

1858 Treatise Presented to the Historical Commission





During the Thursday morning session of the Missouri State Meeting, Mr. & Mrs. Monorable Alexander presented an originial 1858 Free Will Baptist Treatise to Rev. James Barker, a member of the Missouri Historical Commission. Brother Monorable stated that his great grandfather's brother, Martin Myers, brought this little book with him when he came to Missouri from Franklin County, Pennsylvania, in 1865. There were no Free Will Baptist churches in Schuyler County at that time. In 1890 his grandfather, Ira Myers, and his other grandfather, Niles Alexander, helped build the New Harmony Free Will Baptist church. The church is located west of Greentop, Missouri. They celebrated their 100th anniversary in 1990.

The treatise is on display at the Missouri Free Will Baptists state office. If you have old Gems, Treatises, or other Free Will Baptist material, please donate them to the state archives. The material will help preserve the history of Free Will Baptists.

Our Need for Spiritual Friends

Too many of us try to live out our Christian faith behind the mask of a spiritual Lone Ranger. We often cannot talk about spiritual matters to others freely. If we converse at this level at all, we do so cautiously, lest we be misunderstood or deemed "superspiritual." This spiritual isolationism often leads to lack of spiritual maturity, accountability, and productivity. The age-old idea that faith in God is a private matter may be the reason for our inability to build solid Christian communities through a network of vital spiritual friendships.

Looking for Spiritual Friends. What should we look for in a "Friend of the soul?" Allen Jones, in *Exploring Spiritual Directions: An Essay on Christian Friendship*, lists four qualities a spiritual friend should possess:

*Love - an openness and readiness to accept another into one's heart.

*Discernment - the heart of spiritual direction.

*Patience - sitting and waiting rather than making quick judgements.

*Utter frankness and honesty – a naked trust that sets the tone for the relationship.

According to Urban T. Holmes' book Spirituality for Ministry, people seek spiritual friends who display greater spiritual maturity, the presence of the Spirit, a willingness to listen, a liberal amount of holiness, compassion, a total commitment to their needs, an inability to be shocked, compatibility, honesty, confidentiality, and kindness. Most of us would count it a high privilege to have a spiritual friend with these qualifications. We all need someone who is a little farther down the spiritual road than we are, tugging on our sleeves to bring us along. Too often we find ourselves being bulldozed, steamrolled, divebombed, and blizted into spiritual growth by our well-meaning Christian friends.

Seldom are we nudged, loved, and encouraged to spiritual growth in an atmosphere of understanding.

Building Spiritual Friendship Foundations. The following guidelines will help us build foundations that encourage the formation of spiritually friendly relationships:

- 1. Pray for the Lord to send the right person into our lives.
- 2. Be willing to ask for and receive direction.
- 3. Be willing to be spiritually accountable to another person.
- 4. Give the relationship time to form and grow.
- 5. Spend time with our spiritual friend. This time will include talking about the inner things of our hearts and spirits, praying, and developing long-term plans of action for our continued spiritual growth.

Passing on Spiritual Friendship. As ministers, we frequently talk about church work but seldom discuss matters of the heart and spirit. If such hesitancy exits among those who lead, how widespread must it be among those who follow? Having a spiritual friend and being a spiritual friend means bringing God into the open space between our lives and allowing Him to do His work through each of us. By having and being spiritual friends, we encourage those who receive help and direction from us to share that same friendship with others.




























"Peachy Summer"

For my family and me, it was one of life's happiest days. For the rest of our nation, it will be remembered as one of the saddest. April 23, 1995 . . . "The National Day of Mourning" for the victims of the Oklahoma City bombing, and the birth of Kelsie Elaine Poletti.



I spoke with friends in Oklahoma City that day, bubbling over with joy at our newest baby's birth while still feeling the heavy weight of sadness this tragedy had brought. The irony was eerie – the same date marking life and death, joy with mourning – and the mixed feelings I had, with happiness outweighing the sad, made me feel guilty. How could I celebrate when ones we knew were suffering? How could I celebrate the birth of another child when so many had lost theirs in a senseless act of violence?

It all reminded me of a day coming when we Christians will know the greatest joy we have ever imagined while others will experience the deepest sadness and desperation ever known. It would make us almost dread our own happiness, knowing of the pain and torment ahead for others, if we did not have the assurance that God will wipe away our tears. Guilt will be unallowed, as well as unnecessary, if we are certain we are doing all we can to take everyone we meet to Heaven with us.

We have no promise that life holds no such tragedies as this one that's shocked our nation. We can only prepare ourselves for the end, and trust in God to comfort us every step of our way.
