




FWBBC'S MISSION: TRAINING MORE PREACHERS

ewly inaugurated Bible College President Matthew Pinson said in a recent address that combining ministry education with broad-based learning in the arts and sciences was the calling of Free Will Baptist Bible College. Whether a student is majoring in English, Missions or Pastoral Ministry, they will be equipped to serve Christ and His Church, as stated in the College's mission statement. "No matter what God calls our students to do, we believe they will be engaged in Christian ministry, in the service of Christ's Church," Pinson said.

Perhaps this is why so many men who graduate from the Bible College are called to preach and go on to preaching ministries. "It's exciting to see men enter the preaching ministry from a variety of fields. Some come here their freshman year and embark on a course of study in Pastoral Ministry. Others come here called to ministry, major in Bible, and plan to complete their studies elsewhere. Then they go on to seminary for two or three years before pastoring full-time," Pinson said.

He added, "Yet it's interesting to see young men from other fields answering the call to preach while they are in college. Recently a senior English major came to my office and told me he has answered the call to preach."

Ralph Hampton, chairman of the Biblical and Ministry Studies Department at the College, reviewed the 232 male graduates from FWBBC for the past 10 years and found that nearly half—over 45%—are preachers (pastors, associate pastors, youth pastors). "Over the years, on average, about a third of our total student population has been preparing for some ministry field—pastoring, missions, youth ministry, and such," he said.

In May 2002, half of the college's 14 male graduates acknowledged a divine call to a preaching ministry and began pursuing that ministry. Many FWBBC graduates preach part-time at small churches while pursuing a seminary or graduate school degree in theological studies. Others go to full-time pastoral ministries or to serve as youth ministers

while they are mentored by experienced pastors.

"It's great to see how our combination of education in the arts and sciences with a strong core of Biblical studies and Christian service leads people to a variety of ministries, and it's amazing how many of our men go on to preaching ministries," said Academic Dean Milton Fields, who pastored for 29 years, 16 of them bi-vocationally, prior to coming to the College.

Rev. Terry Forrest, coordinator of the Pastoral Ministry program, says, "The students currently enrolled in the Pastoral program are very impressive. Their combination of intellect, commitment, warmth, and natural ability is very heartening and bodes well for their future ministries. We are praying and searching for more of their kind."

While acknowledging the need for more, Free Will Baptist Bible College's administration, faculty, and staff are pleased to see so many of its young men going out to preach. Help them pray that the Lord of the harvest will call more workers to this vital field.

229 STUDENTS ATTEND FALL WELCOME DAYS

NASHVILLE, TENNESSEE The recent Welcome Days at Free Will Baptist Bible College attracted 229 young people from 78 churches in 18 states November 14-16, according to Matt Markins, Director of Enrollment Management. Of the total, 85 were high school seniors. This is the largest registration in at least five years, he says. The total for last fall was 194 and the spring 2002 enrollment was 210.

The largest state representations were North Carolina (46) and Virginia (21). The most from any church was 15 from the Virginia Beach FWB Church in Virginia Beach, Virginia.

Our students, faculty and staff did a wonderful job of hosting our future students and sharing with them a little of what Free Will Baptist Bible College is all about, Mr. Markins said. He also commended the pastors, youth pastors, and parents who worked so hard to bring their young people to Welcome Days.





You Snooze, You Loose by Phyllis Detherage

I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith.

2 Timothy 4:7

It's often comical to watch people in church. I know, you are supposed to pay attention to the sermon but, on occasion, being human, my eyes will roam. Many times you'll see yawns and fidgeting but occasionally you'll see someone who is completely "out for the count." We'll laugh and chuckle when it's someone else but wait until next Sunday! It could well be us fighting off the sandman!

As a child I never really paid attention to those kinds of things. In fact, if I got tired,

I'd just curl up on the pew and drift contentedly off to dreamland. I never worried too much about what other people might think. In fact, I'm pretty sure it never even crossed my mind. I never really thought about what I might be missing either. After all, what was more important, the spirit or the flesh? Sleep and Oblivion won hands down!

Now that I'm older, I've joined the ranks of sleep fighters on Sunday morning. I'll wiggle and fidget in efforts to concentrate on the sermon. I'll try to pay attention for fear I might miss something important. Or worse yet, what if I drift off and drool or snore in front of everyone? That would be a living nightmare, I'm sure and something that I could easily see myself doing!

Our spiritual walk is a lot like our Sunday morning dilemma. Before we accept Jesus as our Lord and Savior, church really doesn't matter too much to us. It's just a routine or social obligation. We see it as something to be endured rather than enjoyed. 1 Corinthians 1:18 says that, "the preaching of the cross is to them that perish foolishness." Why struggle to understand something that is foolish? It's a whole lot easier to just drift along



in a dreamy state of oblivion where nothing is required and no sacrifices have to be made. We can figuratively curl up on the pew for a snooze and never worry about a thing.

On the other hand, once we have awakened to our need for a Savior and accepted Jesus into our hearts, things change. Where complacency once reigned supreme, there is now a longing and a desire to know and understand, "the preaching of the cross," because, "to us which are saved, it is the power of God." (1 Cor. 1:18) Although that desire is there, we still struggle against the flesh and it's desire for oblivion. Jesus stated it so appropriately in Matthew 26:41 when he said, "The spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak."

Our hearts and minds long to know and understand the message and experience, "the power of God." We long to feed on, "the sincere milk of the word" (1 Peter 2:2) that we may grow in the Lord, but the flesh just wants to curl up for a catnap. Don't despair! We are not alone in this struggle. Paul himself wrote of this very conflict in his own life. Romans 7:15 says, "For that which I do I allow (understand) not; for what I would (want to do), that do I not; but

what I hate, that do I." Can you imagine being at a revival meeting and seeing the great Apostle Paul nod off? It may have happened! Although Paul was a dedicated servant of God, he too struggled against the flesh, but he also found the key to success.

2 Timothy 4:7 gives us Paul's secret recipe for success in the struggle against the flesh. Are you ready for this earth shattering revelation? He said, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I

have kept the faith." Yes, there it is, bold as life and in black and white! He "fought a good fight." Nothing magical or supernatural about it, Paul just gritted his teeth and kept on plodding along even when nap time beckoned. Paul believed that old saying of, "when the going gets tough, the tough get going," not snoozing.

God never said it would be easy. He never promised us a bed of roses in this life, just a mansion, crown and robe in the next. The problem is not that life is tough but rather that we aren't. We live in a day of no commitment to anything. If it doesn't come fast and easy, we don't want it. We've got microwaves, fast food, drive up money and overnight divorce, but little or no endurance or commitment to anything. We sort of look for "drive-up" Christianity today. Just pull up to the window, tell God what you want, pull to the next window, pick it up and then off we go until the next time we need something. Unfortunately for some though, God doesn't operate like a burger joint. God wants those who will stand the test and endure the struggle because they are truly committed to

8 KEYS TO MOTIVATING YOUR SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASS TO LEARN

Key 1: Make an Emotional Connection

If you want kids to be motivated and eager to learn, you need to make an emotional connection. The part of the brain that governs emotion can either boost learning or shut it down. Children need good reasons to do what you're asking them to do, a reason that matters to them personally. It might be pride in an accomplishment, the pleasure of an activity, the satisfaction of completing a challenging task or the excitement of investigating something new. If that emotional, personal connection is missing. kids won't be motivated to learn through the activity you have planned. On the flip side is the power of negative emotion.



Key 2: Remove Fear

Fear or threat turns off the learning switch. Instead, children focus on making it through the painful time-even defending themselves if necessary. Even church, a place filled with people who love God and want the best for his children, can be a threatening place for children. Josh, whose teacher tells him he wasn't allowed to fidget with his toy car during Sunday school, felt threatened. Luke, whose body does not allow him to sit still for more than four minutes at a time, feels threatened by teachers who tell him he must sit quietly in the circle for the Bible story.

When the emotional part of the brain feels threatened, the "fight or flight" response takes over. Nothing will make Josh forget about the car that was taken away from him and pay attention to the prayer circle. Nothing can force Luke to learn the details of the Bible story if he's not allowed to move his body around.

When there's a sense of emotional connection and safety, what the child

needs next is challenge. Human brains are created by God to respond to challenge, especially if there is a reasonable chance of success. Kids respond to games in the children's ministry classroom because games bring a challenge to succeed. For a child like Luke, a Bible story presented in an active game format will result in more learning than if he's forced to keep himself still. He'll think, "Wow! This is something I can do. I wish the Bible story were like this every week."

Key 4: Choice

Choice plays a huge role in motivation. Self-determination is a God-given characteristic of the human race. Of course, we all need to do what we're told. But from time to time, the opportunity to make a choice encourages children and adults alike to invest themselves in what they've chosen.

Let children choose what character they'll play as they act out the Bible

story. Let them choose from art supplies you've set out for a project. Let them choose among life application activities that appeal to different learning styles. You'll be amazed at how kids are willing to invest in the choices they make.

Key 5: Emotional Payoff

Emotional connection leads kids to respond to challenge, and challenge is meaningful only if there is a "payoff." What will the kids get out of it? If they do what you want them to do, what's in it for them? Answering this question leads some teachers to the use of positive reward systems, which can motivate students who have difficulty motivating themselves. Positive reward systems provide a reward for good


choices the kids make. If you can say your memory verse, you earn points toward going to camp. If you finish the handout on time, you get to be the assistant teacher for a day. As long as kids clearly understand the expectations, positive reward systems can be simple and effective.

Kids who are internally motivated need fewer rewards. Use external rewards sparsely and wisely. As often as you can, let the reward be the joy of learning something new, the awareness of new growth, and the glow of success in meeting a challenge.

Key 6: Achievable Expectations

Set expectations that are reasonable and achievable for the kids in your class. For instance, don't expect a kindergartner to sit as long as a third grader. Understand and anticipate your kids' attention spans, and gear activities to fit within them.

While reward systems may work to



News From the Turnboughs

Dear Friends,

Today Susan and I met with CRINA and LUCIAN, two Romanian immigrants here in Spain trying to make a living for themselves. I asked them to share a little of their spiritual pilgrimage with us, and my eyes were opened to a different world. Crina, a twenty-year old away from her home and family, came to know the Lord just a few months ago here in Spain. She has been attending the Villalba Church since that time. She didn't accept the Lord during an altar invitation, nor was she involved in any kind of study with anyone. She found the Lord reading the Bible. CRINA was afraid to tell her father. Her parents are nominal Orthodox believers. Her older brother "is big and strong" and they "love each other much." He helped Crina tell their father. Lucian was raised in a Romanian Evangelical Church, but didn't really begin to follow Jesus Christ until this past year. He said he has spent many nights, away from his family, country and culture, feeling scared, knowing that he was avoiding God. Now, he has a warm smile that demonstrates peace.

According to CRINA and LUCIAN, the average salary in Romania today is approximately \$70 a month -yes, per MONTH. Like many other immigrants here, they share a small apartment with others like them, trying to earn enough money to return home, buy some land, build a house, plant a garden in order to have food to eat, and make a life for themselves back in Romania. By trade, Crina is an accountant, but in Spain she cleans houses. Lucian is some type of an electrical specialist (on large industrial motors), but does construction work here to earn whatever money he can. They have found the Lord and each other, and they have asked me to perform their wedding ceremony. We are going to begin studying the Bible together weekly before we proceed with the wedding. They were baptized as children, but were waiting "for more knowledge" before they take the step of adult, believer's baptism. So, we talked about that as well as church membership. Please pray for CRINA, LUCIAN, and so many others like them here in Spain. Also, pray for us as we attempt to understand people from yet a different culture in order to teach universal Biblical truth in a meaningful way.

In addition to meeting with Romanians, the day before yesterday Susan and I spent an entire evening conversing about spiritual matters with a lady from Ecuador. She requested a meeting with us, and that was the purpose of and the entire content of our conversation. Another evening this past week we spent doing discipleship studies people from Colombia. Work in Spain has become somewhat of an enigma for me. We came to Spain to attempt to reach Spaniards. And we are still trying to reach Spaniards. Yet, Spaniards continue to be very difficult to reach. Even Spanish believers that we have reached struggle with tons of problems, doubts, and continual setbacks. Now, immigrants COME TO US, want help, and are very open to spiritual matters. The stronger believers "surfacing" in the local church are immigrant believers. To add spice to the story, it seems as though many Spaniards are suspicious of immigrants and some reject (or would like to eject) them. This is a different Spain, a different world than we found here twenty years ago. Ministry here is definitely different.

As for the NEHEMIAH PROJECT, Nieves and I met with the MAYOR last week and gave him a copy of the legal agreement that we wrote. Now we are waiting for a response from the city of Galapagar concerning permission to build. We are also waiting on bids from one of the architects, which may come this next week. While our bank director

has been very positive with us about working to give the church a loan, we have decided to wait to go any further with that until we have more information from the city and the architect. Your prayers about these matters are as crucial now as they have ever been.

solve short-term problems, real learning happens when the reward comes from within the child the self-esteem and satisfaction that come with a completed task. That means creating challenges that children can actually master. The "unmotivated" children in your classroom perhaps have had fewer experiences of success in mastering something new. A pattern of failure discourages them from trying. It's so important to give children experiences of success that help them move forward with their God-given drive to learn.

Key 7: Establish Caring Relationships

It's as simple as this: kids who love you want to please you. Experiences of success have as much to do with relationships as with mastering content. When children work hard to understand a new Bible truth and integrate it into their lives, they need to be encouraged and affirmed both by children's ministry leaders at church and by parents at home. Notice and comment on small steps of progress.

It's easy for little celebrations to be overlooked because, in an adult's eyes, the achievement isn't all that significant. Express your sincere love for children in winsome ways. Smile with your voice and your eyes as well as your mouth. Punctuate your words of encouragement with a caring touch on a child's shoulder or elbow. Ask God to set you aglow with his love.

This relational dimension of teaching matters enormously. Take time to celebrate answered prayer, to shout hooray after a Bible review game that shows how much kids have learned, to give a pat on the back to a child who's not having a good day. Warm, positive relationships can provide the emotional connection that starts the learning chain.

Key 8: Anticipation

Curiosity. Something out of the ordinary. That millisecond flash when you make eye contact and know you've caught a child's attention. You can help build the emotional connection needed for learning by creating mystery, excitement and anticipation about what is to come. You've caught their attention and they're eager to learn.


