

#### The Ethics of Organ Donation

What follows is part two of three parts of a message presented at the Free Will Baptist Leadership Conference of the National Association of Free Will Baptists, December 7, 1999. Used by permission of Matthew Pinson.

#### 2. The Fundamentals

The second commitment that brought us together was a commitment to the fundamentals of the faith. Free Will Baptists had always been a people of the book. Those in both the East and West were holding onto the beliefs that Free Will Baptists had cherished since their origins in England in the early 1600s. They believed that in the Bible, it was God speaking, and He was speaking infallibly and inerrantly. People have laughingly called Free Will Baptists "biblicists." Well, we wear the name with pride. It has always been our hallmark. We are and always have been a people committed to the Scriptures.

You must understand that this was at the forefront of the minds of our forefathers who formed the National Association. The Controversy between the conservatives and liberals—what's called the Fundamentalist Modernist Controversy—was raging in this country. The liberals who denied that the Bible was God's Words were taking over colleges, seminaries, publishing houses, missions agencies, and entire denominations. New conservative denominations were being formed. The Fundamentalists were fighting for their lives. Indeed, they were fighting for the life of historic Christianity.

The northern Free Baptist movement—the Randall movement—was gobbled up by the Modernist movement. They allowed themselves to be overtaken. They failed to be vigilant for biblical truth. They were more concerned about

What does the Bible say about organ donation? I recently received a very interesting letter from a reader asking my opinion on this issue. So much is changing today in regard to the control of life and death and the understanding of many moral issues, some may think it is impossible to address these issues (such as medical ethics) from a Christian perspective. Even though the scriptures may not explicitly address specific issues, it is possible to evaluate our modern day practices in light of biblical priniciples.

As we do this, very careful attention should be payed to the context of the passage used to find answers. Issues which are not specifically and simply addressed should be answerable in the broad principial teachings of scripture. The issue of organ donation is a complex one. Since no direct or specific scripture may be found which precisely deals with this issue, we must then look for the implicit principles to govern our decision.

Biblical ethicists use different ways of categorizing this process. Here is a model for this (suggested by John & Paul Feinberg in ETHICS FOR A BRAVE NEW WORLD), one that I like to use to frame systematically any hard question that comes up. This is the text I used for our BIBLICAL ETHICS course taught here in Missouri in the Missouri Bible Institute in connection with Hillsdale FWB College in 1999.

Is the action:

- 1. MORALLY OBLIGATORY.
- 2. MORALLY PERMISSIBLE, or
- 3. MORALLY SUPEREROGATORY?
- 1. Is it imperative for me to donate my organs? Are there passages of scripture that clearly require me by compulsion or command to donate my body parts to others as proof of love for God or my

fellow man? Simply, my answer is no. The freedom of individual will and choice comes into play here and people are free to not donate organs. This should be a matter of personal liberty. I favor neither laws nor any efforts to make organ donation compulsory.

2. Is the action morally permissible? In some cases is it permissible for me to donate my organs?

Are there any passages of scripture which clearly identify and define how I might be breaking God's commands by donating organs? I would argue that helping others with organ donation does not violate any law of God, but that it reflects the true spirit of grace. Since Christ gave his body and life to save and redeem us and taught that it is also good for us to sacrifice, and since we have no real need for the physical body after death, it appears permissible in some instances to me. But, I would caution all people not to put this decision in the hands of any local emergency room physician, so therefore I personally am not a card carrying organ donor. I will not entrust the viability of my life to the decision of just any doctor. The family and perhaps a statement in a living trust should state personal choice on this .


3. Is the action morally supererogatory? Does the action of donating my organs go beyond what is expected of me, but in an heroic or sacrificial sense still acceptable? Yes, this I believe is the more accurate categorization of organ donation from a biblical position. Donating a kidney while still alive appears as an act of sacrificial love which may save and prolong the life of a loved one, and is acceptable. Thus following death, a person desiring to leave organs for the use of others, acts in a very loving, sharing way.

In summary, I have read no arguments which with scripture convincingly demonstrate solid contextual evidence


### HANNON CHURCH DEDICATES NEW BUILDING

Reverend Larry Keith Cockman suffered heart failure October 15, 2000, at the age of 57 years. He was pastor of the Pioneer Free Will Baptist Church of Ash Flat, Arkansas. Bro. Larry answered the call to preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ in February 1978. He was ordained in March 1979, at the Pleasant Ridge Free Will Baptist Church. His pastoring, preaching, and laboring as a man of God and a Free Will Baptist was very forthright but very loving. He preached for the cause of Jesus and nothing else.

Bro. Cockman pastored six churches during his ministry. He was also active in helping organize the MO-ARk District Association, serving as treasurer. # JAMES MUNSEY WITH THE LORD

Rev. James Alan Munsey, age 50, veteran missionary to Mexico, passed away at 6:30 AM, Saturday morning, February 3rd at the McAllen Medical Center in McAllen, Texas. He succumbed to a brain tumor which was discovered just one month ago.

Rev. Munsey was born in Greeneville, Tennessee, on August 11, 1950. He leaves to mourn his passing his wife of 28 years, Mitzi (Moore) Munsey, daughters, Laura and Rachel, and son, Matthew, of their home in Weslaco, Texas. He was the son of Rev. Howard and Mildred (Collins) Munsey of Morristown, Tennessee. Surviving also are his sister, Mrs. Joe (Diane) Foister of Jefferson City, Tennessee, and a brother, Tim Munsey of Knoxville, Tennessee. Mitzi's parents, Tunney and Alyce Moore of Newport, Tennessee, were as close to James as any family member and also feel a deep sense of loss at his passing.

James was involved in Mexico missions for most of his adult life. He moved to McAllen, Texas, in 1978 to enter language study at the Rio Grande Bible Institute in Edinburg, Texas. Within a year he was preaching to a congregation in the Spanish language. Out of this group there developed the Primera Iglesia Bautista Libre in Weslaco, Texas which he pastored until his death. This church became a pivotal center from which the work in Mexico developed. Under Rev. Munsey's tutelage more than twenty-five churches and institutions were founded and built and dozens of others were benefitted by his compassionate and dedicated ministry. He was considered by Hispanic people who knew him to be the best Spanish linguist of his era. He worked tirelessly and ceaselessly to promote evangelism and church growth among Mexican nationals whom he loved dearly. Free Will Baptists and other Church groups across America are especially indebted to Brother Munsey for raising the level of consciousness of the need of the lost masses of the world who have never heard of the love of God in Jesus Christ.

James and Mitzi were also founders of Hearthstone Log Homes, Inc. in Dandridge, Tennessee. The sale of this business in 1982 to Mr. Randy Giles helped to finance the early years of his ministry to Mexico. He gave unselfishly of his personal fortune to promote the well-being of those whom he served.

A special service was held for Rev. Munsey at the Primera Iglesia Bautista Libre in Weslaco, Texas, on February 4th at 6PM.

Funeral services were held in Newport, Tennessee, at the Manes Funeral Home on Wednesday, February 7th, at 8PM. James was buried on Thursday at the Union Cemetery in Newport.

RE: Missouri State Woman's Auxiliary Scholarship Applications

The Missouri State Woman's Auxiliary Convention has established a scholarship fund to assist young Christian women who attend Free Will Baptist colleges. Listed below is the criteria for qualification.

- 1. The applicant must be a female student.
- 2. The applicant must enroll as a "full-time" student.
- 3. The applicant must be a resident of Missouri and a member of a Missour Free Will Baptist church.
- 4. The applicant must have already made application to a Free Will Baptist college.
- 5. The application should be forwarded to the president of the Missouri State Woman's Auxiliary.
- 6. The scholarship Committee will evaluate the applications and award the scholarship.
- 7. Scholarship funds will be placed in the student's name at the Free Will Baptist college specified by the student who is selected.
- 8. Students who are awarded the scholarship will be eligible the second year for approximately one-half of the first year's award. Students must reapply for second year.
- 9. Deadline for receiving the application for consideration is May 15.

(either explicitly or implicitly) which prohibits organ donation. However, a warning again should be noted that there is a danger that some medical professionals (who operate on a different world view than ours) might euthanize a person just in order to salvage organs for transplant...While this is another issue entirely, it should be given careful consideration.

A special thanks to the brother who submitted this interesting question; these are issues we already face and no doubt tougher ones are in our future. Letting God's Word guide us is our only hope!

ecumenical involvement than the truth of Holy Scripture. Had it not been for the small remnant in the west that stood valiantly for the faith, the Randall legacy would have been lost to history. We must not let this pass over us lightly without considering how serious it is. The founders of our modern Free Will Baptist movement—both in the West and in the Southeast—were keenly aware of the ravages of liberalism. They were not willing to unite on the basis of anything less than a rock-solid commitment to the fundamentals of the faith—the inerrancy of Scripture, the Holy Trinity, the creation of man in God's image as opposed to evolution, the deity and virgin birth of Christ, His resurrection and return. These commitments were at the heart of what brought us together.

And they must remain our heart and core. We're in an age in which church growth experts are telling us to preach less on doctrine. But we must preach more on doctrine. We must stand valiantly for the orthodox principles of the Christian faith. If we don't, we will not only lose our right to exist as a denomination, but we will lose our soul. The danger we now face is not so much denying sound doctrine outright, but allowing sound doctrine to slip into irrelevancy because of our flirtings with the world and the spirit of the age and the culture. We must renew our commitment to the fundamentals of the faith, which brought us together.

# **\$40K PROJECT**

Greetings in the Lord's name from Mile High Free Will Baptist Church in Northglenn, CO. As many of you may know, Bro. Chuck Lotz has been going through extensive testing for some physical problems he has been dealing with. He needs your specific prayers for physical healing and strength. In spite of all this God has had mercy on our church and it has been growing and seeing several saved and rededicated. Our attendance has been in the upper 40's and some times in the 50's.
