#### **The Revocable Living Trust**

If you want to avoid probate, protect your heirs, and not pay any unnecessary estate taxes, the Living Trust may be exactly what you need and want.

It was Oliver Wendell Holmes who said, "Put not your trust in money, but put your money in trust." That is certainly applicable in this age and generation.

- (1) The Living Trust avoids probate. Since the purpose of the probate court is to establish what a deceased person owned and who will now receive his/her property, probating items in a Living Trust is unnecessary, because those two questions are already satisfactorily answered.
- (2) A Living Trust is a private transaction. Probate proceedings, including the estate inventory, are matter of public record. But items transferred from the estate of a descendant by means of the Living Trust are not made public. Nosy neighbors, relatives receiving no inheritance, even con artists who may want to pursue a list of debts and assets have no knowledge of the proceedings because it is a private transaction.
- (3) A Living Trust is usually settled more quickly. Sometimes, and more often than not, probate court proceedings are lengthy. Because of the nature and function of the Living Trust, it is usually settled much more quickly.
- (4) A Living Trust provides for a Successor Trustee to manage your assets in the event of your death or legal incapacity. If a person becomes "legally incapacitated," the court usually gives someone power of attorney to take care of the business. By having one's assets in and owned by a Living Trust, you have already named your Successor Trustee and would not be at the mercy of the court to choose the person to handle your affairs.

#### **Information Concerning Missouri State Retirement Program**

In order for a pastor, associate pastor, or full-time youth minister to participate in the Retirement Program, the church he is serving must support the Missouri State Cooperative Program with the full 10% of its regular tithes and offerings. This ministry is funded through cooperative giving. (The associate pastor and/or full-time youth minister must receive his salary from the church as a full-time employee.)

A Retirement Pension Enrollment Form supplied by the State Office shows the two plans for participation in the program. Plan 1 is defined as Full Employer participation with the church contributing at least 5% of the base salary.

Plan 2 is defined as the Individual Plan with the employer contributing at least 3% of the base salary. The term life insurance for \$25,000 is \$13.00 monthly for Plan 1, but optional for Plan 2. A \$10.00 enrollment fee is paid to the Board of Retirement & Insurance in Nashville, Tennessee. This of Retirement & Insurance.

Tax Deferred Contribution information: Only 20% of base salary is allowed for total tax deferred contributions. The 20% includes both Salary Reduction Agreement (SRA) (this SRA form may be obtained from the State Office or the Board of Retirement & Insurance) and employer (church) contributions. Base salary is taxable income which excludes benefits such as housing allowance. Ministers may include compensation for honorariums, revival offerings, etc. Older ministers may, under certain circumstances, exceed the 20% by completing a form.

A new SRA may be filed once in any 12 month period. It is of signature.

It is a member's responsibility to maintain and keep accurate records for tax liability and reports to IRS. It is ments, and correspondence, and that you seek competent counsel in all tax matters.

All tax deferred contributions are subject to income taxes the year of withdrawal or distribution. Early withdrawals may be subject to an added 10% penalty. At retirement, distributions for ordained members may be designated housing allowance and tax free (determined by current IRS regulations). Distributions from tax deferred funds to unordained spouses are subject to taxes.

Twice each year, shortly following January 1 and July 1, the Board of Retirement & Insurance, who holds amount stated by the Missouri State Association to the account of the participant. Presently the amount is \$260.00. Before this transfer is made the treasurer of the local church is asked to sign a form, sent from the State Office, stating that the church has supported the Missouri State Cooperative Program with the full 10% of its regular tithes and offerings.

There are several options at retirement. Space will not permit including all of this information. Please do not hesitate to call, write, or come by for any help that is needed.

Fellowship Free Will Baptist Church, 601 Buckley Street, Park Hills, MO, had a very special service on Easter Sunday, April 16, 1995. The people of the Church relived history, for it was on Easter Sunday, April 17, 1949, that the very first service was held in the present sanctuary. The day's activities began with a Sunrise Service, and then a special 2-hour Dedication Service began at 10:00 a.m. All the officers and ministries of the church were recognized and rededicated to the original purposes for which the church was established.

On that first Sunday, in 1949, Rev. Damon Dodd, who now resides in Georgia, was the pastor of the young congregation. In a short three years, the infant church had progressed from meeting in a rented store building, into the basement and finally on this day into the main sanctuary. Most of the labor for the construction was provided by the men of the church. This was a real step of faith for the church, as this took place during the longest lead strike in the history of the local lead mines. The mines provided the finances for probably 98% of the families of the church. This gave the men plenty of spare time but made finances a problem, but the Lord was faithful in

providing the means for the young church not only to survive but to thrive.

For the past two years, Fellowship church has once again been in the process of rebuilding their church property. The Lord opened the door for the church to purchase the Coca Cola Bottling Plant and Warehouse next door to the church. After the purchase, the men of the church once again rolled up their sleeves and began to work. The main building was remodeled into a modern area of assembly rooms and classrooms. The warehouse was turned into a gym and recreational area for the growing youth ministry of the church. An open house was held in March 1994, as the people rejoiced in what had been accomplished. Shortly after the second phase of the construction began, a walkway was built between the buildings, thus allowing for a new entrance into the church that is handicapped accessible. It also added an attractive nursery and rest room area. The sanctuary was completely remodeled, with walls being removed and the sanctuary enlarged to be able to accommodate a growing congregation. The original altar was discovered and after a prayer meeting of the workers, it was lovingly placed in the new altar area. The beautiful sanctuary is a monument to the hard work and dedication of the people of Fellowship, but even more so to the abundant provision given by the Lord to this people. Again most of the labor was provided by the men of the church. Join with us in prayer that we will now expend the same amount of labor and energy to fill His house with those who need to hear the "Good News" that only Jesus Christ can give.

#### Floyd & Berniece Cantrell Celebrate Their 60th Wedding Anniversary

Floyd and Berniece Cantrell celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary May 26, 1995. They were married May 19, 1935. At the time of their marriage, they were both members of the Mill Creek Free Will Baptist Church. The name of the church was later changed to Myrtle Free Will Baptist Church. Floyd was ordained a deacon in the Mill Creek Church in 1937.

Floyd loves to tell of the early days of their marriage when they lived on a farm. He cut and sold wood in the winter in order to buy groceries. He received fifty cents a rank for the wood. He also worked as a carpenter ten

hours a day and earned ten cents an hour, one dollar a day.

The Cantrells moved to St. Louis in the 1940s. There Floyd worked in a candy factory, in a shingle plant, and in a defense plant. In 1944 Floyd was inducted into the army. He served in the Philippines under the command of General McArthur until his discharge in 1946. After his discharge, Floyd returned to St. Louis and took up his former trade of carpentry. He worked at this trade until his retirement.

God has used this fine couple to minister in several Free Will Baptist Churches. In St. Louis they attended the Berkeley Free Will Baptist Church. Floyd worked on the job during the day and at night worked to repair the old church building. Rev. Charles Miller was pastor at the time. As the church grew, the congregation voted to build a new church building in 1961. Floyd was chosen to oversee the construction.

In 1975 the Cantrells moved to Warrenton, Missouri, and attended the O'Fallon Church. There they worked on the new addition to the church and served there until they retired in 1978. After retiring, they moved to Okeechobee, Florida. In Florida, they joined the Okeechobee Free Will Baptist Church and became actively involved in remodeling the building. They left the Okeechobee church in 1986 to help start the Trinity Free Will Baptist Church there.

At 70 years of age, Floyd was asked to build another church building. He and 73 year old C.L. Markham, built the building for the Trinity Free Will Baptist Church in Okeechobee. They completed the sanctuary in only ten weeks and three days.

In 1989 the Cantrells moved back to Warrenton, Missouri, to be near their family. They attend the O'Fallon Free Will Baptist Church and say that it is one of the friendliest churches around.

Floyd and Berniece count among their blessings: their three children - Shirley, Sondra, and Floyd Jr. - their grandchildren, their pastors (past and present), their church and their Christian friends. They encourage others to let the Lord direct their lives, to stay in church, and to give Him the first fruits of their labors.




























#### Why Be a Christian?

Your Role in Teaching Young Teens the Value of Their Faith

Sometimes I'm not sure why I'm a Christian. Sometimes it just seems like the thing to do. Maybe I'm a Christian because most of my friends are Christians. Or perhaps it's due to the way my parents brought me up. Often I'm just acting the part, being a Christian because I've always been a Christian (or so it seems).

Sounds like a young teen talking. Young teens are really not much different from us, if we're honest about it. Many of them are Christians – or pretend to be Christians – because their friends are, because their parents have trained them well, or because it's the life they've always known. Young teens who are new to the faith have a hard time articulating their discovery or really understanding their new joy.

Studies have shown that ninth grade is the time when kids choose the Christian life or decide it's time to start sleeping in on Sundays. It's the first time they've ever really considered the option of not accepting the faith. For once in their lives they are in the position of making the decision themselves. That fact is very puzzling, frightening, and threatening to those of us who are trying desperately to pass on the faith to the next generation.

So, Why Are You a Christian? When I was starting my youth ministry career I interned at a church in Iowa. One of the volunteers asked me one day, "How much do you love the Lord?" She expected an eloquent exposition, I'm sure, but got a dumbfounded response that puzzled her. I spent years trying to answer that question. I still am. But I think now I could give a much clearer response about why I choose to follow Christ. With maturity, I've learned His provision for my life, my unworthiness, His grace. Now I think I could answer her better. Young teens are at the most critical age to make a decision about following Christ. Will they hear from wise words from us?

Be Like Me, For I Am Like... Christ! That's what Paul said. He knew that even though it wasn't healthy for people to become overdependent upon a personality, to some extent, a committed Christian is the best picture of Christ that others will see. What picture of Christ do your students see in you? If you are striving to be Christ-like, your young teens will never forget that image. I know. It's why I'm a follower today.

It wasn't until I was halfway through college that I realized that all of the wonderful non-Christian friends I had associated with for two years had one desire for my life, which was for me to drink alcohol. The realization that this was their level of great concern for me prompted me to start looking for new friends. Where could they be found? Why, in the people who had always cared for me in the first place, the people from my Christian past I had grown up with.

That's the roles you want to fill for your students. In the midst of their throwing pencils out the window, making cutting remarks about the Bible, belching at three in the morning on a retreat, they are somehow formulating a picture of the Christian faith for the future – and it's based on you, the nearest portrait of Christ they might ever see.

A Reason to Live. As students process the ideas and concepts in their lives that give direction to where they are going, they will most likely develop a growing awareness that their lives must revolve around some purpose. As kids move into high school, their ability to consider broader issues will lead them to discover that there are more important things in this world to build their lives around. They, just like us, will need a purpose for their lives. What will help them discover the greatness of following Christ is a close study of leaders who, because they have chosen to follow Him, were willing to spend time with hard-tolove young teens.


## Haitian Island Ministry A letter from Steve Smith

My family and I have been members of the Crossroads Free Will Baptist Church in Wentzville, Missouri, for the past eight years. My wife teaches the Junior Sunday School class, and I teach the adult class. I also direct the music and serve on the advisory board.

For several years I have worked in surgery, being certified in Sterilization Technology and Infection Control, in two local hospitals. Through my contacts in those hospitals I was able to obtain supplies for missionaries. I always felt like I would like to be able to go to the misssion field. After the church began praying for me, I met a doctor who was putting together a team of Christian doctors to go to Haiti. He asked me to go with

On December 26 we left to spend two weeks on the island of La Gonave, off the coast of Haiti. La Gonave is 30 miles long and 10 miles wide, but is very mountainous. The country suffers almost continually from drought so it's almost impossible to raise even the smallest garden.

One fourth of all deaths on the island are of children one year and under. One half of all deaths occur in children five years of age and under. Usually the deaths are caused from infectious diseases or malnutrition.

If all the health problems were not enough, their central religion is voodoo, or voodoo-based, which came from West Africa. There are a few Christians, and they fight a constant

While we were there, we treated or performed surgery on 925 people. Some of the treatment which was performed, I would not have thought possible in the primitive conditions we were in. But the ones I remember most are the 21 who accepted Christ.

For weeks after I returned, I was up sometimes all night wrestling with this and how it had affected my life. I simply can't get these people out of my mind. I told God that if this was what he had in mind for me, he would have to show me the way. I woke one morning at 4:00 A.M. with plans in my

I have formed a nonprofit organization named Haitian Island Ministry (H.I.M.), to help these people physically and spiritually. Our purpose is found in I Chronicles 16:24 where it states that we are to declare His glory among the heathen, and His marvelous works among all nations.

The mission station that is there was established in 1968. They have offered me the use of anything I need, for however long I want to stay.

I will return to Haiti in June to put together a film to show those here who would be interested in being involved, whether spiritually, financially, or both. I have a slide presentation (30 minutes or one hour) for any group or church who would like to see it and I also have pictures.

In order to establish this ministry, I not only need your financial support but your daily prayers. #### FREE WILL BAPTISTS TO BEGIN MINISTRY IN RUSSIA/C.I.S.

During their annual board meeting April 24-26 the Board of Foreign Missions unanimously voted to minister in Russia and Ukraine. This action followed the report of a fact-finding committee composed of R. Eugene Waddell, general director; Jimmy Aldridge, overseas secretary; Bill Jones, foreign missions board member; and Michael Corley, a Russian-speaking deacon from Madison Free Will Baptist Church, Madison, Ala.

The four men spent two and one-half weeks in the Commonwealth of Independent States (formerly USSR) this spring. They found the Baptists in Russia and Ukraine to hold the Arminian position of the doctrine of salvation as do Free Will Baptists. For this reason the major portion of the board's ministry in the C.I.S. will be in cooperation with the Baptist churches there.

Recognizing the political instability evident in much of the former Soviet Union, the board responded favorably to the following urgent needs:

\$1,200 worth of Free Will Baptist commentaries, theological books and literature for the seminaries and Bible institutes in Russia and Ukraine.

Medicines for a Christian doctor in Kiev. (Those interested may write the foreign missions office for the details.)

\* Funds for completing the church building at Selso, Russia, where Sean Warren and Eddie Hobbs served as student missionaries during the summer of 1994.

\* Professors to serve as short-term teachers in seminaries and Bible institutes in Russia and Ukraine.

\* A contribution of \$5,000 toward the new seminary building in Kiev, Ukraine.

\* A copy machine for the Autonomous Baptist Bible Institute in Ukraine.

\* Support for 16 Russian and Ukrainian church planters to go where the needs are greatest.

Co-sponsorship of a pastors' and workers' conference in Russia during the spring of 1996.

\* A witnessing team and a follow-up team of Americans to spend several weeks in Novosibirsk, Russia, in the summer of 1996.

"To respond to these needs, we have opened a 'Russia/C.I.S.' account," Mr. Waddell said. "We are looking to our Free Will Baptist people to reach out in love and generosity toward our Russian and Ukrainian brethren."

In considering these new challenges the foreign missions board emphasized the necessity of continuing to support missionary ministries in the nine countries were Free Will Baptist missionaries are already serving.


