


416 registered for the convention, and 134 reg-

istered for the Women Active for Christ meeting. The speakers for this year's convention were Max Courtney, Jim Williams, Dale Skiles, and National Executive Secretary, Keith Burden. They did a tremendous job in developing the theme, "Guarding our Heritage." The music and the singing were

excellent and complimented the preaching in every service. The Christian Education Board sponsored a workshop on Tuesday morning. The speaker was Dr. John Marshall who challenged the convention concerning world missions. He also delivered the morning message.

Business sessions began Tuesday afternoon with Moderator Richard Robinson delivering a challenging Moderator's message. During the Tuesday afternoon and Wednesday morning sessions, the delegates heard the reports and approved the budgets of the executive office, the bookstore, the five standing boards, and the Show-Me committee. They adopted a co-

operative budget of \$525,000.00; forgave the Youth Camp loan effective January 1, 2004; increased the state repre-





sentation fee from \$50 per church to \$100 per church; increased the gratuity for state delegates to the National Association from \$50 to \$100; approved a \$5,000.00 gift for Hillsdale and for Free Will Baptist Bible College from the executive office; voted to go





to Springfield for the 2004 meeting; approved a Show-me budget of \$521,563.72; heard Executive Secretary Nathan Ruble report that he had submitted his resignation to the General Board, effective August 29, 2004.

The delegates also filled 20 board and committee positions and elected officers for the association. New board


In August, Pastor Jack Day will have led this fine church for thirty-five years.

truly blessed the service. Following a delicious lunch served by the ladies of the church. the congregation and a number of visitors and former members met to dedicate the new addition.


The congregational singing and the special music helped give expres-



Rev. Bill Day Washing Pastor Jack Day's Feet





FOREIGN MISSIONS SELECTS LITTLE AS DIRECTOR OF STATESIDE DEVELOPMENT

oug Little of Russellville, Ark., was approved as the new director of stateside development for the Department of Foreign Missions at the April 2003 board meeting. The position has been vacant since Fred Warner resigned August 2000 to resume pastoral ministry. Little has served 18 years as senior pastor of First Free Will Baptist Church in Russellville. He is to begin his responsibilities with Foreign Missions in July.

"Doug is a man of God with the heart of God for the world and the passion to abandon his life for the sake of the call. Without any conditions or provisos Doug is my recommendation," wrote General Director James Forlines in his report to the Board of Foreign Missions.

Mr. Little states, "The focus of my attention will be serving state leaders and pastors by helping them lead their churches to respond to the enormous opportunities and challenges of extending the Kingdom of God to the ends of the earth. I believe God has not only called us but also equipped us, as Free Will Baptists, to play a strategic role in completing the evangelization of the world in the 21st century. I look forward to what God will do through us

as we work together in the harvest."

Doug is a 1977 graduate of FWB Bible College in Nashville, Tenn., where he received a B.S. in Bible, music and Christian education. He followed this with a master's degree in music from Middle Tennessee State University in Murfreesboro, Tenn., in 1983. Mr. Little also received a bachelor's degree in French from Arkansas Technical University in 1996.

He has served on the staffs of FWBBC and Hillsdale FWB College in Moore, Okla. He has also ministered on the staffs of East Nashville FWB Church in Nashville, Tenn., and Southern Oaks FWB Church in Oklahoma City, Okla. Doug has led the Russellville church to become one of the denomination's top-giving churches to global outreach. At the same time, the church has given generously to FWBBC, Home Missions, the Cooperative Plan and various other ministries. Mr. Little has served on the Arkansas Executive Board, the Arkansas State Mission Board and the Free Will Baptist Bible College board. He chaired the FWBBC board for four years. In July 1998 he was elected to the Board of Foreign Missions and has served as chairman for the last three years.

Doug was born in Ashland, Ky., and is married to the former Joyce Dunbar, daughter of former board member Galen Dunbar. The Littles have a daughter, Rachel, who married Thomas Whittenburg in December 2000.


The 2003 meeting flowed smoothly from the opening session through the closing service. All of those who helped with registration, ushering, and music are to be commended for making this possible.



MISSIONARY RON CALLAWAY TO JOIN BIBLE COLLEGE FACULTY

The Reverend Ronald Callaway, veteran Free Will Baptist missionary to Spain, Cuba, and Panama, will join the Free Will Baptist Bible College faculty to direct its missionary-training program, according to Dr. Milton Fields, Academic Dean.

Rev. Callaway, a 1975 FWBBC graduate, will transition from his service with the Free Will Baptist Foreign Missions Department to begin teaching at the college this fall.

In addition to the Bachelor of Arts he earned at FWBBC, Ron has studied at the University of Madrid (Spain) and holds a Master of Divinity degree from Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary. Since 1976, he and his wife, Linda, have served as church planters and as teachers in institutes in Spain, Cuba, and Panama. He currently serves as interim pastor of a Panamanian Free Will Baptist church.

FWBBC President Matthew Pinson says, "Several things attracted us to Brother Callaway. He has served on more difficult fields such as Spain and more receptive fields such as Cuba and Panama. He is the best known teacher/scholar on our mission field. He has a passion for the lost and for global evangelization. He is also noted for his outstanding work with high school students on E-Team mission trips." He added,"I am confident that he will be an excellent addition to our Biblical and Ministry Studies Department."

The Missouri-Texas native says he is looking forward to getting involved with Bible College students and helping them prepare to serve God. He will fill the place occupied by Rev. Tom McCullough for six years, before he assumed the pastorate of Central Free Will Baptist Church, Royal Oak, Michigan, last summer.

MISSION MOMENT

MESSAGE:

issionaries must know the MESSAGE for the world and know the world in which we communicate the MESSAGE. Last month we talked about the gospel seed and soybeans. I tried to explain that the soil of Missouri and the spiritual soil in Brazil are not the same as we looked at cultural differences. This month I want to look more closely at the seed or MESSAGE of the gospel.

When Jesus spoke to Paul on the road to Damascus, He defined for Paul the MESSAGE he was to proclaim. Acts 26:17-18 Delivering thee from the people, and from the Gertiles, unto whom now I send thee, To open their eyes, and to turn them from darkness to light, and from the power of Satan unto God, that they may receive forgiveness of sins, and inheritance among them which are sanctified by faith that is in me." This is a very important message of freedom, liberation and blessing. We have been hearing a lot about these things in the news lately, yet Jesus gave the MESSAGE of freedom and liberation more than 2,000 years ago!

Missionaries must be willing to share the Scriptures as a seed and not a potted plant. This allows the gospel to be received by hearers and allows the Holy Spirit to work in their hearts as they seek to understand the gospel. We made a decision in Sao Jose to present a Bible study, a seed and not a potted plant, based on the book of John, the "Gospel of Belief". Through this Bible study non-believers were given a chance to hear the gospel message and have a better understanding of their need for Christ in their lives.

The Lord proved time and time again the promise of Paul in Romans 1:16, concerning the gospel, it is "...the power of God unto salvation." Our missionaries are proclaiming this power of God around the world. They are building bridges of communication as they share the liberating MESSAGE of Jesus with so many that are in bondage and fear.

We must pray for our missionaries as they communicate the greatest message ever known to man. It doesn't do any good to send willing messengers over 5,000 miles away to preach the gospel, if we are not willing to "pray them through" the last 5 feet, which are the most difficult to overcome in communicating the gospel MESSAGE



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
