Talking to Kids About Their Faith

A Youth Worker Offers Advice

You come home from one of your junior high events and ask yourself the classic youth worker question: "Why am I doing this?" Your best game failed; the Bible study you worked on all week was met with little interest; and your most dependable kids were the ones creating the problems. Sound familiar? If you're like me, you sometimes wonder if it's all really worth it

Something always comes along to remind me of my focus. It might come when I see an eighth-grade boy discover and understand a truth from the Bible. It might happen when I hear a seventh-grade girl tell about how she is sharing her faith with her friends. Just when I'm questioning my efforts, I'm gently reminded why I do young teen ministry – to help kids fall in love with Jesus.

I'm convinced that many of us are afraid of helping young teens discover faith. Sure, we desire the end results, but the process it takes to get there can be pretty frightening. This is largely due to the fact that these kids are at a place of outrageous change. They are beginning to leave the world of concrete operations (reasoning based on objects) and are entering the world of formal operations (reasoning based on symbols and principles). In a sense, they are learning to "think about thinking."

*Growth Takes Time. Have you ever noticed that when you look at old photos of your house, you're always amazed at how much the plants and trees have grown? While the daily change isn't always noticeable, when you're able to see the long-term perspective you realize that growth was happening all the time. Growing faith in junior high kids is very similar. Even though we may not see a lot going on in the spiritual lives of our kids, we have to trust that our faithfulness will be rewarded later on.

*Tough Questions. While I was speaking at a conference recently, I had a young teen come up to me and express some doubts he was having about his faith. He shared his thoughts almost apologetically, as if God would stomp on him for questioning. I told him he didn't need to be afraid of asking tough faith questions because God wasn't afraid of them. After all, if God is Truth (and I certainly believe that He is), then Truth can stand up to our doubts. As a matter of fact, I believe God respects tough questions because it shows we're thinking.

In this light, we should encourage faith questions rather than attempting to discourage them.

*Leading by Example. When I was a teenager, I lived for the opportunity to hang out with leaders of my church youth group. I probably made deeper commitments in my faith while cruising around in Marlin's van or shooting hoops at Dan's garage than I did in any meeting. The same holds true for many kids today, as I discovered when I become a youth worker. I

learned early on that a discussion around a basketball court or over a hamburger and shake often outweighed a year's worth of programs. It makes sense – real-life ministry happens when we invest our lives in young people between meetings.

The terms *mentoring* and *discipling* define this ministry investment. While it is an investment of our time, the apostle Paul also describes it in I Thessalonians 2:8 as an investment of our lives: "We have loved you so much that we were delighted to share with you not only the gospel of God but our lives as well."

*Putting Faith Into Action. One of the most important principles in nurturing faith is that kids will believe what they do more than they will do what they believe. It is essential, therefore, that we offer opportunities for young teens to own their faith firsthand. Instead of merely "transmitting knowledge," we have to use our creative energies to come up with strategies for kids to experience faith.

Try getting kids involved with missions and local outreach. I've discovered that powerful things occur in kids' lives when they wrestle with issues of injustice and compassion. Take them to a nursing home, have them serve food to the homeless or sponsor a child through a mission program. The possibilities are limitless.

*The Tools of Faith. When I take care of plants in our house, I take great care to provide them with all the elements they need. I place them near adequate light and supply them with the proper amounts of water and minerals. I've learned that without the right elements, plants just don't grow. In a similar way, we need to provide spiritual nourishment for kids. The good news is that kids can learn how to feed themselves – if we provide the tools.

The basic tools that will help a young person grow in his or her faith are an understanding of the Bible, a realization of the power of prayer, a commitment to fellowship in the church, and a grasp of the importance of sharing our faith with others. A solid foothold on these will allow a young person to become "rooted . . . in Him" (Colossians 2:6,7).

*A Final Word of Encouragement. I've been in youth ministry a long time, and it's still painful for me when I think I'm not getting through to my kids. But my years in ministry have also given me another perspective. Older kids come back to me and tell me what a difference I made in their lives. It never ceases to amaze me. It also never ceases to cause me to look heavenward and acknowledge that God knew what He was doing all the time. The things we do and say really matter to kids. Don't give up - you are making a difference.

Pastors often feel unloved and unappreciated. Congregations have it within their power to change this through the biblical principle of honoring. Paul encouraged the Christians in Thessalonica to honor their spiritual leaders. "Brothers and sisters, we ask you to show your appreciation for those leaders who work among you and instruct you. We ask you to love them and think very highly of them because of the work they are doing." (1 Thess. 5:12,13, God's Word) When a pastor has the support and encouragement of his congregation, it is easier for him to face the many things that he is called to endure.

He can face the disrespect of the world. Just as Hollywood portrays him as a weak, lecherous, incompetent, hypocritical, individual, some people in his community will be suspicious of him and put him in the same category as those high profile preachers who fell into sin. Others will love to discourage the pastor with the sharpness of their tongue. An individual in one of my former pastorates used to love to catch me in a public place so he could loudly proclaim to someone nearby, "I'm tired of working. I'm going to quit and either go on welfare or start preaching." A Gallup poll found that of the 100 most admired vocations, being a pastor ranked 56.

He can face those of the congregation that scrutinize his every move, question his every action, and doubt his calling.

He and his family live in a fish bowl where they are often treated as caretakers of the parsonage and their privacy is not respected.

He can face a work week that averages 50 - 75 hours. Often his wife will be required to work outside the home to supplement their income. He knows that his job will never be done. There will always be another funeral, another wedding, another meeting, or another crisis. The lights are never turned off.

He can face the interrupted vacations and the days off. Even when they go uninterrupted, the man of God always carries the weight of concern for his congregation. He often faces the recrimination of his own family for not having time for matters at home.

I believe Free Will Baptist Churches have some of the best people in the world, yet sometimes the pastor is taken for granted. Often it is easier to see the needs of visiting evangelists, missionaries, or singers than the needs of the parsonage family. That is not to say that the church should not support ministries beyond themselves, for they should. But God will honor the church who cares for the shepherd that He has given them. Here are some ways your church can help your pastor.

- Review the pastor's salary and retirement benefits each year. If financially able, give him an increase in salary.
- Respect the pastor's time off. Don't call him unless it is an emergency on his day off.
 - Give the pastor an extra week of vacation time.
- Send the pastor to conferences and meetings where he will be renewed. It will benefit the church.
- Pray for your pastor. I can't stress this enough. E.M. Bounds once said, "The men in the pew given to praying for the pastor are like poles which hold up the wires along which the electric current runs. They are not the power, neither are they the specific agents in making the Word of the Lord effective. But they hold up the wires upon which the divine power runs to the hearts of men."

September is Pastor Appreciation Month for Free Will Baptists. During the month, plan a special day for your pastor. There are any number of things you can do to show him that you appreciate him and that you are glad God sent him to your church. A pat on the back will do wonders for your pastor.



















































Nine Baptized At Republic Church



About Angels, Good and Evil

"The angel of the Lord encamps all around those who fear Him, and delivers them." Psalm 34:7 NKJV.

The existence of angels is taught in at least 34 books of the Bible, with the word angel occurring 275 times. Angels are described as supernatural, created, heavenly beings (Colossians 1:16). However, they are never worshiped or exalted above the members of the Holy Trinity: Father, Son and Holy Spirit (Revelation 22:8,9). Angels are spirit beings who sometimes appear in human forms (Luke 24:4-7). Angels also sometimes offer guidance or protection as seen in Acts, chapter 12, where the Apostle Peter was miraculously delivered from prison. Regarding angels, Hebrews Chapter 1 verse 14, states, "Are they not all ministering spirits, sent out to render service for the sake of those who will inherit Salvation?" (NASV)

According to the Bible, the devil also has a host of angels under his command. The Apostle Paul describes the devil (or Satan) as a being who masquerades as an "angel of light" (2 Corinthians 11:14). Sometimes he presents himself as a counterfeit of Jesus Christ as he seeks people who will follow him and worship him. Jesus said that a Hell of eternal fire has been prepared for the devil and his angels and also for those people who would be deceived by the devil (Matthew 25:41).

Only God can dispatch an angel whom one should want to encounter. A close walk with Jesus Christ is the best protection against being visited by the wrong angel. Jesus Christ's atoning sacrifice of His blood on the cross paid the penalty for the sins of all humankind. For the person who believes, the resurrection of Jesus Christ provides living reality of Christian hope in heaven. Regarding 1 Peter chapter 1, verses 3-12, the editors of the Wesley Study Bible wrote, "Peter thanks God for the sure hope we have in Christ (vv. 3-5), a hope that enables us to rejoice even in trials (vv.6-9). All the prophets looked forward to such a salvation, and all the angels want to understand it." (vv.10-12)

Perhaps one of the most profound proclamations made by an angel is, "And she will bring forth a Son, and you shall call His name JESUS, for He will save His people from their sins," Matthew 1:21 (NKJV).

John Newton Discovers Grace!

The Greyhound had been thrashing about in the north Atlantic storm for over a week. Its canvas sails were ripped, and the wood on one side of the ship had been torn away and splintered. The sailors had little hope of survival, but they mechanically worked the pumps, trying to keep the vessel afloat. On the eleventh day of the storm, sailor John Newton was too exhausted to pump, so he was tied to the helm and tried to hood the ship to its course. From one o'clock until midnight he was at the helm.

With the storm raging fiercely, Newton had time to think. His life seemed as ruined and wrecked as the battered ship he was trying to steer through the storm. Since the age of eleven he had lived a life at sea. Sailors were not noted for the refinement of their manners, but Newton had a reputation for profanity, coarseness, and debauchery which even shocked many a sailor.

He was known as "the great blasphemer." He sank so low at one point that he was even a servant to slaves in Africa for a brief period. His mother had prayed he would become a minister, and had early taught him the Scriptures and Isaac Watts' <u>Divine Songs for Children</u>. Some of those early childhood teachings came to mind now. He remembered Proverbs 1:24-28, and in the midst of that storm, those verses seemed to confirm Newton in his despair.

"Because I have called, and ye refused ...ye have set at nought all my counsel, and would none of my reproof: I also laughed at your calamity; I will mock when your fear cometh: when your fear cometh as desolation, and your destruction cometh as a whirlwind; when distress and anguish come upon you. Then shall they call upon me, but I will not answer ..."

Newton had rejected his mother's teachings and had led other sailors into unbelief. He felt he was beyond hope and beyond saving. Still Newton's thoughts began to turn to Christ. He found a New Testament and began to read. Luke 11:13 seemed to assure him that God might still hear him: "If ye then, being evil, know how to give good gifts unto your children: how much more shall your heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to them that ask him."

Deliverance

That day at the helm, March 21, 1748, was a day Newton remembered ever after, for "On that day the Lord sent from on high and delivered me out of deep waters." Many years later, as an old man, Newton wrote in his diary of March 21, 1805: "Not well able to write; but I endeavor to observe the return of this day with humiliation, prayer, and praise." Only God's amazing grace could and would take a rude, profane, slave-trading sailor and transform him into a child of God. Newton never ceased to stand in awe of God's work in his life.

New Directions

Though Newton continued in his profession of sailing and slave-trading for a time, his life was transformed. He began a disciplined schedule of Bible study, prayer, and Christian reading, and tried to be a Christian example to the sailors under his command. Philip Doddridge's The Rise and Progress of Religion in the Soul provided much spiritual comfort, and a fellow-Christian captain he met off the coast of Africa guided Newton further in his Christian faith.

Newton left slave-trading and took the job of tide surveyor at Liverpool, but he began to think he had been called to the ministry. His mother's prayers for her son were answered, and in 1764, at the age of thirty-nine, John Newton began forty-three years of preaching the gospel of Christ.

John and his beloved wife Mary (at the end of his life John would write that their love "equalled all that the writers of romance have imagined") moved to the little market town of Olney. He spent his mornings in Bible study and his afternoons in visiting his parishioners. There were regular Sunday morning and afternoon services as well as meetings for children and young people. There was also a Tuesday evening prayer meeting which was always well attended.

The World's Most Famous Hymn

For the Sunday evening services, Newton often composed a hymn which developed the lessons and Scripture for the evening. In 1779, 280 of these were collected and combined with 68 hymns by Newton's friend and parishioner, William Cowper, and published as the Olney Hymns. The most famous of all the Olney Hymns, "Faith's Review and Expectation," grew out of David's exclamation in I Chronicles 17:16-17. We know it today as "Amazing Grace." Several other of the Olney hymns by Newton continue in use today, including "How Sweet the Name of Jesus Sounds," and "Glorious Things of Thee are Spoken." The hymns first brought attention to Newton's friend, William Cowper, who later became a famous national poet. Cowper's "There Is a Fountain Filled with Blood" and "God Moves in a Mysterious Way" have continued to find their way into today's hymnals.

Rector Reveals Evils of Slavery

In 1779 Newton left Olney to become rector of St. Mary Woolnoth in London. His ministry included not only the London poor and the merchant class but also the wealthy and influential. William Wilberforce, a member of Parliament and a prime mover in the abolition of slavery, was strongly influenced by John Newton's life and preaching. Newton's Thoughts on the African Slave Trade, based on his own experiences as a slave trader, was very important in securing British abolition of slavery. Missionaries William Carey and Henry Martyn also gained strength from Newton's counsel.

Newton lived to be eighty-two years old and continued to preach and have an active ministry until beset by fading health in the last two or three years of his life. Even then, Newton never ceased to be amazed by God's grace and told his friends, "My memory is nearly gone; but I remember two things: That I am a great sinner, and that Christ is a great Saviour."

The children of Cecil and Jewell Campbell hosted a sixtieth wedding anniversary celebration for their parents at the municipal auditorium in Neosho, Missouri, Sunday, June 25. Family and friends came throughout the afternoon to honor this esteemed couple. Rev. Lewis Campbell, the Campbell's son, printed a small booklet honoring his parents. The following is an excerpt from that booklet.

It was a hot day in June 1935, when a country preacher, Cecil Campbell, was busy farming to support his preaching. At noon, June 22, he parked his equipment under a shade tree, put on his Sunday clothes, and took a young woman that had grown up on a neighboring farm, Jewell Marie Lewis, to be his wife. There is no way that anyone could have predicted the turns in life's road that lay ahead for them.

About halfway between the farms where these young folks grew up was the Jones Chapel Free Will Baptist Church. The church was the center of the community and was to become a central part of their lives. Rev. Campbell was ordained and pastored there three different times in his ministry.

The road of life has taken them to many places. Interestingly enough, the road at this time has taken them back to the same farm where Jewell grew up and where they first set up housekeeping. Between leaving and returning to the farm, they pastored in two states and held revivals in many others. This country preacher worked in the formation and development of the National Association of Free Will Baptists for fifty years. He still serves on the Historical Commission in the Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists.

For her part, Jewell Lewis Campbell was a leader, an officer and frequently a writer for the Woman's National Auxiliary Convention. She was ever by her preacher husband's side but never lost sight of the fact that she was an individual in her own right.
