17. Am I proud?

18. Do I thank God I am not as other people, especially as the Pharisee who despised the publican?

19. Is there anybody whom I fear, dislike, disown, criticize, hold resentment toward or disregard? If so, what am I doing about it?

20. Do I grumble or complain constantly?

21. Is Christ real to me?

Elephants Never Forget

But Zion said the Lord hath forsaken me, and my Lord hath forgotten me. Isaiah 49:14

Birthdays are murder for me. Not my own you understand but trying to remember others! Would you believe that I even forgot my own birthday one year! I'm being honest here! You would think that a person could at least remember his or her own birthday, especially one that loves to get presents as much as I do! I don't mean to forget my loved ones. I certainly don't forsake them, but I just seem to have so many other things on my mind that I don't remember them. I've tried everything imaginable! Different calendars, cardholders and now a computer reminder calendar. (We'll see if it works or not!)

Forsaken is a pretty ugly word when we think of it in relation to ourselves. No one wants to be forsaken or forgotten. All of us need to feel connected to others in some way and all of us need to feel important to someone, yet there are many of us that cry out just as Zion did in Isaiah. Often we feel alone and floundering in the depths of our personal struggles. Often we wonder if any one cares about what we are facing or if any one can understand.

I know that I've been in that place. Wondering where to turn or what to do to find help or encouragement. Did God forsake me? No. Hebrews 13:5 answers that by saying that God will, "Never leave thee, nor forsake thee." So what happened? Why did I feel forsaken and alone? Chances are, God told me to go one way and I chose to go another. God didn't leave me, I left him. He turned right and I turned left.

A great example of that is with my son Joshua. When we go out, he hates to walk in front of us. He always wants to be behind us. We asked him why once, and he said that he was afraid that we would turn or go another direction, he wouldn't see us, and we would get separated. That is what happens with us and God sometimes. First, we are in the wrong spot to begin with - in front. We are supposed to follow God, and we can't do that from the front. Second, God is trying to show us the correct direction for us, but we are too busy looking at all of the wonderful worldly distractions. Separation is inevitable!

This also reminds me of my dog Harry. He loves the meaty smell of cheaper dog foods but they make him sick; when we give him something that is good for him, he curls his nose and acts offended. He doesn't see the bigger picture. He just sees what he wants. Isn't that like God and us? So often we don't see the bigger picture, therefore God must be wrong. No, God isn't wrong and we are quick to find this out when we reach the end of our chosen path. If anyone is forsaken or forgotten, I'm afraid that it is God. We just end up paying the price for it.

Not all circumstances are our own doing. Sometimes, we pay the price for the sin of others also. Sometimes, it's the result of others sin on our lives. Does God forsake us then? No. It just calls for a greater trust and faith in God on our part. We can't always change our circumstances but God can sustain us in them. 2 Corinthians 12:9 says, "My grace is sufficient for thee". God will never leave us, or forsake us. We will never be forgotten in the midst of troubles.

Remember, God is like an elephant He never forgets our needs, only our sin!



WHEN I'VE FAILED

On 29 November 1761 John Wesley wrote in his journal: Many have, and many do daily experience an unspeakable change. After being deeply convinced of inbred sin, particularly of pride, anger, self-will and unbelief, in a moment they feel all faith and love; no pride, no self-will, or anger: and from that moment they have continual fellowship with God, always rejoicing, praying, and giving thanks.

This work of transformation and change is an ongoing process. On a number of occasions over the years I've had to return to the Lord to ask Him to deal, with aspects of my being which I know have displeased Him. When I feel that I've failed, I need to face up to my sin and remember again the extent of His redeeming power-

The address read "The Chapel", and as there was no letter-box in the church, the postman had pushed it under the front doors as best he could. The contents, of the letter were bewildering. The writer, using prison notepaper, begged me to go to a nearby prison to visit him.

A week later, after-all the formalities had been completed, I was led down a long gray corridor and into a small interview cell. Keys rattled and the lock turned and I was led in to meet the prisoner. Two detectives arrived and sat behind me.

The prisoner had asked if he could make his confession to me, but with the police present. It was a horrific story of a murder and a life of sin. Eventually the man's life was transformed by the power of Christ. The prisoner could tell a new story: a story of repentance, forgiveness, and of a new beginning.

I never cease to be amazed by the wonder of the Christian Gospel. No matter how low we have sunk, how far we have strayed, or how foolish a life we have, lived, there is room in the love of Jesus for forgiveness and a new beginning. Many of us who are long-established Christians need to discover again the transforming power of this redemption.

I have a friend who is the minister of a small Yorkshire chapel. He is a keen artist, and often involves the whole congregation in celebrating their faith creatively.

One Sunday I watched as his congregation turned up with all kinds of rubbish they'd collected: scrap paper, empty boxes, and useless trash. Gradually they sorted through the refuse, and over the days that followed they discovered ways **6** of using it artistically.

By the following Sunday the mound of rubbish had been transformed into a powerful illustration of the cross. The twisted, broken scraps of refuse had been redeemed into something beautiful and elegant.

This is the work of redemption. This is what the Lord wants to do within us all, if only we'll let Him. He wants to take away the filth and sin of our lives, and forgive us. He wants to take away the guilt and shame, and transform us. He wants to turn us away from selfishness, and redirect us.

The "Daybreak" musical tour was absolutely exhausting. Every day we traveled to a different town to setup several tons of equipment, rehearse the local choirs and drama groups, and present the musical to a packed theater.

In the production I played the part of Simon Peter. Night after night I had to stand alone on the stage in a blinding spotlight and enact "the denial."

As the last chords of the last song faded, the lengthy derig in Southampton Guildhall began. Props, costumes and PA equipment were packed and trundled on trolleys to the waiting truck.

I looked up at the Guildhall clock; it was just after midnight. It was my turn to travel overnight in the truck. I clambered into the cab next to the driver and wrapped my coat around me. We were bound for Cornwall. . . it was going to be a very long night. The roads were covered with mist. The noise of the engine made conversation impossible; and no matter how I tried I couldn't find a comfortable position to sleep

Hour after hour we rolled along in this kind of unreal world. My thought turned back to the previous evening's performance. The sounds and images rolled around my mind and I relived Peter's denial.


I looked again at my own life, and the words of Peter's denial returned to haunt me. The swirling mist in front of the headlights created an eerie feeling of unreality.

As my mind backtracked down the years I began to feel a failure as a disciple of Jesus. I felt that there were areas of my life which I still needed to yield to His Lordship. I felt that I loved the work more than I loved the Lord.

As soon as we arrived in Cornwall I found a room and knelt to pray. I was broken. I offered every aspect of my life and ministry back to the Lord and asked Him to change me from within.

Today, reflect on those aspects of your life which are not pleasing, to the Lord. Do you really want to live in a continuing cycle of failure, selfishness and despair? Allow the Redeemer to transform those areas which you know are flawed; allow Him to change those wrong attitudes, that unyielded thought life, that root of selfishness and weakness. Hand over the trash in your life, and let Him get to work on redeeming you!

e stepped to the pulpit, and then stood dead silent, hiding his shaky knees behind the dark wood that separated him from the congregation. My stomach tightened in knots for him. He was nervous. I was nervous. In his face, showed the intensity of the moment. I put my head down and prayed that God would give him the words to start.

He too put his head down as if he were searching for the words to say. I grew anxious and the whole church, packed out that night, shifted in their seats. The church grew perfectly still, except for the pounding of my heart, as Jair lifted his head. His eyes were full of tears as he began his testimony. . . "I can never put into words what Christ has done in my life. I have to be honest, I'm not here as a new Jair. I'm not even a better Jair. I'm not even Jair. I was born again. The old Jair is dead.

It's not easy to get up and give your testimony in front of your friends, family and strangers. But, Jair wanted to. The words that he had said just floated in my head. He was right. He wasn't Jair. He wasn't the same guy I saw a year ago. He looked and acted differently. He even talked differently. He continued...

" I was waiting for death. I went to places that I knew I might not return. I did things that I knew could kill me. I ran with people who were dangerous. I knew that I wouldn't grow old. Because of my lifestyle, I didn't expect to be here much longer. Lots of other people my age had already died."

You could hear a pin drop in our church. Some nodding their heads identifying with the words he was saying, others bowed their heads in shame, because he was describing their life as it was now. Fighting the tears, (mine were flowing freely) Jair spoke his brother's name.

"Osmir would come over to my apartment and tell me about Jesus. I would laugh and make fun of him. I called him names. I was the oldest in my family but never the one that was responsible. My family didn't depend on me, they couldn't. They depended on Osmir. Osmir continued to look me up and I continued to reject him and his Jesus. But, I know he never stopped praying for me. . .Then my dad was killed, and I started felling the pain of a sinful heart. My eyes were opened."

Now the tears were streaming down his face, as well as Adriana's as she listened to her husband. I remembered her reason for getting saved. She had said she knew Jesus was real because she saw Him in Jair. He treated her differently. He stayed at home with her more. She was ready for the same Jesus that had transformed her husband. Jair closed his testimony with these words. "My dad never got to see the Jair that Jesus had help me to become. And I never got to help my dad see Jesus. But thank God the rest of my family has seen Jesus and my son will see Jesus in my life too. Let Jesus transform you before it's too late."

He sat down. God had spoken to His church through a changed life, a simple person. Jair had used simple words but there was power in each statement he had said. Jair didn't preach. He simply shared what Christ had done in his life. As someone once said, "It was one beggar giving other beggars the Bread of Life." That's evangelism, like I would imagine Jesus to be very pleased with.

How long has it been since you have shared Bread with another beggar?

If there is any one thing that breaks my heart, its looking out over the congregation and not seeing the faces of some, who use to be among our very best workers. But it happens! Each year it happens! Good, solid members of Peace Church fall prey to Satan's devices and thus, join the growing ranks of spiritual failures. Often I find myself wondering who and how many will be next? Perhaps you have considered throwing in the towel and joining their club. If so, I can give you a 3step plan found in your Bible - a "sure fire" plan that always succeeds in producing genuine failures for God. It's the plan followed by Lot and he wife as set forth in Genesis, chapter nineteen.

Step one: Be willing to tolerate the wickedness of this world (verses 1-14). Had there been just 10 righteous souls in Sodom, God would have spared the city. However, before any head-count could be made, the men of Sodom tried to rape the two angels who were sent to check out the city. Wow! That was enough for God! This city was to be destroyed. Peter informs us that the wickedness was so great in Sodom that Lot's soul was vexed every single day that he lived there (11 Pet 2:7,8). So, why didn't Lot just pack up his belongings and walk away from this place? He learned to tolerate the wickedness of the world. That's why! You see, that's how Satan's plan for our downfall begins. He places before us a very small wickedness. If we tolerate that, then he sends us a little more to tolerate. This is kept up until the Christian is finally overwhelmed and overcome by the world around him. Because he too, couldn't bring himself to walk away at first, he now finds himself unable to do so. He now tolerates things that used to disgust him. He has fallen so low that he finds no problem with tolerating the "Austin Powers" of today's sick society.

Step two: Determine to make only partial commitments to God (verse 16). Why on earth did Lot linger? Why did he have to be forced by angels to escape Sodom? Simple! He had been so programmed to compromise and half-hearted responses to God, that it was only natural for him to balk at fully obeying the Lord. In fact, Lot was so use to spiritual mediocrity that he found the simple life style of Abraham's country living unacceptable. That was part of his past life with the Lord and he didn't want any part of that. So, he begged God to let him settle in a city (verses 18-20). Christian, I must warn you! God has never accepted halfheartedness! It makes Him sick on His stomach (Rev. 3:16). Jesus said, 'He that forsaketh not all that he hath cannot be my disciple."

Step three: Fail to get away from Sodom's control when you've gotten away from Sodom's border (verse 26). Lot's wife got out of Sodom, but Sodom never got out of her. She looked back with a deep desire to return. Her heart was still

full of Sodom's parties, people, pleasures, and prosperity. Sodom succeeded in ruining Lot's wife and we are commanded to remember what it did to her. Like an adder, it bit her and destroyed her. The Bible is replete with examples of those who longingly looked back at some "Sodom" in their lives after being delivered. There were Samson, Acan, Saul, Solomon, Judas, Demas and others. Peter tells us about these spiritual "dogs," who return to their own vomit (11 Peter 220-22). You can spot them today in our fair city. You'll find them at the bars of O'Cools and Applebee's drinking their beer church members, who once knelt at our altar. You'll hear of their lying on beds of adultery - church members, who use to serve God at Peace Church. Were they ever saved? Only God knows the answer to that question. All we are told is that they have gone back to their own vomit; that their latter end is to be worse for them than the beginning; that they would be better off if they had never known the way of righteousness. They got out of Sodom, but Sodom never got out of them!

Have you pitched your tent toward Sodom? If so, turn around! Go back! If you have made the mistake of settling in this city of sin, escape now! Escape to the Mountain of God! Sodom is marked for destruction by God.. Please, I beg youl

Cut these months into thirty or thirty one equal parts. This batch will keep for just one year. Do not attempt to make up the whole batch at one time, (so many persons spoil the entire lot in this way), but prepare one day at a time, as follows:

Into each day put twelve parts of Faith, eleven of Patience, ten of Courage, nine of Work (some people omit this ingredient and so spoil the flavor of the rest), eight of Hope, seven of Fidelity, six of Liberality, five of Kindness, four of Rest (leaving this out is like leaving the oil out of salad- don't do it), three of Prayer, two of Meditation, one of well-selected Resolution. If you have no conscientious scruples, put in about a teaspoonful of Good Spirits, a dash of Fun, a pinch of Folly, a sprinkling of Play, and a heaping cupful of Good Humor!!

Pour into the whole Love, add Libitum and mix with Vim. Cook thoroughly in a fervent heat; garnish with a few Smiles and a sprig of Joy; serve with Quietness, Unselfishness and Cheerfulness and a Happy New Year will be a certainty

n order for a pastor, associate pastor, or full-time youth minister to participate in the Missouri Retirement Program, the church he is serving must support the Missouri State Cooperative Program with the full 10% of its regular tithes and offerings. This ministry is funded through cooperative giving. (The associate pastor and/or full-time youth minister must receive his salary from the church as a full-time employee.) The individual must also enroll with the Board of Retirement & Insurance in Nashville, Tennessee. The enrollment fee is \$10.00. This may be paid through the State Office, but it goes to the Free Will Baptist Board of Retirement & Insurance.

A Retirement Pension Enrollment Form supplied by the State Office shows the three plans for participation in the program..

Plan I is defined as Full Employer participation with the church contributing at least 5% of the base salary. A \$25,000 term life insurance policy is mandatory with this plan. The premiums are deducted from the employer contributions.

Plan 2 is defined as an Individual Plan with the employer or the individual contributing at least 3% of the base salary. The term life insurance is optional for Plan 2.

Plan 3 is an introductory plan. The individual or the employer contributes at least \$ 10.00 per month. The life insurance is not available with this plan.

Tax Deferred Contribution information: Only 25% of base salary is allowed for total tax deferred contributions. The 25% includes both Salary Reduction Agreement (SRA) (this SRA form may be obtained from the State Office or the Board of Retirement & Insurance) and employer (church) contributions. Base salary is taxable income which excludes Information Concerning Missouri State Retirement Program

benefits such as housing allowance. Ministers may include compensation for honorariums, revival offerings, etc.. Older ministers may, under certain circumstances, exceed the 20% by completing a form.

A new SRA may be filed once in any 12 month period. It is not retroactive. Increases may not be credited prior to the date of signature.

It is a member's responsibility to maintain and keep accurate records for tax liability and reports to IRS. It is recommended that you keep all SRA forms, semiannual statements, and correspondence, and that you seek competent counsel in all tax matters All tax deferred contributions are subject to income taxes the year of withdrawal or distribution. Early withdrawals may be subject to an added 10% penalty. At retirement, distributions for ordained members may be designated housing allowance and tax free (determined by current IRS regulations). Distributions from tax deferred funds to unordained spouses are subject to taxes.

Twice each year, shortly following January I and July 1, the Board of Retirement & Insurance, who holds the money in trust, disburses the amount stated by the Missouri State Association to the account of the participant. Presently the amount is \$400.00. Before this transfer is made the treasurer of the local church is asked to sign a form, sent from the State Office, stating that the church has supported the Missouri State Cooperative Program with the full 10% of its regular tithes and offerings.

There are several options at retirement. Space will not permit including all of this information. Please do not hesitate to call, write, or come by for any help that is needed.
