

THE CHURCH TITHING THE TITHE





Church cannot sustain its physical plant, implement programs, or provide ministry without some financial income. For most churches that income is derived from the tithes of its members. How the church uses the tithes varies from church to church. Some churches believe that gift money should be used for local ministry only, while other churches would use it not only to meet their needs, but budget a portion for other ministries. Eugene B. Haberker, in an article entitled "How Much is Enough," raises a pertinent question. "The reason Scripture commands tithing is not to improve an economic situation but in response to a command of God and the important priority He is in our lives. Individuals are expected to tithe, so why not Christian organizations?" he asks.

Should churches tithe the tithes? Pastors and church leaders differ on this question. Those who are opposed to the church tithing the tithe use two major reasons to justify their point of view. First, there are those churches who believe the tithe should be used for nothing other than local ministry saying, "We want to know where our money is used." Second, there are churches who state that they just can't afford to tithe because the church budget just won't stand the extra expense.

For every reason for the church not to tithe, there is a better reason for the church to tithe.

Scripture supports tithing the tithe. The New Testament records that the early church gave of its means to assist the apostle Paul in his missionary endeavors. Also, it is recorded that the churches gave to help the Jerusalem church in its time of need. It can be argued that all of these gifts were special offerings which were over and above the tithe. However, since the Old Testament gives a very clear commission to tithe the tithe, we may assume that the early churches were not opposed to the practice. In the book of Numbers God told Moses that the tribe of Levi would not have a land inheritance when they settled in Israel, but the Levites would receive the tithes from the people.

And, behold, I have given the children of Levi all the tenth in Israel for an inheritance, for their service which they serve, even the service of the tabernacle of the congregation. But the tithes of the children of Israel, which they offer as an heave offering unto the LORD, I have given to the Levites to inherit: therefore I have said unto them, Among the children of Israel they shall have no inheritance. Numbers 18:21-24

He then instructed that the Levites tithe the tithe to the Lord.

And the LORD spake unto Moses, saying, Thus speak unto the Levites, and say unto them, When ye take of the children of Israel the tithes which I have given you from them for your inheritance, then ye shall offer up an heave offering of it for the LORD, even a tenth part of the tithe. ... Thus ye also shall offer an heave offering unto the LORD of all your tithes, which ye receive of the children of Israel; and ye shall give thereof the LORD's heave offering to Aaron the priest. Numbers 18:

Stewardship instruction to the Saints is reinforced when the church tithes the tithe. Christians are taught that stewardship is one of great tests of spirituality, and the Bible gives many reasons why the individual who has been saved should tithe. Gordon K. Moyes wrote, "Our tithes and offerings are God's by right, for the first fruits belong to Him. Tithing is God's key to your successful personal finances. Tithing puts God first, makes you budget in discipline, involves your family as a team, frees you from the great dollar hang-up, proves the reality of your faith, and releases to tithe the tithe. According to Edward J. Hales, ". . . The church needs to model a similar understanding of God's provision by being willing to give away from its own local program as the demonstration of its belief that God will, indeed, provide."

The solution to tithing the tithe begins with a commitment and a budget, formal or informal. Just as individual stewardship begins with a commitment to be obedient to give to the Lord, the church must make a commitment to give. After making the commitment to tithe the tithes, a budget will help the church to verbalize and then visualize the

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commitment to tithe. "The Churches budget is not a list of its expenses, but a record of its vision. It is not a list of bills to be met but a program of ministry to be achieved," states Gordon K. Moyes.

However, commitment and budget alone will not guarantee success. Without consistent, aggressive leadership there will be limited success or failure. The pastor must provide the leadership that is necessary for the church to be a consistent. If there is a reluctance in the pulpit, there will be a reluctance in the pew.

Select a method for sending the tithes to work for the Lord. The Free Will Baptist Together Way Plan offers both the Cooperative and Designated method of giving. Cooperative giving, like the tithe when given to the church, is given undesignated. The money is sent through the state office where it is disbursed to state and national ministries according to the budget adopted by the State Association. Missouri churches have been blessed and have been a blessing by adopting the Cooperative plan of giving. Designated giving specifies the ministry that the money is to be given to. It may be sent through the state office, national office, or sent directly to the ministry for which the money is designated. Whichever method is used, the church should be concerned that the tithe they give supports the total ministry of the denomination. In that way it will be as the tithe given to the local church which supports the total program of that church.

Satisfaction is the blessing of the church tithing the tithe. There is the gratification of knowing that the church is participating with the rest of the body of Christ in carrying out the Great Commission. Too often churches are like two people riding a bicycle-built-for-two up a steep hill. When they reach the top, the first, gasping for breath, exclaims, "I though we'd never make it!" The second replies, "We wouldn't have if I hadn't kept the brakes on to keep us from rolling back down!" The Scriptures calls for cooperation and not competition. When our church tithes, it gives testimony to our oneness with the body of Christ. If God blesses the individual for tithing, He will no doubt bless the church for tithing.

"And they commanded the people, saying, When ye see the ark of the covenant of the LORD your God, and the priests the Levites bearing it, then ye shall remove from your place, and go after it. Yet there shall be a space between you and it, about two thousand cubits by measure: come not near unto it, that ye may know the way by which ye must go: for ye have not passed this way heretofore. And Joshua said unto the people, Sanctify yourselves: for tomorrow the LORD will do wonders among you." (Josh. 3:3-5)

After forty years of wandering in the wilderness, the Lord brought the children of Israel back to the Jordan River in preparation for entering the land He had promised them. Because they had not traveled the land they were to occupy, they were given instructions for the journey. They were to keep the Ark of the Covenant in sight, use it as their signal to move, and sanctify themselves, for God was going to do wonders among them.

I can't think of better instructions for Missouri Free Will Baptists in 1998 than that which God gave to the Israelites, being where God is, going where God is going, and separated unto Him for His use. We have before us a New Year and how we follow God's instructions will determine what we do with it.

There is a road in Israel built next to a security fence that runs through the Jordan valley to separate Israel from its neighbors. The fence is an ordinary security fence, but the road is unusual. The road bed is covered with a thick layer of sand, and the only traffic on the road is a vehicle that pulls a drag along it once or twice a day to wipe out any tracks that may be on the road. As you probably have surmised, the road is used as a detector. Anyone crossing the fence will leave their tracks on the soft sand road and thus it alerts the Israelee patrols that an intruder has crossed into their territory.

1997 was like that road when it was used. Tracks of our passing are in the sand. Souls were saved in our churches and at youth camp, the Show-Me Mission Plan was launched, two new churches were started, Missouri Bible Institute sights and enrollment increased, lake front property was purchased for future use, Cooperative receipts increased, Senior Adult Retreat moved to two sessions, and Youth Ministries workshops were held.

1998 is like the sand road after the drag has passed by leaving no tracks or disturbances. As we set our feet upon the road of 1998, let us remember the admonition of the writer of Hebrews when he said, "... make straight paths for your feet, lest that which is lame be turned out of the way; but let it rather be healed." Heb. 12:13

Straight paths are commanded but they don't just happen. It requires planning and implementation. God has allowed us to plan. We have prepared budgets, scheduled meetings, and enlisted workers. The afternoon service was a time for special music and testimonies. Former pastors were recognized and those present were honored. Rev. Hugh Stogsdill was presented a plaque and Sister Eunice Stogsdill was presented roses in appreciation for their ministry in O'Fallon. Sister Carolyn Lombard was presented a plaque and roses in appreciation of her and Brother Don's labors. (The Lord called Brother Don home while he was pastor of the church.) Brother Stogsdill and Sister Lombard related some serious and comical things they remembered from the time that they served the church. Letters from former pastors Lloyd Durbin and Dale Underwood were read. Charter members were also recognized.

The First Free Will Baptist Church of O'Fallon had its beginning in the Spring of 1966 under the leadership of Rev. Lloyd Durbin. The Missouri Free Will Baptist Home Mission Board provided financial help and guidance. The mission went self supporting and organized into a church with 23 charter members in 1967.

A local restaurant was used as the first meeting place. At that time the mission was paying rent for the meeting place and for a house for the pastor. After a short time the congregation decided it would be better stewardship to build a parsonage with a basement where the church and Sunday School could meet and a top story where the pastor would live. Four men served the church as pastor while it met in the parsonage: Lloyd Durbin, Hugh Stogsdill, Dale Underwood, and Don Lombard.

In 1970, led by pastor Don Lombard, the church voted to build a first phase worship and educational facility, and in 1977 Brother Lombard led the church in a second phase addition to the building. Four pastors have served in the new facilities: Don Lombard, Robert Sherry, Ken Petty, and present pastor Rick Dement.

The First Church of O'Fallon continues to grow numerically, financially, and spiritually. Pastor Rick Dement states that the goal of the church is to be a blessing to others.

The service was concluded with the congregation giving the new deacons and their wives the right hand of fellowship and congratulations.

LESSONS FROM NATURE

ow hunting in late December D and early January in the northeast corner of Missouri is often a brutal experience. Three or four hours sitting in single digit temperatures (or below) and wind chills that go well into the minus two digits teaches one the meaning of the word cold! My wife says it more properly defines the word, stupid! Whatever your viewpoint, trust me, it is cold enough to make your bones ache. When I'm that cold, the quickest way for me to warm up is by sitting in front of a roaring fire in either the fireplace or my wood furnace in the basement. It never fails to bring back memories of standing around the old wood stove in uncle Ted and aunt Ta's kitchen. Some of you know what that's like. The side closest to the stove gets first degree burns, and the side away from the stove won't melt frost. Wood stoves are wonderful, and have only one drawback - you have to cut wood!


By now most of you realize I'm a little different (or as some say, "strange"), but I like to cut wood. I've learned a lot of lessons from cutting wood, mostly, all the hard way! I would like to share some of this wonderful knowledge!

**The best time to cut wood is when you don't need it. Then you can pick the weather conditions, and the time that you want to do it. The worst time to cut wood is when the last stick is in the stove! Then no matter what the weather, or how bad you feel "you gotta cut wood!" It is the same way with prayer. The best time to pray is not when your back is to the wall, and you have tried all other alternatives. Rather, it is better to pray and commune with God from thankful hearts, praising him when everything is going great. He receives more glory from this than from "bailing us out of trouble" all the time. We should be as one of his disciples said in Luke 11:1 "...Lord, teach us to pray..."

**Your chain saw needs to be tuned up, and the chain sharp. There is nothing worse than a saw that is difficult to start. It is easier physically to cut a pick-up load of wood than start a balky saw - you can pull your insides out! A dull chain turns a job into real work! Solomon sums it up in Ecclesiastes 10:10, "If the iron be blunt, and he do not whet the edge, then must he put to more strength:" Some Christians are like that - they are difficult to get started (some you can't start), they bog down easily. and kick back. The pastor ends up spending all his time working on them, rather than "cutting a load of wood."

**Some trees fool you. They look like they will fall one direction, but they fall the opposite. Ecclesiastes 11:3, "And if the tree fall toward the south, or toward the north, in the place where the tree falleth, there it shall be." This can be quite dangerous. I experienced that this past spring. A large tree landed where I was standing just seconds before. Thank God, even though it got my saw, I escaped by inches. Solomon says: "... and he that cleaveth wood shall be endangered thereby." Ecclesiastes 10:9. Spiritually we sometimes get over-matched. Our confidence in our abilities to combat the forces of satan may put us in the direct path of the "falling tree."

**Splitting wood is a real art. My father-in-law is a master at splitting wood with a double-bit axe. He makes it look easy, splitting with one or two swings of the axe. I assure you, it is not that easy - it comes with years (decades) of practice. Mature, experienced Christians are that same way. They make the Christian life look so easy, so simple. They never seem to break a sweat. Meanwhile the immature Christian may be swinging the axe faster and harder, but he's not splitting with the grain, or can't hit the same place twice. Therefore, his greatest accomplish-



**Wood with twisted grain is difficult to split – sometimes seemingly impossible, especially when green. However, that same stick of wood with frost in it will split with a single blow. So it is when the "frost" of the Holy Spirit penetrates embittered, twisted, impenitent hearts. People that have been prayed for, and witnessed to for years with no success, can be "split with a single blow" with the working and leading of the Holy

**Properly seasoned wood burns better, with less creosote build-up than green wood. Likewise, a heart seasoned with prayer and Bible study accomplishes its purpose of providing warmth to cold, sinful hearts with a lot less "smoke and impurities."

Spirit.

**When burning wood, the ashes have to be routinely carried out or eventually they will choke out the fire. The flue has to be kept clean, or there is a danger of a flue fire, and of burning the house down. We as Christians need a routine cleansing of our lives, or our fire will go out. If we do not routinely clean the impurities from our lives, then we too risk the danger of burning our spiritual house down.

Unfortunately, in this modern age, most of us have become great thermostat adjustors. The concept of having to plan ahead and physically prepare for our winter's fuel supply is completely foreign. Once again, another opportunity for an entire family working together as a unit toward a common goal is lost. Is it possible that the demise of the wood stove, the family garden, the hog killings, and some of the other old time ways has contributed to the break-up of the family unit? Hmmn — I wonder.



The recording session will be held at the Rejoice Fee Will Baptist Church in Owasso, Oklahoma, just north of Tulsa. Recording will begin on Friday afternoon/evening and continue on Saturday, followed by a fellowship supper for all participants.

"This is a very ambitious and exciting undertaking for our commission and for Free Will Baptists. It will include songs that our people have held dear as part of our tradition, as well as new songs destined to become standards of the church," commented Sawver. "It's something no Free Will Baptist musician will want to miss."

Songs from the release will be used in worship by the mass choir during all evening services of the convention, and attendees will have the first chance to purchase the project that week at the music commission booth. Production plans include cassettes, Cds, choral books, and orchestration tracks.

"We need participation from everywhere for this project to be a success," Sawyer continued. "Singers from choirs with 10 voices or 100 voices all need to make preparations to be at the recording session."
