We are still looking for a place to meet. It seems that each time we believe we have found a place, it doesn't work out. Please pray that God will provide. I know He will!



#### O'Fallon Youth Minister in Canada

Twenty members of a Missouri youth group spent a year raising \$20,000 in order to bus to Canada and teach Vacation Bible School at a new Free Will Baptist church in Fredericton. Home missionary Jeff Crabtree said the 28 people (including eight adult sponsors) from First FWB Church in O'Fallon, Missouri, paid their own way and dramatically impacted the Canadian community.

After 33 hours on a chartered bus, the group arrived in Fredericton at 5:00 a.m. on August 8. They lodged in a downtown hostel and hit the ground running with last-minute preparations for the August 12-15 VBS.

Missouri youth minister Ben Crabtree (son of Jeff Crabtree) preached Sunday morning and evening. The youth arranged the church for the VBS "Jonah and the Whale" theme.

Monday through Thursday, 9:30-11:35 a.m., classes were held for area children. Afternoons were for sightseeing and relaxation. Though unplanned, the evenings became times for witnessing and interacting with others in the hostel. No air conditioning or televisions brought everyone to the common rooms where area university students and international travelers interacted with the youth group and its leaders concerning their faith. Discussions went late into the night. A highlight of the trip was the visit to the building site of Serenity FWB Church. The group had raised over \$500 for the new building and learned that their sacrifice and efforts paid for the sheet rock for over half the wall area, plus one special project to be announced later. They gathered where the altar will be in the new sanctuary and prayed for God's blessings on the congregation as it works to reach the community for Christ Home missionary Jeff Crabtree said, "Only time will tell what this trip accom-

plished for the kingdom. For most, it was a trip to a new country, an introduction to a new culture and an opportunity to share the gospel with people not familiar with Bible-belt theology. It was an opportunity for the youth to see their leaders actively sharing their faith while living it in new surroundings, and to share their table with others who sounded and thought differently than they did."

Thursday evening at 9:00 p.m., Alex, an eight-year-old boy from the community, expressed the feelings of his group as he stood by his parents and cried as Steve, his new friend from St. Louis, boarded the bus to go home.

Missouri pastor Rick Dement welcomed the youth group back to the O'Fallon congregation after they completed their long trek.

#### Information Concerning Missouri State Retirement Program

In order for a pastor, associate pastor, or full-time youth minister to participate in the Missouri Retirement Program, the church he is serving must support the Missouri State Cooperative Program with the full 10% of its regular tithes and offerings. This ministry is funded through cooperative giving. (The associate pastor and/or full-time youth minister must receive his salary from the church as a full-time employee.) The individual must also enroll with the



Board of Retirement & Insurance in Nashville, Tennessee.

A Retirement Pension Enrollment Form supplied by the State Office give the following guidelines:.

#### I. Eligibility

An applicant for participation in the plan must be gainfully employed a minimum of 20 hours weekly by a Free Will Baptist Church or church-related agency. Being gainfully employed is receiving reasonable compensation for services. Serving in a voluntary ministry -without compensation does not qualify a person for participation in this plan.

#### II. Types of Contributions

- A. ER (Employer Contributions) ER contributions are made by the employer as a budgeted amount above the employee's taxable income.
- B. SRA/tax deferred contributions SRA contributions are tax deferred, non budgeted employee contributions made through an agreement between the employee and the employer. The church/employer withholds the specified amount and sends it direct to the retirement office.
- C. EE (Employee) contributions EE contributions are made directly to the retirement fund by the employee from tax-paid income.

#### Participation level

A. Plan 1 - Full Employer Participation - pays the highest earnings

The Church/employer is required to contribute a minimum of 5% of the employee's base salary (taxable income), which excludes housing and other expense allowances. The employer may contribute up to 25% of the employee's base salary as long as all tax deferred contributions (ER and SRA) do not exceed 25% of base salary or \$10,500. In addition to the employer's contributions the employee may contribute any amount of tax paid (EE) contributions. Employer contributions must be paid by church/agency check.

\$25,000 term life insurance is required for participants in Plan 1.

B. Plan 2 - Individual Plan - pays 1/4% less earnings than plan 1

The employee and/or employer is required to contribute a minimum of 3% of the employee's base salary (taxable income) which excludes housing allowance and other benefits. The employee may contribute any amount beyond the 3% as long as all tax deferred contributions (ER and SRA) do not exceed 25% of base salary or \$10,500. \$25,000 term life insurance is optional.

C. Plan 3 - Entry Level Plan - earns 1/2% less than Plan 1

The plan requires a minimum contribution of \$10.00 a month. The contributions may come from the employee or the church/employer.

No Insurance is available under Plan 3.

Twice each year, shortly following January I and July 1, the Board of Retirement and Insurance, who holds the money in trust, disburses the amount stated by the Missouri State Association to the account of the participant. Presently the amount is \$450.00. Before this transfer is made the treasurer of the local church is asked to sign a form, sent from the State Office, stating that the church has supported the Missouri State Cooperative Program with the full 10% of its regular tithes and offerings.

There are several options at retirement. Space will not permit including all of this information. Please do not hesitate to call, write, or come by for any help that is needed.

I just had an encouraging telephone conversation with a local bank director. After talking to "the powers that be" she says they have decided they have no problem in working with "a church" to give us a construction loan. I received news this week that another Evangelical Church in a nearby town was turned down by a bank, specifically because it is a church. This does not mean it is a "done deal" for us, but it is a great beginning step. Now, the church and the bank will have to study the details about exactly how the church will guarantee the bank payment, which will undoubtedly mean the personal involvement of several church members. The bank director is calling me next week to set up an appointment.

At the same time, one architect has presented us sketches of new plans for the building this week, and called me last night to see if we want to move ahead with him (we met him through an email update just like this one). Another architect is studying the old plans to give us a bid on how much he would charge to take on the project, and we are to meet with him next week (this one is a friend of one of the church members).

At the same time, both of these architects have given (free) important suggestions to the church lawyer concerning the writing of the agreement we are to present to City Hall this month. The church members will need to make important decisions and be willing to commit themselves financially in the coming days. We are doing all we can humanly speaking, but there is so much that will have to be God's working in order for the Nehemiah Project to take off and be a success. That is good. If it happens, everyone will have to give God the glory. That would be a great testimony for so many unbelieving people here in Spain.

# Crisis Intervention Fund Established


God's intervention in the crisis at International Christian Academy in Bouaké, Côte d'Ivoire,

at the end of September is worthy of praise. He used the Free Will Baptist Foreign Missions staff, the United States State Department, the French and U.S. military, the prayers of Christians, and other individuals and groups to bring about safe evacuation of the students and staff at ICA.

By God's grace all Free Will Baptist missionaries and children were safely removed from Ivory Coast. Most are now in the U.S. on temporary stateside assignments, praying and awaiting the outcome of the coup d'etat. The Cousineaus have gone to Dakar, Senegal, to fulfill their commitments the school where many of the students from ICA transferred



Since such evacuation efforts cannot be adequately budgeted due to their sudden nature, a special "Crisis Intervention Fund" has been established. The expenses of travel to Abidjan and emergency airline tickets (more costly than when purchased in advance) as well as costs to help missionaries with some replacement



clothing, extra stateside housing, etc. would adversely affect missionary accounts. Long distance telephone calls to inform the press, deal with the U.S. State Department, the American Embassy and ICA personnel in Bouaké all were significant in effecting the evacuation without casualties. But international phone rates are high.


These combined expenses total approximately \$40,000. Foreign Missions has determined to keep missionary accounts from suffering. Consequently the "Crisis Intervention Fund" will assure them that none of these costs will come from their accounts.

Free Will Baptist partners are asked to help by giving to this special fund. Just 400 people giving \$100 or 800 people with a \$50 one-time donation could provide the money needed. Any gifts beyond the amount needed will remain in the fund for future crises.

Gifts should be sent to Foreign Missions, P.O. Box 5002, Antioch, TN 37011-

5002 and should be earmarked "Crisis Intervention Fund."

God intervened in the danger crisis. Free Will Baptists are urged to intervene in this monetary crisis as a praise offering to Him.

I guess you could say that I have been the building contractor. I have spent all of my time and energy for the past year getting the permits, the builders, and the material lined up. God is gracious and generous to us. We have seen things fall into place at exactly the right time. Today, we all praise and thank Him for the debt free building that has already been a witness to the neighborhood. The neighbors have watched groups come and go and have asked, as they always will, how much we paid all of those experts. They walk away wondering why all of those people

,love us enough to pay their own way to come down here and work in this heat and rain for nothing! I trust and believe that every one who laid a hand to the work or donated a red penny has been bountifully repaid in blessings. We know that their work will stand as a monument to their love and a lighthouse to the lost on this sin darkened island.

So, with our job finished, Ruth has packed 52 boxes and started shipping them to Missouri. Yes, Missouri. We had always expected to return to Mexico once we finished our work here, but that door just has not opened for us at this time. One of our tile men, Brother Greg Cleveland, contacted the Missouri State Mission Board soon after he arrived in Puerto Rico. These men in Missouri have been burdened for the many Hispanics that have moved into the southwestern part of the state looking for work. This board has purchased a church building, and have funds ready to begin a work there, but had been unable to find someone who speaks Spanish to just jump in and do it. As we spoke to them, prayed about the possibility, and spoke to our own Home Missions director, we felt more and more that this is the direction the Lord has in mind for us. By the way, Brother Greg Cleveland, pastor of the First Free Will Baptist Church in Monett. Missouri, is well known to us. He is one of the young men we count when we add up the positive results of our years of work in Children's Church at East Tulsa Free Will Baptist Church. Ruth prayed daily that the Lord would call faithful workers from that group of children. What a wonderful blessing to have him come to Puerto Rico and work with us on the building, and now we will have the privilege of working with him in Missouri.

Our work there will be a Joint Project between the National Home Missions Department and the Missouri State Mission Board; Our account will remain just as it is, the only change will be our location. Look for the new address and phone number below. We will let you know as soon as we are estab-

lished with a new e-mail address. Ruth's family is looking forward to this move since she will be only one hundred miles or so from her folks. Her father, Rev. Howard Gage is recovering from the hip fracture, but remains in the Colonial Terrace Nursing Home in Pryor. At this point, it does not appear that he will be able to return home. The Alzheimer's Disease has seemed to accelerate and on October 2, he was diagnosed with pneumonia. Please keep her mother and extended family in your prayers. This has been a difficult time for them all, and some hard decisions still need to be made.

In July Ruth began a new treatment, and she has experienced a wonderful turn around in her health. Before she left the island we were able to hike to the top of El Yunque Peak in the rain forest. This is the mountain behind our house and it had been her dream to be able to hike it one day. We thank the Lord for her restored health. We would not have been able to undertake a new work without her return to health and strength. We give God all of the praise.

We will be attending the Oklahoma State Meeting on Oct. 14, and then taking care of family business for my mother before we move to Missouri. Ruth went back to Oklahoma after the national retreat to help her mother. She spent a day in Monett looking around, and we will be back there the first week in November for a mission conference. We hope to rent a house in the Mexican community then. Please pray for an open door among the Hispanics there and for us to make this move with the least stress possible for all parties involved. Please continue to pray for the work in Puerto Rico. The Roys continue to need your daily prayer that they would quickly be well established with the language and that the Lord would provide the mature Christian helpers they need to minister there. .
