State Convention Report

Great preaching, singing, and fellowship characterized the 87th session of the Missouri Free Will Baptist Convention. Three hundred and twenty-one registered to hear Reverends Milan Ruble, Don Walker, Jason Roberts, and Bill Evans develop the theme of the convention, "Conscious of the Past, Challenged by the Present, Confidence in the Future." Hearts were stirred and challenged by each speaker's presentation of the Word. Rev. Steve



Reeves delivered the Wednesday morning devotion that prepared the attendees for the final session of business.



Tuesday afternoon, Moderator Rick Dablemont delivered a timely Moderator's message before presiding over the business sessions. Tuesday afternoon and

Wednesday morning, the delegates heard the reports and approved the budgets of the state boards. The delegates also approved a \$5,000 gift from the Executive Office to Free Will Baptist Bible College and \$5,000 to Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. In other business they approved a constitution and by-law change, three resolutions, voted to hold the 88th session at the United Free Will Baptist Church in West Plains, and to give the Wednesday evening offering of \$957.53 to the Show-Me Plan. The other offerings of \$422.46 will be used for convention expenses. Please note the reports at the end of this



article. The State Officers, Moderator Rick Dablemont, Assistant Moderator Richard Robinson, Clerk Jim Williams, and Assistant Clerk Rick Dement, are to be commended for the excellent job of handling the business.

The convention music was led by Curt Gwartney, Jim Williams, and Howard Dobkins. The special music featured






WAC are encouraged to promote Missouri State Home Missions in February.



"A life changing experience" was how one of our men described his experience at the National Master's Men Retreat in Conway, Arkansas April 27th - 29th.

Our men left for Conway and Camp Beaverfork early Thursday morning, April 27th and along the way shared special fellowship and anticipation of what God was going to do over the next few days. This was the second year that we had participated in the retreat; last year's being at Camp Hope in Ewing, Illinois. The men that went last year were very blessed and this year, with double the number of men, we expected a double blessing. We were not disappointed.

Rev. David Crowe from the Home Missions Department was our featured speaker for the weekend and his first sermon dealt with getting a "double portion" of God's spirit in our lives and when the altar call was given for the men to truly commit themselves to God's call on their lives, the altar was full! Every man came to re-commit himself to a life of purity, holiness and commitment!

The next day we started with a devotion from the newest member of Master's Men, Brother Kenneth Akers, who is the director of ministry development. He spoke of having a good name and having strong character. Following the devotion, Rev. Crowe delivered a strong message on being a committed, loving, and encouraging church. Constitution and By-Law Change

Article 21 was changed to read: (the section in italics was added to article 21) The General Board shall have power to act in behalf of, and for the State Association from one regular session to another, and shall have power to elect such officers as may be necessary to carry out the plans and undertakings of the State Association. The General Board shall have the right to employ an Executive Secretary who shall serve as treasurer of the Association except in cases where this responsibility shall be expressly delegated by the General Board or by these by-laws to some other officer, agent, or board of the Association, He shall make an annual financial report to the Association. The procedure for election of the Executive Secretary shall be: (1) The Executive Committee shall serve as a search committee to screen potential candidates. (2) The Executive Committee shall recommend one candidate to the General Board. (3) The Executive Secretary shall be elected by a majority vote of the General Board.

Resolution Committee Report

"Whereas:

The Bible speaks pointedly and plainly concerning the necessity of unity among believers, "Striving to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bounds of peace," and,

Whereas:

It is the intent and purpose of the devil to divide and destroy the unity by sowing seeds of suspicion and mistrust among us, "Be sober, be vigilant, for your adversary the devil, walks about as a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devour," and, Whereas:

There are some breaches in our Christian unity in some areas of our denomination.

We Resolve:

That the Missouri State Association urge our people to pray earnestly and sincerely for greater Christian unity in; (1) the local church (2) quarterly meetings and district associations, (3) the Missouri State association, and (4) The National Association.

#2. Whereas:

It is increasingly more difficult for missionaries and Christian workers to be admitted into Muslim countries, especially those bearing credentials with the words "Baptist" or "Bible" in the name of their educational institutions.

"Whereas:

It would be a recruitment tool for appealing to a broader base of potential students

Whereas:

Moving to a new campus would be the logical time for a new name,

The Fellowship Of Believers

"Tychicus will tell you all the news about me. He is a dear brother, a faithful minister, and fellow servant." Colossians 4:7

Do you think the same thing as I do when they show you that dessert tray at a restaurant? Every dessert looks so perfect, almost too perfect. Don't you just want to stick your fingers in one of those pieces of pie to see if it's real, not plastic?

Colossians 4:7-16 is a slice of the fellowship of the first century church. At first glance it seems like just a list of names. But when you take a closer look at these people you see how real the fellowship of the church really is. In these verses, Paul talks about real people and real life, both the joy and the pain, the ease and the struggle. Look with me at a few of these names. Tychicus, who helped Paul write this letter, reminds us that fellowship is a relationship.

Paul calls Tychicus his Dear Brother, a faithful minister and a fellow servant. These descriptions remind us of the kind of relationship we have as believers.

Brother — A family relationship

Minister — A working relationship

Servant — A Spiritual relationship

Onesimus reminds us that fellowship is all-inclusive. He was a former slave, an escaped slave, but now he is called "one of you." We can't even imagine how radical a statement this was for the first century church. The fellowship of Christ accepts him!

John Mark is also in this list, reminding us that fellowship is forgiving. You might remember that Paul had a falling out with John Mark earlier in his ministry life. Here, he accepts him as a fellow servant of Christ. You cannot hold onto grace and hold a grudge at the same time.

Aristarcus and Luke in this group are striking examples of the fact that fellowship is lasting. They were lifelong friends with Paul.

Demas helps us to honestly remember that fellowship means disappointment. If you love someone, you will sometimes suffer disappointment.

Epaphras is a great picture of the sacrifices that is in all genuine fellowship. He wrestled in prayer for the believers. He worked hard for them. One person with this kind of heart empowers many others to enjoy the fellowship that we have in Christ. The fellowship of Christ is an exciting place to be! In this short list of people who served the Lord together we have three of nine writers of the New Testament (Paul, Luke, and Mark). They must have had some GREAT small group Bible studies when they got together! There is no greater place to be, no more energizing place to be, than in the fellowship that Christ has given us with other believers. Oh sure, it's a risk. There might be a "Demas" in the group. But if you never get into a group, you'll never find life-long friends such as Paul found here, never find the relationships that stimulate your faith and change the world that you see in this chapter.

Bible College Plans Academic Olympics For High Schoolers

Free Will Baptist Bible College will host its first academic olympics for high school students, grades 9-12, on February 23-24, 2001, according to Dr. James H. Cox, Director of Enrollment Management.

Called "Brain Storm," the challenge will be issued for up to 16 teams from Free Will Baptist schools, churches and associations to meet in Nashville to see who has the top students. Teams may be comprised of from two to four students, with up to two alternates. Participants must be enrolled in a Free Will Baptist school or be members of a Free Will Baptist church.

The competition will include several fields of knowledge: Social Studies, Language Arts, Mathematics, Bible, Science, Current Events, Fine Arts, and the Free Will Baptist Denomination. The college will issue a bibliography of textbooks to help participants prepare.

An entry fee of \$150 will be charged, with participation limited to the first 16 teams who pay the fee. Trophies, certificates, and free participation in various Bible College-sponsored events will be awarded.

I heard a radio commentator say last week, "Christians are the light of the world; someone just needs to flip the switch." My immediate reaction was to



Honk For Encouragement

One, they rotate their leadership. When the lead goose gets tired, he rotates back in the wing and another goose flies point. (I'm sure one of the reasons leaders burn out is because they are expected to stay in front all the time and they just plain wear out.)

The second thing that they do is to create an upward air current for one another. As each bird flaps its wings, it creates an uplift for the bird immediately following. Then, by flying in a V-formation, the whole flock gets seventy-one percent greater flying range than if each bird flew on its own. (One reason for loneliness is that so many of us are all heading in our own directions rather than seeking to mobilize with each other in the same direction.)

Third, when a goose gets sick or is wounded by a shot or falls out, two geese fall out of formation and follow him down to help and protect him. They stay with him until he can fly again. (If people knew we would stand by them like that in the church, they would push down the walls to get in)

Finally, it's the geese in the back who honk; letting the leaders know that they're following and all is well. (I am sure, too, that if people thought we would be constantly honking encouragement to them, our churches would have standing room only.)

When was the last time you stopped to encourage the pastor or one of the leaders in your church? Gave a honk of encouragement to a hurting or lonely person in your church? When we are focused together in a cooperative way in what God's call is, we are able to save much time and energy.
