FREE WILL BAPTISTS TO MEET IN TAMPA

The 2003 convention theme is "Founded On The Rock—Focused On the Future." Five ministers, all of whom lead national agencies, will deliver major addresses: Ron Hunter (Sunday School and Church Training Department), Larry Powell (Home Missions Department), Keith Burden (Executive Secretary), Matt Pinson (Free Will Baptist Bible College) and James Forlines (Foreign Missions Department). Kenneth Akers, who leads the Master's Men Department, will teach the Adult Sunday School Class.

Meeting simultaneously with the National Association are the 36th annual National Youth Conference (NYC), with an expected 1,500 registrants and the 68th annual Women Nationally Active for Christ (WNAC) Convention with more than 1,000 women anticipated.

The four-day NYC which includes Bible competi-

tive activities as well as a music and arts festival will rally around the theme, "Stand Still," from Psalm 46:10. NYC will conduct separate worship services for youth at Tampa Convention Center. Numerous seminars are scheduled for attendees. Several hundred teens will participate in "Reach That Guy" service and work projects within the Tampa community. The youth will meet with adults Wednesday evening for a combined worship service at Tampa Convention Center.

The two-day WNAC theme is "Lifting Up Our Eyes." During a WNAC Monday afternoon seminar, the Free Will Baptist French Muslim Team will present a 60-minute challenge. The Tuesday business session convenes at Tampa Convention Center. The WNAC keynote service will feature foreign missionary to Ivory Coast, Deleen Cousineau. Rosalie Ranquist with New Tribes Mission will address the Fellowship Luncheon at noon Tuesday.

Monday afternoon, the Pastor/Laymen Conference meets in Tampa Convention Center. Participants at the two-hour conference will hear Canadian educator and evangelist Ted. S. Rendall.

The Tuesday morning Home Missions/Foreign Missions Rally in Tampa Convention Center will draw some 1,000 ministers and laymen for the two-hour session with John Weaver (*Inside Afghanistan* writer) and Mike Cousineau, foreign missionary to Ivory Coast.

The Tampa Marriott Waterside will serve as headquarters hotel for the national convention, National Youth Conference

Reverend Archie Stanley Cooper 1907 - 2003

Reverend Archie Cooper, 95 of Kirksville, Missouri, passed away Sunday morning (April 27, 2003) at Kirksville Manor Care Center in Kirksville.

The son of Byron Isaac and Cleo Virginia (Muncy) Cooper, Archie was born July 10, 1907 in Mystics, Missouri-. On October 16, 1927. Archie was united in marriage to Verdie Summers and to this union two daughters were born. Verdie preceded Archie in death in 1945. In 1946, he was united in marriage to Gladys Wellman Peterson who preceded Archie in death on January 30, 1997.

Also preceding him in death were his parents: one daughter, Phyllis Beth Cooper at the age of eight; three brothers, Hobart, Walter and Kyle Cooper; two sisters, Kathryn Brown and Faith Hyatt and a son-in-law. Reverend Edwin Eloe.

Archie is survived by two daughters, Betty Lou (Cooper) Eloe of Lincoln, NE and Patricia (Peterson) Townsend of Riverside, CA; one son and daughter-in-law, Charles

and Jean Peterson of Kansas City, MO; one brother and sister-in-law, Horace and Helen Cooper of Green top, MO; five grandchildren; ten great-grandchildren and two sister-in-laws, Mildred Cooper of Brashear, MO and Dorothy Cooper of Greentop, MO. Archie is also survived by several nieces, nephews and a host of friends across the country,

Reverend Cooper lived most of his life in Adair County and was a preacher of fifty-three years. Archie was ordained for the ministry by the Free Will Baptist Association at the Hazel Creek Church in Adair County on September 4, 1937. He served at the New Harmony Church from 1938 to 1947 and at the age 69 returned to pastor from 1966 until 1995. He also ministered at Low Ground, Baring, Refuge, Jewe1 and Sublette churches. Archie also spent thirty-two years, every morning, six days a week at 6:15 a.m. serving many counties on KIRX with his morning meditations that he thought of from scripture, prayer and often a poem. Throughout Archie's amazing career, he ministered over nine hundred weddings and twenty-eight hundred funerals.

Archie did many things down through the years to support his family, He was manager of Groceries at the MFA in Novinger, MO, drove a school bus, drove a highway truck, farmed, did some carpentry work, and in his later years, he and his wife, Gladys were custodians at the Kirksville Savings and Loan.

Archie was recently recognized as the KTVO Heartland Hero. Reverend Archie was a devoted member of the New Harmony Baptist Church.

Weekend of Champions

"I was in prison and you came to Me." By J. Mark Vandivort

on piloted his C-141 cargo jet on many missions to Vietnam, taking over loads of bombs and bringing back bodies of dead American soldiers. After the war, this high achieving graduate of the Air Force Academy busied himself with his business, family and church. However, there was a sinful, secret dimension to Ron's life. Eventually, he was pulled into a deep vortex of depression to the point of becoming suicidal.

In sharing his testimony with our church, he related that he had spent time in a federal prison. While there he submitted himself with a broken heart to God for forgiveness and mercy. Ron's faith was strengthened and firmly established through an evangelical, Christian, prison discipleship ministry.

When I learned that Ron and his wife Rita were coordinating the Oklahoma City Bill Glass "Weekend of Champions" I felt that I should volunteer as a "freshman teammate" (Several people from our church served in volunteer positions). Bill Glass (former Baylor All American and NFL All-Pro) has directed personal evangelism campaigns in prisons since 1972.

Someone in the hotel elevator noticed my nametag. "What is a Weekend of Champions"?

I explained, "It is highly successful athletes, Nascar drivers, performers (and numerous other celebrities) along with 600 volunteers sharing the love of Jesus Christ with prison inmates. We tell them that Jesus died for their sins. By repenting of sin and inviting Him into their hearts, they can experience forgiveness of sin, peace, and salvation for their souls." By that time the elevator had reached the 3rd floor and I had received that "sorry I asked look". I can only pray that the seed of truth will take root and grow.

My preparation for the "Weekend of Champions" began with the study of a 36 page "Basic Training Manual" and workbook. This included scripture memory and reflection on the personal

evangelism methods of Jesus, Peter, and Paul. Also, when one is contemplating going behind prison walls and sharing Jesus face-to-

face with inmates, one tends to spend some extra time in prayer - letting God clean up hands and heart.

During the Thursday evening training session our leader emphasized seeking an open door to share the salvation Bible verses - speaking out loud - "faith comes by hearing". Also, we were taught to enroll interested inmates in a beginning Bible correspondence course. A veteran "teammate" took me under his wing and gave me person-toperson coaching. The idea of a veteran accompanying a Freshman felt very supportive.

I was assigned to a team of 8 men to witness in a certain section of a prison. Our program agenda had been carefully prepared and orchestrated. However, we were often moment-bymoment dependent upon the leadership of the Holy Spirit. And the spiritual warfare was sometimes severe. (Ephesians 6:12). I prayed that God would lead me to the men He wanted me to talk with. He answered that prayer! Several men prayed (out loud) for salvation and rededication. Also, a common struggle of several men with whom I talked was their struggle to forgive other people. (Matthew 6:12,14,15).

What types of people volunteer for a "Weekend of Champions"? I met Jeff, a UPS driver, while standing in line at the prison mess hall, waiting for our meal of beans, cornbread, spinach and Jell-o.

Fred, one of our team members, said that he had spent several years in the 'joint" - angry and mean. However, a visiting preacher had given him a gospel tract that he had stored away. During a time of deep despair he got out that tract and read of Jesus' love for Him. Then and there he invited Jesus into his heart.

Other teammates included a truck driver from South Dakota, a financial



planner from Dallas, and an electrical engineer from Silicon Valley. Several high level state government officials shared with the inmates their testimony of faith in

Jesus Christ.

I spoke with a young Missouri man that hours earlier had just returned from piloting his B-2 bomber over Baghdad. God was being glorified through his testimony of faith in Jesus Christ. I heard one "biker" say that he was going to ride back to lowa to get his wife so she could get in on the witnessing experience. He had to keep that "two wheeler" rollin' in order to make it back before the "weekend" was over.

A champion bull rider said that he was impressed with Oklahoma's Lieutenant Governor, Mary Fallin, when he saw her weeping as she shared Jesus with some female inmates. He said that if your eyes leak your head won't swell.

Both Friday and Saturday night services, which were conducted in large Oklahoma City churches, were devoted to inspiration and sharing. Some of the most jubilant sharing was from people who for the first time in their lives had won a person to Jesus Christ! There was "rejoicing" in heaven! One woman said that she was assigned to a room where boys ages 5-10 were housed. She shared with them hugs and the love of Jesus.

Bill Glass told us that most incarcerated youths have never received expressions of love, value, or belonging from their father or a father substitute. Some dedicated men are working on that problem.

One teammate said that a group of men who attended a previous "Weekend of Champions" had helped stimulate a spark of enthusiasm for personal soul winning in their church.

As I walked out of the hotel with my luggage, I stopped to talk with Terry, a roofing contractor. He said, "I hope I see you in Columbia, Missouri, June 27-29".

Update From Our Nat'l Home Missionaries

Hello again to you, our faithful supporter in the Lord's work of building a strong Free Will Baptist Church in Denver, Colorado. I normally take this time to bring you a couple of notes regarding the work but felt led to share differently with you this time than in the past couple of months. I want to let you know both the Good and the Bad regarding our situation here....

First off: THE GOOD

- People are being saved here at Mile High. We've had five professions of faith in just the past couple of months. Several more have rededicated their lives to the Savior.
- Attendance is up. Excitement is at an all time high since we began our work here in July of 2001.
- We've recently baptized four new men and women into God's family.
- All of this is a blessing and shows the desperate need of reaching folks with the Gospel here in Colorado. Ours is now the only Free Will Baptist work in Denver. The ONLY one. It is crucial we keep on keeping on for the Lord Jesus Christ.

Now...THE BAD (Or as I like to call it, Satan's battle for our work)

- Our Missions account is lacking nearly one thousand dollars a month of just breaking even with our expenses to stay in the field. We have the supporters on our list but very few individuals are giving. (For those of you who've been faithful, and to our base of church support, thank you so much and please continue with us. We desperately need your help to stay on the mission field.)
- Doing the work that needs to be done here to make this church self supporting is a full time job and then some...But I may be forced to seek extra employment if the situation doesn't improve. That would rob me of valuable time needed to do the things that need to be done in order to be successful. It's not an ideal situation and one our church families aren't fond of either, but I can't find any other way to try to muster the added support I need to stay out of the red. Leaving the field to travel to churches again to try to raise additional support isn't a good option either. The families here at Mile High need stability. Being gone for several weeks at a time would likely be disastrous. Since there are so few Free Will Baptist Churches in the state, finding a substitute preacher isn't easy, and it would cost us in honorarium fees, not to mention the fact that I wouldn't be able to be in town to minister to the new families and the needs of our existing families.
- Perhaps your church could help us by taking up a one time offering to help with our account or perhaps join our list of supporters? We need everyone to make this work. We're turning the corner here but we need YOU to keep the momentum going. I don't know what else to say but please, if you can, help us and God Bless You!


Theological Symposium

They replaced all the venetian blinds in the church; cleaned the windows inside and out; put down carpet In the trailer; put down linoleum In the trailer kitchen; removed the wall in the trailer between the kitchen and dining giving us a good sized room for fellowship; put the water line in to the trailer; (they will come back and re-plumb the trailer as it Is not giving us water in each outlet;) cleaned the trailer kitchen until it was spotless; folded and sorted several bags of clothes; put down tile in the church entryway; put down linoleum in the church bathroom; moved the church kitchen out to the trailer kitchen; painted the fence posts and gate; put in a raised vegetable garden; burnt all the brush; tore down and burned the old privy; installed a new pressure line on the water tank; etc. You can see what a blessing they were to us and our people. We had our Guatemalan ladies make 'pipian' which is a Guatemalan dish of rice, chicken and salsa made from pumpkin seeds; sesame seeds; cinnamon, etc. It was a big hit. We had a bi-lingual service before lunch; singing 'At the Cross' in both languages. All seemed to have a good time.

We have a new fence around our parking lot with a cattle guard. This helps tremendously. Thanks to Larry Wormington from New Life FWB in Monett and David and Michael Brittenham from Macedonia FWB. All the churches in the Indian Creek Association have been and continue to be very helpful.

Ruth had surgery on her right wrist for carpel tunnel syndrome Monday morning at 6 am in Springfield. We then drove to Park Hills church where she spoke that night to the mother-daughter banquet with 90 women. While she was speaking at the banquet, Travis Harrison (he came to Mexico with some of the Missouri preachers when we were there and stayed several weeks and worked on the seminary) asked me to speak to his English - as a -second language class (all Mexican), and since it was Cinco de Mayo (5th of May), one of their national holidays, we had a hamburger cookout. I gave my simple evangelical 'speech' and seven of the eight were saved. I think he can start a mission there with them. He speaks some Spanish and does very well. The one young man who did not respond has a wife and child in Mexico. Pray for him and for Travis as he works with them. His English class is on Sunday nights during the regular worship service, and this is a great opportunity for him to start a Bible study with them. He has had a burden for the Mexicans ever since his visit to Mexico in 1996.

Keep praying for us. We just added a new member today, as we took Eufemia to Joplin to the birthing center, and she had a 9 lb 14 oz baby boy named Angel. We hope she will be able to attend service Sunday on Mother's day with little Angel.

We continue translating for the police department when needed, the emergency room, and I go to Cassville every week to work with the first-graders who don't yet speak good English. Next year I hope to get in the Monett and Purdy classrooms, as this is a great way to meet newly arrived Hispanics.

We had no damage from the tornados, though they passed just to the north

MISSION MOMENT - MUSIC

As I write this article today, Ash Wednesday, Brazil and many other countries around the world have just finished "celebrating" what Brazil calls, CARNIVAL! Brazil extends their weekend as unbelievers dance in the streets, party every night and listen to loud samba music. In the USA this "celebration" is called Mardi Gras.

In using the word MUSIC for this month's title, I have in mind the cultures in which our missionaries live. Music many, times, expresses and explains our cultural situation. If you don't believe me just take this little test. When I say Nashville, TN, what do you think of?

I don't want to focus on the music of Mardi Gras or Carnival. However, I would like to examine more closely the cultural settings and contexts in which we present the gospel of Jesus Christ. Our SHOW-ME missionaries and state missionaries face a variety of challenges and cultures as they seek to reach people around the world with the message of salvation and attempt to plant churches.

I personally don't believe that our missionaries have been called, commissioned or encouraged by the Lord to plant Missouri, Oklahoma or even Tennessee Free Will Baptist Churches in Brazil or any other part of the world. We have been called to sow the seed of the gospel that is found in Scripture. Paul told Timothy to teach others "...that which you have heard of me."

The gospel seed grows best in natural, well-prepared soil. It is very difficult to grow oranges in MO, yet they grow easily in Brazil. It is very easy to see the beauty of a maple tree in MO, but in Brazil it would probably dry up. Soybeans grow well in both countries. Why? Because MO has the soil, fertilizer, pesticides and etc. that help soybeans grow tall and healthy. Brazil too, has learned how to plant, produce and price soybeans in such a way that they make an impact on the world market.

The seed of the gospel is much like the soybean seed. It can not be a plant that was nourished in one country and then transplanted into another culture with the idea that it will thrive and produce. When soybeans first showed up in Brazıl, they did not come as mature plants, but only in seed form. Each seed had to be planted in soil and then nurtured for growth. The gospel must be introduced as a seed that will be planted and nourished within the new culture, society and soil of the hearts of the hearers. The plants that grow will be different, but the seed is <u>always</u> the same.

When the Lord led us to sow the gospel seed and plant the Sao Jose FWB Church in Brazil, we made a strategic decision. We wanted to be sure that the music, worship, evangelism and leadership development was Brazilian and not from MO, OK or TN! The soil is different in Brazil, Spain, Africa and India, but the believers that grow from these seeds into mature plants will some day gather around the throne of the One and Only LORD OF THE HARVEST!
