

When you sample the whole crop, preachers win the blue ribbon as the happiest people in the world. This may surprise those who equate ministers with long faces and longer sermons, but preachers know where to find the laugh, in life.

They are sure of their calling. They lead the pack in knowing the will of God. They spread good news in a culture gone bad.

But I suspect that what puts the

twinkle in a minister's eye is that he uses his spiritual gifts in the body of Christ. Others in the church may shelve their abilities, but the preachers calling goes on display frequently and publicly.

He exercises his gifts for the few and the many all day Sunday, and between Sundays when he counsels, teaches and sets the example for the community.

While it is true that from time to time you meet ministers who tiptoe through life like hot-air balloons at a porcupine convention, pound for pound preachers are the most contented people in the kingdom.

Most preachers like one another. Although competition between them gets more ink than their mutual respect, I have discovered that preachers trust each other and would rather be around other preachers than anybody else.

Preachers love people. Literature on ministerial burnout scared a lot of preachers in the last three years. But it is my opinion that the majority of preachers, while overworked, are not looking for the exit signs.

They unselfishly make themselves available to people. Check out the fellow who has offended everybody within 10 miles of his home, and you will usually find some preacher who visits him, prays for him, and calls him "friend."

Preachers work to make their communities better. You do not have to worry about the preacher burning down

the local high school. Wherever a minister lives, you know that he gives his best to promote what is good and right in the community.

Preacher's talk a lot, but then they have a lot to say. They shake more hands than politicians and knock on more doors than the Fuller Brush man. There is a reason for their methods; they will do anything short of illegal to reach people.

Just because a minister weeps, do not assume that he is unhappy or mistreated by the Lord. To the contrary, he loves people in God's world so much that he weeps when they have so little when he knows they could have it all in Christ.

A minister is the most accountable man in the community. He Is accountable to God first and foremost. He cannot change that, and no one in the community is at liberty to tamper with the arrangement.

However, the minister is also accountable to every member of his congregation. Each member feels that the pastor is personally responsible to him. Never have so few been so accountable to so many for so much.

But ministers are happiest when they are preaching. Every sermon has at least three parts - the same three parts.

Part one is hard work. Some nurse

Trinity Celebrates 40 years 1962 - 2002

rinity Free Will Baptist Church of Bridgeton, Missouri, held a five day celebration to commerate forty years of ministry. The celebration began with a three day revival. Former pastors, Millard Sasser, Mike Garner, and Lynn Davenport, were the evangelists. Saturday was fun day as the church hosted a carnival. Well over two hundred people gathered for Sunday services presided over by Harold Bailey. The Sunday School hour was given over to special music and greetings from the former pastors and Sister Elaine Spurgeon Caskey, the former wive of the founding pastor Russel Spurgeon. Bro. Spurgeon was killed in a plane crash in 1980. Sister Elaine was the only charter member present.

During the morning worship service, the Trinity Women Active for Christ honored the pastor's wives. Each of the ladies were thanked for their special ministries to the church and were presented a corsage. The church's own acapella quartet and men's quartet provided special music for the morning worship service. Executive Secretary Nathan Ruble delivered the anniversary message. He also commended the church on its forty years of faithful ministry.

A great time of fellowship continued as the congregation moved to the beautifully decorated fellowship hall of the church. The church served a delicious luncheon while folks reminisced.

The afternoon service gave time for testimonies and the viewing of a slide show as the congregation viewed old photos and tried to remember the names of all those pictured.

Trinity Church in Bridgeton stands as a living testimony of what God can do through a group of dedicated laymen with a vision born of faith.

In January 1962, the Third Free Will Church of inner-St. Louis was notified by the State Highway Department that

their property was marked for highway construction. They searched for a suitable sight to relocate. The Southside Free Will Baptist Church was located only 3 miles away. The Holy Spirit led in a plan for the two congregations to merge and begin a new work for the Lord in suburbia. Third Church's pastor, Rev.

Russel Spurgeon, had served only three years before the church was notified to move. The decision to merge, therefore, resulted in five suburban families calling Rev. Spurgeon as pastor of their new mission in a rapidly developing suburb of St. Louis called Bridgeton. The five families were: Bill and Opal Hughes, Art and Blanche Francis, Carvie and Lucy Warden and daughter Dormalee, Roy and Marie Rodgers, and Bill and Lois DePriest, and children Dennis, Debby, and Sharon. The pastor's family members were Russel, his wife, Elaine, and two daughters, Jean Ann and Carol. Bill, Art, and Carvie were deacons at Third Church and were, therefore, the first deacons at Trinity.

In June 1962, the tiny congregation promptly acquired four acres of a choice site after financial and property arrangements were made. Their first service was held in the garage of Bill Hughes, chairman of the Deacon Board. Thirteen adults and five children were in attendance.

God continued to bless the Trinity congregation. The first building on the new property was dedicated January 27, 1963, with Dr. W.S. Mooneyham as the guest speaker. More space was soon needed for the growing congregation and a second building was constructed and dedicated in November 1965 with Dr. Billy Melvin as the guest speaker. In January 1969, the church took a giant step as they made the de-

cision to build a two-level sanctuary to seat 525 people. Dr. Robert Picirilli officiated at the dedication of this new sanctuary in March 1970.

The church suffered a great loss on September 17, 1980, as pastor Russel Spurgeon was killed in a plane crash. He left a great legacy of dedication and service which continues to be reflected in the church today. Trinity church is resolved to be a beacon light for rescuing the lost and giving encouragement to believers in this new millennium.



the mistaken idea that because a man has preached for 15 years he can step into the pulpit on a moment's notice without prior preparation and speak extemporaneously with the authority of John the Baptist. Believe me, it does not work that way. It sometimes takes an hour of preparation for five minutes of presentation in the pulpit. This means that a Minister prepares from five to 20 hours just to preach one sermon!

Part two is loneliness. There is no loneliness quite like that which washes over the minister just before he enters the pulpit. No matter how well he has researched, prepared and prayed, the

minister knows he is beyond human help once he steps forward to preach. If God does not grant him grace and a clear mind, he will fall flat on his face.

Part three is ecstasy. The ecstasy unfolds during and immediately after the sermon. No man is ever so alive as the minister in full stride preaching a sermon. Every sense is alert: heart pounding, mind clear, brain racing from thought to thought, from word to word, from experience to experience, weaving an incredible garment of truth that startles some hearers and angers others.

Hearing a great sermon revolutionizes a church. Preaching a great sermon is the nearest thing to inspiration since John left Patmos.

Somewhere in this world, God has a special minister for you and your family. He is worthy of your prayers and your support. He probably pastors the church where you attend.
















News from Ken and Judy Bailey

Dr. L.C. Johnson 1914 - 2002

Dr. L. C. Johnson, founding president of Free Will Baptist Bible College, died in Norfolk, Virginia, on June 26, 2002, at the age of 88. He was born in Alma, Georgia, on February 3, 1914, and ordained to the ministry in 1934.

The National Association of Free Will Baptists voted in 1942 to launch an educational institution in Nashville, Tennessee, and tapped the 28-year-old pastor, Linton Johnson, to head it. With few resources other than his own vision and strength of character, he shaped the infant Bible school and laid the foundation for what would become Free Will Baptist Bible College. He served as its president for 34 years until his retirement in 1979. (He returned to the pastorate for three years, 1944-47.) He served for two years, 1979-81, as chancellor of the college.

He earned his B.A. at Bob Jones College (now University). The University later bestowed on him an honorary doctorate. His pastorates included Free Will Baptist churches in Georgia, Mississippi, Florida, and Tennessee.

He also served on the Executive Committee of the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges and on the program of the World Congress of Fundamentalists.

He was frequently sought as a speaker for Bible conferences and revivals but said he felt like a poor evangelist because, no matter where he went, his heart and mind remained in Nashville, bound up in the affairs of the college.



In recent years, his health declined. He retained his sense of humor and paid frequent visits to the college. In May, he and Mrs. Johnson moved to Norfolk to live with their daughter and son-in-law, Mary Nell and the Rev. Terry Beck.

He is survived by his wife, Ruth Masser Johnson, and by their three children, Paul Johnson, Mary Nell Beck, and Mark Johnson.

Few men have marked as many lives within the ranks of the Free Will Baptist denomination as Dr. Johnson. His influence will live on through those who are richer for having known him.
