Following are the e-mails sent by the Pinkertons as they made their way out of harms way. We thank God for His hand of deliverance.

### September 28, 2002 - Abidjan

Leaving Bouna was not easy...you could see the questions in folk's eyes... It wasn't when will you return, but will you return??? We do not have the answers to give...We do not know what could happen next? WE Know the One who holds us in the palm of His Hand...and that's about all we know.

Thanks for your prayers.. The convov left Bouna a wee bit past 7am..Kenneth & Rejane took the lead followed by 5 vehicles (18 people) from New Tribes Mission, then Jerry & I followed. New Tribes Folks shared walkie talkies so we were able to keep in contact while on the road together. Never the first problem at the police checks... Apparently Bouna police did as they promised & sent word ahead that we were coming. Nobody even asked to see our papers. I'm sure many people who were standing along the road side have sore necks tonight. Just to see one car passing down the road with white folks is a sight, but to see so many cars all with Pale Faces inside.one followed by another, yet another...till seven pssed..eeekkk!. You could see heads turning back and forth as we passed by...Even the police used their hands to count as we passed. It was a long trip..we arrived at Abidjan, without any car troubles, at 5:30 pm.



Cousineaus are with ICA folks, but West, Andersons, Alice, Eagles & us are all together at the guest house. We've had talks & prayers..but no decisions yet. Appreciate so much your help as we seek God's choice for us at this time..none are eager to leave, yet we don't want to stay too long either...

OH, Pastor George from Bouake called Jerry after we'd arrived in Abidian., LISTEN TO THIS. PASTOR GEORGE, WIFE AMA & THEIR TWO YOUNG GIRLS LEFT BOUAKE WALKING ... THEY WERE GOING TO A VILLAGE TO TRY & GET TRANSPOR-TATION BACK TO THEIR VILLAGE NEAR BONDOUKOU .. THEY WALKED TWO DAYS, SPENT ONE NIGHT IN THE BUSH & ARRIVED WHERE THEY COULD GET A BUS ... WALKING 60 MILES. Jerry asked if they had money for the bus ride & Pastor George said it would take all he had to get tickets to Abidjan -prices have jumped with the urgency of folks to travel away from rebel controlled towns. Jerry told him to buy the tickets & we'll help to see that they can take another bus back to their village. They are super precious folks..scared & rightly so. Please add them to your prayer list. When I think of them & the many Believers who are still in troubled spots, I realize my problems are very small... Jerry & Carol

### September 29, early a.m. Abidjan

Africans are seeking ways to return to their villages to be with their families. FWB Miss'ys are also returning. In total unity, a decision was made Sunday afternoon that FWB Miss'ys serving in the Ivory Coast follow the strong recommendations of the US Embassy & depart. We'll be leaving as soon as air tickets can be purchased. None of us want to go, yet feel it is wise at this time—praying that soon the country will be safe so we can return to continue the work God has placed upon our hearts.


More news about Pastor & Madame George. They have arrived in Abidian worn & torn from the flight Bouake. When Jerry from picked them up in Abidjan, Ama's feet were so swollen she could barely walk. They fled from Bouake with the clothes on their backs, a few cooking pots and their most valuable possessions; Rebecca (3rd grade) and Pricilla (kindergarden), their two children. It seems they did not walk the total 60 miles as we had been told earlier, but were happy to be hauled like cattle in a truck with as many as could crowd in for part of the way in a truck driven by Catholics. Bullets had come through the roof of the new parsonage home in Bouake. The sights they saw before leaving Bouake are too raw to be shared.

### J. Matthew Pinson Inaugurated as FWBBC's Fifth President

On a rainy September morning (September 26, 2002), some 700 students, faculty, staff, and visitors gathered in the Picirilli Activities Center at Free Will Baptist Bible College to witness and participate in the inauguration of J. Matthew Pinson as FWBBC's fifth president.

In addition to a host of alumni, pastors, and friends of the college, a delegation of well-wishers from colleges and universities were inattendance. These included representatives from such institutions as Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Belmont University, TreveccaNazarene University, Belmont University, Vanderbilt University, Mount Olive College, Carolina Bible Institute, The University of The South, Bob Jones University, and Columbia International University.

Among those bringing greetings were Nashville Mayor Bill Purcell; Rev. Keith Burden, newly elected Executive Secretary of the National Association of Free Will Baptists; and others.

Board Chairman Gary Fry recited the Investiture of office conferring the presidential duties on Mr. Pinson. FWBBC History professor John Carter presented Rev. Pinson with a 65-pound replica of the original 1611 edition of the King James Bible, reminding him of the College's commitment to the Word of God.

President Pinson's Inaugural Address made frequent mention of the late Dr. L. C. Johnson, the College's first president. Mr. Pinson recommitted the College to prepare students to serve Christ in whatever vocation to which God calls them. He reiterated FWBBC's commitment to provide Free Will Baptists with pastors, missionaries, and other full-time church workers.

The Inauguration was followed by a luncheon at which personal tributes to Rev. Pinson were shared by family and friends. The day closed with an Inaugural Gala, featuring music and drama by members of the faculty, past and present, and a reception for President Pinson.

### BIBLE COLLEGE ENROLLS 322 FOR FALL SEMESTER

Free Will Baptist Bible College began its 60th year of ministry with an enrollment of 322, some 13% higher than fall 2001, according to the Registrar's Office. More good news was the 20% increase in dormitory students, who total 230.

Nearly 90% are full-time students, also a 13% increase. Students new to FWBBC total 105. They join 217 returnees. There are 161 men and 161 women in the fall student body.


By classes, students number 100 freshmen, 70 sophomores, 70 juniors, 74 seniors, and eight special students.

Dear Friends of El Seminario Biblico La Cruz,

Thank you very much for your interest in the ministry of Christian education in Mexico. God is doing great things on the seminary campus, and you are an important part of this ministry.

We had a very busy summer. We were privileged to attend the Texas State Meeting in June and the National Association in July. It was a pleasure to see many of you and visit with you at these meetings.

The E-TEAM group from the Foreign Missions Department arrived on June 24. Sponsors Tim and Terri DeCresie and Jonathan Postlewaite brought a group of ten outstanding young people who spent two weeks with us. During their time in Mexico they helped with painting and other work on the seminary campus. They visited all the churches in Reynosa and Monterrey and presented a good program of music and testimonies. They also helped the Calvary, Free Will Baptist Church in Reynosa with a Vacation Bible School. Their most important ministry, however, was to the young people from the Free Will Baptist churches in Mexico. Josue Gonzalez coordinates the youth ministry for the Mexican Association. He worked with the E-TEAM group to plan two days of youth activities. These activities included sports, food, devotionals, testimonies, singing, and preaching services. One young man was saved and several made rededications during these activities. ### ANOTHER DAY IN THE LIFE OF A MISSIONARY BUILDER

Today was one of those days when I would rather have been shoveling gravel or mixing cement! I left Tony and David at the church at 9:00 a.m. and headed toward downtown Carolina to see if I could get the elusive "Use Permit."

I went to the architect's office and she told me where to go in the Municipal building and what to ask for. I went to office No.2 and waited in line (take a number!) for about 10 minutes. Being a little impatient, I asked the secretary if she could just hand me the form I needed to fill out requesting the "Use Permit." She looked annoyed that I hadn't taken a number and sat down with the rest of the people to wait my usual two hours. She reached over next to her desk and pulled out the form and handed it to me.

I took the form back to Indira's office and she showed me a list she had made of places I needed to go. First of all, I had to go down the street to the Collecturia (tax collector) and pay sixty dollars. Then I could go to the Fire Department and request an inspection of the church. Naturally, I had to have the church tax number so I retreated back to Indira's office. Fortunately she had the number.

I returned to the Collecturia and stood in line again for several minutes. I paid the \$60.00 and got the receipt, then I headed for the Fire Department central office. I finally located it in another part of the city. (There are no street signs, of course.) I found the man who does the inspections and explained what we needed. He said he would be out to do the inspection in about a week. (You know what that means!!)

I then headed for the Department of Health. (That would be the eighth office, counting returns.) This office is located in Rio Piedras (a city inside San Juan). I finally found it at 11 :45. Once again, I waited in line. When I finally reached the desk, I told the girl what I needed. You guessed it, she sent me to another building. When I got there, it was closed for lunch.

Parking in the city is absolutely unavailable most of the time. I had driven around several narrow streets looking for a place to park when I got there. I finally found a parking place big enough for our dodge van and did not plan to move from that spot until I finished my business. So, I just went back to the van, got in, and read the newspaper for an hour.

At one o'clock I went back to the office, took a number and waited. When my turn finally came, I paid the \$35.00 fee for the inspection. It did not surprise me one bit when I was told I needed to take the receipt to another Health office in Hato Rey. (That is another city inside San Juan.)

I searched until I located the street in Hato Rey and spent another 15 minutes looking for the building and a parking place. I went in, took my place in line and listened for 15 minutes as a little old lady lambasted the guy at the desk. It seems he wouldn't give her a permit to be buried in her back yard. Finally my turn came. The fellow at the desk looked at my receipt and said" Around the corner."

I finally got everything on my list taken care of, then I realized I was no closer to my "Use Permit" than I had been at the beginning of the day. Our engineer/inspector is coming Friday to take the Certificate of Electricity; Certificate of Plumbing, and his Certificate of the Building and see what else he needs to do to get the Use Permit. After he has the permit in hand, he will take it and start the process to get the "Permit to dig a hole in the street to connect the water." I am glad it will be his turn to wait in line. I just hope I don't get a fine for having the hole already dug there- for the last 3 months (Optimism)

One week later. The engineer-inspector finally came and we went to the city offices with all the papers filled out to get our permit. We had six original copies of the filled out forms, as directed. We took our number, waited in

line, and finally the secretary started working on our case on her computer. After about 10 minutes, the electricity went off and we all just sat around for about an hour waiting for it to come back on. When she finally finished, she stamped our copy and gave it to us. Finally, I thought! Then she explained to us that this was the "permit to get the use permit" and we still needed the Health Department inspection and the fire department inspection. We could then come back and get the Use Permit (sure, sure). We have now been waiting almost two weeks for them to come and inspect. We were told it would be within 30 working days, which with all the holidays here, means up to seven weeks. Once we get the inspections, we take the papers to the city, they stamp them and we take that to the water department and electric company, and they will come and hook up the water and permanent electricity. Then we can advertise who and what we are. Red tape? No kidding!

Please continue to pray.



### **The Bible and Our Nation**

Of the many influences that have shaped the United States of America into a distinctive nation and people, none may be said to more fundamental and enduring than the Bible.

Deep religious beliefs stemming from the Old and New Testaments of the Bible inspired many of the early settlers of our country, providing them with the strength, character, convictions, and faith necessary to withstand great hardship and danger in this new and rugged land. These shared beliefs helped forge a sense of common purpose among the widely dispersed colonies– a sense of community which laid the foundation for the spirit of nationhood that was to develop in later decades.

The Bible and its teachings helped form the basis for the Founding Father's abiding belief in the inalienable rights of the individual, rights which they found implicit in the Bible's teachings of the inherent worth and dignity of each individual. This same

sense of man patterned the convictions of those who framed the English system of law inherited by our own nation, as well as the ideals set forth in the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution.

For centuries the Bible's emphasis on compassion and love for our neighbor has inspired institutional and governmental expressions of benevolent outreach such as private charity, the establishment of schools and hospitals, and the abolition of slavery.

Many of our greatest national leaders— among them Presidents: Washington, Jackson, Lincoln, and Wilson— have recognized the influence of the Bible on our country's development. The plain-spoken Andrew Jackson referred to the Bible as no less than "the rock on which our Republic rests."

Today our beloved America and, indeed, the world, is facing a decade of enormous challenge. As a people we may well be tested as we have seldom, if ever, been tested before. We will need resources of spirit even more than resources of technology, education, and armaments. There could be no more fitting moment than now to reflect with gratitude, humility, and urgency upon the wisdom revealed to us in the writing that Abraham Lincoln call "the best gift God has ever given to man... But for it,[the Bible] we could not know right from wrong."
