A TRIBUTE TO DR. L. C. JOHNSON

DR. ROBERT E. PICIRILLI

First, let me say that is indeed an honor, and humbling, to have a part in Dr. Johnson's funeral. And I should note that some of what I will say has come from Paul Harrison's unpublished biography of Dr. Johnson or from material Mary Wisehart prepared to be used at his retirement.

When the history of Free Will Baptists in the last half of the twentieth century is written, the role of Dr. L. C. Johnson will be prominent, perhaps the most prominent of any. His leadership has been manifested in various ways, of course, but the main reason his name will be "writ large" among us is his leadership of Free Will Baptist Bible College, from its founding.

Linton Carroll Johnson was born February 3, 1914, to Thomas and Mary Jane Johnson. That Linton grew up as an only son with four sisters— Lollie, Lola, Lexie, and

Lennie— may help us understand something of the personality of the man. One thing is sure: for us who knew him he was always the epitome of a southern gentleman. He mus have learned that very early!

The Johnson's were part of the "landed gentry" of southern, rural Georgia. They farmed for a living, and young Linton learned early to do his share of the



work, including plowing. Later on he would say that it's a mighty discouraging thing to plow all morning and be able to spit over what you had finished. Long rows work that way. He also learned the value of work, during high school, in the Quality Grocery Store in Alma, where his leadership qualities were soon recognized and he rose to the unofficial position of store manager.

The Johnson family attended church at Pine Level. At the age of 14, Linton went forward, during a revival preached by H. L. Lumpkin, to "join the church," as invitations were often worded in those days. Three years later, under the ministry of I. J. Blackwelder, he found the settled assurance of salvation that he had struggled hard for. He always perceived that the seeking, and the resolution of it, was a source of great confidence and strength. He was never in a hurry to teach new converts a quick and easy assurance.

Listing the events of a man's life doesn't really provide an understanding of the man. But, for the record, here are some of the key events.

He attended Douglas elementary and Bacon high, in this community, graduating from Alma High School in 1932.

He attended Middle Georgia College, in Cochran, in 1932-33. He was licensed to preach in 1933, at age 17, and ordained in 1934(by the South Georgia Association), having already become pastor here at Pine Level, his home church, earlier in 1934.



Dear Friends of El Seminario Biblico La Cruz,

Thank you very much for your interest in the ministry of Christian education in Mexico. God is doing great things on the seminary campus, and you are an important part of this ministry.

We had a very busy summer. We were privileged to attend the Texas State Meeting in June and the National Association in July. It was a pleasure to see many of you and visit with you at these meetings.

The E-TEAM group from the Foreign Missions Department arrived on June 24. Sponsors Tim and Terri DeCresie and Jonathan Postlewaite brought a group of ten outstanding young people who spent two weeks with us. During their time in Mexico they helped with painting and other work on the seminary campus. They visited all the churches in Reynosa and Monterrey and presented a good program of music and testimonies. They also helped the Calvary, Free Will Baptist Church in Reynosa with a Vacation Bible School. Their most important ministry, however, was to the young people from the Free Will Baptist churches in Mexico. Josue Gonzalez coordinates the youth ministry for the Mexican Association. He worked with the E-TEAM group to plan two days of youth activities. These activities included sports, food, devotionals, testimonies, singing, and preaching services. One young man was saved and several made rededications during these activities. God used the visit of this group to bring a closer bond between young Free Will Baptists in Mexico and those in the United States.

Classes for the fall semester will begin on August 26. New students will be coming from all across Mexico to begin a new semester of studies. Pray for the students and faculty of the seminary. Also, please pray for the Free Will Baptist churches in Mexico. The churches will be increasing their financial support for the seminary. Beginning this fall, churches that send students to the seminary will be required to contribute a minimum of 200 Mexican pesos per month to the support of the seminary. This may be difficult for some of the Mexican churches, but they are determined to do it.

The seminary depends on you for prayer support and financial support . Please pray for the seminary each day. Please assist us financially. There are two ways you can help. He enrolled in Bob Jones College, in Cleveland, Tennessee, in 1936 and completed his degree there in 1939.

Upon graduation in 1939, he accepted the dual call of the Glenville, Georgia, and Ebenezer churches as pastor, soon adding the Stoney Hill and Alabaha churches to his responsibility.

He also pastored the Harmony Church in Lake Butler, Florida, during part of that period, which replaced Stoney Hill and Alabaha on his schedule.

On March 30, 1940, he married Ruth Louise Masser of Pennsylvania, whom he had met and courted at Bob Jones.

In September of 1942, he became president of the new Free Will Baptist Bible School, opening for the first time, and he remained president for two years.

In 1944, he became pastor of the East Tupelo Free Will Baptist Church in Mississippi, where he served three years. In 1947 he returned to the presidency of Free Will Baptist Bible College, an office he filled until retirement in 1979.

But that kind of list is just to impersonal. Here are some things about L. C. Johnson that put a face on these events; some of them you may not know.

Did you know that as a teenager, he often led services in his church? Or that when his pastor, J. R. Davidson, would ask him to preach in his absence, he began his messages insisting that he was not a preacher?

Did you know that he agreed to be licensed at age 19 because Brother Davidson and some of the Pine Level men felt he should, not because he thought so?

Did you know that his first date at Bob Jones— arranged by friend and fellow student Chester Pelt— was with Ruth Masser, who graduated later that year and had to wait three years to become his wife?

Did you know that, at Bob Jones, along with his studies and long-distance courtship, he was both his society president and leader of the intersociety basketball championship team for three years?

Did you know that, while still a student, he became the commuting pastor of Ashland City Free Will Baptist Church in middle Tennessee? The twice monthly, 150-mile trip, one way, was usually made by train and bus, and the church paid him \$25 for each visit.

Did you know that he was also selected " Mr. Pulchritude," for being the handsomest man on campus in both his junior and senior years? No wonder Ruth Masser fell in love!

Did you know the he mailed Ruth her engagement ring for Christmas of 1939; and that after their wedding at Bob Jones in March of 1940 the proceeded to ride back to Georgia with the Pelts? Let me read you Dr. Johnson's own words about the wedding. "The honeymoon came at Christmas following our wedding in March. The church gave us \$25 as a Christmas gift. With this and the sale of some pecans from a tree in the parsonage yard(at Glenville), we took a trip to Miami, Florida. We spent nights with relatives of mine and did without food on the last days of our return because our money ran out. It was one of the better trips that lingers in our memory. How foolish young people in love can be!"

Did you know that, at the end of his first year as pastor at East Tupelo Church, he filed the following annual ministerial report with the Association: "Greetings to the Northeast Mississippi Association, when convened with Depriest Chapel Church on September 20, 1945. It is with true thankfulness of heart of God that I am able to make this report of the past years work. I have preached 200 sermons; prayed many prayers; visited many sick people; baptized 10 converts; received 12 into church; helped ordain one minister and two deacons; preached one memorial sermon; preached one commencement sermon; pastured one church. Received \$2000 from church pastured, \$885 for revivals. Total received for year's service \$2885. Traveled approximately 15,000 miles. Respectfully submitted, L. C."

Did you know that at the 1942 session of the National Association the Board of Education and Brother L. R. Ennis asked him to head up the new Bible school, scheduled to open in September? He said he could not understand this, but could only submit, once again, to the obviously spiritual judgement of the older, more experienced men who seemed sure of God's leadership.

And so it came to pass that on September 1, 1942, L. C. Johnson arrived at 3609 Richland Avenue, with his family, to prepare for the opening of the new Bible school September 15. He and his family, along with all the student body, moved into the building and started what we might call a "great experiment": an attempt to establish a successful educational program for a denomination without one.

Indeed, this was education for a people who were not all that sure they wanted education. To do that is not an easy task. Nonetheless, we shall have to judge, at this point 60 years later, that the great experiment has been successful. And that success can be attributed, more than to any other one person, to Dr. L. C. Johnson.

Here are some of the important things we must not overlook:

While some of those first leaders thought only in terms of a Bible institute, Dr. Johnson led the new college to a wellrounded program that includes both sound Biblical content and a generous core of Christian liberal arts.

Some of the most important features of life at Free Will Baptist Bible College were begun by Dr. Johnson, including the annual Bible Conference and the requirement of Christian Service assignments for all students.

From its inception, the Bible College has emphasized missions and evangelism. These are largely due to things Dr. Johnson did; bringing Miss Barnard to the faculty that first year, for example; and the beginning of the Christian Workers' Association for soul-winning efforts.

When the Bible College was founded, there was little teaching about the assurance of salvation in the denomination. That has changed for the better, and the lion's share of the credit must go to Dr. Johnson, who often had to withstand personal attacks as a result of his emphasis on being saved and kept by faith alone.

There was also little theological sophistication in those days. Dr. Johnson undertook courses like Arminian theology and literally introduced a denomination to its own theological heritage.

Furthermore, there were many different ideas abroad about Christian living. Dr. Johnson insisted that the College maintain high standards of clean, Christian living, and through that influenced a denomination.

At that point in time, most Free Will Baptist churches had part-time pastors. Through the College, Dr. Johnson gave Free Will Baptists a vision of full-time ministry, and of a conscientious, faithful pastorate majoring in the Word of God.

Any number of such things might be mentioned. A good way to summarize is to point out what may not be so obvious something that Leroy Forlines has observed. When the Bible College began, the denomination might literally have been led in any of several different directions. Education has that potential— for bane or blessing. Free Will Baptist Bible College helped shape the course of the denomination for a new day. And at the helm Dr. L. C. Johnson shaped the course of the college.

For those of us who were there with him for some of that time, there are many things to remember.

Who can forget his calm thumbing through the pages of his New Testament and Psalms during the opening chapel song?

Who can forget the times he called out the name of someone sleeping in chapel? He would say, "If you sleep in chapel, you'll sleep through life!"

Who can forget the picture he often painted, of preachers standing before God with mimeograph ink on their hands?

Who can forget his admiration for the determination of a bulldog?

Who can forget his admonition to pastors against sleeping in and letting the milk sour on the front porch, or the morning paper yellow in the sun?

Who can forget his marvelous devotional lessons from the Psalms, or his eminently practical wisdom drawn from the Proverbs?

Who can forget those rare occasions when serious misbehavior of students got him really riled and he shot right from the hip— but always shot straight and true?

How does one summarize or characterize such a man? We can only be selective, at best. Here are four things that stand out, things that any tribute to him must surely include.

One. It is altogether clear that he was a man with a rich devotional life. Nothing else can account for the depth of the extemporaneous sermons, or his readiness to talk about the Word at the drop of a hat. Some of us heard him speak in chapel, literally, for years on end. What seems clear, as unbelievable as it sounds, is that he never really preached the same sermon twice: the same text, perhaps, or some of the same words, but the message was always fresh.

Two. As already mentioned, L. C. Johnson was himself the definition of a "Christian gentleman." He was equally at home on the farm and at the finest banquet table, the very model of refinement, modesty, and restraint. You never heard any shady story from his lips. He was never crude, always courteous and temperate.

Three. Closely related, Dr. Johnson was a man of right and strong character, clean and firmin his convictions. His life matched his preaching, and his preaching held forth the highest standards. Dr. Johnson's words and life supported qualities like honesty, purity, graciousness, and integrity.

Four. Dr. Johnson was a man of vision, a man far ahead of his time. He was not ignorant of the hurdles; in fact, he saw them more clearly than most. But in spite of them he saw— though always realistically— what Free Will Baptists might be, and what Free Will Baptist Bible College might contribute to that. And his vision has largely been realized.

When young Linton was licensed to preach in 1933, his pastor, J. R. Davidson, reported at the time, in the pages of The Free Will Baptist paper: "One of the outstanding that happened was the licensing of Bro. Linton Johnson to the Christian ministry. He is a young man to be appreciated, for he has a real Christian character back of his work. The boy is only nineteen years of age, and he has had one year in college. He bids fair to be one of the greatest powers in the ministry in our entire connection."

We are force to agree that Brother Davidson was a trustworthy prophet!

We give tribute, today, where tribute is due, to one of the very few truly great people who have walked with us: to Dr. L. C. Johnson, and to the grace of God that have and called him and gave him to minister to us.

I conclude, now, in a little different way. I want to give you an abbreviated version of one of his chapel messages, one that I think is especially fitting for this occasion, including many who are here and are in Christian service. After he read the Scripture (which will become clear in a moment), he said:

Jesus had just preached a great sermon.

Healed some people.

Performed miracles.

Some of the people became awfully excited. They said, "We will follow you."

But Jesus had a screening program. He said first one, "Birds have their nests, and foxes have holes. But I don't have a house or home."

Another fellow said, "I will follow you, but I want to bury my father first."

And then another said, "Lord, I will follow you, but first let me go tell them goodbye at my house."

Jesus ended this by saying, "Any man who puts his hand to the plow and looks back is not fit for the Kingdom of God."

If you don't finish the job, there isn't

any place in God's program for you.

O, you say, I'm going to finish the job after I quit this one and get another.

No. If you don't finish the hard job, the one that's distasteful but is your duty, you won't finish the next one.

Be honest with yourself: if you're a quitter, it started back there in your past. You had an examination or assignment that you hadn't finished. You woke up sick. Strange, you felt fine the night before! Your mama pampered you, let you stay home. You dodged your responsibility. Quitting became a pattern in your life.

I read a shocking thing the other day: ninety percent of those who announce for the mission field never get there. There will be 150 ministerial students in this student body. Every one of them— perhaps with a few exceptions— ought to walk across this platform and get a degree. But how many of them will?

I believe there are more dropouts in Christian service than in other professions. There ought not be any dropouts.

I've told you before about a tenant farmer we had on our place. He was a fine fellow. Everybody liked him. But he had a most peculiar habit: he never finished a field unless he could finish it the same day. He would skip around, plow in this today and in another tomorrow. He didn't like the same scenery, so he moved. O, you could drive along the road and see his crop and say, "Mr. Melvin has a wonderful crop." But if you went a few rows over in the field, he hadn't plowed. He never finished a field.

There are a lot of people who never finish the field. They start. They plant the seed. They announce, but they never finish.

You see this principle all through the Bible: God uses people who finish the job. What did God call you to do? "O, I'm going to change plows and get a bigger one," you say, "This plow's not big enough for me." Wait a minute: you're just too big for God to use, maybe.

If you think the job isn't big enough, you're too little for the job. Take the little job. Do a good job there. And God will open a bigger door.

Have you put your hand to the plow? Don't quit. When God says it's time to quit, it's OK. The job is finished then.

Otherwise, don't quit. Remember that fellow who dashed off in front of you, kicked up so much dust.

Everybody thought he was going places.

So don't quit. Keep going.

Dr. Johnson's words are for us, today. And he set the example.

"There Is A Lion in the Street!"

I wish I could have heard Dr. L. C. Johnson preach that sermon one more time, "There Is a Lion in the Street!" (Proverbs22:13). He taught that one should not be a slothful person. Nor should fear of a "lion in the street" be an excuse to avoid carrying out God's call on one's life.

After over 40 years, his message still echoes through the chambers of my heart.

During chapel time, while a student at Free Will Baptist Bible College, I often observed Dr. Johnson stand on the platform, reach into his pocket and pull out a small Bible, and proceed to preach extemporaneously from his selected text.

It was after chapel services while standing in line outside the "mailroom/ snack shack" that I got to know Dr. Johnson face to face. (I was standing in line, looking for my daily letter from my fiancee, Louise.) Often he would and easy, jovial laugh. He appeared tall and dignified, and was usually wearing his hat.

When we learned of Dr. Johnson's death, Louise said, "It is the end of an era in our denomination". He liked her blackberry cobbler that she took to the married student potluck.

During our student days, fellow student Dan Parker and I spent countless late night hours discussing some of the "fine points" of denominational theology. It seemed that for many years Dr. Johnson kept his hand near the pilot wheel of our denomination. Sometimes he stood and spoke or offered a "resolution". At other times he stayed on the sidelines but his influence was felt.

After Dr. Johnson's retirement, other men assumed the helm of FWBBC. During one of those years, Dr. Dan Parker and I agreed to meet for lunch during a National FWB Convention. Since many people wanted to talk with Dan, the convention hall was nearly empty by the time he was free to go. We noticed Dr. Johnson standing all alone.

My eyes met Dan's. Here an opportunity to invite him to join us for lunch— our former college president and friend. As I recall, we didn't discuss theology or denominational "issues". We simply "broke bread" together as broth-



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
