PUTTING GOD BACK IN THE PUBLIC SQUARE

Roy S. Moore Circuit Judge, 16th Judicial District

Since 1992, Roy S. Moore has been a circuit judge for the 16th Judicial District in Etowah County, Alabama. A former deputy district attorney, he is also a Vietnam veteran who served as a captain, a company commander, and a battalion staff officer in the military police corps. He graduated from the U. S. Military Academy at West Point in 1969 and the University of Alabama School of Law in 1977.

For his achievements in the community and on the bench, Judge Moore has received awards from several prominent national organizations, including the Center for Christian Statesmanship, the Family Research Council, the American Family Association, the Declaration of Independence Foundation, the African American Family Association, and the Valley Forge Foundation. Judge Moore's seven-year battle to preserve religious freedom of expression in the courtroom and in the public arena has earned him national media attention.

Moore has been sued for displaying the Ten Commandments in his courtroom. He discussed his case in a student-sponsored lecture on the Hillsdale campus in early 1999.

Judge Moore's remarks are based in part on his article that appears in the Summer 1999 issure of the Cumberland Law Review.

n his first official act, President George Washington did something that would be unthinkable today. He prayed in public! Specifically, during his inaugural address he made

fervent supplications to that Almighty Being who rules over the universe, who presides in the councils of nations, and whose providential aids can supply every human defect, that His benediction may consecrate to the liberties and happiness of the people of the United States a Government instituted by themselves for these essential purposes . . . No people can be bound to acknowledge and adore the Invisible Hand which conducts the affairs of men more than the people of the United States. Every step by which they have advanced to the character of an independent nation seems to have been distinguished by some token of providential agency.

If that were not enough, Washington added, "We ought to be no less persuaded that the propitious smiles of Heaven can never be expected on a nation that disregards the eternal rules of order and right which Heaven itself has ordained."

Two hundred years later, few government officials are bold enough to make earnest professions of faith. It seems that politicians can do just about anything in public but pray, unless it is obligatory (during, say, an annual prayer breakfast at the White House). They can survive scandal and immoral conduct, but they suffer ostracism and worse once they are labled members of the "Religious Right."

Even the American justice system, which is firmly rooted in the Judeo-Chrisitan tradition, has developed a bias against public worship and the pub-

lic acknowledgment of God that ought to give the most militant atheist cause for concern. If judges can deny Christians and Jews the right to express their beliefs in the public square, they can surely deny secular humanists (devout believers of a different sort) the same right.

In California, creches and crosses have been removed from downtown Christmas and Easter displays.

In Kansas, city hall monuments featuring religious symbols have been torn down.

In Rhode Island, high school graduation invocations and benedictions have been banned.

In Alabama, students have been prohibited by federal court order from praying, from distributing religious materials, and from even discussing anything of a devotional or inspirational nature with their classmates and teachers.

And in Ohio, an appellate court has overturned the sentence of a man convicted of raping an eight-year-old child (Continued on Page 6)

Reverend Cecil Campbell At Home With the Lord

On July 18, 1999 Rev. Cecil Herbert Campbell died at age 88 at Riley Oaks Manor in North Little Rock, Arkansas. Brother Campbell was well-known to Missouri, after investing 47 of his 58 years in the pastorate to 12 Missouri congregations. He pastored 11 years in North Carolina at two churches in New Bern.

Rev. Campbell was born on September 28, 1910 in Stella, Missouri, and graduated from Wheaton High School in 1930. He married Jewell Marie Lewis on June 22, 1935. Often referring to himself as a "country preacher," he preached his first sermon on September 5, 1930 and was ordained as a Free Will Baptist minister by the Indian Creek Association at Jones Chapel FWB Church.

Brother Cecil began his pastoral duties at the age of 21 in Cartersville, Missouri. In addition to pastoral duties, he stayed active in denominational outreach, moderating several district associations as well as the Missouri State Association. While pastoring in North Carolina, he served five years as chaplain for the New Bern Police Department.

Except for a four-month recovery period after a heart attack in 1988, Brother Cecil remained active with revivals and pastoral duties for almost 70 years. He was a skilled electrician, plumber and carpenter, and, as a bi-vocational pastor, worked at 13 different vocations while supporting his family in the ministry. He even built his own home on the farms where he and his wife grew up. He was a breeder and trainer of Border Collies, a Red Cross volunteer, and worked for 20 years as a rural mail carrier. His final pastorate was at Oskaloosa FWB Church in Liberal, Missouri (1977-1990) where he drove the 170-mile round trip for 14 years until deteriorating health forced him to retire at age 80. During his retirement years, Brother Campbell gave much time and energy to the Missouri FWB Historical Commission which he chaired.

Cecil Campbell was known as a man of prayer. His son, Lewis, said, "When Daddy prayed, it was like he was talking to a neighbor."

Funeral services were conducted July 22 at Jones Chapel FWB Church in Neosho where he pastored (1946-1951) and where he was a member at the time of his death.

He is survived by his wife of 64 years, Jewell Campbell; his son, Lewis E. Campbell of North Little Rock, Arkansas; his daughter, Judith Campbell Bird of Washington, D. C.; two sisters, one brother, four grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

ten times. Why? Because the judge who pronounced the sentence quoted from the 18th chapter of Matthew: "But whoso shall offend one of these little ones which believe in me, it were better for him that a millstone were hanged about his neck, and that he were drowned in the depth of the sea."

In the courtroom in which I preside, the public display of the Ten Commandments and voluntary clergy-led prayer prior to jury organizational sessions have sparked not only a national controversy but also an epic legal battle. In 1995, I was sued in federal court by the ACLU and the Alabama Freethought Association. Just prior to that case being dismissed for lack of standing (the ACLU and Alabama Freethought Association failed to show that they had been or were about to be injured), a separate lawsuit was filed in Alabama state court requesting a ruling on whether the First Amendment to the United States Constitution prohibits the display of the Ten Commandments and voluntary prayer in the courtroom. A state circuit court judge presiding in Montgomery County, Alabama, held that the practices in Etowah County were unconstitutional under the First Amendment's "Establishment Clause," which reads, "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion . . . " It would appear that the circuit court judge and others were not impressed when the members of the U.S. House of Representatives and the U.S. Senate passed a resolution stating that

(1) the Ten Commandments are a declaration of fundamental principles that are the cornerstones of a fair and just society; and

(2) the public display, including display in government offices and courthouses, of the Ten Commandments should be permitted.

The state circuit court's ruling was appealed to the Alabama Supreme Court and, appropriately, was set aside by the Alabama Supreme Court in 1998. Nevertheless, federal constitutional issues regarding public worship and the public acknowledgment of God remain unresolved.

Church and State

In a 1997 law review article, Brian T. Collidge expressed the opinion of many in the legal profession when he claimed that the mere display of the Ten Commandments in the courtroom is a "dangerous" practice. Although Collidge concedes that the Commandments reflect universal teachings that are beneficial to a civil society, they make explicit references to God, and, in his view, this is an unconstitutional breach of the "wall of separation between church and state."

This now famous "wall of separation" phrase does not appear in the Constitution, the Declaration of Independence, the Articles of Confederation, or any other official American document, yet millions of Americans have been led to believe that it does and that, in the words found in a 1947 Supreme Court decision, "the wall must be kept high and impregnable."

The phrase is actually mentioned for the first time in a letter President Thomas Jefferson wrote in 1802 in reply to an inquiry from the Danbury Baptist Association. Jefferson said,

Believing with you that religion is a matter which lies solely between man and his God; that he owes account to none other for his faith or his worship; that the legislative powers of the government reach actions only, and not opinions, I contemplate with soverign reverence that act of the whole American people which declared that their legislature should make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof, thus building a wall of separationbetween church and state.


But did Jefferson mean that the government should in no way support religion? To find the answer we must go back more than one hundred years before he wrote to the Danbury Baptist Association. Jefferson was strongly influenced by John Locke, a well-known English philosopher, who published "A Letter Concerning Toleration" in 1689 in which he clearly defined the proper church-state relationship. Locke stated that "the magistrate has no power to enforce by law, either in his own Church, or much less in another, the use of any rites or forms of worship by the force of his laws."

Herein lies the true meaning of separation between church and state as the concept was understood by Jefferson and the other founding fathers. Government may never dictate one's form of worship or articles of faith. Not all public worship of God must be halted; on the contrary, freedom to engage in such worship was the very reason for creating a doctrine of separation between church and state.

Two days after he wrote to the Danbury Baptist Association, Jefferson attended a church service conducted by John Leland, a prominent Baptist minister, in the halls of the House of Representatives. Throughout his presidency, he attended similar services, which were often held in the north wing of the Capitol. From 1807 to 1857 church services were held in a variety of government buildings where Congress, the Supreme Court, the War Office, and the Treasury were headquartered.

Obvisouly neither Jefferson not any other officials in the early Republic understood separation between church and state to mean that the federal government was precluded from recognizing the necessity of public worship or from permitting active support of opportunities for such worship. Indeed, they plainly recognized that the duty of civil government was to encourage public professions of faith. Perhaps this is why John Jay, the first chief justice of the Supreme Court, specifically authorized the open-



WORDS For Women

he old adage, "A woman's work is never done," has never been

more applicable than for 1999. The roles and responsibilities of women down through the years have changed dramatically.

In the generation of most of our grandparents and greatgrandparents, the role of the woman was almost exclusively that of making a home and rearing children. But in those days "making a home" went beyond cooking, dishwashing and floor-sweeping. It also included the hard

physical labor of tilling the soil, planting, growing and harvesting the families' food; and then canning and preserving all that could be saved. She also may have assisted her husband with all the other heavy chores just to survive. All this responsibility was often accompanied by tending several children all at the same time! Whew!

Thankfully, times have changed due to our progress with modern conveniences and timesavers that make our lives much easier. But in spite of all our progress, women are busier than ever with never enough waking hours to accomplish all that our days require.

Many families today rely on two incomes just to make it financially, so that thrusts most women out of the home and into the workplace. And the number of single mothers raising a family alone is a staggering figure. So, after a long and tiring day at the office, in the factory, in the classroom, or on the road, most women arrive home in the evening with "Job #2" awaiting them. They then fall into bed at unreasonably late hours, only to awake the next morning and begin another hectic schedule identical to the day before.

So . . . where does our time with God fit into this picture? Even though our prayer time is the most important time slot on our daily schedule, unfortunately that slot may be the one that gets erased off completely, to be replaced with something or someone else.

I recently finished an excellent book on prayer that is a classic by Charles Spurgeon. He devoted an entire chapter to a form of prayer which he called "Exclamatory Prayer"—which merely means short bursts of on-the-spot prayers that can bring peace and rescue to any kind of day, any need, any situation. It doesn't require an altar or solitude, kneeling or closing your eyes. You can activate it any place, any time, whether standing, sitting, driving, or working. No matter what, when or where, a little shortand to-the-point prayer reaches the ear of God. 1 Thessalonians 5:17 tells us to pray without ceasing. So even in the middle of our most helter-skelter day, we still can keep the channel open and active between us and heaven.

Have you ever been in your car and knew you were lost ... and late? I have. And if you've cried out in desperation, "Lord, help me find my way!," then you've practiced exclamatory prayer. Spurgeon says it takes no time, it works, and God accepts it and responds.

How about when you're in line at the grocery store and the check-out clerk is super-slow and keeps making errors, and you were due home thirty minutes ago? Have you breathed these words under your breath, "Lord, help me to show your love to this girl even though she's pushing my patience to the limit!" If so, you've again practiced exclamatory praying.

We've all felt our hearts slipping off track when temptations try to overtake us and sin looks so appealing to us. That's when we can quickly intervene with, "Lord, hold

> me up," or "Keep me by your grace." It immediately brings God's resources to us and brings our focus back on Him.

> Even though exclamatory prayer should never replace our daily time with God (that special time should be reserved for our closets), we still can take advantage of God's

availability to us any time. It shows that we are continually seeking Him and trusting Him as our first resource instead of our last resort.

God is interested in *every* area of our daily living, and He is waiting for us to beckon Him in every situation. 1Chronicles 28:9 says, *"If you seek him, he will be found by you."* Seek Him at any moment on any day. Why not just whisper right now, "Lord, what a beautiful day you've given me today!" He's waiting to hear from you.

ing of jury sessions over which he presided with voluntary prayer led by local clergy of the Christian fiath.

Many believe that James Madison, as chief architect of the Constitution and the Bill of Rights, led the fight to keep religion out of politics. In truth, he was more interested in protecting religion from politics. In 1785, two years before the Constitutional Convention, he wrote a *Memorial and Remonstrance* opposing a Virginia bill to establish a provision for teachers of the Christian Religion. He stated that man's first duty is to God, and that "religion, or the duty which we owe to our Creator, and the manner of discharging it," was a right and a duty "precedent both in order of time and degree of obligation, to the claims of a civil society. Before any man can be considered as a member of civil society, he must be considered as a subject of the Governor of the Universe."

Madison championed the First Amendment's Establishment Clause with one overriding purpose: to keep one sect from gaining an advantage over another through political patronage. This is a far cry from denying public worship or the public acknowledgment of God. Madison also made sure that the Establishment Clause was followed by the "Free Exercise Clause," so that the First Amendment would read, in relevant part, "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof "

Both Jefferson and Madison would have agreed with United States Supreme Court Justice Joseph Story's definitive *Commentaries on the Constitution of the United States* (1833) in which he posed the question of whether any free government could endure if it failed to provide for public worship. They would have concluded, as did Justice Story, that it could not. Justice Story explained that

the promulgation of the great doctrines of religion, the being, and attributes, and providence of one Almighty God; the responsibility to him for all our acitons, founded on moral freedom and accountability; a future state of rewards and punishments; the cultivation of all the personal, social, and benevolent virtues; these never can be a matter of indifference in any well ordered community. It is, indeed, difficult to conceive, how any civilized society can well exist without them.

s I talk with pastors, the lament I'm hearing is the

same. "We need a men's ministry, but just can't find the men to lead it" or "Commitment from our men is hard to come by with everything else going on in their lives."

While I admit we seem to be busier now than ever before, the whole problem with building a strong men's ministry lies in one crucial area, COMMITMENT. Our churches need men to be committed to the cause of Christ. Strong men who love the Lord with all their heart who aren't afraid to take a stand for Jesus and to share his love with others. As men, we can make time for other outside activities whether it be recreational sports, surfing the internet or watching football every weekend. But when it comes to putting in the time to plan for ministry, (something Christ commanded us to do), we seem to find excuses such as "I'm not good enough," or "Joe has more free time than me," or "I already serve the church in other areas." Many men I've spoken with over the years tell me they would attend such activities if they were held, but alas, the church has no one to plan them and those same men who really need the fellowship and spiritual blessings do not receive them.

Men, we can do something about this. I know there are men who have a heart for this type of ministry in our denomination and just do nothing because they are afraid to take a leadership role and begin to make decisions. We've started planning service projects such as remodeling a Sunday School classroom, purchasing contemporary tracts for use in the church to help in evangelization efforts, involving men in preparing Bible studies that they normally would not participate in otherwise and many other similar activities. I think I speak for all in my goup when I say the Lord has poured out his blessings on us and we are seeing the increase. More men are coming now than ever before and hearts are being changed, all because we put oru fears behind us and began following Christ and trusting in him to guide us on the way.

You can do the same. It's all a matter of priority. Make in an important part of your life and other will follow and before you know it, you will have a life changing ministry that will benefit not only the men, but their wives, children, church family, pastors and work associates. Take the first step, ask the Lord for help. Go to your pastor and get his blessing and start inviting men to come and share their ideas. Get a charter through Master's Men and help the national office help you gwo your ministry. They need your support to pay their bills and increase the program and its offerings to participating churches.
