I know the danger that one faces when he begins to talk too much about the past. However, to a degree, we are shaped by our past experiences. I know that many of my work habits, standards, and values were learned as a boy. Some were learned the hard way on the end of a cross-cut saw.

Have you ever used a cross-cut saw? If you have, you remember the experience. If you haven't, it may be hard to explain since cross-cut saws are a thing of the past. However, in the not too distant past, a cross-cut saw was used to fell trees and to cut the timber into the desired length. The saw was about six to eight feet in length, with a vertical handle on each end. The teeth of the saw were course and could really turn out the saw dust. Two things were necessary to operate this fine piece of equipment—endurance and cooperation. Needless to say, one did not need an aerobics class after hanging on to the saw all day. It took endurance just to make it through, and it took cooperation to make the labor effective. One person would pull the saw his way, and then, without a pause, the other person would pull the saw his way. The labor was made easier and more productive by cooperating. I can still hear my Dad say, "Son, stand a little closer, let your arms flow smoothly, and don't ride the saw." When one stood too far from the work, he shortened the stroke of the saw, and it increased the time it took to do the job. When one rode the saw, he caused his partner to work harder.

Missouri Free Will Baptists know the importance of endurance and cooperation. Through the years, God has blessed our united efforts. He has blessed us with multiple ministries which aid the local churches in their ministries. He has given us a great State Missions program that has led in the planting of new churches. He has led in developing channels through which we are able to give our gifts to meet the needs of State and National Ministries. Missouri is number four (4) in the nation in giving to National Ministries. The foresight of past leaders led our churches to adopt the Cooperative Plan of support, and God has blessed it. Two years ago the State added the Show-Me

Plan to underwrite the needs of our foreign missionaries, and God has added His blessing to what we are doing.

LESSONS FROM NATURE

The turkeys had gobbled strong all morning long. They never hesitated to answer the call, but I couldn't get them to come in. They had hens with them, and the hens would not come off the state park, which does not allow hunting. My son, Chad, and I had watched hens fly out of the trees and onto the state park after daylight. At 7:00 a.m. he had to leave to go to work, and I had spent the morning intermittently talking to the turkeys and thinking.

It was late in the second week of spring turkey season, and I had only been out one other day. For the first time in 20-some years I had missed opening morning of the spring season. I looked at the longbow in my hand and thought about dad. After being healthy for 79 years, and not missing a Sunday behind the pulpit in my 46 years, he had suffered a major heart attack. He had been airlifted from the local hospital to Birmingham, Alabama, fighting for his life. Three days later he had undergone open-heart surgery. There had been "substantial" damage to the heart. In a three-week period my wife, Joyce, and I had made two trips to Alabama to help my parents and my brother during this difficult time. Now dad was home, and Joyce and my sister-in-law had helped to get dad started on his "heart diet". He still faced more surgery in the future, but at least now he was mending—slowly—but mending. During all this, the first week of turkey season had come while we were

in Alabama. The longbow in my hand was like an old friend, but we had not been together much for 3 or 4 months. Joyce had also been experiencing some health problems and "woods' time" and "practice time" had been limited—other things were more pressing.

Off in the distance I heard a gobble. I "cut" on the mouth call, and immediately he gobbled back, closely followed by three other gobbles from different directions. All were several hundred yards away. I looked at my watch-11:02 a.m. For the next twenty minutes I "yelped", "purred", "cut", "gobbled", and "whined". The gobblers were coming from different directions-but which one would get here first? I thought for a moment I heard a gobbler "drumming", but after seeing nothing, I decided it must have been the wind. I turned my head to the left and there stood a huge gobbler just breaking out of full strut at 20 yards. To get here from that direction he had crossed ditches, a creek, and a gravel road. I had heard "drumming" after all! He spotted my decoy and with his beard dragging the ground he came straight in. At about 15 yards he stopped and stretched his neck, looking all around. He spotted a second decoy and stepped closer. My bow was up and ready-I debated shooting straight into his backbone as he advanced with his head held low, covering his breast. No, wait for him to turn broadside. As if on command, he turned broadside, and I picked a feather on his wing and began my draw-then it happened! The worst case of "gobbler fever" you can imagine. I released the arrow and watched in horror as the broadhead-tipped arrow passed 18" over his back and split a sapling 3 yards behind him! He quick-stepped behind a clump of brush and gobbled. He

walked away gobbling every few steps, but never gave me another shot. I looked at my watch—11:24 a.m. I had blown the perfect shot! (I still have nightmares about that!) I stepped off the distance to the sapling—12 steps. I had missed an unsuspecting gobbler in the 24-25 lb. range at less than 10 yards! After over 20 years of bow hunting, I never get "buck" or "gobbler fever" until after the shot—then I fall apart. Nerves shot, legs trembling, arms shaking, heart pounding, and ragged breaths—all after the arrow leaves the bow—but not today! Maybe it was all the emotional strain over the past weeks, maybe it was the lack of practice and lack of time spent in the woods. Whatever, I had lost my cool, and "blown" a "gimme" shot!

Later I thought about what had happened and realized that

God had just shown me another object lesson. No matter how long we've been a Christian, and no matter how "mature" we are—we are still human! We can experience "spiritual gobbler fever". We never completely outgrow the natural man's tendency toward sin. If we fail to keep "practiced up" through prayer, Bible study, and service, we can slip back into that sinful nature that lies just below the surface in all of us. If the stress of life keeps us from being at our very best—we stand a good chance of "blowing the shot". The Apostle Paul warns us in I Corinthians 10:12:

"Wherefore let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall." My prayer is, that no one experiences "spiritual gobbler fever" that can wreck lives and destroy ministries, no matter how strong or effective they may have been in the past!

A Small Part Of The Unfinished Chapter A Tribute to Marie Hanna

At Mom's memorial service in Nashville, I missed a terrific opportunity. The service had gone on quite long before my time to speak—not long enough to do Mom justice, but too long for the endurance of all of the kind folks who had come to honor her, comfort her family, and praise her God for His work in her life. So, as I made my way to the platform, a leader on the stage rose to the podium and asked the congregation to stand.

When I arrived at the podium, what was I to do? I was faced with a standing, and tired, audience. It was a down moment. They were standing to get a break, to stretch their hurting backs. I sensed their weariness and wanted to give them a lift. So I said, "Now if you were all to clap, that would be a standing ovation! And we know who it would be for." It was enough to get them all back in their seats and I went on to briefly share with them some thoughts directly from my heart at that moment. But, given that fully unanticipated situation, here's what I could have said about my Mom to finish the thought.

Now if you were all to clap, that would be a standing ovation! We are told in Hebrews about a great cloud of witnesses that surrounds us; it's a part of the great chapter on faith which is as yet unfinished, for all the books on earth could not contain it. For me, the writer conjures up images of a great athletic competition with fans raring in the stands. When you're in a stadium, you stand up and cheer the success of what's being done on the field. What is happening today is kind of a mirror image of what happened with that great cloud of witnesses throughout Mom's life. We are here to applaud what we have seen in her life, but I've seen Mom live by faith and I know that that great cloud of witnesses has gotten excited and given her a lot of standing ovations. Many times and in many ways, she got them to stand up and cheer.

Just after the Faith Chapter, Hebrews also tells us to lay aside our encumbrances and run with endurance the race that is set before us. It is probably because of Mom's example that I have such a personal appreciation for endurance in life—and endurance sports. Mom wasn't the proverbial rabbit. She was always in the race. She often said she didn't want to run ahead or lag behind God's leading. Marathon runners talk about hitting the wall. They reach a point where they feel that they can go no further and many do not complete the race. It is usually toward the end of a marathon that the group of leaders breaks apart and one comes out of the pack to take the tape. And then a great cloud of witnesses rises to their feet and cheers the performance. Mom didn't wait to get in the race, and she was in it until the very end. She ran the race with endurance.

Mom was a book of James kind of woman: quick to hear, slow to speak and slow to anger. Much of that might have come from her Dad and Mom and the mid-western culture in which she was reared. What I knew of my grandparents was enough to prove to me that, for them, it mattered much more what you did than what you said. So Mom didn't say much, but her actions said plenty. So too, as you have heard repeatedly in the memorial service, Mom did that. In fact, it's probably better to say that

Mom lived the Gospel in India than to say she carried the Gospel to India. It's the actions of the athlete and the work of faith that are cheered by the great cloud of witnesses.

When I was three, our family spent about a year in Nashville. My brother and sister went to school, my Dad went to college and took services. Dad traveled on the weekends while most other students got their work done. He must have done his work at night while most other students spent time with their families and slept. It probably was a difficult year for Mom. Today, I could draw the floor plan of the house where we stayed. How many of us could remember the place where we lived when we were three? And why do I? It's because Mom was working in every room of that house and I followed her around all day. I still have an image of her in my mind in that kitchen with a broom. Because the sunlight is coming in the window and it's morning, I could even tell you the direction the house faces. Through her actions, Mom demonstrated her love and concern for her family, and the great cloud of witnesses must have risen to cheer.

One day, when I thought I should be outside playing with my brother and sister, Mom took me into her bedroom in our Mussoorie house. (The house was named Aloha.) She wanted me to memorize a verse and worked with me until I got it. She also led me to understand its meaning. She knew what was most important for me that day. I expect she had prayed about it for a long time. I must have been in kindergarten or younger. I have only recently come to remember that experience, but I believe it was a time of angel rejoicing and wild cheering in that great cloud of witnesses. The verse was John 3:16. Like Mom, I'll never perish and I have everlasting life.

After my senior year in high school, Dad had to fly back to Sonapurhat to close the accounts before a six-month furlough. (Mom and Dad like to be in America while we began our transition to life over here.) Mom and I, along with Bharosi Bhai, our helper, and a lot of baggage, took the train. When we got to Lucknow, we had tickets for the remaining two nights and a day of travel across the hot plains of North India, but we had no reservations.

That evening, I got some coolies (porters) and took the luggage to the platform, but there was literally no space on the train. While Mom went back to the waiting room with the coolies and the luggage, I went to the ticket master's office with Bharosi Bhai. In my own youthful exasperation and impatience, I angered the man and he wouldn't give me reservations for the next train. which left the following morning. When I got back to the waiting room, all seats had been taken and Mom was sleeping on the floor. No man or woman in that room had thought to give her a couch or share a seat. I was angered: in my eyes she deserved much better. But she never complained about such hardships. The next morning, I went and bought tickets in an air conditioned compartment and thereby got the only remaining space on the train home. You've got to understand that the most luxurious place in India's heat is an air-conditioned sleeper. While she got situated on the train, I went to the station master's office to get paperwork for a refund on the unused tickets. By the time I got back to the

train, it was about to leave and Mom had settled in. I thought she looked like a queen in all of that luxury. That was more like what I thought she deserved. In the space of eight hours, I had seen her live Paul's testimony of knowing how to be abased and how to abound. I was so proud of her.

James says to consider it all joy when you encounter various trials because the testing of your faith produces endurance. The crowd doesn't cheer what you say: it cheers what you do. Mom's endurance is evidence that she considered it all joy. James also says that those who persevere under trial are blessed because they will receive the crown of life which God has promised to those who love Him. Recently, I believe, Mom received that crown. She is now a part of that great crowd of witnesses, having completed her own episode for that great chapter of faith. And when you and I demonstrate a living faith in the arena of life, she is standing to cheer us on. For all of the remembrances of her faithfulness you have heard today, she would say, "May Jesus Christ be praised!"

In India, the women wear a dot on their foreheads as a kind of beauty mark. It's usually blood red, but many other colors are also used. It's a practice much like the western use of make-up. Hindus also receive a mark on their foreheads from the priests when they go to the temple to perform their worship rituals. Because of this association with a heathen practice, Mom always taught the Christian ladies to refrain from wearing a mark on their foreheads, as she also refrained. When Mom had her last stroke and the seizures associated with it, she fell and bruised her forehead. Every person who saw her in her casket saw that bruise on her forehead. Was it a cruel fact of life in India that no mortician was available to apply make-up and cover that bruise? I think not! God Himself placed that mark on her forehead to tell us what he thought of her. He gave her an authentic and visible external mark as a testament of her internal beauty!

Now, Mom would want me to say that the chapter on faith is yet to be finished and you and I have a part in it. She would want us to read Hebrews 11:1 – 12:3 and imitate her faith along with that of many others who have endured. And, I'm sure, she is a part of that great cloud of witnesses, vigorously cheering our endurance in the work of faith.

Five Advantages of a Revocable Living Trust (RLT)

1. The RLT gives complete control of your assets.

The RLT gives complete control of your assets, as long as husband and wife live, and the survivor of the two of them, for as long as that one shall live. At death the Successor Trustee, whom you have already appointed, disburses the estate as you have directed.

2. The RLT avoids probate costs.

Since the purpose of probate court is to establish what a deceased person owned, and who now receives his/her property, probating items is unnecessary. The RLT has this information.

3. The RLT is often settled more quickly.

Normal probate proceedings take at least six months, and can take much longer. Not so, with the RLT.

4. The RLT is a private transaction.

Probate proceedings, including estate inventory, are a matter of public record. Items transferred from the estate of a decedent by means of RLT are not made public.

5. The RLT makes provision in the event one becomes legally incapacitated.

The Successor Trustee, whom you have chosen, may act In your behalf, in the event that you, or your wife, become legally incapacitated. The court need not appoint someone.

There is no area of Christian stewardship more important than one's estate planning. Everything we have or hope to have comes from the Heavenly Father. It seems that we should be just as careful and responsible with what we pass on to others, as what we have while living here on earth. Yet thousands of dollars worth of savings, investments and life insurance is not passed on to those whom we wish to receive it, because proper planning was not given to this important matter.

The Missouri State Association of Free Will Baptists offers help in this area, through the Stewardship Commission. The services of a fine Christian attorney have helped many with this need. Dear Friends of Mexico,

This past month has been full of blessings for us here. First of all, Rachel and I are recovering from the transplant surgery of August 4th. Rachel is doing amazingly well just one month after surgery. We are still adjusting the anti-rejection medications that she must take the rest of her life. It requires a lot of lab work and follow-up visits, but Rachel is adept at medical procedures now. She wears a mask every time she leaves the house as her immune system is very suppressed. Over time, this will improve, but, right now, we do not want her to get sick. Thank you so much for your prayers, cards, letters, and gifts for Rachel. They have meant so much to all of us. We are overwhelmed by your concern for her.

On the 31st of August, the Seminary of the Cross in Reynosa, Mexico, had opening services for the new semester with over 200 attending. President Hilarino (Lalo) Gonzalez and his team has worked hard preparing for the new semester and recruiting students. We are pleased to announce that we have 26 students enrolled, each taking at least 9 hours. This is up from 11 last semester, a significant increase in enrollment, for which we are grateful. We must challenge the young people of Mexico to answer the call of God to reach the millions in Mexico still without Jesus Christ.

I just returned from a trip to Mexico City, where I visited with Pastors Jose Rendon and Oscar Hernandez. Our Christian brothers suffer much there, due to an alarming deterioration of the social order. You may have heard of the high crime rate in the area. In spite of this, our churches there are growing, souls are being saved, and new missions are being established.

In the new mission of Chilmalhuacan, Bro. Rendon took me to meet Bro. Rodolfo Galaviz, who is in charge of this new work. His son, Pedro, is about 35 years old. Just a week ago, he was kidnapped by the judicial police. A sack was put over his head, and he was driven out in the country about 1 1/2 hour from Cd. Neza. When he was taken out of the car, they told him to run, even though he had his head covered. When he ran, they shot the ground around him. He said he could feel the dirt kick up from the bullets. His legs and hands were full of cactus needles, as he could not see where he was running. They then took him in a house where they beat and kicked him.

He was told to sign a confession of a list of serious "crimes" which he refused to do, since he was not guilty. As Pedro retold the story, he pulled open his shirt and showed me about 20 cigaret burns where they tortured him. Just when he thought he could not resist any more, they gave up, admitting they had gotten the wrong man. I have often heard of this type of abuse, but this was the first time I had ever seen the results first hand. It moved me deeply.

Mexico is indeed a country in turmoil. The only hope for real peace for its 95 million inhabitants is to find Jesus Christ. That is why we labor there. The changed lives we see each day confirm the value of this work of God. The hopelessness we see about us motivates us to reach even more.

That is why we offer Christian training to the youth of Mexico. We must prepare them to reach their own countrymen for Christ. Thank you for helping us train them. We urge you to continue to help as we expand our witness for Christ in Mexico.

I wish we could personally respond to each one of you who so faithfully supports the work in Mexico. Please be assured that we are aware of your contributions and w so appreciate all you have done.

We remain your servants for the Lord in Mexico





FAMILY NIGHTS

Jim Weidmann and Kurt Bruner with Mike and Amy Nappa

There is toothpaste all over the plastic covered table. Four young kids are having the time of their lives squeezing the paste out of the tube—trying to expunge every drop like Dad told them to. "Okay," says Dad, slapping a twenty-dollar bill onto the table. "The first person to get the toothpaste back into their tube gets this money!" Little hands begin working to shove the peppermint pile back into rolled up tubes—with very limited success.

Jim is in the midst of a weekly routine in the Weidmann home when he and his wife spend time creating "Impression points" with the kids. "We can't do it, Dad!" protests the youngest child.

The Bible tells us that's just like your tongue. Once the words come out, it's impossible to get them back in. You need to be careful what you say because you may wish you could take it back." An unforgettable impression is made.

Impression points occur every day of our lives. Intentionally or not, we impress upon our children our values, preferences, beliefs, quirks and concerns. It happens both through our talk and through our walk. When we do it right, we can turn them on to the things we believe. But when we do it wrong, we can turn them off to the values we most hope they will embrace. The goal is to find ways of making this reality work for us, rather than against us. How? By creating and capturing opportunities to impress upon the next generation our values and beliefs. In other words, through what we've labeled impression points.

The kids are all standing at the foot of the stairs. Jim is at the top of that same staircase. They wait eagerly for Dad's instructions.

"I'll take you to Baskin Robbins for ice-cream if you can figure how to get up here." He has the attention of all four kids. "But there are a few rules. First, you can't touch the stairs. Second, you can't touch the railing. Now, begin!"

After several contemplative moments, the youngest speaks up. "That's impossible, Dad! How can we get to where you are without touching the stairs or the railing?"

After some disgruntled agreement from two of the other children, Jacob gets an idea. "Hey, Dad. Come down here." Jim walks down the stairs. "Now bend over while I get on your back. Okay, climb the stairs."

Bingo! Jim proceeds to parallel this simple game with how it is impossible to get to God on our own. But when we trust Christ's completed work on our behalf, we can get to heaven. A lasting impression is made. After a trip up the stairs on Dad's back, the whole gang piles into the mini van for a double scoop of mint-chip.

Six years ago, Jim and his wife Janet began setting aside time to intentionally impress upon the kids their values and beliefs through a weekly ritual called "family night." They play games, talk, study, and do the things which reinforce the importance of family and faith. It is during these times that they intentionally create these impression points with their kids. The impact? The kids are having fun and a heritage is being passed.

Intentional or "Oops"?

Sometimes, we accidentally impress the wrong things on our kids rather than intentionally impressing the right things. But there is an effective, easy way to change that. Routine family nights are a powerful tool for creating intentional impression points with our children.

The concept behind family nights is rooted in a Biblical mandate summarized in Deuteronomy 6:5-9.

"Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all our strength. These commandments that I give you today are to be upon your hearts. Impress them on your children!

How?

"Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up. Tie them as symbols on your hands and bind them on your foreheads. Write them on the doorframes of your houses and on your gates."

In other words, we need to take advantage of every opportunity to impress our beliefs and values in the lives of our children. A growing network of parents are discovering family nights to be a highly effective, user friendly approach to doing just that. As one father put it, "This has changed our entire family life." And another dad, "Our investment of time and energy into family nights has more eternal value than we may ever know." Why? Because they are intentionally teaching their children at the wisdom level, the level at which the children understand and can apply.

Truth is a Treasure

Two boys are running all over the house, carefully following the complex and challenging instructions spelled out on the "truth treasure map" they received moments ago. An earlier map contained a few rather simple instructions that were much easier to follow. But the "false treasure box" it led to left something to be desired. It was empty. Boo, Dad! They hope for a better result with map number two.

Step One: Walk sixteen paces into the front family room. Step Two: Spin around seven times, then walk down the stairs. Step Three: Run backwards to the other side of the room.

Step Four: Try and get around dad and climb under the table. You get the picture. The boys are laughing at themselves, complaining to Dad, and having a ball. After twenty minutes treasure hunting they finally reach the elusive "truth treasure box." Little hands open the lid, hoping for a better result this time around. They aren't disappointed. The box contains a nice selection of their

favorite candies. Yeah, Dad!
"Which map was easier to follow?" Dad asks.

"The first one," comes their response.

"Which one was better?"

"The second one. It led to a true treasure," says the oldest.

"That's just like life," Dad shares. "Sometimes it's easier to follow what is false. But it is always better to seek and follow what is true."

They read from Proverbs 2 about the hidden treasure of God's truth and we end their time repeating tonight's Jingle – "It's best for you to seek what's true." Then they indulge themselves with a mouthful of delicious candy!

The Power of Family Nights

The power of family nights is twofold. First, it creates a formal setting within which Dad and Mom can intentionally instill beliefs, values or character qualities within their child. Rather than defer to the influence of peers and media, or abdicate character training to the school and church, parents create the opportunity to teach their children the things that matter most.

The second impact of family nights is perhaps even more significant than the first. Twenty to sixty minutes of formal fun and instruction can set up countless opportunities for informal reinforcement. These informal impression points do not have to be created, they just happen—at the dinner table, while driving in the car, while watching television, or any other parent/child time together. Once you have formally discussed a given family night topic, you and your children will naturally refer back to those principles during the routine dialogues of everyday life.

If the truth were known, many of us hated family devotions while growing up. We had them sporadically at best, usually whenever our parents were feeling particularly guilty. But that was fine, since the only thing worse was a trip to the dentist. Honestly, do we really think that is what God had in mind when He instructed us to teach our children?

FROM THE TURNBOUGHS

VACATIONS are winding down here. Most of the believers in both of the churches here have arrived safely back home, with the exception of two or three who are still out there somewhere. The fact is that public grade schools do not begin here until later in September. High schools and universities begin in October. ANOTHER CHANCE

Sunday evening services were drawing to a close, when someone from the village of Seroudi, came in whispering in Silas' ear. He whispered to someone else, then left. After the final "Amen," we went to the hospital. This is the story as it happened.

There had been a soccer match at the village that afternoon. The opposing Team were sorry losers. They picked up rocks and started throwing—anywhere and at anybody. One of the sharp rocks sliced open the head of Silas' mother. A truck had been found and brought her into town to see the doctor. She was in surgery as we arrived at the hospital ... blood was all over several bystanders as we waited. At last, the doctor came out saying she was okay.

She is such a cute little Lady. She's just a small thing, but has a large smile and a firm hand shake. And, she's got a twinkle in her eyes that doesn't stop. After prayers we left her at the hospital. The following days I made several visits to see her—lots of times it was just handshakes and smiles, since we have a language problem: she doesn't speak French and my knowledge of Koulango can be placed in a thimble. In spite of this hurdle, we became friends almost immediately.

After being released from the hospital, she stayed with friends in town so she could make regular visits back to see the doctor. I took Christian ladies with me to visit her. I explained the Gospel and they Preached it! Of course, I don't know what they said, but it always took longer when they spoke. That pleased me for I felt she was given a clear-cut witness ... Did she want to "pray" and receive Christ? NO.

I found that difficult to believe since she'd been so very close to death's door just a few days earlier. Well, yes, she did want to be a Christian, but there was her mother. Her mother wasn't a Christian and she couldn't become a Christian and leave her mother. No trouble Madame, your mother can receive Jesus too. He died for all. But the Mother didn't want to change ... so the daughter felt she couldn't either. Time passed. More visits, but the same results.

Word came months later that Silas' Grandmother had died. How sad. Such a good woman, just wasn't saved. I waited for time to pass, then went to the village to see "Mother." I gave my sympathy and waited ... until only a few were around. "Is it time now?" I asked. Oh no, she couldn't make a decision until 40 days of mourning had passed.

After the required days had gone by, I made another visit. This time we sat outside on a backless bench under a shade tree ... other women were present while the same appeal was made. I was given a sweet smile, but no decision was made. How can she wait and wait, I wondered. I poured my heart out, thinking only of her.

It was quite a shock a couple of days later when word came in from Seroudi that one of Silas' aunts had died. "Did I ever meet this aunt?" I asked Silas. And the reply that was given still echoes in my mind – "Oh yes, she was there on the bench with you as you spoke with my mother earlier this week." I had been so burdened for Silas' mother that my vision had been severely limited and I hadn't talked to the others. Did the aunt hear, understand and make a decision? I do not know.

Silas and many others have witnessed to this Mother. How many more chances will she have before it is too late? How many more chances will I have to talk to her? Lord, forgive me for my limited vision. Help me to see the multitudes that need you as well as the individuals.

The last time I talked to this dear Lady, she assured me that she is "thinking" about making a decision for the Lord. How many times has she been spared so far? Many. And how many times have I had tunnel vision instead of wide-angled vision? ... I'm afraid the answer is the same. May God be merciful to us both.

Creeches Unable to Return to ICA Dorm

Missionaries Paul and Rhoda Creech will be unable to return to their ministry as dormitory parents at International Christian Academy in Bouake, Cote d'Ivoire.

After specialized evaluation of the Creeches' four-year-old son, doctors diagnosed Joseph with "Pervasive Development Disorder, Not Otherwise Specified." In lay terms, he had deficiencies in communication, social and play skills.

Paul and Rhoda recognize that ICA is not equipped to provide the special education and training Joseph will need, so they and the foreign missions staff are praying that the Lord will open another door in Africa or some other field where they can minister while providing for Joseph's needs. In the meantime they will continue their stateside ministry and seek to get the attention Joseph requires.

General Director R. Eugene Waddell expressed regret that the Creeches must change directions but commended them for their faithful service at ICA for the past six years.

In light of this change, the Foreign Missions staff and the Ivory Coast field council are urgently seeking a couple to accept the challenge of providing 20 MKs (boys) a "home away from home." This ministry offers the opportunity to encourage and counsel missionaries' children in the absence of their parents who are taking the message of Christ to unreached people.

Brother Waddell emphasized the urgency of getting a couple approved, prepared for the task and on the field before school opens in August of 1999. "Our agreement with the school obligates Free Will Baptists to provide dorm parents for this dormitory," says Waddell. "We must have someone soon. 


