or are we lukewarm?

The good news is that trends and directions can be stopped or changed by simply making our lives conform to God's Word through praying, fasting and personal commitment. We have seen other groups walk this path. I ask you, "Which generation are we and what direction are we going in?"
