Thanksgiving 2004

I recently read of a group of women who listed the things for which they were thankful They said:

-For automatic dishwashers because they make it possible for us to get out of the kitchen before the family comes back in for their after-dinner snacks.

-For husbands who attack small repair jobs around the house because they usually make them big enough to call in the professionals who do it right.

-For children who put their things away and clean up after themselves. They are such a joy you hate to see them go home to their own parents.

-For teenagers because they give parents an opportunity to learn a second language.

-For smoke alarms because they let you know when the turkey is done!

It seems that when we begin to look at those things for which we are thankful, we are looking at the benefit we receive from them. I suppose that is normal, after all that is what makes us thankful.....what it does for us or how good they make us feel.

I am sure that the pilgrims who we emulate at this season were thankful just to be alive and anything that made that possible was subject to their thanksgiving praise.

Nothing wrong with that either. But sometimes I think that we need to concentrate more on the giver of the gifts than the gifts themselves or how they make us feel. It seems that we are much more thankful when a need is met than for the giver when the need is gone. It is easier to be thankful for the food when I first sit down to the table or when it has just satisfied my hunger than when I am not hungry at all. If fact, that same food, for which I was so thankful moments earlier doesn't even smell good when I am satisfied (or over-satisfied!)

David said in Psalm 100

Make a joyful noise unto the LORD, all ye lands. Serve the LORD with gladness: come before his presence with singing.Know ye that the LORD he is God: it is he that hath made us, and not we our-

selves; we are his people, and the sheep of his pasture. Enter into his gates with thanksgiving, and into his courts with praise: be thankful unto him, and bless his name.For the LORD is good; his mercy is everlasting; and his truth endureth to all generations.

The Lord was reminding Israel that the day would come when their wandering and travel and fighting would be over. They would achieve the promised land and would settle down with their families and would grow satisfied and fat. God is saying "Don't forget who brought you out of Egypt, through the wilderness and into a land flowing with milk and honey!"

What a joyous, rejoicing, celebrating tone there is to Psalm 100. You can almost hear the Israelites as they entered into the courts of the Lord with their loud cymbals and trumpets crashing and blaring away! You can see their swirling robes and waving hands! One thing Israel did well and that was worship! And the Lord responded to their worship. This psalm is His request through David for their praise and worship.

It was His name they were lifting up...He was the object of the worship...not the gifts he had given them or the deliverance he had provided for their nation, He was the object.

Roland Allen tells about a missionary who had spent many years in India as a medical missionary. He told Allen about the region he served having a mysterious disease that resulted in progressive blindness. The people would be born with healthy vision but the malady would strike them and they would loose their sight as they matured.

But the missionary was enabled by the Lord to develop a process that would arrest the blindness. Many people came to him and he performed the operation on them. They would leave his small hospital realizing that they would have become blind, but now they were going to be able to see the rest of their lives!

He said that they would never say "Thank You," because that phrase was not in their dialect. Instead they spoke a word that meant "I will tell your name." Where ever they went, they would tell the name of the missionary who had cured their blindness. They had received a marvelous gift and they were going to proclaim the name of the one who had provided for them.

That is what David is telling us....when we recognize what God has and is and is going to do for us, we cannot help but do what Psalm 100 instructs us.

Enter into his gates with thanksgiving, and into his courts with praise: be thankful unto him, and bless his name!

Our Thanks to Bro. Dale Skiles for arranging the golf tournament, even though he had jury duty that day and did not get to play!


FootWashing Pamphlet Available

Florida Free Will Baptists Establish Hurricane Fund

After a series of hurricanes hammered the state in September, Florida executive secretary Randy Bryant said a hurricane relief fund has been established to assist Free Will Baptist churches and families that experienced substantial loss. Contributions may be sent to:

A September 16, 2004, e-message from Randy Bryant indicated that several Pensacola area churches reported damage from Hurricane Ivan.

Early reports said trees had fallen on First FWB Church in Pensacola and the roof was down to the sheeting. Beulah FWB Church in Pensacola reported extensive water and tree damage to the church and fellowship hall. Soul's Harbor FWB Church in Pensacola reported three tree limbs through the parsonage roof and limbs through the fellowship hall roof. Shiloh FWB Church in Bratt, Fla. reported the fellowship hall flooded, the vestibule ceiling collapsed and the parsonage roof damaged.

Reverend Bryant said he expected more damage reports from pastors and churches as telephone service was restored in the Florida Panhandle.

The Mile High Update

A Serious Situation

Psalm 25:2 (KJV)

"0 my God, I trust in thee: let me not be ashamed, let not mine enemies triumph over me."

A couple of months ago in my last newsletter, I entitled my lead article "The Victories Continue." I am consistently encouraged by what I've seen in our people and the bless-

ings the Lord has made possible in the few years we've been on the field here in Denver. The mortgage has been burned, our sanctuary made inviting to new families looking for a church home, and most importantly, our people welcoming newcomers with open arms and loving kindness.

This month, However, I have some sobering news to bring to your attention/ Our missions account, which I have spoken to you about several times, is now too far in deficit for Home Missions to be able to subsidize it any longer. I know that many of you contribute finan-cially each and every month, and for those who do, I can't tell you how grateful I am for your con-tinued support and commitment to see this work done right. Many though, for whatever reason, have not supported us in a long time. Perhaps it was the long commitment and

new pressures that day to day life brings with bills and such. I've been there; I know. I wasn't able to go on a full itinerate when I began, but we were hopeful with my taking over the work begun by Rev. Chuck Lotz two years prior, that we would be able to sustain the support that was raised when he went on itinerate in 1999. We were both from the same area, both from the same denominational dis-trict.etc. It looked like a good fit all the way around even though it wasn't planned that way. The reality was that the church families here needed leadership and fast. They had already been with-out a pastor for nearly 3 months before my family and I arrived in Denver in July of 2001. Fringe families that had only recently started attending began dropping like flies because of the lack of a pastor and the dearth of Free Will Baptist pastors in this state. We only have 6 churches in the whole state of Colorado and mine is the only one in an approximately two and a half hour drive between Colorado Springs and Fort Collins where our nearest churches are.

When I began super-vising the work, we had approximately 5 families that stayed with us. We essentially had to start over even though the church had been under missions support for nearly two years prior to my arrival.


So where does that leave us? Well, as of this writing, I am over \$15,000 in deficit in my account. Our church is going to budget a larger amount than we were planning to go into my salary account, but as a businessman also, I can see the numbers don't add up to where I'd like them to be as of yet. The church is already helping us tremendously with our health insurance which is quite sizeable for a single family, non group policy. In addition we have to have funds outside

> of our operating expenses for things like advertising, outreach and materials needed for effective minis-try in our region. I'm not sure there's enough yet for all that would be needed, but we're going to trust in the Lord that this will be done.

My commitment to you as our supporter is that I am com-mitted to the vision God has given me for this work. We are quite strapped with time now as it is, but it looks as if, barring a resurgence of giving to my account, that I may have to seek outside employment to help support our family here. We are drawing a minimum salary compared to the cost index for living in Denver. My wife is working full-time to do all she can to help, but we can-not afford to live here on less than what we have right now. I hate to sound so dire when so much good is happening here in our work, but this is all very real. I take comfort that we are being put through this because I truly believe Satan's at work to try

to derail our efforts and get our minds focused on ourselves and our situation and take our eyes off the work that is being accomplished at Mile High. He doesn't waste his time on things that aren't impacting the kingdom of God. If you haven't supported the work here in a while, would you please prayerfully consider supporting us again? If that's not possible, please pass the word along that we are in need of help. Perhaps a one time offering at your church could help us bring down our deficit and ease some of the pres-sure. If nothing else, please pray for my wife and children. I'm not so concerned about myself, but I certainly don't want this to become a strain on her, and in turn, affect the kids heading back to school. God Bless You and thank you for your support of us!

A new boy came to our one-room country school from a big city——he didn't talk like we did. Kids at our school didn't know much about big cities, and Harvey didn't seem to know much about milking cows and horse manure. Also, he seemed unfamiliar with some of the games we played——some of which we made up ourselves.

For reasons which I don't understand, our teacher didn't seem to like Harvey. One day Teacher loudly demanded that the city boy come to the front of the room and lean across the teacher's desk. Then Teacher made a big production of pulling his heavy leather belt from the loops of his pants. Suddenly Harvey leaped out of the teacher's reach and ran out of the schoolhouse with Teacher in close pursuit!

Immediately we heard loud "slap, slap, slap," sounds. Some of us cautiously crowded up to the window in the "cloak room" (where we stored our lunch buckets and hung our coats). What we saw was beyond belief! Teacher was hitting his own leg with his belt as he watched the "boy from Boston" disappear around a curve that led to his grandparent's farm. When our teacher entered the room we were all sitting in our seats, quiet as little country mice. Harvey was back in school the next morning and the incident was never mentioned.

Sometimes people are slow in accepting others if they represent a different race, socio-economic class, or culture. The Apostle Paul addressed this issue in one of his letters to the first century Christian churches. "So you are all children of God through faith in Christ Jesus. And all who have been united with Christ in baptism have been made like him. There is no longer Jew or Gentile, slave or free, male or female. For you are all Christians—you are one in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:26-28, New Living Translation).

Rather than "run around a corner and slap your leg with your belt," look for some commendable quality in other people. Seek to encourage and cultivate good relationships. May God use you to draw out the best in people. Jesus gave us the *Golden Rule*, "Do to others as you would have them do to you" (Luke 6:31, NIV).
