PUTTING GOD BACK IN THE PUBLIC SQUARE

Roy S. Moore Circuit Judge, 16th Judicial District

PART II

(Part I was printed in the Oct. issue)

Since 1992, Roy S. Moore has been a circuit judge for the 16th Judicial District in Etowah County, Alabama. A former deputy district attorney, he is also a Vietnam veteran who served as a captain, a company commander, and a battalion staff officer in the military police corps. He graduated from the U. S. Military Academy at West Point in 1969 and the University of Alabama School of Law in 1977.

For his achievements in the community and on the bench, Judge Moore has received awards from several prominent national organizations, including the Center for Christian Statesmanship, the Family Research Council, the American Family Association, the **Declaration of Independence** Foundation, the African American Family Association, and the Valley Forge Foundation. Judge Moore's seven-year battle to preserve religious freedom of expression in the courtroom and in the public arena has earned him national media attention.

Historical Precedent

When the federal legislature met in 1789, one of its first actions was to appoint chaplains in both houses of Congress. (Congress still recognized God by appointing and paying chaplains who open each session with a prayereven the recent session devoted to the impeachment proceedings President against Clinton.)

On the very day that Congress approved the wording of the First Amendment, its members resolved to request of President Washington a day of public thanksgiving and prayer for the peaceful manner in which the Constitution was formed.

A month earlier, Congress passed the Northwest Ordinance.

one of the most important documents in our history. Article III of the Ordinance declared, "Religion, morality, and knowledge, being necessary to good government and the happiness of mankind, schools and the means of education shall forever be encouraged.

Every president of the United States (with only one possible exception) has been administered the oath of office with his hand on the Bible, ending with the words "so help me God."

The Supreme Court begins every proceeding with the

ringing proclamation, "God save the United States and this Honorable Court."

Throughout our history, the executive and legislative brances have decreed national days of fasting and prayer.

Public offices and public schools close in observance of religious holidays.

United States currency bears our nation motto, "In God We Trust."

Also by law, the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag affirms that we are "one nation under God." Congress would not even allow a comma to be placed after the word "nation" in order to reflect the basic idea that ours in a "nation founded on a belief in God."

It is ludicrous and illogical to believe that it is constitutionally permissible for all three branches of the federal government to acknowledge God openly and publicly on a regular basis, and yet at the same time accept the notion that the federal government can strictly prohibit the states from doing the very same thing. Have we become so ignorant of our nation's history that we have forgotten the reason for the adoption of the Bill of Rights? It was meant to restrict the federal government's power over the states, not to restrict the states from doing what the federal government can do.

It is no wonder that our present Supreme Court Chief Justice William Rehnquist observed in a 1985 dissenting opinion that "the wall of separation between church and state is a metaphor based upon bad history, a metaphor which has proved useless as a guide to judging. It should be frankly and explicitly abandoned."

Rehnquist added that "the greatest injury of the 'wall' notion is its mischievous diversion of judges from the actual intention of the drafters of the Bill of Rights." He is right. The doctrine of separation between church and state has been abused, twisted, and taken out of context in recent court decisions in order to prevent the public worship and acknowledgment of God.

False Neutrality

The Pharisees demanded of Jesus, "Is it lawful to give tribute unto Caesar, or not?" He asked them to produce a coin and tell him whose image was inscribed on its face. When they replied, "Caesar's," Jesus gave his answer: "Render therefore unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and unto God the things that are God's."

We have to render an awful lot to Caesar these days, but we do not and should not surrender our freedom of conscience. The state can't tell us how we ought to think or what we ought to believe.

Following a bountiful lunch, an afternoon of singing and testimonies were enjoyed by everyone.

History of the Willow Springs Church

(abbreviated from the Church History book)

Seventy-five years ago some Christians in the Willow Springs Community saw the need for the establishment of a church—a place to worship and grow with fellow believers. Because of the burden and vision of a few in the community, efforts got underway to begin a spiritual link in the area, which progressed and grew into the establishment of an organized church.

Mrs. Charley (Nettie) Middleton approached "Uncle" Alfred Peachee about the possibility of beginning a prayer meeting in her home. After spreading the word, the attendance grew each week, and quickly the prayer meeting developed into new things— a Sunday school was organized and held in the Willow Springs Schoolhouse during the summer months.

Brother Grover West was elected as superintendent, and among some of the teachers were Brother Amos Peterson, Mrs. Sadie Melton, and Mrs. Ollie Watson. Some of the families who were instrumental in this new undertaking were: the Bartons, Michams, the Gourleys, Wiyricks, Peachees, the Middletons and the Frys.

A three-week revival was soon held at the schoolhouse with Brother Clarence Ussery. Some sixty souls were saved as God's Spirit moved. On September 30, 1924, Elders Clarence Ussery and John Plunk with Deacon H. Malone met with the congregation at Willow Springs and officiated in the organizing of the church. Brother Clarence Ussery was elected as pastor, with Henry Wiyrick and Bert Wiyrick serving as deacons, and Flora

Middleton as clerk. It was voted that services would be held the first Saturday, Saturday evening, and Sunday of each month.

By the 1930's, the congregation outgrew the little schoolhouse and it was obvious that a church building was needed. A committee was appointed and the vision quickly became a reality, as a church was erected through labor and materials donated by many people in and around the community.



In 1951, an addition was built on the north side of the original structure which included Sunday school rooms, a kitchen and a wing to the auditorium. In 1988, a new auditorium with a baptistry was erected on the site of the original auditorium, with a dedication service being held on October 30, 1988.

Due to the original vision and prayers of a few faithful believers, God blessed and is continuing to bless the Willow Springs Free Will Baptist Church. The pastors of the church have been: Clarence Ussery, Dee Royster, John Ratteree, Ruel Parker, Oliver Letterman, Fred Wynn, O. L. Allen, Curtis Wilson, Leland Horton, Tommy Carlson, Ezra Butts, Bud Hill, Steve Stidham, Gary Hutsell, Bob White, Ollie Wright, Bud Arnold, and Charles Crenshaw. The present pastor is Howard Anderson.

Ken Eagleton,Sr. At Home With The Lord

en Eagleton, Sr. passed away from this life to be with his Lord and Savior on August 26, 1999 following a brief lung ill-

ness. Funeral services were held in Nashville on the 28th (Ken and Marvis' 45th wedding anniversary date) and he was buried in a Veteran's Cemetery on the 30th.

Ken was diagnosed in May with a condition known as pulmonary fibrosis. This condition causes an inflammation of the lung tissue and replaces it with nonfunctional scar tissue, Initially, he responded well to his medication. During the second week of August he started getting progressively worse and had to be hospitalized on the 15th. He was put on oxygen and a number of tests were run. Aggressive treatment was initiated, but his lungs did not respond. The disease progressed much quicker than was expected.

Ken and Marvis first went to the mission field (Brazil) in 1958. They were active on the field until 1990. During this period Ken was involved in ministries of church planting, discipleship, and Bible teaching. Along with Dave Franks, he cooperated in establishing our first Free Will Baptist church in Brazil, located in the city of Campinas. He was a talented Bible teacher, having used his skills and his knowledge teaching in Bible Institutes, extension courses for church leadership, Sunday School, and youth camps. He made a profound impact on the lives of many people during his ministry there.

Since 1992 Ken has been working with high school teens through a program called TEAM, taking them on mission trips to our mission fields. One hundred twenty teens have gone to ten different countries under this program which he started.

Truly, Ken and Marvis have been used of the Lord in their ministries in the United States and in many other countries around the world. Many souls have been saved, many leaders trained for the ministry, and many young people challenged to give their lives for the Lord's service.

I have one final challenge for you. Ken and Marvis' account is \$14,000 in the deficit. I want to challenge you to give generously to erase this deficit in their account. What a fine way to give a final significant tribute to one of God's faithful servants who served actively as a Free Will Baptist foreign missionary for 41 years.

We hope to have the new ball field cleared and leveled by winter so work on the Tabernacle can begin in the able. If everyone works together and gives what they can, there is no reason why we cannot only achieve, but also surpass all of these goals.

Let's face it. There are many things we need to begin doing if we want our camp to meet the needs of the young

ments that we have needed for several years. While we are thankful for the more than fifty great years that our camp has served, let's be honest, there is need for improvement. While we realize that this new tabernacle will not meet all our future needs, it is a start. Before we can finish this building, we must raise at least


\$100,000. I realize that to many people that is a lofty goal, but we believe that this

project is God's will, He will move in

the hearts of people and they will give generously. Our real concern is the urgency of needing the funds by January 1st. Our goal is to have the building complete as soon as possible. The sooner the money is in hand, the quicker our youth will reap the benefits of this new facility.

By now you have heard some of the incentives for levels of giving. While asking for large donations will turn off some, we hope that everyone will give something. Many Free Will Baptist churches have been built and maintained with small contributions. Only \$5 per week would amount to \$260 in one years' time. While that is not a large sum by itself, combined with 99 other \$5 weekly contributions, it would become \$26,000. Most families can give \$5 per week. What we need is for our pastors to place this burden on the hearts of their congregations. Some will be able to give \$1,000, others \$500, \$100, etc. But all could give \$5.

We feel blessed to have kept the price for camp very low. As we have checked with other camps, we find that we are usually \$50 per camper below other camps. How God has blessed us and we have been able to do this for so many years is, in itself, remarkable. Your one-time gift can help us to keep our costs low. It is important that our camp be not only attractive to our youth, but also afford-



people across our state. For example, last year there was a young girl who attended our camp in a wheelchair. While most can walk across the gravel, it was a difficult endeavor for her. We must make our camp accessible for these special needs. That means that we need either a paved road or sidewalk from one end of the camp to the other.

Plans are to air-condition the kitchen by next year (this

needed to be done years ago, but funds were not available). Our playgrounds and mini-golf need complete renovation. Many of our cabins are in dire need of repair. We are not complaining. We are thankful that God is blessing us to begin the process of these renovations, but the problems with the structural integrity of the old tabernacle forced us to make it first priority. While we are aware of these other needs and will begin work on them as soon as possible, our first two projects are the new tabernacle and to finish the new ball field (the new tabernacle will be located on the old ball field).

God still owns the cattle on a thousand hills. If He chose to send a check to cover the expenses, we would certainly celebrate, but He will most likely use you so you can also receive the blessing of giving. Whether your name is on a brick on a wall or not, each time you visit the camp you will know you had a part in the ministry of this youth camp when you give to this project. Every time the evangelist gives the altar call, you have helped bring those children to the altar.

Decision time. How much can you give. . . and when will you give it. We will not begin to tell you when or how much to give. That is between you and God. God knows our need . . . God knows your finances. All is appreciated.

333 Enroll at Free Will Baptist Bible College

Free Will Baptist Bible College enrolled 333 students in late August, according to a report from Dr. Charles Hampton, Registrar. Students come from 24 states and nine foreign countries.

To date, there are 125 new and transfer students who are joining 208 returnees. Dr. James Cox, Director of Enrollment Management says, "This is the largest number of new students in at least 12 years." The dormitory population numbers 232, with 101 living off campus.

The enrollment total is well above spring projections due to a higher than usual number of summer applications. "A lot of our people worked hard, especially in summer camps, to reach young people who might not have considered coming to FWBBC," says Bert Tippett, Public Relations Director. "It appears that a reorganization of the Enrollment Management process and the addition of several summer recruiters paid off."

By classes, the present enrollment includes 126 freshmen, 86 sophomores, 57 juniors, 56 seniors, and eight special students. Sixty-one students are studying pastoral training or youth ministry. Thirty-two are taking missions studies.

Registration took place on the Nashville campus August 23 and 24, with 15 students registering from Missouri.

As Jefferson testified, "Almighty God hath created the mind free."

But in the latter half of the 20th century the state is trying to take by force the unalienable rights freely given to us by God, declared in the Declaration of Independence to be "self evident." Caesar is trying to tell us when, where, and how we can profess our faith.

In 1962 the Supreme Court outlawed a simple, 22word, nondenominational prayer devised by the New York Board of Regents and used in the New York public schools: "Almighty God, we acknowledge our dependence upon thee, and we beg thy blessings upon us, our parents, our teachers, and our country."

A year later the Court issued another ruling declaring that reading the Bible and reciting the Lord's Prayer in Pennsylvania and Maryland public schools was unconstitutional, thus outlawing "without the citation of a single case" practices that had existed in American schools for over 170 years. Writing for the majority, Justice Tom C. Clark asserted, "In the relationship between man and religion, the state is firmly committed to a position of neutrality." Justice Potter Stewart pointed out in his lone dissent that this was false neutrality indeed, designed to stifle public professions of faith. Justice Stewart also noted, "We err in the first place if we do not recognize, as a matter of history and a matter of the imperatives of our free society, that religion and government must necessarily interact in countless ways."

Both decisions represented a major turning point in our history. Judges were no longer interested in the "original intent" of the founders or in legal precedents (which they unapologetically and arrogantly failed to cite). They were eager to embrace the new doctrine of "judicial activism," which would allow them the opportunity to use their power to reshape society according to the attitudes and whims of the changing times.

Since the 1960s judicial activists have made a concerted effort to banish God from the public square. They have done this by deliberately destroying the distinction between "religion" and "religious activity." These terms may sound similar, but in fact they are very different. Religious activities may include many actions that would not themselves constitute religion. For example, prayer and Bible reading might be characterized as religious activities, but they do not constitute religion, and they are not limited to any specific sect or even to religious people. One may read the New Testament to gain wisdom, and school students may pray before a big exam. Neither activity was intended to be, is, or should be, proscribed by the First Amendment, even if practiced in public.

Sadly, however, it seems that the judicial activists are winning the war. Consider the 1997 case in Dekalb County, Alabama. There, a federal district court determined that a student's brief prayer during a high school graduation ceremony was a violation of the First Amendment because it alledgedly coerced unwilling citizens to participate in religious activity. We have evidently forgotten that nothing in the Constitution guarantees that an individual won't have to see and hear things that are disagreeable or offensive to him. We have also failed to realize that peer pressure and public opinion are not the types of coercion against which the framers were seeking to safeguard.

No student should ever be forced by law to participate in prayer or in other religious activity. But to outlaw the public acknowledgment of God simply because another student might have to witness it is as illogical as abondoning a school mascot or motto because it might not be every student's favorite or because some might not believe in "school spirit."

In this context, Justice Joseph Story is again worth quoting. He said: "The duty of supporting religion, and especially the Christian religion, is very different from the right to force the consciences of other men, or to punish them for worshiping God in the manner, which, they believe their accountability to him requires." Even more to the point, one of the most famous Supreme Court justices, William O. Douglas, once wrote that forbidding public worship discriminates in favor of "those who believe in no religion over those who do believe."

Disastrous Consequences

October 1997—Pearl, Mississippi; December 1997— Paducah, Kentucky; March 1998—Jonesboro, Arkansas; April 1998—Edinborough, Pennsylvania; May 1998— Fayetteville, Tennessee; April 1999—Littleton, Colorado. These dates and places—these outbreaks of mass violence and needless loss of young lives - serve as a cruel reminder of something gone wrong, desperately wrong, in a nation founded upon faith in God and a respect for His eternal commandments.

Liberal commentators in the media, academe, and the justice system deride the notion that restoring prayer and posting the Ten Commandments can help stem the tide of violence and bloodshed. They prefer secular solutions, especially ones that involve more federal spending and regulation. In effect, they favor more concertina wire, metal detectors, and armed security guards instead of the simple and effective teaching of moral absolutes.

Yes teaching moral absolutes is out of the question. "We don't want to trample on the civil rights of students." "We don't want to teach that one creed or one code of conduct or one lifestyle is better than another."

When will they understand that secular solutions will never solve spiritual problems?

Tragically, as in the days of the Roman Empire, we too have become accustomed to "bread and circuses." With our stomachs full and our minds preoccupied with the pleasures of this world, we fail to seriously ponder the reason for the tragedies that are regularly occurring before our very eyes. We rarely contemplate the significance of the judiciary's usurpation of power and suppression of religious liberty. When and if we do, we are too

often afraid to take a stand—ashamed of our faith in God, afraid to hazard the notion of putting God back into the public square.

We must not wait for more violence, for a total breakdown of our schools and our communities. We must not be silent while every vestige of God is removed from our public life and while every public display of faith is annihilated. The time has come to recover the valiant courage of our forefathers, who understood that faith and freedom are inseparable and that they are worth fighting for.

In the words of that great Christian and patriot, Patrick Henry,

We must fight! I repeat it, sir, we must fight!! An appeal to arms and to the God of Hosts is all that is left us!... Why stand we here idle? What is it that the gentlemen wish? What would they have? Is life so dear, or peace so sweet, as to be puchased at the price of chains and slavery? Forbid it, Almighty God! I know not what course others may take; but as for me, give me liberty or give me death!"

North Carolina Suffers From Hurricane Floyd

Dear Pastors, Leaders and Friends:

Free Will Baptist families in North Carolina have suffered the worst flooding disaster in 500 years. Forty people have died and the number is rising. The Federal Government can't really put a dollar amount on the loss because the waters are still high. The Free Will Baptist pastors in the center of this disaster tell me that the number of their members who have lost everything continues to rise. Most of them have anywhere from 7-10 families who have lost all they have, and do not have flood insurance to help them recover.

Multitudes of Free Will Baptists have not only lost their homes (structure, furniture, appliances, family antiques and heirlooms, clothes, vehicles, etc.), they have lost their businesses, places of employment, and farms. The domino effect will begin in a month's time with bankrupt families, businesses and farms, kids dropping out of college and Christian Schools, ministries going defunct, and on we could go. There is just no way to comprehend the massive destruction that has taken place and will take place. This is not going to go away for a long, long time.

But, on the brighter side, things and people are in motion to help. Here in North Carolina we have organized an account and a system to try to relieve our pastors and people. An account by the name of the <u>NC FREE WILL BAPTIST</u> <u>DISASTER RELIEF FUND</u> has been set up to take contributions to help Free Will Baptist families to cope with their losses. Contributions can be mailed to the *NC Free Will Baptist Promotional Dept., P. O. Box 67, Goldsboro, NC, 27533-0067.* A board of pastors (those who are in the center of all of this devastation), the Promotional Director and a representative from the Executive Committee will devise a plan to equitably distribute the funds that will be received.

Also, we have designated four churches to receive donated items such as furniture, food, clothing, etc. These churches are in a four-corners pattern which basically surrounds the worst of the flooding zone.
