
I want to thank all of you who have contributed articles during the past twelve years. You have made my job easier and interesting. I hope that each of our churches will contribute news items for the new editor.

#### What's Your Weak Spot?

Every year my dad bought a new car, put 40,000 miles on it without changing the oil or having it serviced, and then traded it back to the Ford dealer for a new one.

Every year the Ford dealer would say, "Well, Harold, can I talk you into some options this year?" "Just a heater," Dad would say. "Well, what about color?" the dealer would ask."Cheap," Dad would answer. "Any color that's cheap. I like cheap colors."

Even Dad's wardrobe reflected his indifference to the material world. For one ten-year stretch, he wore nothing but black slacks and white shirts. 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# When Anxiety Rules Your Life

When I was born, my parents lived in the city. My fa-

ther owned his own business where he commercially raised flowers. I grew up with red tulips at Valentine's Day, white lilies at Easter and pink roses for Mother's Day. Before I started school the business outgrew its location, so my parents purchased a twenty-acre farm to expand the greenhouses.

Mother was concerned because the property had a pond and I did not know how to swim. In preparation for our move to the country, she felt I needed swimming lessons as a precaution.

Every week during the summer months, Mother faithfully took me to swimming lessons in an indoor pool. I didn't like the water at first because it scared me. My mother told my swimming instructor about my anxiety. He took extra care to help me overcome my fears. I learned to trust that he would watch over me. I don't think he was a therapist, but somehow he understood what I needed to overcome my fear. He started by exposing me to the water for short periods of time. I started in the shallow end of the pool and gradually swam in deeper water. Frequently, to reduce my anxiety, he told me to take deep breaths and slow down.

One day my instructor surprised me by advancing me to diving. My first step was to learn to jump into the water from the edge of the pool. I tried, but I couldn't do it-I was petrified. "Breathe deeply," he told me while encouraging me with his words. He told me to keep repeating to myself positive statements like, "I can do it."

"I've got a deal for you," my instructor told me that day. "I know you're scared, so you don't have to jump today. You just need to stand at the edge and think of what it would be like to take the plunge. I want you to become familiar with what it feels like." Week after week he patiently waited for me, but I refused to

jump. I wanted to do it for him, but my body wouldn't move when I got to the edge.

One week I overheard him making fun of me to one of the other coaches. I was crushed. I determined I would show him. I'd take the plunge. The other kids dove into the water before me. When it came to my turn to jump, my body froze. He turned his back to help another student. Determined to avoid further humiliation, I quickly jumped into the water and instantly plunged toward the bottom. Then I panicked. I remember gasping for breath and taking on water instead. I struggled to come to the surface, but fear had immobilized me. My body lunged from the bottom to the surface and instantly sank again.

Mother saw what was happening to me and screamed for help. Because the pool was indoors, her cries were muffled so no one responded. Mother was desperate. She leaped over the other parents and just as she prepared to jump in the water, my instructor rescued me. "Carol will have to continue her lessons," the wise instructor told Mother. "If she doesn't continue, I'm afraid she will never go into the water again. He did continue to work with me for several months, but I was still not able to overcome my fear.

In the meantime we moved to the farm. It wasn't until several years after that event that I took summer swimming lessons and was able to conquer my fear.

The principle I learned from my swimming instructors is similar to the one I now use as a therapist to help my patients address their anxiety issues. It's called "systematic desensitization."

There was a two-part process of helping me overcome my fear of the water. Part of the success was the technical process of exposing me to something I feared. The other portion of the equation was the love and support of Mother and my instructors. It was their caring that I believe ultimately challenged me to move forward.

Excessive comfort and support will not help an individual with an anxiety disorder. Loving limits, however, combined with breathing and relaxation, encourage the person to move forward and take adult responsibility for overcoming the anxieties.

Love has an amazing ability to help us conquer our fears. The apostle John wrote, "Perfect love casts out fear" (1 John 4:18, The Message). In this verse the word "perfect" carries with it the meaning of "whole" and "healthy." The Message further explains it this way: "There is no room in love for fear. Well-formed love banishes fear. Since fear is crippling, a fearful life . . . is not one fully formed in love."

People with anxiety disorders are living fearful lives, and as the apostle John acknowledged, they need love from the body of Christ to overcome and be "fully formed" individuals and develop the specific skills they need to overcome their fear and anxieties. This development is not an event, but a process. I didn't overcome my fear when I jumped into the water the first time; it was a long-term process of learning to trust others and myself.

If you have an anxiety disorder, it will take time for you to trust others and to expose yourself to what you fear. But the promise of being able to "jump in and swim" with confidence will lead you to an abundant life.

Not long ago, I had the opportunity to see underwater from a new perspective. I took a ride in a glass-bottomed boat and saw schools of brightly colored fish, giant seaweed and the coral in the Pacific Ocean. I realized there is an entire world that has opened to up me now that my fear is gone.

When Does Worry Become Excessive? Jesus had a lot to say about worry. Early in his ministry, he gathered his followers on the mountain above the Sea of Galilee. Part of his teaching focused on the destructive implications of worry in our lives. Matthew 6:26 says, "... Do not worry about your life..." Jesus knew that worry would take precious time away from what is really important in our lives-our relationships with others and with him.

People with Generalized Anxiety Disorder have difficulty turning off their worry machine. Some researchers tell us that the more we worry, the more we become programmed to worry. Eventually, worry can become a primary response. Simple

#### **Passion to Possess**

I think most of us are a little like my dad. We have one little weak spot. Whether it's a motorcycle, a home, a boat, clothes, books, stamps, jewelry, furniture, art, music, horses, etc., most of us have a weakness that occasionally gives way to runaway desires. I don't think I've ever met anyone who doesn't have to struggle now and then to control the passion to possess something.

The tenth commandment warns us about this passion to possess. It tells us to be very careful about inordinate desires that encourage us to covet. Coveting is an all-encompassing compulsion to possess something. It's not merely the act of admiring something. We certainly can appreciate an object for its beauty, workmanship, or functionand express that appreciation freely-without coveting it. But there's a big difference between saying, "I like that," and saying, "I have to own it." When we covet something, we decide we're not going to rest until we get it. What is it for you?

#### I Want It All

Never in the history of civilization have people been as "pushed to possess" as we are. Marketing research is a billion-dollar-a-year business. Thousands of people in this country spend 40 hours a week designing ways to trigger our buying mechanisms. They use music, slogans, sights, sounds, and colors to inflame our passion to possess. Often they attempt to stimulate fear, nostalgia, pride, sexual arousal, jealousy or some other intense emotion. Their ultimate goal, though, is to impair our self-control just long enough for us to decide that we simply "must have" their product. They're trying to make us covet.

Advertisers are not, however, the only ones guilty of this ploy. Managers sometimes dangle attractive inducements in front of producers or salespeople in an effort to increase their output. "Just think," they say, "about that Caribbean cruise. Or that golfing vacation in Pebble Beach. Or that huge bonus." Some sales organizations even encourage people to hang color pictures of their dream possessions on their refrigerator, bulletin board, or bathroom mirror. Hopefully, these constant reminders will motivate them to sell more products.

Obviously, not all incentive programs are bad. But when their underlying motivation is to produce a fixation that causes an employee to sacrifice greater values for the sake of profits, those incentives are wrong. Any program, ploy, or advertisement that knowingly creates the climate for covetousness is a tool Satan can use to distract us from spiritual concerns.

Paul says, "If then you have been raised up with Christ, keep seeking the things above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your mind on the things above, not on the things that are on the earth" (Col. 3:1-2, NASB). The Living Bible says that if we really know the Lord we should "have as little desire for this world as a dead person does" (Col. 3:3, TLB). A familiar chorus tells us that if we "turn our eyes upon Jesus," the things of this world "will grow

strangely dim."

Those concepts make sense to me. It seems reasonable to expect that those of us who truly know Christ as Lord and have our attention focused on Him should have a somewhat detached attitude toward material things. We should realize that though they're a necessary part of our earthly existence, they're not an ultimate value.

Why should we, who have been born again to spiritual life, allow ourselves to be controlled by runaway desires? Why should we fix our minds on things that will rust, rot, and depreciate? We are men and women created in the image of God; we've been called to be agents of reconciliation. We're created to accomplish eternal goals. When we fix our minds on transitory commodities and temporal goals, however, we live beneath our privilege.

The Victories Continue!


Matthew 28:19 "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost"


has been excellent. By the time you receive this newsletter, I will be nearing my three year anniversary as a missionary here in Denver. It's amazing how much God has used this experience not only for the advancement of FWB missions in Colorado, but also how much He has used it to deepen the faith of every member of our family. We came here with a clear plan of action but as you know, sometimes God has other ideas. Plans have to be amended and steps of faith taken in order for the victories we've seen to become reality. Let me share with you just a sampling of the victories we've seen since coming to Mile High:

- \* We've added several new families to Mile High. When we started here, about 22 were coming to worship. We're regularly running 50 even on slower days!
- \* Last summer, we remodeled the interior of our worship center taking out old stained carpet and dilapidated pews and replaced them with more inviting carpet and comfortable chairs. worries about food, clothing, and shelter become excessive and consuming. People with GAD tend to worry about things that most likely will never come true.

We need to learn to rest in the Lord; to leave things we can do nothing about in his capable hands. The Bible often speaks of this in terms of "abiding in Christ." Learning to abide, or remain, can go a long way in alleviating our anxieties.

Jesus the vine likens his followers to branches of that vine. "Remain in me and I will remain in you. No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in me" (John 15:4).

Jesus goes on to underscore that "apart from me you can do nothing" (v. 5). No amount of frantic thought or activity on our part can bring about peace of mind and heart. In 2 John 9, the apostle John speaks of both the harmful consequences of taking matters into our own hands and the rewards of abiding. "Anyone who runs ahead and does not continue in the teaching does not have God; whoever continues in the teaching has both the Father and the Son."

In I John 2:28, the future benefit of remaining calm in Christ is readily apparent: "And now, dear children, continue in him, so that when he appears we may be confident and unashamed before him at his coming."

The more confidence I place in Christ, the stronger and more confident I become as a follower of Christ. To begin the journey of healing from an anxi-

#### **Too Much Dynamite!**

Our neighbor, who lived on an adjacent farm, walked to our house one summer evening, asking if I would like to join his "job crew" digging holes for electric poles. His foreman had asked him to find another "good man". The pay was 3 or 4 times the minimum wage of that time. I was excited at the prospect of earning that "big money". It was after World War II, and in the "hill country" where I lived contractors were busy building electric lines to outlying farms and communities.

The next morning after helping Dad milk our cows I caught a ride with my neighbor to the contractor's office. I sensed that the job foreman was disappointed to see a 17-year-old boy instead of a job hardened, skilled laborer. Nevertheless, upon my neighbor's recommendation, I was hired and assigned a 9 ft. steel bar, hole diggers (with 9 ft. handles) and dynamite.


My excitement grew as we rode the 4-wheel drive Army surplus van over the rough electric line right-of-way. (In my mind I can still picture the cases of **dynamite** bouncing off the van's steel floor.)

My boss instructed me to dig as many 6 ft. holes as I could during the 8-hour workday. (Sometimes we worked overtime if our quota was short.) He demonstrated how to use the dynamite, instructing me to use it sparingly and only if I hit hard clay (packed nearly as hard as concrete). He cautioned, "Never use dynamite in a hole when the soil has a lot of relatively loose rocks because the sides

The boss also taught me to stand looking straight up into the air after I set off a charge of **dynamite**, explaining that if I saw rocks falling back to the ground to step aside out of their way. Apparently, I successfully followed that bit of advice. ("He who obeys instructions guards his life. ..." Proverbs 19:16, NIV).

I dug holes for several days but always fell short of my quota. One day I had a hole about 4 ft. deep, but my digging tool was bringing up one or two rocks at a time – finishing this hole would last forever. I thought that a tiny bit of **dynamite** would hasten things along. Upon hearing the blast, my foreman came to investigate. The sides of my hole had caved in! He worked the remainder of that day to remedy my catastrophe while I, a "fired" hole digger, watched. (I had learned the importance of following instructions.)

Later that summer, Uncle Homer hired me to use a jackhammer and dynamite to help dig a basement under his kitchen. He taught me safe procedures. And I gained confidence that I could learn a new skill and accomplish an assigned task. The pay was 60 cents per hour.

The Bible speaks of wages, "For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 6:23, NKJV). (For a more complete description of eternal hell and eternal heaven, read Luke 16:19-31 and Revelation chapters 20-22).

Our experiences ahead are unknown. Eternity is certain. "I am but a pilgrim here on earth: how I need a map—and your commands are my chart and guide" (Psalm 119:19, Living Bible).

It sure pays to read the operator's manual—the Bible.

Dear Friends,


It's been awhile since I've written. My, how time flies. Let me hit some highlights and try to catch you up on things.

Building Plans - We are once again working with architects on revised building plans. The archi-tects were in town a few weeks back and I feel we made good progress. We are working on two concepts. One is a multiple ministry concept that will allow us a larger facility. I do not know if this is feasible, but we are going to do some research and see what God might do. In the next few weeks we will make a decision whether to pursue that. If not, we will begin progress on a much smaller facility, smaller than our original plans. It will be a more affordable building that is expandable. Pray that God will provide what is needed. I am seriously concerned about building a facility that will not allow for growth. Southern Hills should one day be a large church. We want to make sure we provide the foundation for such.



his morning we received a call from Brother Inocente Pacheco with the news that Brother Pablo Salazar passed away last night. Brother Pablo suffered a total renal failure eleven years ago. He had been on peritoneal dialysis during this whole time. beginning with four times a day and later increasing it to five. Pablo took care of the procedure in a special room in his home. The kidney failure was due to damage suffered some years earlier following a chemical spill in a refinery where he worked. At the time of the complete renal shut down the doctors told him that he might live a year. Not one to be easily discouraged, Pablo smiled that big old toothy smile and set out to make it a good year. He was quite ill at the time of the initial failure and had to give up pastoring the church in Panuco. He and his family moved to the Bible Institute in Altamira and lived there in the house on campus. He looked out the window, calculated how long it would take him to walk to the nearest housing addition, and how long he could visit before he would have to start back and do the next treatment. How he grinned when he told me that he had passed his first year and was still working. He later moved with his family into his mother's home and from there successfully started a mission in the Revolucion Verde Colonia. There he oversaw the building of a church building and out of that congregation started another mission.

Sunday night the pastors in Altamira had agreed to trade places. Brother Pablo preached in the Ebenezer church where Brother Lazaro de la Rosa pastors, and Brother Lazaro preached at the Revolucion Verde church. Following his message, Brother Pablo suddenly became ill with an apparent heart attack. Right there in the church, where he had just poured out his heart to the congregation, his earthly service ended.

We are saddened for his family, but a bit envious of Brother Pablo who now beholds our Savior's face with to-
